


THE YPRES-ROULERS RAILWAY.

- The sketch overleaf illustrates the various embankments and cuttings on the YPRES-ROULERS Railway in the region where it crosses the BROODSEINDE-PASSCHENDAELE Ridge. Between ZONNEREKE and the level crossing in D 17 b, these are of particular importance to us at present.
- 2. With the exception of a few concrete structures shown thus on sketch there are no indications of any defences having been constructed along the line at present, but, owing to the bend of the railway to the N.E. and its general situation with regard to the lie of the land, it is clear that great use might be made of the various embankments and cuttings for the purpose of obtaining various embankments and cuttings for the purpose of obtaining enfilade fire up the HANNEBEEK Valley and GRAVENSTAFEL Ridge to enfilade fire up the HANNEBEEK valley and GRAVENSTAFEL Ridge to deal with any advance by us in this direction.

A further point worthy of note is that an air photo taken on the 1st inst. shows that the ground in D 22 b and d (marked marshy on sketch) is still very wet. The Battalion moved out from camp at VLAMERTINGHE at 4.30.p.m on afternoon of the 3rd and moved to Bivouac Area East of YPRES. This area was reached at 7.p.m and a halt was made here for four hours. At 11.p.m the Battalion moved out on to "K" track and moved up thus in Single file with A. Company leading followed by B, C & D Coys. Shelling was met with right along the track after passing the crest of FREZENBERG Ridge. His shelling caused a fair amount of delay but no confusion. The Battalion reached its assembly point at 2.a.m and by 2.30. a.m all were in position and touch had been established with 11th Brigade on right and New Zealanders on left.At 5.30.a.m the enemy opened a bombardment on the 2nd Division on our right and we got the splashings of this. At 5.55.a.m all men were ready. At 6.a.m our Barrage opened and at 6.5.a.m we advanced. Owing to the bad light and Battle Smoke it was impossible to keep formations; the consequence was that all Battalions of the Brigade became mixed. At the first halt of the barrage for 12 minutes at the 37th objective, slight reorganisation was done but at the hours halt on the 38th objective a fair amount of reorganisation was done. The first serious opposition was encountered at JUDAH GALLERIES and here about 40 Huns were captured. These were attended to by a mixed body from the Brigade. While waiting at the 38th objective we were subjected to serious machine gun fire from ABRAHAM HEIGHTS and from some ruins in front of BEECHAM FARM. Word was sent to the New Zealanders re the guns on ABRAHAM HEIGHTS and the guns near BEECHAM FARM were dealt with by us on the left of the barrage. Our Line of Consolidation was reached at 8.50.a.m and consolidation was at once pushed on with. During consolidation casualties were sustained from fire of machine guns in concrete dugouts on Southern portion of DAB TRENCH and from snipers in BERLIN WOOD but these were afterwards dealt with by the New Zealanders and 40th Battalion on the left of the barrage. 100 men and 2 Officers were sent up to assist the 40th to capture and consolidate their objective. SPECIAL ORDER.

The Operations carried out by this Division, during the period October 1st to 5th/17, have been brilliantly successful.—
We have captured a large territory, over 1,000 prisoners and many machine guns, and have accounted for very many enemy killed and wounded. —

This success has been due to the fine spirit and devotion of the Troops, as well as to the high standard of performance, which all Commanders, Staffs, Services and Departments, throughout the Division, have set themselves. -

I have received many congratulatory messages from the Commander-in-Chief, the Army and Corps Commanders, and from other Divisions. - In conveying these to the Division, I desire to add an expression of my own thanks to all, for the splendid support which they have rendered to me.

The blow inflicted yesterday upon the enemy is caloulated to have a decisive influence upon final victory. - But
this can be achieved only if we vigorously follow up our success;
and we must prepare ourselves as rapidly as possible to repeat
our blow.

I look therefore to all Commanders and to the Troops, to spare themselves no pains or sacrifices to prepare, by rapid reorganization and re-equipment, for further immediate Operations.

Narrative of Battle of PASSCHENDAELE. -----

On the night of October 11th, the 39th Battalion(less D.Company who were attached to the 38th Battalion and A. Company carrying party) left their billets near Hussar Farm at 10.45.p.m and proceeded to YPRES-ZONNEBEKE Road thence along road to starting point of the Approach March OXFORD ROAD which they passed at 11.15.p.m and moved along road to junction of "K" track along which they proceeded to point of Assembly which they reached about 4.a.m on the morning of the 12th Inst. The march up to beginning of "K" track was unattended by any unusual incident but from the start of "K" track to near BEECHAM FARM we were bombarded with gas and other shells intermittently but owing to a strong wind blowing and also the softness of the ground the gas had no effect and we reached the Assembly Point with only very slight casualties. The march along "K" track was very slow and attended by many stoppages owing to our catching up to the 38th Battalion and also parties of troops coming out along the same track. Just prior to our arrival at the point of assembly the enemy shelled us heavily and continued to do so during the operation and also while we were holding the Consolidated Line. About 8.a.m on the 12th Inst I received word that men were bunched together behind pill boxes and did not know what to do as they had no Officer with them. I immediately sent forward Lieutenants' Nicholes & Edwards to organize them and lead them forward; both these Officers became casualties. It was then reported to me that the forward troops were held up by snipers and machine gun fire which I reported to Brigade and was ordered by the Brigadier to send forward the reserves. I sent Captain A.T. Paterson forward with what troops remained to me. About midday men began to te filter back who on being questioned stated that they were told to get back, I ordered them forward and also went forward myself to ascertain what was the matter. I found men of both Brigades coming back in large numbers, I ordered them to dig in on the present line running from junction of railway line with road at point D 17.b.30.25, thence to S.E corner of AUGUSTUS WOOD, thence along Southern edge of Wood to cross roads near WATERFIELDS. D. 10.d.48.68. The 10th Brigade holding from the S.E. corner of AUGUSTUS WOOD to cross roads D.10.d.48.68 with the 9th Brigade on the right. After digging in the Brigade was re-organized. Standing Patrols were put out on the ridge in front of Consolidated Line but were ultimately with-drawn under instructions. Relief of the Brigade by the 11th Brigade commenced at about 7.p.m of the 13th Inst, and was completed about 8.30.p.m. The return journey was made under great difficulties owing to the state of the track and took about 5 1/2 hours to complete. Through the Operations the weather was very cold and wet and severely taxed the strength of the men.
