



NE RIGHT of ILLY- SEC.	1.7.	8.	The Support and Reserve trenches were shelled during Morning mainly from Right flank. A recommendation (Appendix 1) was forwarded by the C.O. to the G.O.C. Brigade, for a minor operation to be undertaken by the Battalion. Capt. K. R. Wyllie made the reconadisance and the C.O. decided that Capt. Wylle would take charge of the raiding party which would consist of A and B Companies and 1 platoon of C Company. The arrangements were made for A and B Companies to be relieved by two Companies of the 56th. Battalion on the night of 2nd./3rd. July and withdraw to ROMA LINE, (Support Battalion area) for organisation. The day was fine througout. Aerial activity on both sides was increased. At 7 p.m. 2 machines (identity unknown) were brought down in enemy territory.	Appendix
	2.7.	8.	Quiet day on sector. Patrolling of N.M.L. was very difficult owing to long crops and the proximity of enemy's forward posts. The Hun uses flares very freely and tries to controll N.M.L. by M. G. fire. Little Aerial activity during the day. The connecting up of front line posts and digging of forward C.T's was pushed on energetically under cover of darkness. The G.O.C. Brigade visited Bn. H.Qrs during morning and discussed minor operation with the C.O. Bn. Operation Order No.115 was issued for the relief of Companies forming the raiding party (Appendix 2).	Appendix
	3.7.	8.	The day was spent in the organisation of the raiding party and the making of final preparations for the raid. Bn.Operation Order No. 116 (Appendix 3.) was issued to all concerned. Brigade Operation Order No. 149 was received and the location of the sector to be raided was found to be slightly altered. Corrigendum to Bn. Operation Order 116 was issued (Appendix4 to all recipients to that order. An addendum was then issued (Appendix 5) stating the detailed orders of O.C. Raid supplementary to Bn. Order 116. The day was fine and sunny. The raiders were rested as much as possible, the afternoon being spent in the Officers of the raiders explaining the scheme to the men and making every one thoroughly conversant with the scheme on hand. A special hot dinner was given the party about 10 p.m. By midnight the party was ready to move forward, every man being issued with two identity discs, each being differently numbered. All other means of identification had been dispensed with. In the meantime parties under Capt. F. J. Cotterell were working hard improving the "jumping off" line xxx and front line generally. N. of SAILLY-LE-SEC.	.7.18	3.	All working parties were clear of "hopping off" and front lines by 2 a.m. moving out by a different from that used by the raiders moving in. The "hopping off" tapes were in position and pegged down by 1.30 a.m. The raiding party, consisting of Capt. K. R. Wyllie (0.C.Raid) and 5 other Officers, and 192 0/Ranks moved into position on the tapes without incident by 2.50 a.m., 20 minutes before Zero. The tapes had been marked so that each section under its leader would be in correct position. This part of the operation reflected great credit on the organisation of the raid. By this time all details of the "Chinese attack" had been completed and the Officer in charge, Lieut. W. E. Campbell and 5 other ranks were standing by waiting for Zero hour which had been laid down for 3.10. a.m. Battalion H. Qrs was notified by 0.C.Raid and 0.C. Chinese attack that everything was ready at 20 minutes before Zero hour. The minutes went slowly by, and at the appointed hour the Artilleyy and T.M. Barrage came down synchronising with the Barrage for the major operation on both flanks. Appendices 7 and 8 are detailed reports of the Raid showing the conduct of the operation after Zero hour, and the gallant manner in which the officers and other ranks of the party acquitted themselves. An hour before Zero, an advanced Dressing Station was formed by the R.M.O. on the right flank of the Assembly position. The results obtained were most satisfactory especially in cases of severe wounds. The Messing Officer, Lieut. A. E. Smith, arranged for a hot firink to be ready for the raiders on their return from the Boche lines. This was very much appreciated. A run issue was also provided. En. O.O. 118 (Appendix 9.) was i ssued in connection with the relief of C and D companies by the 56th. Battalion. The relief was completed without incident by midnight. Parties organised by O.C. Raid commenced at 10.30 p.m. to search N.M.L. and front line area for wounded who had not been reported in during the day. The operation on the right flank could b	Appendix 7 and 8.





