Period 7th August to 5 p.m. 12th August 1918:

The morming and afternoon of the 7th Aug was spent waiting under bank of the SOMME near AUBIGNY. In the early evening after the evening meal the A.M.C. party split into two. The Ambulance bearers (less one runner, Pte. Fuller 5th Field Amb.) and the Maltese Cart and driver were instructed to go as far forward out of enemy observation under the high ground between the SOMME and VILLERS BRETONNEUX. As soon as darkness fell they were to proceed as far as the "AEROPLANE DUMP" forward of HUNTER ST. They were unable to do this as the shell fire became heavy as soon as darkness set in - all material was dumped near the YORK St R.A.P. During this trip two bearers were slightly wounded by shell fragments (Ptes. Fox and Paine, 5th Field Amb.)

The second party consisting of R.M.O. A.M.C. details (Cpl. Jones, L/Cpl. Scotton) and runner, Pte. Fuller proceeded in a straight line over the high ground bwteeen the SOMME and VILLERS BRETONNEUX, by way of the PIONEER SWITCH. In this area the battalions of the 8th Bde. (5th Divn) were met and one could not but be struck by the cheerfulness of the troops that were to go over the top on the morrow. Further on in a subken road large numbers of 18 pounder guns were seen drawn up for the morrow's barrage. The entry to the Battle R.A.P. was uneventful, - the Battle R.A.P. consisted of a dugout near the junction of AUSTRALIA SUPPORT and AILEEN TRENCH. The dugout was about six feet wide by eight feet long and four feet deep. The roof was of elephant iron and one layer of sandbags. The floor was just below the level of the sap outside which latter was exceedingly narrow and would not allow a stretcher case being carried along it. About 9 p.m. the runners brought the Ambulance bearers and the A.M.C. material up to the Battle R.A.P.

The material carried during this operation was about 150 shell dressings and the usual complement of Thomas and other splints with material and instruments for their adjustment. The bearers were accomodated in small dug outs and "cubby holes" about 50 yards to the rear of the R.A.P. - these had been occupied at some time by a German Wireless Outfit. The night was spent in the R.A.P. dugout with some 24th Battn. Sergeants - chiefly talking, the 20th A.M.C. had a bottle of whisky while the 24th Sergeants supplied rum -, so the long wait was not without cheer. There was little enemy shell fire in this area during the night, most of the fire fell to the rear of the R.A.P. or to the right in the trenches occupied by the 19th Battalion - this was contrary to expectations. On the evening of the 7th the enemy set fire to some supply yanks in an orchard to the West of VIDLERS BRETx. - this caused huge volumes of smoke and it was thought that the enemy would "smell a rat" and strafe during the night accordingly.

The barrage was timed to come down at 4.20 a,m. on the Bn. Sector and a few minutes before this one could distinctly hear the tanks rumbling up to the tape although low-flying aeroplanes and salvoes of Artillery fire. attempted to drown the rumble of the tanks. Finally the rumble of one tank grew insistant and evidently it was making in our direction. Cpl. Jones remarked "We'd look pretty silly if a - tank ran over our dugout, sir! I've the - wind up about those things". Just then we heard the barrage on the left and almost immediately it came down in our Sector, very few shells dropped short although the barrage was very heavy. About a minute after the start of the barrage, a deafening roar was was heard outside the dugout and on looking out the front of a tank was seen poised,

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as it were, on the side of the sap opposite the dugout, everybody shouted something and one made a dash for the opening of the dugout, however, it was all too quick, the crash was almost simultaneous as the tank passed over and crushed a side of the dugout - by some means or other no one was hurt. Whilst the occupants were extracating themselves from the debris, a shell hit the undamaged side of the dugout and completed the destruction. The occupants of the dugout now went out into the Sap and there waited for about 10 minutes for the barrage to get a good start. Unfortunately the tank had not only ruined the dugout but had altogether destroyed the splints etc which had been put on the roof of the dugout as there was ho room inside. About 10 minutes after Zero the R.M.O. and his batman (Pte. Paine) went with a bag of shell dressings to tell the Regimental Bearers to commence work and also to collect any wounded on the tape. Only an occasional casualty was found and dressed. Owing to the intense fog and the smoke from the smoke and H.E. Shells of the barrage, it was very difficult to find the casualties and more difficult to find ones way about. The casualties collected during the first hour after Zero were chiefly Walkers of the 20th and 19th Btns.

