REPORT ON OPERATIONS BY 22nd BATTALION A.I.F. FROM 3.10.18. TO 5.10.18., NEAR ESTREES (SHEET WAINCOURT, 1/20,000)

I beg to report as follows .-

PART T ATTACK ON 3.10.18.

PRELIMINARY.

At noon on October 3rd, the Battalion received orders to move from trenches G.24.a. through ETRICOURT to trenches in H.13.c

ASSEMBLY.

At 15.00 instructions were received to move into Assembly trenches in BEAUREVOIR system, B.27.a & c. Finding the Front Line only partly dug, the Battalion assembled in the rear trench, with "D" Company on Right of main ESTREES-GENEVE Road and "C" & "A" Companies on the Left of the road. Whilst waiting here two hostile planes flying low spotted the troops and as a result of their reconnaissance, shelling by 5.9's followed. Casualties were 3 O.R's wounded.

ATTACK.

Punctually at 15.30 the barrage came down and rested on its initial line for 6 minutes. The Battalion, with 23rd Battn on Right and 24th Battn on Left, at once moved to the attack, pressing through the 18th Battalion - "D" Company on Right, "A" Company on left, with "C" Company behind "A" Company. "A" Company obtained their objective - a line through LAMOTTE FARM - and "C" Coy passing through them got their objective, and pushed out to the line of trench B.23.c., along trench in B.22.b.7.2., and thence in line to B.15.d.9.1. The copse in B.23.c. was inclusive to 23rd Battalion, but CANAL at B.16.c. was inclusive to the Battalion, hence the front was 1400 yards in extent.

The enemy appeared taken by surprise to some extent, but on the whole fought fairly well. There were several instances where determined resistance was offered by small groups of Machine Gunners, and an examination of the ground after the attack evidenced the fact that the bayonets had been used by

our men to a greater extent than usual.

On the high ground in B.23.c. a 4-gun battery of 77 m.m. Guns was found, and the enemy made determined efforts to prevent them falling into our hands. The adjacent posts were mopped up by "D" Company, and the battery captured. 45 prisoners were secured in the vicinity of these guns.

On the main road in B.28.a., a 5.9. Howitzer was found,

being still in good order.

A reliable estimate of the number of enemy killed is hard to arrive at, but I consider that at least 50/60 were killed out in the open on the Battalion front. Several pill-boxes and deep dugouts were bombed; and had dead in them, but I am unable to say how many.

ART ATTACK ON 4.10.18APPENDIX

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PRELIMINARY.

During the night 3rd/4th October, consolidation of the newlygained ground was pushed on with, some difficulty being
experienced about B.22.b.7.2., where a gap existed in our line.
This gap was caused by casualties and slight loss of direction,
and the enemy had pushed in and established Machine Gun posts.
A local thrust by one Platoon of "O" Company at about 21.00
mopped up the posts, and joined up.our line.
Companies were now disposed.FIRING LINE.- "D" Company (Right) "C" Company (Left)
"A" Company, Support (LAMOTTE FARM)

ORDERS.

At 23.00, 3.10.18., orders were received to continue the attack at dawn, and capture the X-roads B.18.a. to B.18.c.3.0. in conjunction with 23rd Pattalion on the Right and 7th British Brigade on the Left.

The enemy was barraging the ridge in B.28.b.- B.21.d. and the continuous shelling rendered telephonic communication with the forward Companies impracticable. In view of this I decided to go forward to the firing line myself and issue the attack orders to the officers concerned. By 02.00 I had discussed the plans with the Company Commanders on the ground, and allotted objectives as follows.-

OBJECTIVES.

"A" COMPANY. Line from X-roads in B.18.a. to B.18.c3.0.

"D" " CANAL B.17.a.7.0., along road to B.17.d.8.2.

"C" Coy constituted the Battalion reserves, and was allotted the special task of safeguarding the left flank in case of the Unit on the left not reaching its final objective.

At 06.00 the barrage opened on the start line and remained for

25 minutes, afterwards moving forward at the rate of 100 yards

every 4 minutes. At 06.25 the Battalion moved to the assault,

ATTACK.

"C" Company gaining its objective without serious opposition, and becoming my reserve. As soon as "D" Coy passed "C" Coy's objective, heavy Machine Gun fire was encountered from the direction of GENEVE and FACTORY in B.17.d. An enemy Machine Gun was also firing from the enclosure B.17.d.1.5. Vigorous action with Lewis Guns against this point covered the mopping up of this post, and enabled the advance to proceed after a slight check. "D" Coy then pushed on to its objective and consolidated. "A" Coy (who were to take the final objactive) struck serious opposition from Machine Guns firing from FACTORY B.17.d. and Railway embankment B.17.b. but the advance was maintained under cover of two Lewis Guns, which from the embankment on road in B.23.a. engaged the enemy, and forced him to withdraw. The above information was received by lamp signals from an advanced report centre at B.23.c.1.4., but no news of the left flank was obtainable from our Coys, although at 10 a. m. a telephone message from the Brigade Major stated that the British had taken PONTCHAUX. In order to obtain first-hand information I pushed forward myself, and found that the casualties of the two leading Coys had been severe, and that the left flank of the Battalion was in the air. Severe enfilade fire was causing more casualties, and the report that PONTCHAUX was captured was found to be incorrect. The situation regarding this exposed flank appeared critical, and the following action was decided on and carried out .-"A" Coy pushed on by short rushes and gained the line of the road B.17.d.8.1. to B.17.d.7.7., thence refusing the flank towards B.17. central, where touch was gained with the Support Coy ("D" Coy). This movement was difficult, and was carried out under very intense frontal and enfilade Machine Gun fire, but the men responded splendidly to what was required of them. One Platoon of the Reserve Coy ("C" Coy) was placed in the CANAL at B.17.c.00.80, to further secure our exposed flank. At about this time, touch was obtained with elements of the 7th British Brigade at B.17.c.60.95., beyond which point they could not advance.