OF AILLY- E-SEC.			The weather during the "stunt" and for the remainder of the day was fine, aerial activity being normal. The following Congratulatory message was received from Corps Commander:- "Please accept my congratulations and thanks and convey same to Brigadier's and Troops employed for their brilliantly executed subsidiary operations which have contributed so admirably to the complete success of pur main attack. General Birdwood also telegraphs his admiration of the true A.I.F. style in which the Corps has acquitted itself." The Divisional Commander also desires to express his deep appreciation of the splendid work done by all concerned.	
	5.7	18.	The parties searching N.M.L. for wounded and those possibly killed continued their work until daylight made further movement in the epen impossible. The work done by these parties was highly commendable. The day was fine and all Compa ies rested. Cleaning up of equippment and clothing was also done. Aerial activity was increased, one enemy aeroplane being brought down in his own lines. During the evening two Company Cookers were brought forward into Ravine in J.22.d. making it possible for the Batalion to have two hot meals per day, and a hot drink at mid-day. A few men had been sent daily to Transport Lines suffering from Infleuenza which was prevalent in the area.	
	6.7	18.	The day was very quiet in the Battalion Sector, forward Bn. area being shelled at intervals during the day. Aerial activity again normal. Working parties were provided for the 56th. Battalion at night totalling 100 0/Ranks. A party of 30 0/Ranks were employed carrying Stokes Mortar Shells.	
	7.7	.18.	Marked improvement in the men due to the quiet day. No shelling on the Battalion area. Salvage operations were commenced and resulted in a large amount of material being sent to rear for sorting. Ravine in J.22.4. is not under direct observation from right flank. This is one of the results of the 4th. Aus. Div. success on July 4th American Independence Day. Over 100 O/Ranks were employed on defensive works in forward area. 50 O/Ranks were employed carrying engineering material and rations for right line Bn. This party did two trips to front line. 160 Gas projectors were discharged successfully at 2.30 a.m. against enemy defences D.D. & L. London, E.C. (ASOO)) Wt. 

The operation was entirely successfulx. 70 0/Ranks were employed improving Communication Trenches in forward area. No. 2143 Pte E. A. Corey, M.M. marched out today to represent the Battalion at an Allied Demonstration in Paris. The C.O. inspected Battalion area and was very pleased with measures taken for sanitation. All trenches were in a good pondition, weather being dry and hot. Aerial activity normal during day increasing about 6 p.m.	
	9.7.	18.	The weather during the day was showery but the ground dried quickly. No fresh cases of infleuenza in the Bn. This eppidemic appears to have ceased in this area. Orders were received that the Bn. would move into the left Bn. sector on night 10th./11th. July and relieve the 53rd. Bn. 100 O/Ranks were employed in the forward area on defensive works. A letter was sent to the C.O. 56th. Battalion by the C.O. expressing his appreciation of the willing and valuable co-operation afforded to the 55th. Bn. during the operations of the 4th. Bn. 0.0. No. 119 (Appendix 11.) was issued and the Batalion moved from the Support Bn. area in accordance with this erder. The relief was completed without incident by 11.45 p.m. Battalion H. Qrs now situated at J.17.b.3.7. Two Cookers were brought forward and were dug into a bank 100 yards from Bn. H. Qrs. Five O/Ranks U.S. Army were attached to the Bn. for front line experience. 	12.	7.18.	The C.O. went to Brigade today at about 9 a.m., the G.O.C. being away at a Tank Demonstration. He returned to Bn. H.Qrs at 7 p.m. The 60th. Bn. relieved the 58th. Bn. on our left flank tonight (12th./13th. July). All telephones forward of Div. H.Qrs and all buzzers and Fullerphones forward of Brigade were not used from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Visual Signals, wireless, runners and pageons were the only means of communication used during the above period. Weather very changeable to having constant thunderstorms. One limber of green forage was cut and returned to Transport Lines. French Corps on our right attacked on a 7000 yards front penetrating to a depth of 2,000 yards capturing many prisoners and much war material.			
	13.	7.18.	Battalion H. Qrs heavily shelled by 5.9's from 8 a.m. to 9.30 a.m. Owing to all H. Qrs personnel being provided with good cover only three slight casualties were caused. The rest of the day was comparatively quiet. Aerial activity increased, two of our observation Balloons being brought down in flames by a hostile plane at 8.40 p.m. The plane was not observed until almost on our Balloons having taken advantage of the low clouds. The Kun plane cached the Hun lines in safety. The C.O. visited the front line about 8.p.m.	e		
	14.7	.18.	Very heavy rain at 7 a.m. which made all C.T's and trenches very difficult for movement. The G.O.C. Division, Sir. J. J. T. Hobbs, K.C.B., V.D. visited the Bn area at 11 a.m. Bn. H'qrs was again shelled during his visit. The G.O.C. Division expressed his appreciation of the cleanliness of the area and of the spirit of the men. He also personally complimented the C.O. on the success of the operation on July 4th He left the Bn. area at 11.45 a.m. 100 O/Ranks were employed carrying rations and improving defences forward of the Support Line.

