

DAOURS. (In billets)  CORPS RESERVE near PONT NOYELLES.	1.6	.18	It was along trip from the Line and, naturally, after the strenuous tour, all men were fagged and weary the next morning, but all Companies were on time at the starting point for the move to the QUERRIEU-PONT NOYELLES area, which was made in accordance with Battalion Order No. 111, second phase (Appendix 7 of volume 27).  The distance of the march was about 5 miles and was completed at about 10.30 a.m., The remainded of the day was devoted to putting the house in order, extra bivouacs being constructed and dilapidated ones re-erected. Battalion Headquarters was established on the banks of the Lagoon in PONT NOYELLES at about H.11.d.4.0. The Battalion was disposed in trenches and bivouacs in Card XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX	Appendix 1.
	2.6	.18	The C.O., Lieut. Colonel P.W.Woods, D.S.O., M.C., visited the men in their bivouacs. Instructions were issued that during the first 3 days in Corps Reserve the men would be rested as much as possible. Bathing sites were selected in the River Hallue and Companies have already started bathing parades in small parties. Arrangements made for all Officers and senior N.C.O's. to acquaint themselves with all the Army Defences and to reconnoitre routes forward. At about 11 p.m. several enemy gas shells burst in QUERRIHU. Some burst quite close to our Transport Lines but none of the personnel or animals were affected.	
	3.6	.18	All personnel were put through the hot baths at QUERRIEU. The G.O.C.Brigade (Brig. Gen. J.C. Stewart, D.S.O.) inspected the Battalion 1st. Line Transport during the afternoon and seemed pery impressed with their turnout. The Battalion Recreation Committee under the Chairmanship of Major E.W.Stutchbury, M.C., commenced preparation for an Acquatic Sports Programme in the near future and made arrangements for Cricket Matches etc. Major Stutchbury was also appointed to the Brigade Sports Committee.	
	4.6	.18	All personnel were again paraded to the QUERRIEU baths, when a change of underclothing was issued. After a period of 3 months, without sending anyone on leave, the Battalion was asked to nominate 5 men for leave to the United Kingdom, permission also being obtained to send 2 Officers daily to ABBEVILLE on leave. This gallant Officer had dinner with the Commanding Officer, who congratulated him in the presence of all Officers.  A letter received by the G.O.C.Brigade from Colonel C.Hamilton, Commanding the 137th. Infantry Regiment, U.S.Army, was passed to the Battalion. The Colonel's letter expressed his thanks for the treatment meted out by this Brigade to his Officers during their stay with us last month. He said: "It seems to me that nothing which you could have done to make our stay most interesting and profitable was left undone We have all returned with the feeling that the Australia both Officers and men, are the 'best ever'. The men are all keen to improve their knowledge, but of course as yet our parade-ground work and field training is in need of "brushing up".	
	6.6.	18	The training programme set out in the syllabus was departed from to allow all personnel to go throughthe Brigade testing chamber at the QUERRIEU Chateau. All respirators were tested and new ones issued to replace any unserviceable. During the afternoon Companies carried out a acquatic recreational training in preparation for the forthcoming sports.	
	7.6	.18.	Training carried out in accordance with syllabus. The musketry practice by a "a" Company carried out by "A" Company shows that the men generally are still efficient with the rifle. The Kewis Gunners and Grenadiers are making good progress at the school and the prospects are that when next we go into the Line we will have ample fully qualified specialists with these weapons.

Details of mare set out in Battalion Operation Order No. 113 (Appendix 9) The move entailed a march of about 2 hours. The Battalion dispositions are in a very compact area in I.18.d. and J.13.c. (Sheet 62D). Battalion Headquarters is established at I.18.d.70.45. The bivouacs are on a serie of terraces and are well protected from enemy observation. Working Parties were provided to relieve those found by the outgoing unit which were employed on various deep dugouts and signal test posts etc. Our positions overlook the ANCRE River, and the Villages of HEILY, MERICOURT, RIBEMONT and BUIRE, further East, come within our view. Every precaution is being taken by the R.M.O., and so far there have been no cases forward. It is understood that the disease is spreading amongst the units of the 8th. Bde., and, in anticipation of relieving one of their Battalions, in the next few days, we have asked the A.D.M.S. to issue instructions for the dugouts and trenches to be fumigated.		
	25.	6.18	Orders received that the Battalion would relieve the 32nd. Battalion in Line Right, Right Brigade Sector on the night 26th/27th. Reconnaisances were made forward to-day by all Officers.		
INE IGHT Of AILLY- E-SEC.	26.	6.18	Preparations were made during the day for the move forward. The relief was carried out in accordance with Battalion Operation Order No.114(Appendix 10), and was completed with only one slight casualty*at about 2.35 a.m., 27th. It was only recently that the 2nd. Division advanced their line in this sector, and the sector is not yet thoroughly organised for defence. The front line is a series of small posts, the Battalion extending over a frontage of 2,400 yards. The position held by the Brigade came under enemy observation from the high ground held by him South of the SOMME. The VILLERS-BRETONNEUX Plateau and VAIRE Wood which have played an important part in our recent history, can be clearly observed from any part of our line. The enemy opposite is very active with his machine guns, with which he sweeps the whole of our front throughout the night. 