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ATTACK (CONTD) The above was the situation at noon when I returned to Battalion H.Q., and reported to the G.O.C. by phone.

The firing line was maintained in this exposed position throughout the remainder of the day, though subjected to converging fire from all directions - more especially from the exposed left flank, where the enemy had pushed Machine Guns close in against our small posts.

Nightfall permitted minor adjustments of the line to be made, and although the flank remained exposed all the succeeding day, the position was handed over intact to the 3rd Battalion, 117th American Regiment, on the night of 5th/6th October.

I regard this operation as one of the most difficult in which the Battalion has yet been engaged, and only the determined spirit animating this Company enabled this exposed salient to be retained.

Many enemy were killed by Lewis Gun and sniping fire, and in posts mopped up during the advance.

REPORT ON OPERATIONS - 3rd and 4th OCTOBER, 1918. Ref. Map .- WIANCOURT Ed. 1. 1/20,000.

In accordance with Brigade Order No. 181 the Battalion moved by Route March from CAPPY (Where it had been in Rest) to LE MESNIL on the night 27th/28th September, 1918.

During Night of 28th/29th September, 1918, a move from

LE MESNIL to TINCOURT was carried out.

After two days at TINCOURT, the Battalion again moved forward to vicinity of VILLERET on the morning of 1st October, 1918. Here the Battalion was to bivouac in Trenches in approx. G. 14. but at 17.30 message was received by 'Phone that the Battalion would. go into Reserve to the 5th A.I. Brigade which was to take over the Line JONGOURT - ESTREES, and that consequently we would move up to vicinity of ETRICOURT in H.13.a. and d. Move was commenced at 18.30.

Transport and Q.M's. Store and all Details were left at this point on the 1st October, 1918, but moved forward to CANAL at G. 22. b. 2.5. on the 3rd October, 1918. BLANKETS were also dumped

on the 1st October, 1918. On arrival at H.13. it was found that a Company of the 30th A.I. Battalion were occupying this position as Reserve to the 31st Battalion, A.I.F., and after consulting with C.O., 31st Bn., it was agreed that the 23rd A.I. Battalion should relieve the Company of the 30th A.I. Battalion.

This was completed about 23.00. The Disposition of the

Battalion then was .-

H'Qrs .- H:13.c.7.9. "A" and "B" Coys .- In SUNKEN ROAD, G. 18.b., %. and d. "D" Coy .- SUNKEN ROAD, G. 18.a., c. and d.

These Dispositions were sent to 5th A.I.Brigade at 23.15. On the 3rd October, 1918, at 10.05 a.m., verbal instructions were received from the 5th A.I. Brigade to send one Company up to Close Support and to take up their position along SUNKEN ROAD running through H. 2.d. and H. 9.b., notifying C. O., 18th A. I. Battn. that they were in this locality. They were, however, to work solely under orders of G.O.C., 5th A.I. Brigade.

At 11.30 verbal orders were received from 5th A.I. Brigade that the balance of the Battalion was to move forward and take up position in BEAUREVOIR - FONSOMME LINE from B.27.d.O.4. to H.4.c.8.6. This move was commenced at 12.30.

Battalion H'ers. remained in vicinity of 18th A.I. Battn. H'Qrs. at H.8.c.9.5. in order to be in touch with 5th A.I. Brigade.

At 15.50 on the 3rd October, 1918, verbal instructions were received by 'Phone that the Battalion would attack at 16.15 in conjunction with 22nd and 24th A.I. Battalions.

The order of Battle arranged was 23rd A.I. Battalion on Right, 22nd A.I. Battn. in the Centre, and 24th A.I. Battn. on Left. Boundaries were .-

RIGHT .- A line from H.4.c.6.6. through to B.30.a.central. LEFT .- B.20.central through B.9.central. Between 23rd and 22nd Bns .- H. J. b. 6.8. to COPSE in B. 23.c.cent-

ral (approx.) inclusive.

Between 22nd and 24th Bns .- B. 27.a. 7.6. to B. 16.c. 0.2.

23rd A.I. Battalion Objective Line running from COPSE in B.23.c. central (approx.) inclusive to B.30.a.central.


The Barrage Line arranged was a line running through B. 15 . central and B. 29 . central where it played for 6 minutes./

A Conference of Coy. Commanders was held at "A" Coy. H'Qrs. in SUNKEN ROAD, when verbal instructions as to dispositions for Attack, etc., were given them.

At about 16.10 verbal message was received that the Stunt

was postponed.

at 18.10 I received werbal instructions from G.O.C., 5th A.I. Brigade, that ZERO Hour would be 18.30 and that the Barrage P. T. O.



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would open at 18.40. This was conveyed to Coys. by 'Phone Immediately.