LINE LEFT S.W. of MORLAN- COURT.	15.	7.18.	The day was showery. An enemy aeroplane taking advantage brought down one of our Observation Balloons in flames near BONNAY at 3 p.m. The Plane reached its own lines in safety despite the heavy barrage of A.A. and M.G. fire. The C.O. attended a conference of C.O's at 56th. Bn H'qrs in Ravine at J.22.d. The Brigadier was present. The policy of aggressive daylight patrolling was discussed. This was the day on which the great German Offensive South West of RHEIMS was commenced and where the Boche was thrown back at all points.		
	16.	7.18.	Five O/Ranks U.S. Army attached to Bn. reported back to Brigade H'qrs at 8.45 a.m. Rain was intermittent during the day, with 2 very heavy showers at 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. Orders were received that the 8th. Aust. Inf. Brigade would relieve the 15th. Brigade in the Left Bde sector and the left Bn of the 14th. Brigade, Right Bde. Sector. Advance parties from the 30th. Bn came forward and thoroughly reconnoitered the Battalion area.		
			Bn. O. O. No. 120 (Appendix 12) was issued in connection with the relief by the 30th. Battalion. Special effort was made that the whole area would be handed over in a clean and sanitary condition. This was accomplished despite heavy rain during the day. Companies of the 30th. Bn. moved in immediately after dark and the relief was complete without incident by 1.45 a.m. 18th. instant. By this relief the kark right boundary of the left Bde Sector now rested on the BRAY-CORBIE ROAD. During this tour in the line front line wiring had been energetically carried out a permanent party of 20 O/Ranks being employed each night. Lieut. D. T. W. NEVILLE, M. C., D. C. M. and two other ranks marchedout today to join a patrol party being lent by the Australian Corps to the 3rd. Corps on our left.		
LINE RIGHT N. of SAILLY- LE-SEC.	18.	7.18.	On relief Bn. took up position in ROMA LINE (Support Bn. area) vacated by 53rd. Bn. The Bn. was in position by 2.45 a.m. Weather improved slightly during the day, the men resting and cleaning up. Bn. 0. 0. 121 (Appendix 13) was issued for the relief of the 56th. Bn. in the left Bn sector, right Brigade. This relief was not completed by midnight. Today at 4.30 a.m. the gallant allied troops, on the front between SOISSONS and THE MARNE attacked on a 25 Kilometre front and penetrated to a depth of 10 kilo's.	Appendix 13.

The members of the Delegation are: Deputy Albert METIN, General PAU, Commandant DANDRE, M. GOUT, Labour Delegate Thomsen, Private J. BADER, Private ANDRE SIEGSRIED, Mr. J. T. MEADOWS SMITH. General Pau addressed everybody present (in French) and expressed his appreciation and admiration of the gallant deeds of the Australian Troops both on Gallipoli and in France. Enemy Observation Balloon was brought down in flames on our left front at 12.20 p.m. 54th. Battalion relieved 53rd. Battalion in line right. 	20.7	7.18.	Brigadier General Herring, D.S.O., G.O.C. 13th. Aust. Inf. Brigade visited Bn. H'qrs and discussed proposed relief of 55th. Bn. by one of the units of his Brigade. The day was fine, with a few light showers at night. The Support and Reserve trenches were heavily shelled during the morning from direct front, but no casualties were caused as shelled areas were vacated during the "straffe". 143 Gas projectors were successfully discharged into Ravine at K.25.d. at 11.15 p.m. At 9.25 a.m. two planes, beleived enemy, were brought down in flames in the Boche lines. Phtrolling in N.N.L. is still extremely difficult in this sector, enemy keeping up constant M.G. fire salthering the sector of the