An hour or so after sunrise the casualties were coming in more thickly as the mist had, to a certain degree cleared so the depressed area once a Wireless Station (before mentioned) was converted into a Dressing Station. The casualties here treated were from many units, a few 20th and 19th Btn. men 4th and 3rd Division men, tanks, and large numbers of German prisoners. These prisoners proved very useful in carrying wounded to the rear, and from forward to the R.A.P. A party of German Red Cross men were put under a Red Cross N.C.O. (also German) given a bag of shell dressings and made to dress their own wounded. Large numbers of prisoners passed the R.A.P. on their way to the rear and they were mostly given a load. Other passers by were the 30th and 31st Bns. and Capt. Brown 8th Field Ambulance with a party of bearers. About 11 a.m. everything was just about clear and all hands set to work to get something to eat. After this meal the area from the tape to the first objective was scoured for wounded only a few odd ones, however, were found.

During the afternoon all hands tried to get a little sleep but there were constant interruptions and the Hun began to shell all round with his H.V. gun. Later in the afternoon the R.A.P. and all attached was moved to hear 20th Bn. H.Q. in a depression near BOIS L'ACCROCHE - here we were all wonderfully cheered by the glorious news of the wounderful advance. The night was spent quietly in "bivvies" in this depression - the earlier part was somewhat disturbed by the loquaciousness of certain diggers nearby after the rum issue.

An early start on the morning of 9th August with the A.M.C. party and Maltese Cart in rear of the battalion which advanced in Artillery Formation. Passed through WARFUSEE -ABANCOURT where everyone was greatly cheered by seeing the 1st Australian Division passing through. After passing through this village, or to be more exact, heap of bricks, the Bn. passed along the Northern side of the great East West Road, and in the neighbourhood of BAVON VILLERS crossed to the Southern side. The Battalion rested for some time behind a road running off at right angles to the E-W Road towards HARBONNIERES. On passing across the deep gully with BUCHANAN and other WOODS in it fairly heavy fire was encountered. Arrangements were then made for a R.A.P. and to obtain touch with Advanced Dressing Stations. The abandoned enemy C.C.S. on the E.W. Road was chosen at first but was later abandoned as it came under heavy shell fire. Major Wells, R.M.O. 30th Bn. had his R.A.P. in thes C.C.S. and a few minutes after reconnaisance by 20th A.M.C.

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is severely wounded by a shell - he later died from these wounds. At 4.30 p.m. the 17th and 18th Btns. attacked in the direction of FRAMERVILLE while the 19th and 20th Btns were in support. Am R.A.P. for 20th Bn. had been found in a sap near Bn. H.Q. - as soon as the advance began this came in for pretty heavy shelling. Several tanks were damaged during this attack. One disabled tank made for the R.A.P. no doubt attracted by the Red Cross flag and thus drew a good deal of enemy fire on to the R.A.P. The crew of this tank had severe burns and were more or less severely shocked. Only a few cases were treated in the R.A.P. this afternoon. When things had quietened down a bit the ground forward of the R.A.P. was searched for wounded but none were found. The night was spent by the A.M.C. detachment in the large quarry nearby and a good nights rest was obtained. The contents of the Malteset Cart were dumped and the horse and driver proceeded to Bn. Transport Lines leaving the Cart in the quarry. During this period and the subsequent period the Ambilance Bearers were fed from the Company Cookers of the Battalion and the men owe much to Capt. Kent M.C., the Quartermaster of the 20th Btn. in this respect.