Battalion H'Qrs. opened at H.S.b.4.6. in BEAUREVOIR LINE at 18.30.

The Order of Battle for this Battalion was .-

"B" Coy. - RIGHT - First Wave.

"D" " - LEFT - First Wave.

"A" Coy. - Second Wave.

"B" and "D" Coys. in BEAUREVOIR LINE, and "A" Coy. in SUNKEN ROAD.

The pace at first had to be rather FAST to enable Coys.

to get up behind our Barrage.

at 19.50 Telephone Message was received from the Front Coys. that Objective had been reached all through and that opposition had been slight. This information was immediately passed back to 5th A.I. Brigade H'Qrs.

The Dispositions of Coys. then was .-

"B" Coy. - On RIGHT Half of Objective.

"D" " - On LEFT Half of Objective.

Each had a Platoon from "A" Coy. in CLOSE SUPPORT.

The balance of "A" Coy., with Coy. H'Qrs., was in SUNKEN ROAD running through B.28.b. and B.29.d.

Some trouble was experienced in getting touch with the Troops on RIGHT of this Battalion and until they were located, the SUPPORT Platoon in Rear of "B" Coy. was utilised to form a Defensive Flank.

A second Platoon from "A" Coy., in the SUNKEN ROAD, was pushed forward

to a position overlooking the Right Flank.

at about 03.00 on the 4th October, 1918, word was received from 0.C., "A" Coy., that he had located the 6th SHERWOODS (The RIGHT Flank people) in RAILWAY CUTTING in B.29.d., but that they had instructions to withdraw from that position. This information was passed on to 6th A.I. Brigade (Who had taken over control of the Front at 22.30 on the 3rd October, 1918.) at MEE 03.05. At NO time was my RIGHT FLANK actually in close touch with the people on the Right.

Up to this point out Casualties had been light and the Prisoners captured amounted to 17, including 1 Officer, most of whom were Wound-

ed.

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At 22.30 on the 3rd October, 1918, I received a message stating that the 23rd A.I. Battalion would attack again at 06.00 on the 4th October, 1918, in conjunction with the 22nd A.I. Battn. on LEFT. The Operation involved a change of direction to the RIGHT with this Battalion's RIGHT FLANK as the Pivot.

The Artillery Barrage for this operation was to start as

follows .-

B.30.a.5.7. to B.23.a.1.6., and B.22.b.8.2. to B.16.d.6.4. where it rested from ZERO to ZERO plus 25, lifting at rate of 100 yards every 4 minutes till it reached Final Protective Barrage Line.

B.24.d.9.8., B.24.a.9.9., B.18.d.7.5., B.18.a.6.5., where it rested for 30 minutes gradually easing off.

The Start Line of this Barrage necessitated the Front Line being withdrawn about 300 yards to be clear of danger.

This information was conveyed to Coy. Commanders at 02.35 in writing.

The Order of Battle for this Operation was same as before,

"B" Coy. on RIGHT, and "D" Coy. on LEFT.

B.50.a.5.5. to Cross-Roads at B.18.a.2.2. inclusive. The Inter-Battalion Boundary was EAST-WEST GRID Line running between B.18. and B.24.

At 06.00 the Barrage opened.

at 07.35 word was received from Front that the RIGHT Coy. had gain; its objective and was occupying the system of Trenches in B.24.c., but that the LEFT Coy. had been stopped by Machine Gun Fire in SUNKEN ROAD running through B.17.b. and B.24.a. and c. This information was immediately transmitted to 6th A.I. Brigade.

at 08.30 this information was again confirmed and it was ascertained that the LEFT Battalion had also been held up in continuation of this SUNKEN ROAD. Machine Gun Fire was extremely heavy

P.T: 0.

and Enemy Field Guns were seen firing at Point Blank Range. When darkness set in on night of 4th October, 1918, the LEFT Coy. pushed forward to its original Objective and established itself there for the rest of the Tour in the Sector.

During the 4th and 5th October, 1918, much valuable information was obtained as to Enemy movement in Rear and this was tele-

phoned to 6th A.I. Brigade as received.

The absence of Artillery Liaison or F.O.O. during the whole operation was very much folt. It was not until late on afternoon of 4th October, 1918, that a Forward MEER Observation Post for artillery was established and many Targets were missed owing to having to transmit al. information back through Brigade H'Qrs., which on several occasions was cut off from us owing to wires being broken.

During Night of 4th/5th October, 1918, the 2nd Aust. Div. Pioneers took over the RIGHT Sector from 138th British Infantry Bde. and a Warning Order was received that the 21st and 24th Bns. of the 6th A.I. Brigade were attacking the Village of MOMBREHAIN on Morning of 5th October, 1918.

We were instructed to Patrol the RAILWAY CUTTINGS in B.30.c. and B.29.d. and see that they were kept clear up till within

half an hour of ZERO time on the 5th October, 1918.

Patrols were sent out and reported that Enemy had established a Machine Gun Post in CUTTING in B.29.d. It was arranged to put Stokes Mortars on to this position and have a Platoon ready to occupy it when Mortars ceased fire. Before this was actually carried out another Patrol reported Enemy Post at LEVEL CROSSING in B.30.c.

After consultation with 6th A.I. Brigade it was arranged to leave these places till ZERO Hour, when Barrage would be put on them

in addition to original Barrage Line.