#### 55th. Battalion Training Memorandum No.1.

3.6.18.

1. During the 6 days training period in this area, it is intended to utilise the time available in the progressive training of the Platoon on the lines laid down hereunder. If training space is available for Company training the programme for the last 2 days may be extended to include 3 or 4 hours Company work.

2. The training period will extend from 5th. Fune (inclusive) andeach training day will be of 4 hours (8.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.) It is intended that afternoons should be devoted to sports, recreational xxxxxx

training, competitions etc.

3. Subjects of training will comprise a progressive program as follows:First 2 days. Section and Platoon close order work.

Elementary Musketry.

P. Training and Bayonet Fighting.

2nd. 2 days. Section and Platoon Training and Field Exercises,
Musketry Range Practices and Elementary Musketry.
Platoon and Company Route Marches.

3rd. 2 days. Platooh and Company Training and Field Exercises.

Musketry Range Practices.
Platoon and Company Route Marches.

A training Sylkabus will be issued on the lines indicated above.

4. It has been decided that the best results will be obtained if Lewis Gunx and Bombing instruction is given under Battalion arrangements. The whole period is to be devoted to training Rifle Grenadiers in the use of the No.36 Grenade. This opportunity will be taken to put as many of those men who have not had Lewis Gun instruction through a few days course. The following table shows the arrangements for the 2 courses:-

Role in Corps Reserve and Action in case of Attack.

1. (a). Role of Division in Corps Reserve- While in Corps Reserve the pivision will normally be employed offensively for the maintwinance of the present positions of the forward divisions.

(b). The Division is disposed in Brigade Groups as follows:-(i) 15th. Inf. Ede. Group. ALLONVILLE-CARDONETTE, with

battalion at FRECHENCOURT. (ii) 8th. Inf. Bde. Group. RIVERY CAMONWith battalion at LA MOTTE.

(1111) L4th. Inf. Bde. Group. QUERRIEU-DAOURS with battalion about LA HOUSSOYE.

14th. Inf. Bds. 14th. L. T.M. Baltery. 15th. Field doy.A.E. 14th. Field Amb. 15th . M. G.Coy.

(c). Disposed as above the role of the Division will be either the retention of the LA HOUSSOYE Plateau or the covering of AMIENS.

- The normal role of the 14th Bdo. Group is the defence of the LA HOUSSOYE system in which the forward Battalion (55th.Bn.) is disposed as the nucleus garrison.
- 3. The Division may also be employed to meet the following eventualities :-

(a). An attack South of the SOMME.

- (b). A threat on the left flank of the Corps. (c). Loss of ground to the Mouth of the Corps necessitating a defensive flank.
- 4. In the event of 3 (a) and the temporary loss of VILLERS-BRETONNEUX the 14th. Inf. Bde. may be called upon (i) to attack in a South Fasterly direction from assembly positions in 0.16 and 0.17 or 0.21 and 0.27. (ii) to attack in an Easterly direction from the general line of the FOUILLOY-CACHY Road.
- 5. In the event of 3 (b) it may be necessary-(i) for the Brigade to operate offensively in conjunction with other Brigades of the Division or (ii) to occupy defensively the whole or postion of the BRESLE Switch.
- 6. In the event of 3 (c) the normal action will be the occupation of the spur south of FRECHENCOURT and the St. GRATIEN spur forming a defensive flank facing worth.
- . 7. All Officers and senior N.O.O's. will acquaint themselves with all the Battalion dispositions, and all men will be instructed as to the normal role of the Battalien. Reconnabisances will also be made of routes forward to (a) the assembly positions in 0.16, 0.17, 0.21 and 0.27, (b) the BRESLE switch and (c) the spur south of FRECHENCOURT and the Sigratien spur.
  - 8. One troop A.L.E. and one platoon of Cyclysts have also been detailed to operate with the Division.