Just after sunrise on the morning of the loth August an R.A.P. was formed for a few hours in a Sap just East of the PROVART - HARBONNIERES road near Bn. Headquarters. Later during the day a fine dugout was converted into R.A.P. on the Cross Roads between E-W Road and PROVART- HARBONNIERES Road. The roof of this was covered with a layer of iron girders quite 18 inches thick with wood and earth covering. Inside were beds, tables, and other conveniences. Just on the other side of the road Capt. Whish R.M.O. 18th Btn. had his R.A.P. - the ambulance cars drove right up to these twin R.A.P's.

During the morning two motor lorreys drove up the E-W Road and turned off along the PROVART Road. They did not go far along this latter before they came under heavy M.G. Fire from PROVART - both drivers were killed - they were Canadians. This will show the great doubt about the exact position of the enemy that existed at this period. During the afternoon the enemy shelled the cross roads with heavy guns but did no damage although the R.A.P. dug-out sustained a direct hit.

Just before nightfall news that the 20th Bn. was to attack next morning was received so the R.A.P. had to be shifted forward. A site was chosen in a dugout in the Pioneer and Engineer Dump at LA FLAQUE and a move effected just after nightfall. During the night casualties were dealt with from the 10th Brigade (3rd Austm.Divn). who were making an encircling movement to PROVART along the E-W road. Earlt next morning the 20th Btn. attacked under cover of a heavy mist - not many casualties came from this attack. The Regimental Bearers had to travel across an open space between the E-W Road and FRAMERVILLE under direct enemy observation. They state that while working under the White Flag they were never deliberately fired upon. During this morning 4 of the Regimental Bearers were resting for a few minutes near the R.AP. in a round hole where there had at one time been a bell tent. A 4.2 shell landed in this hole with them and wounded very slightly 2 of them while the other 2 were not touched. All four however were more or less gassed by Blue Eross (sneezing gas) and entering the R.A.P. almost immediately after the explosion gassed the occupants causing extreme sneezing etc. and vomiting in one case. It was noted that the enemy about this time was using Blue Cross in nearly all his shells (H.E.)

On the afternoon of the 12th Capt. Beare was relieved by Capt. Bateman who had returned from English leave.

No praise would be too high to bestow on the Regimental Bearers during this period. Their work was hard and dangerous but in spite of casualties they carried on unflinchingly. The work done, by Pte. "HAPPY Sutton calls for special mention.

AUGUST 1918.

The period August was spent in the line at KENT R.A.P. at 62 D (SE) p 19 Xd.6.7.. There was nothing of unusual occurence. At the end of this period the battalion moved back to the village of BLANGY-TRONVILLE where it was billeted in houses. At this period the epidemic of Diarrhoea had almost died down only an isolated case reporting with this complaint on sick parade. On the night of 6th.Aug. a party of 1 N.C.O. and 12 bearers joined the battalion for duty from the 5th. Aust.Fld.Amb. The duties allotted to these men was as follows:-

(a) To act as liaison between the R.A.P. and the nearest Field Ambulance. Post.

(b) To collect cases in the immediate neighbourhood of R.A.P.

(c) To carry cases from R.A.P. to nearest ambulance post.

The men were rationed from the ambulance, but were by the courtesy of the O.M. 20th. Battn. they were given any hot meals that the battalion men had brought to them on the cookers. A while after the arrival of these men, the A.A.M.C.details and attached men moved off with all gear on maltese cart to AUBIGNY system, where the night was spent on the banks of the On the evening of the 7th. Aug., the A.A.M.C. party moved up in detachments to the battalion R.A.P. at 62D (se) P 20 D 93. The maltese cart again conveyed material to within a 1000 yards of the R.A.P. but unfortunately came under pretty severe evening shell fire. The Battn. R. A. P. was merely a small dugout off a sap and was used as a store only - the personnel slept in funk holes in the neighbouring saps. At 4.30 a.m. on the 8th. Aug. the barrage opened and almost at the same time a tank passed over the R.A.P. crushing it in and destroying a good deal of material in the ways of splints, etc .. No cases came in until 5 a.m. when the material was removed to a depression about 50 yards from R.A.P. where all dressings where done from that time on. During the morning about 11 a.m. the flow of casualties were steady consisting of men from 2nd. 3rd. 4th. 5th. Aust. Divisions and miscellaneous Imperial Units and later on enemy prisoner wounded passed through in much larger numbers than our own. Enemy prisoners were used in large numbers in carrying wounded, both from front line to R.A.P. and from RA.P. to Advanced Ambulance Post. During the afternoon in conformation with the movements of Battn. the R.A.P. was moved to dugout in neighbourhood of P. 22. Central