Both these Cuttings were clear at 16.00 on the 4th October, so that Enemy must have just occupied them prior to our Patrols

getting out.

Early on Evening of 5th October, 1918, I was advised by 6th A.I. Brigade that the Battalion on my had not reached its Objective during the Stunt, but was holding a system of Posts along the Dotted Trench in B.30.d., and that I was to push down SUNKEN ROAD from my RIGHT Post at B.30.a.5.5. and establish at LEVEL CROSSING in B.30.c. or even further along SUNKEN ROAD in B.30.c., if necessary, and that the Battalion on my RIGHT would push forward and link up. This was accomplished without opposition.

Battalion was relieved by portions of the 2nd and 3rd Battns.

of 117th Americans Regiment on night 5th/6th October, 1918. our Casualties for the whole tour amounted to .-

> Killed .- 4 O.Ranks. Wounded .- 26 O. Ranks.

2 Officers were Wounded but remained at Duty. Most of these Casualties were caused in the early Morning Stunt on the 4th October, 1918, or in holding the Line afterwards. BOOTY .- 9 German Machine Guns were captured.

List of recommendations for reward is being sent under separate cover.

The feeding of the Troops throughout the Operations was

satisfactorily carried out.

TRANSPORT arrangements were satisfactory, except that on two occasions during the move forward, the new Mules which were obtained recently, in place of horses, were unable to keep up, thus causing some delay to progress of Transport Column.

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REPORT ON THE OPERATIONS CARRIED OUT BY THE

SATH BATTALION DURING PERIOD OCTOBER END

OCTOBER 6TH 1918.

PART I.

At 1800 on October and the Battalion was located in the HINDENBURG LINE with Battalion H.Q. at B.16.d.2.8.

Attachment to 5th A.I.Brigade.

At 1400 on the 3rd inst. I received instructions from the G.O.C., oth A.I.Bde. that the 94th Battalion had been placed under the orders of the G.O.C., 5th A.I.Brigade.

At 1430 I reported to the G.O.C., 5th A.I.Bde. who explained to me the limits of the advance effected by the 5th A.I.Bde., and informed me that my Battalion would probably be called upon to attack in order to establish the high ground South of BEAUREVOIR. The G.O.C. stated that my objective would probably run between the Mill in B.15.d.3.7. and the Canal at B.16.c.8.8. In anticipation of this the Battalion was ordered to move to a point of readiness in the BEAUREVOIR System, Between B.30.central and B.36.b.7.9. I immediately despatched a party consisting of an Officer and 6 scouts to reconnoitre this position and having called a conference of Company Commanders briefly explained to them the position and the probable objectives for the attack.

The Battalion moved in Artillery formation from the HINDENBURG LINE at 1545 passing South of NAUROX and North of ESTREES. In front of ESTREES I was met by the Officer whom I had sent forward to reconnoiting, who stated that there was no shelter into the BEAUREVOIR LINE, and the men would be under direct observation. Having satisfied myself by personal reconnaisance that this was the case, I decided to place the Battalion in the Sunken Read running along the GRID LINE between B. 20c. and d. This afforded reasonably good cover and was a suitable Assembly point. While moving into this position we were observed by 1 low flying enemy plane; which fired on the troops continuously, and brought down a heavy enemy barrage, but & succeeded in getting the troops placed along the Sunken Road with only two casualties.

At 1715 I received instructions to report to goth Bn.H.Q. at H.S.C.3.0 and there had a conversation with the G.O.C., 5th A.I.Bde. from whom I received orders to attack at 1830, the objectives to be as previously stated. An order which had been sent, had not arrived, so I decided to adhere to the objective laid down in my previous conversation i.e. from Road junction immediately North of Mill at B.15.b.3.8. to TORRENS Canal at B.16.c.8.8. Touch was to be effected here with the gand Bn. who were attacking on my right. The attack if successful would give possession of the summit of the hill overlooking BEAUREVOIR and would furnish a good jumping off place for an attack on the village.

The attack was to be supported by an Artillery bombardment commencing at 1840, resting for six minutes in front of the TORRENS Canal in B.90b. and B.91.a., and then moving forward to the objective at the rate of 100 yards every four minutes.

I reached my Battalion Headquarters at 1880, and briefly explained the scheme to my Company Commanders, who were awaiting instructions, impressing upon them the necessity for moving quickly as the TORRENS Canal 1000 yards in front must be reached before the barrage opened. I decided to entrust the attack to "A and "B" Companies and held "D" Company in reserve in the Sunken Road running through B. 20. central.

Companies moved quinkly to the line of the Ganal, "A" Company on the

right by way of the Sunken Road running North through B. 20.b. and d. and "B" Company on the left by way of the Sunken Road running North through B. 20. central. Junction between the Companies was effected on the line of the Canal where each Company deployed into two waves, and Passed through the 20th Battalian. The left Comapny was longer in getting to the Canal Line and was left behind by the barrage, but they doubled for about 200 yards and came level with the right Coy. during the progress of the attack.

Enemy resistance was slight. A party of enemy attempted to run away in front of the right Company but was driven down a deep dugout at B.16.a.3.2. by our Lewis Gun fire and 24 men captured. The right Coy. then occupied the objective and established touch with the sand Bn. on the right.