The other four flew back carrying with them the attention of all ground observers, during which time the single machine successfully attacked one of our observation balloons bringing it down in flames. This plane reached its own lines in safety, having to fly through a very heavy A/A and M.G. Barrage. 120 O/Ranks were employed in the forward area carrying rations, ammunition and bombs, improving defences and salvaging. Aerial activity was increased our planes bringing down two enemy observation balloons. Daylig Bombing raids were carried out by our planes. Word was received this morning that Lieut. 	23.7.	18.	Suspected Gas Projector emplacements opposite Bn. front were fired on by T.M's, enemy using both Minenwerfer and "Pineapples" in reply. Early in the morning a thousand men were seen practising extended order operations near MORCOURT. 130 O/Ranks were emplyed in forward area on defensive works. 

Division on our left at 10.30 a.m., smoke being used to screen raiding party from observation. Operation was an entire success, identification being obtained.		
	26.	7.18.	The day was dull and dreary. Spasmodic shelling of the Bn. area took place during the day, particular attention being paid to the Ravine in J.22.d. Notification was received that the 8th. and 14th. Brigades would carry out an attack on the Divisional front at a date to be notified. The 53rd. Bn. was selected by the G.O.C. Bde to be the attacking unit in the 14th. Brigade. The following are my recommendations for the execution of a Minor Operation in this Battalion Sector:-

- (1) As a result of reconnaissances made today I am convinced that a raid against the two lines of trenches contained within the shaded area shewn on attached sketch, and between the dotted lines on attached aerial photograph would meet with the greatest success.
- (2) Strength of raiding party 6 Officers and 200 O/Ranks.
- (3) The advantages of this enterprise are: -.

 (a) The "hopping off" line is paralell to objectives and close to first objective.

(b) Objectives are close together.

- (c) Flanks are well defined by tracks, so making direction easier.
- (d) Objectives are wexx clear of xxx C.T's which would allow Artillery and T.M'x fire to be maintained on the latter throughout the operation. The enemy may reasonably be expected to anticipate that a C.T. would come within the area of the raid.
- (4) An Artillery Barrage including a little smoke to fall on the front line at Zero and lift to rear of second objective and on to what appears to be a line of covering machine gun posts in rear of second objective; and protection throughout by Artillery fire on all enemy front line defences opposite Battalion Sector. The opening barrage would include the cutting of wire in front of second objective.
- (5) Co-operation of M.G's and T.M's for neutralising enemy machine guns on flanks and overhead machine gun fire on various targets in rear of sector to be raided.







The following detailed orders are issued by O.C. Raid supplementary to 55th. Battalion Operation Order No. 116.

- 1. ORGANISATION. The raiding party will be organised in two waves followed by Stretcher bearers. First wave 2 Officers and 80 O/Ranks. Lieut. Donaldson and Lieut. Piddington will be in charge of the right and left halves respectively. The wave will consist of 10 sections each of a leader and 7 O/Ranks, numbered from right to left. No's 1 and 10 sections will be organised as bombing sections for clearing traverses to flanks. No's 2,3,8, and 9 sections as Lewis Cun Sections. Second wave. 2 Officers and 100 O/Ranks. Lieut Chadwick and Lieut Stafford will be in charge of right and left halves respectively. The wave will be organised in 16 sections each consisting of a leader and 6 or 7 O/Ranks. No's 1 and 16 sections will be utilised as Bombing sections for clearing traverses to flanks. Dress will be as laid down in 55th. Battalion Operation Order No. 116,
- 2. ASSEMBLY. After a hot meal the raiding party will leave ROMA LINE three hours before Zero. The first wave will lead followed by the second, right halves of waves in advance of left halves. Route Via COOTAMUNDRA SAP and BOURKE LINE to position about K.19.d.4.7. At this point guides will lead parties on to tape line. The tape will be marked with the position of each section.