Early next morning, detachment with Maltese Cart marched with Battn. which was in Artillery Formation along AMIENS-PERONNE ROAD to open field in vicinity of Q. 34. central, thence cart was taken to chalk pit in gully in Q. 35. central. Immediately on arrival the routes of evacuation to imbulance were investigated and post at W.5.c.3.5. was chosen instead of that at Q.29.c.3.3. as the route to this post was being shelled at this period, On the completion of this arrangement a Battn. R.A.P. was established in open sap at Q. 35.c. 9.2. As the Battn. w was in support no 20th. Battn. casualties were dealt with but only men from miscellaneous units there-abouts. Perhaps the most interesting cases were the crew of a tank who were suffering from burns as the result of direct hit on tank from enemy shell. At 5 a.m. on Aug. 10th. the detachment, less cart, moved to strong dug out at cross road at R. 25. c. 1.5. where R.A.P. remained till 9.30 p.m. when it moved to R.25.d.5.4. Here the RAA.P. Remained till /8/1918. During this latter period a good number of casualties both from 20th. Battn. and various 3rd. Aust. Div. Units who had apparently great difficulty in locating theirR.A.P's. While this there was a big percentage of bearers (Regimental) wounded and killed as the carry was in full observation of the enemy who swept the flat fields to be traversed with burst of machine gun fire. Regimental stretcher bearers worked under the white flag and were all emphatic on the point that the enemy did not deliberately snipe them.

The work of the Regimental Stretcher Bearers in this region is beyond praise for they had many wounded both our own and enemy to carry in under shell and machine gun fire. Whilst at this R.A.P. Ambulance bearers carried to motor loading post at R. 25.c. 1.5/ The fact that the cars came so close to R.A.P. ensured a rapid and efficient evacuation of wounded. On the 12th. and from thence onwards to the 17th. the battalion was behindFRAMERVILLE in support lines The R.A.P. was situated in a dug-out at the edge of a lange enemy dump and appeared to be of enemy construction. Next day we moved back away from the dump as it was shelled to a position which was nearer the battalion and more central. There were a few casualties only, weather fine and warm. The men had hot meals which were cooked some distance back in a ravine and carried forward. Our water supply was drawn from a source further back and brought forward in water carts to barrels. A reconnaissance of the 24th. Battn. R. A. P. was made. On the night of the 17th. the battn. marched to BAYONVILLERS, where they embussed and were taken to Fouilloy. Here, we stayed for nine days. Very dusty, hot, weather prevailed, which made the canal waters very inviting to the men and officers. These was very little sickness of any kind, sick parades were small. A swimming carnival was held and all thee men were very fit. Several route marches took place which served to keep the men's feet fairly hard. Hot baths were made use of freely and fresh changes of clothing received and tunics and trousers run through a delousing chamber. Inoculation return for the battalion was completed up to IOO%. There was a large amount of refuse in the village which had to be cleared up. Late in the evening of the 26th. the battalion again embussed and left FOUILLOY proceeding to the east side of WARFUSEE for some distance where we debussed and marched to trenches behind PROYART. The maltese cart accompanied us with the advanced transport. Sick parade was held under the maltese cart cover which formed a tent. Shortly after lunch the battalion moved off to a position in front of CHUIGNOLLES, passing through a little shell fire from heavy shells on the way. There were no casualties. In our new position we formed the R.A.P. in a shed which had quite recently been a German Dressing station but had been evacuated on account of our 6th. Bgde. capturing it. There were some German dressings still left, bundles of cellulose and bandages, which seemed to be made out of window curtains or some open work material. The R.A.P. was in a sunken road, which was littered with hurriedly cast away German material. Some water from a well which was thought to possibly contain some poisons was tested and found to be quite alright. The position of the Field Ambulance was ascertained. Some shelling of the wood and trenches where the men were placed occurred but we were lucky and had none. Next morning the 28th. I visited the Field Amb. and found out their probable movements. They were in a chateau in CHUIGNOLLES. After lunch we moved again marching a short distance to just south of CAPPY where we were placed in a QUARRY in G. 26.c. There were no shelters but plenty of material to make them, surrounding us. The men soon had bivvies made for themselves. The R.A.P. was made out of a spare tarpaulin which was on the maltese cart and some malthoid roofing material for the sides. Next morning the 18th. Battm. were to attack through the 6th. Bgde. with the 20th. Battn. in close support. Reveille about 3.30. A hurried breakfast and we moved off to keep up with the 18th. who were meeting with little opposition. Whilst in front of PROYART I had three squads of the 5th. Field Amb. Bearers attached to me and after that I obtained a wheeled stretcher. The maltese cart was left behind and 5.30 a.m. of the 29th. found us moving forward at the rearof the battn. with our line equipment carried partlyby my details and partly on the wheeled stretcher.