The left Company met with more opposition and killed 16 of the enemy in two Posts North of the Mill. An enemy Post of six and a machine gun were also captured at B.15.b.0.8. by a Patrol moving to gain touch with the left Ede.

Patrols were sent out as Ear as BELLEVUE FARM to establish touch with the 7th Ede., but no trace of them could be found, so I sent a Party of 1 Officer and four Scouts from En. H.Q., who established touch with them at B.14.b.8.8. at about 2100.

The total captures in this operation were IEX one 77 mm Gun, seven Machine guns, 33 prisoners, 4 messenger pigeons.
The enemy Battalion Commander was fired at but escaped.

Our casualties in the operation were two killed and four wounded.

Subsequent to the attack a German Battalion runner walked into the right Company Hqrs. and was captured. A German Patrel seeking to re-establish the line in front of our left Company was routed. Six of the enemy were killed and two captured. At least 85 of the enemy were killed in the operation.

PART II.

At 9930 on October 3rd the Battalion again came under the orders of the G.O.C., 8th A.I. Bde. and the relief by the 30th Manchester Regiment had already begun. The felief however was not complete until about 0300 on 4th inst., when the Battalion moved to a position in B.28.a. and b. Here the Battalion spent the day and though subject to intermittent enemy shell fire suffered slight casualties, one man being killed and one wounded. At about 1400 I received orders for an attack on MONTBREHAIN which was to take place on the morning of October 5th.

Report of the attack on MONTBREHAIN by the seth A.I.Bn. on the morning of October 5th 1218.

Ref. Mar WIANCOURT, 1/20,000.

The Battalion assembled at the J.O.T. at 0530 in accordance with Operation Order 117 with "A" Coy. on the right, "B" Coy. in th. centre and "D" doy, on the left. At 0605 the barrage came down as arranged and the troops moved off with the two leading platoons of each Coy. in extended order and the third and fourth platoons in lines of sections in single file. The Tanks had not arrived and the attack was launched without them. "B" Coy. in the centre was the first to meet with opposition. They had scarcely Passed the Railway cutting in H.G.a. when four enemy strong Posts at about H.S.a.P.P. were encountered. These Posts were rushed and several prisoners captured. Resistance came almost immediately after from the trench system in H.6.a. and b. An enemy strong Post at H.6.b.l. contained numerous machine guns and 48 Germans, and a desperate struggle ensued, the enemy fighting fiercely until our troops were within three yards of their guns. They were however eventually overcome and the garrison killed to a man. At the same time two Minenverfers and a machine gun were silenced and captured at H.S.D.S.S. "D" Coy. on the left and "A" Coy, on the right had in the meantime made good Progress, and met with little resistance, but heavy cas-

ualties had been already inflicted by the enemy artillery, which was very severe throughout, and followed the advance with deadly accuracy.

A Tank now appeared on the right and did excellent work in reducing a series of four enemy Posts at about H.6.2.0.0. The advance continued, and again "B" Coy. met determined opposition, but having overcome a series of organised groups of riflemen, who took shelter in shell holes, they Jushed on to the Quarry in H.6.b.9.9. This obstacle presented almost insuperable difficulties, but they were overcome by the magnificent initiative and daring of 3/Lieut. INGRAM and Sgt. Witherden. Together they rushed two of the German Posts, and shot the crews, with the exception of those whom they sent to the rear as Prisoners. Sgt. Witherden then turned one of the captured guns on the enemy, and fired with such deadly effect as to sorable the whole post to be rushed, and captured. In this quarry were 40 machine guns and considerably more than 100 Germans. In one dugout alone 63 Prisoners were taken.

Magain and again the enemy resisted flercely. At B.30.d.l.l. four machine guns were captured. Two more were captured in the corner of the Cemetery at H.O.b.70.95., and on the left of the Cemetery three more posts were mopped up.

By this time the Coy. had become isolated and heavy machine gun fire was encountered from the direction of B.30.central, and so it was determined to dig in here. Accordingly a line of strong Posts was established from B.30.d.0.3. to B.30.d.7.0. and efforts were made to regale touch with "A" and "D" Coys. The nature of the shelling was mainly responsible for the loss of connection between "A" and "B" Coys. The enemy placed a terrific barrage along the line from . H.S. central to C.25.central, which in addition to inflicting heavy casualties caused "A" and "B" Coys, to diverge - "A" going to the right and "B" to the left.
"D" Coy. had by now reched a line running from B.30.C.e.5. to B.30.c.

0.0., where they experienced heavy M.G. fire from B.30.a.7.4. and from the direction of B.30d. and C.10.c. The artillery, which covered

the advance of "D" Coy. had been very ragged throughout, and on the left mestassammen, whence so much fire was coming, no artillery fire at all. A Tank came to their assistance but it was disabled, and two Officers were killed and another wounded in their efforts to advance. The fourth Officer of the Coy, had already been killed so the C.S.M. deginding that further advance was impossible decided to dig in here. "B" Coy. seen got into touch with them and Lieut. Calvert came across and took charge of the Coy. After some trouble he established touch with the gard Bn. on the left. Meantime "A" Coy. had continued its advance through the village, morped up two machine guns and a minenverfer at I.l.b.l.a. and reached C.95.b.7.2. Heavy casualties from shell and M.G. fire had

reduced the strength of the Coy. very considerably, and had caused a gap between "A" and "B" Coys., "A" Coy. therefore halted on a line from C.95.b.7.2. to C.95.d.5.5. the right being in touch with the glat En. A strong Post was established at C.35.b.7.8. to protect the left, and Lt. Clough went out with five men to get into touch with their Company on his left. He reached the enemy system about B.30.d.9.5., but in so doing four of his fibe men were killed by M.G. fire and so he was forced to return without having established connection. Leaving this post to Project the flank "A" Coy. pushed on to its objective, which it reached with but twelve men. Heantime the enemy had worked his way down to about G.85.c.4.0. and he also appeared in large numbers on the right flank threatening to cut "A" Coy. off. The remants of the Coy. therefore with a Party of the glat Bn. withdrew from the village, and moved across to join