 Arrangements for guides and for the assistance of Lieut.

 Matthews and Lieut. McCee, at present holding this sector, will be provided for in instructions to Officers Commanding Front Line Companies issued separately.
- 3. ASSAULT. At zero plus 3 minutes first wave will hop off with sections ions extended in line, section leaders in the centre of their sections lieut. Piddington and Lieut. Donaldson accompanying No's 3 and 8 sections. The second wave will follow at a distance of 20 yards with sections in fileled by section leaders, Lieut. Stafford and Lieut. Chadwick will be between no's 4 and 5 and 12 and 13 sections. The second wave will be followed by 5 pairs of stretcher bearers at a distance of 20 yards, each pair carrying a stretcher.

 The whole party will advance at a steady double.
 - (a) Action of first wave .- First wave will take the first objective at the point of the bayonet and kill or capture the occupants of the trench. Sections 1 and 10 will immediately proceed to chear traverses to the flanks to a distance of 30 yards. Lewis cun sections will take up positions on the flanks and engage any retreating enemy or hostile machine guns firing from flanks of first or second objective. No man of first wave will attempt to return to our lines, whether wounded or with a prisoner, until the second wave and Stretcher bearers have passed over. Immediately this has happened any prisoners and wounded men will be rushed back to our lines. Remaining sections will destroy any guns or material that cannot be removed and search all dug-outs and dead in their sector of the trench. The first wave, with the exception of the Officers in charge and the flanking, bombing anf Lewis cun Sections, will withdraw on the completion of their task. The sections remaining will withdraw on the orders of the party leaders when the withdrawal of the second wave has taken place.

- first objective and proceed to second objective. Leaders must locate gaps in wire and rush sections through, immediately opening out for assault on second objective.

 No's 1 and 16 sections will form bombing blocks on flanks and the remainder of the party will kill or capture the garrison and destroy or remove machine guns or material with the utmost despatch. Before giving the signal to withdraw the party leaders must satisfy themselves that the task has been completed and that no members of the party, dead or alive, are left in the trench. In the withdrawal the second wave must be on the lookout to carry back or assist any wounded en route.
- (c) Action of Stretcher bearers. Stretcher bearers will follow second wave across the first objective to second objective and immediately proceed to work back to "Hopping Off" line.
- (4) Return. All raiders and prisoners on return will be guided by front line garrison towards CRUMP LANE.

 Each raider will hand in the card disc at Raid Headqu arters in COOGEE TRENCH, none of the party will attempt to move to the rear until orders are received from O.C. Raid.
- 4. MEDICAL ARRANGEMENTS. An Aid post will be established in GOOGEE TRENCH for treatment of wounded.
- 5. REFRESHMENTS. Hot drink will be provided in COOCEE TRENCH while waiting for enemy retalliation to sudside.
- 6. PRISONERS. Rrisoner collecting point will be at COCCEE TRENCH, adjacent to CRUMP LANE. Intelligence Officer will be in charge of Prisoners escert and will arrange their removal to rear. Instructions re non-interference with prisoners by front line garrison will be contained in instructions to Officers Commanding Front Line Companies.

PRELIMINARY REPORT ON MINOR OPERATIONS BY 55th. BATTALION ON 4th. JULY 1918.

The Assembly was completed 20 minutes before Zero without having suffered any casualties and judging by the normal machine gun fire from enemy front line without being observed by the enemy.

The Barrage fell to time and at Zero plus 3 minutes the signal was given and the raiders moved towards their objectives in the formation arranged. The waves were seen to reach the first objective but from that time onwards the whole operation was clouded in smoke. Very little resistance was met at the first objective. The second objective was reached and the task there completed in spite of a stubborn resistance. The wire in front of the second objective was not cut but did not prove a serious obstacle. Tasks completed, raiders returned to our lines via the same route.

All the objects of the operation were attained, a large number of the enemy were killed, and three prisoners taken were identified as belonging to the 3rd. Company, 232nd. R.I.R. Two Machine guns were also captured. Our casualties were heavy and up to the present it is known that, approximately, 1 Officer and 10 O/Ranks were killed and 1 Officer and 45 O/Ranks wounded. 1 Officer and a few other ranks are not yet accounted for.