Further to the "Role in Corps Reserve"issued 5.6.18.

1. Owing to the alterations in the dispositions of the Bist. French Corps and the consequent alteration in the role of the Division in Australian Corps Reserve, the following additional instructions are issued: -

2. To deal with an enemy attack South of the SOMME the task of the Division is to secure the point of junction between the Australian and the 31st. French Corps.

3. (a). The main line of resistance of the 31st. French Corps is the CACHY SWITCH running through U.3.c. " U.9.a. - U.8.b. and co - U.7.do - U.13.a. and co - U.19.a. - T.24.d. (East of CACHY and GENTELLES).

(b). A counter attack regiment (approximately equal to one of our Brigades) is held in readiness in the vicinity of the MICHOLAS SUPPORT (T.3.c. and d. and T.9.a.) Which has as its task the retaking of the CACHY CINTILLES PLATEAU and the main line, in the case of hts loss.

4. (a). In the event of 3 (b) the 8th. Inf. Bde. will replace the French counter attack regiment in the NICHOLAS SUPPORT.

(b). If the counter attack fails it is possible that 8th. and 14th. Inf. Bdes. will be called upon to counter attack. the 8th. from the West and the 14th. from the North or North west.

(c). The position of readiness for the 14th. Bde. will be in 0.7.d. and 0.13.b.

5. Reconnaissances will be made forthwith of the areas of the position of readiness and approaches thence to the CACRY GENTELLES PLATEAU.







#### Quartermaster's Report for June, 1918.

Rations.

Rations as drawn from the A.S.C. continue to maintain a high standard, the percentage of bread and fresh meat being good.

The Cooks continue to do their work most thoroughly in preparing food of a high standard and good variety. During the time the Battalion has been in the front line, we have been able to send forward nightly: stew or curry, hash, puddings, boiled meat and bacon. In addition to this the men were able to prepare, with the aid of trench cookers, tea and cocoa supplied by the A.I.F.Comforts Fund.

Baths.

Hot baths and an issue of clean clothing were arranged whilst the Battalion was in Reserves.

Boots.

52 new pairs of boots were issued during the month and 176 pairs repaired by the Battalion Bootmakers.

During the month 60 suits of new clothing were issued, and when last inspected, the clothing throughout the Battalion was found in good repair.



The animals are all in good, hard condition. Their lines are in a splendidly sheltered position in the large wood near FRECHENCOURT. At present we are 1 mule and 1 charger short of establishment.

Up to the usual standard. There has been no grazing owing to the distance from lines of suitable ground. A small amount of clover has been cut and brought back from the forward areas.

Seven wagons have now been thoroughly repaired and repainted.

The water cart indented for last month has been drawn and our second one condemned. One G.S.limbered wagon body has been drawn.

Of the remainder of the wagons 2 are in a very bad state of repair and are awaiting inspection. All accessaries are complete and the limber covers have been made waterproof with a coat of paint.

The work during the month has been a little lighter. A fair amount of Engineer material was carried towards the end of month.

All Transport personnel were very fit until the Influenza, which is so very prevalent at present, attacked them during the last week.
28 are now off duty.

This Unit is now located in centre Battalion Section, Right Brigade.

1. WORK OF BEARERS. To render first aid to wounded and convey them to R.A.P.

LENGTH OF CARRY. About 1500 yds.

DIFFICULTIES. 1. Narrowness of sap.

2. Impossibility to evacuate wounded during day light.

3. Frequent bursts of enemy machine gun fire all night.

#### DISTRIBUTION OF STBEARERS. 2 per platoon

- 2. PREVAILING SICKNESS AND GENERAL HEALTH. Influenza is very prevalent with high temperature and severe course. This affects general health to some considerable extent.
- 3. CONDITIONS OF LIFE OF MEN. In reserve positions sufficient dugout accommodation is available.

  In support trenches and advanced out posts the trenches afford partial shelter and during this tour of duty were dry underfoot.

SANITATION. The Sanitary conditions are very good. Interchangeable latrine buckets and Urinal absorption pits are in general use. Cook houses are kept clean and all refuse is buried.