Our casualties had by this time been very heavy, and it was decided to ask for the help of two Coys. of the a7th Bn. Heantime "A" Coy. and a Platoon of the Blat Bn. which was in support, moved forward and joined up with "B" Coy. establishing three posts at H.C.b.3.9., B.30.d.6.0. and B.30.d.8.0.

Lieut. Clough of "A" Coy. and Lieut. Reid of the 37th Bn. with two runners now went out towards the village to reconneitre, and get into touch with the alst Bn. Meanwhile the Posts furnished by the alst En. were relieved by our men, who also established another post at I.1.a.4.7. and the men so relieved were sent over to Lt. Roberts glat Bn. for it was decided to close the gap by working back from C.25.d. 9.7. where Lt. Roberts was established. This was done and the 91st Bn. established posts at C.95.d.3.4., C.25.d.0.0. and 1.1.2.7.7.

The men of the 97th Bn. were not called upon except to carry up some ammunition. The dispositions of the Coys, at the conclusion of the operation was as follows. - from left to right.

"D" doy, strong posts from B.30.c.8.3. to B.30.a.3.9. with three Vickers Guns at B.30.c.7.0., B.30.c.4.7. and B.30.0.7.4.

"B" Coy. from B.30.d.0.3. to B.30.d.7.0. At nightfall an additional post was established at B.30.d.5.9. and here five Prisoners were taken.

"A" Coy. Four strong Posts at B.30 d.6.0., B.30.d.8.0. I.1.2.1.8. and I.l.a.d.B.

It is impossible to estimate the number of enemy killed by my Bn., but never before has it inflicted such heavy casualties. -Vickers Gun, Lewis Gun, Rifle and Revolver ran out of amounition repeatedly, extras supplies were sent forward and much was salved from casualties. German guns were freely used on the enemy, and the battlefield was littered with German dead.

"B" coy. alone, whose strength at the beginning of the operation was but 90 men claims to have killed 300 Huns and to have captured 200 Prisoners, 100 machine guns, a minenwerfers and a Field gun. Our As soners were no fewer than 380, but as men were few, and the Pioneer Bn. was known to be morping up in rear, they were sent back

1. Wherever Tanks appeared the enemy fired a double green flare, which brought down a heavy barrage.

4. Great benefit would be derived from the establishment of am observation post in the front line as soon as Possible after the objective is taken. The fire of our artillery often fell short, and large groups of enemy frequently offered excellent targets for our guns. In such cases early information is all important.

5. A frear lamp port was established as D Coy's position and proved invaluable in maintaining emmunication with Br. H. Q.



Period 06.00. 2.10.18. to 22.30. 3.10.18.

At 06.00 on 2nd October the Battalion was in a trench system at G.17.b.

just South of NAUROY.

At 11.45 orders were received to move at once to a trench system at B.25.c. The C.O. was also informed that the Unit would then come under the orders of the G.O.C., 7th A.I. Brigade.

After a hasty lunch the Battalion moved off at 12.15 and was disposed in the

trench system at B.27.c.

This area was spasmodically shelled and at times an amount of "blue cross" gas shells were fired which necessitated the wearing of S.B.Respirators by troops in the vicinity.

Casualties.- Nil.
Captures.- Nil.
Enemy casualties.-Nil.

Period 22.30 3.10.18.to 06.00. 6.10.18.

At 22.30 on 3rd inst., the Battalion moved from trenches at B.27.c. - where it had been supporting the 7th A.I.Brigade - to the BEAUREVOIR Line at B.27. The night was exceptionally dark, and, owing to the lateness in the arrival of orders, it was impossible to make a daylight reconnaissance.

Lieut.A.PECK and 1 N.C.O.per Company and Bn Hqrs left an hour previously to arrange billeting. The route taken was via FOLEMPRISE FARM, thence by compass bearing across country to the trenches allotted.

This movement was successfully accomplished without casualties although the outskirts of the Village near which we passed were subjected to continuous heavy shelling.

On arrival the troops were placed in shelters in the trenches and Bn Hqrs were established in a dugout near by Telephone communication was established with Brigade at NAUROY. A guide was sent to the cookers and a hot meal was brought up to the troops at 4 a.m.

The Battalion remained here until 03.00 on 5th inst. Although the position was shelled frequently, we sustained only two causalties - 2 0.R. being

evacuated wounded.