L have not as yet completed my investigations into the cause of the casualties and am not prepared to express any opinion until the detailed report is forwarded later.

REPORT ON MINOR OPERATIONS CARRIED OUT BY 55th. BATTALION, on 4th. JULY 1918.

- 1. The Minor Operation by the 55th. Battalion against the two enemy front line trenched from K.19.d.77.25 to K.19.d.92.60. and from K.20.c.10.15 to K.20.c.16.54. as set out in Battalion Operation Order No. 116 was very successfully executed on the morning of 4th. July 1918. The raiding party consisted of 6 Officers and 192 other ranks under the command of Captain K.R.Wyllie.
- 2. All preparations were completed with absolute thoroughness and at 20 minutes before Zero (3.10 a.m.) the raiders were all successfully assembled without incident at the "hopping off" line. Tapes had been set out on the ground marking the position of every section and approaches to same only an hour or so before assembly. Every man knew his position and every man was in it.
- At Zero the Barrage fell and one minute later enemy trench mortar barrage came down close in front of our trenches. Casualties were caused by this fire all along the "hopping off" line during the three minutes period of waiting. The Artillery barrage was excellent as also was the fire of our L.T.M's. As the Artillery barrage xxx lifted at Zero plus three minutes, the pre-arranged signal for the advance was given. The first wave got away immediately followed by the line of sections in file which formed the second wave and stretcher bearer squads. The formation arranged by O.C., Raid was maintained with wonderful accuracy, and as the advance continued across"No Man's Land" three of the men were rendered casualties by enemy Machine gun fire; but still further casualties were caused by the enemy trench mortars. The first wave entered the first objective and encountered two small posts, one of which consisted of a machine gun crew. All the garrison were killed with the exception of one man sent back to our lines a prisoner with his Mach-The trench for a distance of about 40 yards on wither flank was searched and found clear of the enemy. The Second Wave "leap-frogged" through the first objective and moved rapidly towards the second trench. The wire was found almost intact but it did not prove a very difficult obstacle, and the two parties playing the most important part in the operation worked their way through it and rushed the second objective. Here they met considerable resistance. Lieut. Stafford from the parapet shot his first and second man but unfortunately the third Hun killed him. The nearest man to this Officer succeeded in killing the Boche and two or three men working with him worked along the trench and accounted for nine more of the enemy. On the right Lieut. Chadwick encountered a Machine Gun post. All the crew were accounted for and the gun captured. Considerable damage was done to the dug-outs etc. and all the garrison of the trench accounted for before the withdrawal began.

The withdrawal was effected without interference from enemy machine gun fire but the AArtillery Barrage which had come down on our line and No Man's Land" about nine minutes after Zero, caught the raiders as they returned inflicting several casualties. The majority if the Raiders returned as arranged Via Raid Headquarters and Aid Post in front line. A few came back towards the "hopping off" lineand passed to the rearvia the Support Line. Direction throughout the operationwas maintained, but was rendered extremely

difficult particularly on the left flank by -

(1) the fact that the left"leg" of the "Box Barrage" rested so close to the well defined track which had originally been selected as the left boundary, that the latter could not be used for direction. Instead, the flanking section leaders had to choose their line of direction according to the line of the "Leg" of the barrage.

(2) the excessive use of smoke. Soon after the barrage had opened vision beyond a distance of a few yards was rendered impossible. The atmosphere was so thickened that the raiders breathed with difficulty.

2. Nevertheless direction was maintained throughout in spite of the above circumstances, nor did they in any way account for the heavy