Each squad of bearers carried two stretchers and four blankets. We marched as far as ERISE, where we had a spell for a while Then the companies moved forward to get into touch with the 18th. The R.A.P. moved on ahead of the H.Q.Coy. to H.14.a.5.0. A few dressings were done here but there were no wounded coming through worth mentioning, though this was the ground that was advanced over that morning. Whilst in this position two germans emerged from the village of FEUILLERES and marched over to the Red Cross Flag we had flying. They were sent back to battalion H.Q. escorted by the chiropodist on horseback. After about an hour here we went along the road to some dugouts and established the R.A.P. there in H. 15.a. 2.3. at a cross road which after became the Motor Loading Post. Here I got into communication with the Field Ambulance through Capt. Park who arrived in a Ford car. A few cases arrived here though there more wounded germans than our men. We stayed here all day and towards dusk went forward to a position about four of five hundred yards behind the companies to be close at hand for an attack, the next morning in which an attempt was to be made to cross the river. This was an excellent R.A.P. and was situated at H.16. a.3.2. No casualties during the night and the attack was postponed owing to a bridge being blown up. One of our stretcherbearers (Regt) came through in the early morning. About 6 a.m. we packed up again and marched back to behind FEUILLERES? along the canal where the men had a hot breakfast and a short rest. At 10.30 a.m. the battalion moved off, crossed the SOMME at FEUILLERES to the north bank. (here our wheeled stretcher punctured and had to be dumped). The companies opened out into extended order and moved along the bank of the river, then spreading up north a little and pushing through the 3rd division. Wounded were to be exacuated through CLERY-sur-SOMME. The R.A. P. Was established at H.II.a.5.7. Very few casualties came through here. In the evening some wounded Germans came through us. The prisoners were utilized for carrying back stretcher cases and did numerous trips. Next morning the 31st. the battalion attacked at 5 a.m. The R.A.P. was moved forward at 6 a.m. to a position on a ridge to the left of the 17th. Batt. R. A. P. at about I 1.C. 4.5. Few cases came through here so we moved down to just in front of Pattn. H.Q. at H. 12. b. 9. 0. Whilst getting to the first spot there was a good deal of shelling and two of the ambulance bearers were hit, both fairly lightly. The emrry for our bearers after we became established at H.12.b.9.0. was back about 600 yards to a Ford Car. Later on in the day the cars and horses Ambulance came up in numbers to where we were and formed the motor loading post, Large numbers of casualties came through during the day from the three divisions, 3rd., 5th., and 2nd., german prisoners were utilized to the utmost for getting stretchers cases away and often relieved a congestion. Supplies came up from the Fld. Amb. fairly well. At midnight the cases ceased until 6 a.m. the next morning the 1st. September.