At a conference held at Bde Hqrs at 15.00 on 4th inst., instructions were received for an attack to be made, in conjunction with the 24th A.I.Bn and the 2nd Pioneer Bn, assisted by Tanks and the necessary artillery. The objective was to capture and secure the Village of MONTBREHAIN. The capture of the Village was entrusted to the 21st & 24th Bns, while the 2nd Pioneer Bn were ordered to establish themselves on the Right Flank facing South. On. the night of 4th/5th October the 2nd Pioneer Bn took over the line from the English troops and at 3 a.m. the 21st Bn moved from its position in the trenches at B.27.a.&.c. to an assembly position in trenches at H.10.d., arriving there at \$4.15.

At 04.30 the Companies moved from the assembly position on to the J.O.T. where they arrived and were in position without casualties by 05.30. All the surrounding valleys were continually being shelled with gas although the concentration was not sufficient to warrant the wearing of the S.B.R., the use of which, on account of the darkness, would have seriously hampered

the move.

The J.O.T. had been laid by the 6th Field Company, Australian Engineers, earlier in the night. Two guides per Company with the Intelligence Officer had reconnoited the H.O.T. and one guide per Company remained there while the other met his Company at the Assembly Position and guided the troops into position on the J.O.T. The assembly position had been similarly reconnoited and a guide had met each Company before moving from B.27.2.&.c.

90 The 2nd Pioneer Bn was withdrawn behind the J.O. t. 15 minutes before Zero. Bn Hors was established at B.10.a.1.3.and a forward Report Centre at f.6.c.2.2.on the J.O.T. before Zero. This was moved to the Railway Cutting as soon as possible after Zero. The R.A.P. was established at SWISS COTTAGE, but on account of the distance from the front the R.M.O.moved forward about two kilometres and established

his Post in the Railway Cutting where he did exceptionally fine work, though continually under heavy enemy artillery fire, for over ten hours. At Zero (06.05) the barrage opened rather weakly and as soon as its fringe

was discerned the troops moved up to it, taking cover behind a Railway Enbankment.

While here the barrage increased considerably and came down on our own troops, causing considerable casualties.

The enemy barrage came down very quickly and was fairly heavy. This is accounted for by the statement of a prisoner who stated that an attack was expected and extra artillery had been brought up especially to deal with it The attack was made by "A" Company, plus 1 Platoon of "D" Company, on the Right, and "B" Company, plus 1 Platoon of "D" Company, on the Left. "D" Company, less 2 Platoons, occupied the old front line as soon as possible after Zero. For the first time in the experience off the Battalion the enemy barrage shortened, as our attack progressed, irrespective of where his own troops were. This continued until our men were well into the Village, when the barrage again lengthened to the old front line, which, until 15. 17.00, was subjected to continual bombardment with 5.9 and 4.2 shells. Exceptionally strong enemy machine gun fire was encountered from the Village, but this ceased when our men entered the Western outskirts. From then onwards the opposition gradually weakened.

The tanks allotted to the Battalion were late in getting on to the J.O.T. and one, as it advanced behind our men, inflicted a number of casualties with its fire. Another, moving through the Villagerfired into houses that had been mopped up and in some cases were occupied by our men. The tanks seemed unable to catch up to the barrage and were of no assistance in the attack.

On emerging from the Village, the troops could see the enemy running away over the high ground, but, when he realised that the advance had stopped and we were in such few numbers, he apparently reorganised and returned in formed parties to get in touch with our outposts.

Considerable machine gun fire was directed on our right flank troops from DOON MILL and on our left flank from a Northerly direction. Also a Field Gun fired point blank at a distance of 500 Yards until silen-

ced by our artillery and machine gun fire. A battery of 77 mm fired from BRANCOURT at a distance of approximately

1000 Yards on to the Posts of the Centre Campany. A Line of posts was established clear of the village. - "A"Company, under Lt.W.McConnochie, established four posts on the South of the BRANCOURT -MONTBREHAIN Road. C.S.M. Trevascus, with a mixed party of 21st & 24th Bns, established three posts on the Left of "A" Company. "B" Company established two posts on the North East edge of the Village. This Company pushed out a post into a sunken road about 300 Yards past the Village at C.26.a.5.6. This post and one at C.25.d.9.7. were under heavy machine gun fire. The former being in danger of ebing cut off was withdrawn into the Village. Another Post seeing this one coming in also withdrew, but both were reorganised, and, having salved a quantity of ammunition, again established at post in the sunken road.covering the North-Eastern edge of the Village.

As the position on our immediate left was rather obscure the 2 Platoons of "D"Coy in support were ordered to clear it up and establish posts securing the North-Eastern edge of the Village.

Two posts were established near the Cemetery, and, in conjunction with the 24th Bn, a line of posts securing the Village from attack on the North side were established.

At 10.35 the C.O., 21st Bn, was advised be telephone from Brigade that two Companies of the 18th Bn were in trenches at H.10.b.and at his disposal. On account of the thinness of the front the C.O. decided to send both these Companies forward. The two Company Commanders were sent for and at 10.55 they were given verbal orders where to take their Companies and what they were required to do. One Company was to reinforce the Line astride the MONTBREHAIN - BRANCOURT Road, the other to move up through the Village and to establish connection between the post at I.2.a.0.6. and the Cross Roads at C.25.d.9.7. Each Company was to carry up extra bandoliers and S.A.A. from the dump at the Railway Cutting in H.6.c.4.4.

These Coys were met at the Railway Cuttingby Lt. W. E. Hardwick M. C. who gave them their locality and direction.