- COMMUNICATION. All line communication failed within 8 minutes of Zero between Battalion Headquarters and front line.
- The total captures were three other ranks taken prisoner who are ident-5. ified as belonging to 3rd. Company, 232nd. R.I.R. and two machine guns. One heavy gun set in a concrete bed could not be moved and was blown up.
- The casualties of the raiding party on the tapes in "No Man's Land" 6. and enemy trenches were 1 Officer and 6 other ranks killed, and 29 wounded, many of the wounded being very slight wounds.
 - Enemy trenches. Both front and second line trenches were very well 7. dug, 6' deep and firestepped. In the second line 4 dugouts, appeared to be about 12-16 steps. These were blown in with Stokes Bombs.
 - Wire. None in front of first line. Low D.A. 10-12 feet wide in 8. front of second line. No trouble was experienced in negotiating
 - Medical. Arrangements for evacuation of wounded were excellent and 9. the greatest credit is due to the party of the 14th. Field Ambulance
- Simultaneousky with above operation a "Chinese Attack" was earried out 10. against the enemy defences in the vicinity of K.25.c.5.7. Fifteen figures were placed in position at 2 a.m. and same were operated from Zero until Zero plus 35 by Lieut. W. E. Campbell and 5 0/Ranks. The operation acted as an excellent diversion, drawing considerable machine gun fixe and Minenwerfer fire. Some of the figures were practically smashed to pieces by Machine Gun fire.
- The operations were successfully carried out and they resulted in drawing a great amount of fire on to the sector. The enemy barrage was in three belts and was very heavy. It was kept on until Zero plus 2 hours, 35 minutes.

Our casualties were naturally heavy for the day, being as follows: -

> Raid. Killed. 1 Officer. Wounded. 29 0/Ranks. 6 0/Ranks. In Trenches. Killed. 2 0/Ranks. Wounded. 1 Officer 26 0/Ranks. Missing. 1 Officer. 1 0/Rank.

Total Casualties. Killed. 1 Officer, 8 0/Ranks. Wounded. 1 do 58 do 1 do 1 do

Of the 2 missing Lieut. Piddington was a member of the Raiding party, and after returning to our front line went to the rear over the top and has not been heard of since. The other man is beleived to have been blown to pieces on the tape by a trench mortar.

Considering the nature of the operation and the success obtained in drawing enemy fire, I do not consider the casualties excess-Every effort was made to reduce shell casualties.

The enemy casualties were heavy. The front line was hardly manned at all. but the second line was well garrisoned and our men had a solid fight with bayonet and bomb. Enemy casualties on a conserestimate were 45. Our men brought back all their dead except vative one.

QUARTERMASTER'S REPORT.

Rations. Rations as drawn from the A?S.C. continue to maintain a high standard, the percentage of fresh meat and bread being good. A regu-

lar supply of oatmeal was also obtained.

The Cooks have done excellent work in preparing food of a high standard and good variety, especially whilst the Battalion was in the Line. The Battalion whilst forward was supplied daily with Cocoa and milk and one packet of cigarettes per man. The rations have also been supplemented with goods supplied by the Comforts fund and Y.M.C.A such as oatmeal, golden syrip, tinned fruit, tinned vegetables, Australian tobacco, sweets, and sweet biscuits.

Clothing. Clean clothes were sent forward whilst the Battalion was in the line which enabled the men to have a clean change. 48 suits

of new clothes were also issued.

BOOTS. 32 pairs of new boots were issued, the bootmakers for the month also repaired 90 pairs of worn boots.

ORDNANCE STORES. Allk demands have been supplied punctually, no items of importance being outstanding.

FAT. We again topped the list with our monthly fat return, the quantity returned being 3,000 lbs.

TRANSPORT OFFICERS REPORT.

ANIMALS. The animals are not in as good a condition as at the end of last month, owing to hard work, feed being cut down slightly and several cold snaps.

HARNESS. All harness is in good working condition except that of the Maltese Cart which will have to be replaced soon.

The hay ration was cut down 1 lb. alround which makes a total of 2 lbs. reduction the last 6 months.

To make up this deficiency straw was salvaged and crops and clover cut in forward area.

This feed is a good laxative for the animals but does not sustain condition when in hard work.

WAGONS. Two water carts and two cookers only require painting now. One Limber has been condemned by the I.O.M.

WORK. The work for the month has been heavy averaging 8 to 9 wagons daily. One wagon was permanently on Engineers fatigue up to the 25th. inst. A special bomb proof revettment was constructed round the horse lines.

INSPECTIONS. The Staff Captain the Transport Lines and seemed satisfied. Colonel Max Henry, D.S.O. and Captain Greaves, M.C. made their usual inspections.