APPENDIX - 3 -At 12.40 Lt. Hardwick reported that that Lt.F. Gawler M. C. had established four posts on the North side of he Cemetery in B.30.d.extending to I.1. a.5.9. and was under heavy machine gun fire; that Lt. W. H. Roberts was digging in on the Cross Roads on his Right. It. Roberts eventually established these posts (two) on the Cross Roads at C.25.d.6.7.to C.25.d.9.7. The two Companies of the 18th Bn were in position at about 15.00. The enemy throughout the day was advancing in organised parties over the high ground that surrounded the village - evidently with the intention of establishing a line as close as he could to us. Though he never launched an organised counter-attack he at one time almost cut off a post that was established early in the sunken road at C.26.c.5.6. Our Lewis Gunscaused great slaughter amongst these parties, continually dispersing them and inflicting heavy casualties. One post & about I.2.c.5.8. and another at H.6.b.9.9.each claim 100 casualties to the enemy. The section of the 2nd M.G.Bn attached to this Unit were blown out at the start. Another section was sent up and did very good shooting. The section of the 6th A.L.T.M.B. had no targets but endeavoured to fire on DOON MILL. They had only fired two rounds when they came under heavy artillery fire and the Officer was wounded . Being put out of range they returned to the Quarry at H.12.b. with their gun and ammunition. Of the four tanks attached to be Battalion only two have been reported on as being in their allotted area and their action was unsatisfactory. Our artillery was very thick during the barrage but the fringe was extremely ragged and after the first few minutes the fire suddenly increased twofold. The troops had moved forward as usual at Zero as close to the barrage as safety permitted and, whilst waiting in the shelter of a bank for it to lift, the increased fire came down on them, causing heavy casualties. One coy Commander was killed and another was wounded. As the advance continued the irregular fringe was responsible for many more casualties and I estimate that 40% to 50% of our casualties were caused by our own Artillery Fire. As in all previous battles, once more the liaison between the Infantry and Artillery was very weak, and, though want of time may be put forward as an excuse, there should be no excuse for not having a responsible senior Officer with Bn Hqrs, who could, by runner or 'phone, pass on information direct to the Battery or Group, especially as in a case like the last battle where the ground was undulating a F.O.O. with a wire to Group or the Officer at Bn Hqrs would be able to direct the Artillery fire instead of having to depend upon the observation of an Artillery Officer in the Firing Line, and on the Infantry communications to get the news to Bn Hgrs. Even then the

Bn Commander has to send the message on to his Brigade on the Infantry Line. The sending of a junior Artillery Officer to a joint Bn Hqrs from which operations are being directed, and, he having to depend on Infantry Communications to get and despatch his information, is wasting the time of this Officer.

Castalties were quickly cleared. The R.M.O. (Capt. H. Mendelsohn) showed great initiative in establishing his R.A.P. in advance of the J.O.T. as soon as circumstances permitted, and also the manner in which he collected and used the prisoners as stretcher bearers was the means of getting the battlefield cleared, and the early rendering of first aid and prompt despatch of wounded to the rear by prisoners was. a very meritorious performance and responsible for the saving of several lives.

At about 3 15.00 on the 5th inst., verbal instructions were received that the 118th Regiment of the American Army would relieve the Brigade Group. The C.O., 21st Bn., was requested to take charge of relief and arrange for the whole front.

On the arrival of the American parties in advance the front was divided between their 2nd & 3rd Bns. The 1st Bn went into trendes in Support at H.10. The necessary guides were provided by the 20th A.I.Bn.

Having halved the front by an approximate line East and West, each Bn Area was divided into three parts - one for each coy of the incoming Unit. The fourth Company in each case being kept in support in the Railway Cutting and Sunken Road.

Instructions were then sent to Lt. W. E. Hardwick M. C. at the Railway Cutting, & Lt.R.H.Farndon at the Quarry at H.12.b.9.9.Lt.J.Horsburgh D.C.M., M.M. was sent with a short order, and map marked in areas, forward to arrange for the relief with the above mentioned Officers. These were the only Officers with whom the C.O. was in touch at the time. They were instructed to see the senior Officer in ech area, show him the map, and give him a copy of the order Each Officer was held responsible in his own area for the guiding in of the Americans and the handing over to them of their particular area.

Each area sent out five guides who reported to Lt. Horsburgh at SWISS COTTAGE at 19.00 and, on the arrival of the Americans, they were led in by the area guides.

The relief went well and would have been completed before midnight had not the guides from one area got lost. This party did not reach their proper position until after midnight.

Relief was complete by 02.35. 6.10.18. The Battalion moved out in small parties to the Cookers which were located near NAUROY.Traffic men were posted on the various corners to direct the men as they came out. Bn Hqrs arrived last at 03.30.


Captures - Prisoners It is not possible to state the number captured as, on account of the few men in the line, the prisoners were usually sent out with stretchers and became mixed with the prisoners of other Units. It is estimated that 150 Prisoners were sent back.

Material. It is also impossible to give an accurate list of material captured but at least 50 machine guns,6 trench mortars, and a large dump of ammunition and engineers material fell into our hands.

Enemy Casualties.- It is estimated that 100 enemy were killed in the attack. Two Companies report that after consolidation they each caused over 100 casualties throughout the day. Our artillery also on several occasions dispersed parties of the enemy with great slaughter.


