

	5th Nov		Consequent upon the arrangements made with Army Stores, a copy of the stores demand of the 1st Aust. Div. Sig. Coy., which was under orders to move up into Fourth Army Area, was forwarded to D.D. Signals, Fourth Army.	
	6th Nov		I visited D.D. Signals, Fourth Army to discover as much about the situation as possible I was informed that owing to the increasing difficulty in obtaining stored and in transporting them forward, Corps were experiencing great difficulty in maintaining communication with Division and in some cases had found it impossible to do so. I visited the 9th and 13th Corps Headquarters. The latter Corps had lost touch with it is Division in the line. The only forward line communication was to a Report Centre from which D.Resconveyed traffic to various formations.	ns

EU.	7th	10v.,	In consideration of the amount of work to be done, I wired the O.C. Australian Corps Sign Coy. to immediately despatch No. 1 and 2 MAL. Sections and an Emergency Office, equipment and peonnel. I arranged with A.D. Signals, 9th Corps to supply these units with all available information.	rs-
Le CATEAU	.Sth	Nov.,	Arrangements were made to draw Cable and Stores from Army Signal Dump at LA CHAPELLETTE. The remainder of Headquarters Section of the Australian Corps Signal Company moved by Lorry from EU to Le CAREAU. The 1st Aust. Div. moved from Long Area to St. SOUPLET, communication being obtained through 9th Corps.	
	9th 1	NOV.,	I was informed by B.G.G.S. that Australian Corps would take over the Headquarters of the 13th Corps at Le CATEAU on the 11th inst. I moved up from EU to Le CATEAU in order to see that the work of preparing for the arrival of Corps and Divisions was pushed ahead. No. 1 and 2 Australian Cable Sections moved by Road taxEU from EU to Le CATEAU. The 4th Aust. Div. moved from CAVILLON area to 9th Corps Area.	
	10th	Nov.,	I visited the D.D. Signals, Fourth Army and discussed with him the construction of certain routes. It was decided to pool the whole constructional resources of the Army and construct a route forward to AVESNES. 2 American Construction Coys were also available for this. I was instructed to construct from a point in AVESNES hack along the MARBAIX - AVESNES Road to meet the Americans who were building towards AVESNES. The route was to be one of 8 pairs, eventually, the top four pairs to be of 100 lb. copper and the bottom four pairs of 70 lb. copper. The O.C. of the 4th Telegraph Construction Coy. was to be in charge of the whole of the route. I instructed the Os. C. No. 1 and 2 M.A.L. Sections to report to him immediately. The D.D. Sign is to arrange for the construction of the Black and White routes to formations which established on the flanks of this main route. 	12th	Nov.	I inspected No. 2 M.A.L. Section at work on the construction of the route through AVESNES. The difficulty of transporting stores to the job, owing to the state of the roads, had delayed the progress of the work slightly but good headway was made. Standing French Poles were being used for part of the distance and an old German route is to be cleared up and used in that portion of the route, near AVESNES. Orders were received from Advanced Army that all permanent line construction except to Headquarters already chosen and to which the work was in progress was to cease and construction units were to stand by. (Telegram attached)	
	13th	Nov.	I reconnoitred the country to the north of AVESNES towards MAUBEUGE for existing routes. In almost all cases German routes have been partially or totally destroyed, but French routes have not been touched. A French route running along the main AVESNES - MAUBEUGE Road may prove useful as an extension to the route at present under construction to AVESNES should the line of advance be North Easterly. I was visited by O.C. Signals, 2nd Aust. Div. and discussed with him the general situation.	
	14th	Nov.	I visited the D.D. Signals, Fourth Army and asked for information about the move forward. No information was available on the subject but the D.D. Signals informed me that he was to meet a German Representative at MONS on Nov. 15th. and expected information after that date. A Conference of A.D. Signals of Corps concerned was arranged for 11 a.m. on 16th at this Office. I also arranged with D.D. Signals that on completion of the route to AVESNES, the two Australian Airline Sections would commence constructing from a point, TRAIS PAVE in AVESNES, in a North Easterly direction. I visited the 1st Aust. Div. Sig. Coy. with regard to the Exchange at BOHAIN. At present this is being manned by 9th Corps and I arranged for it to be taken over by Australian Corps December 150 Marks 15

The road between AVESNES and this point has been blown up and at the present time it could not be possible to get loaded Lorries through. The Officer in charge of the Repair Gang informe me it was hoped that a passage for Lorries over the crater would be ready the following day. The Airline Sections completed that portion of the route to AVESNES on which they were working.	
	16th	Nov.	A Conference attended by the D.D. Signals, Fourth Army and the A.D. Signals 4th, 6th, 9th and Australian Corps was held at this office. Amongst other things the following points were discussed. (a) The supply of Cable. (b) Supply of Stores other than Cable. (c) Probable extent of communications on move. (d) The allotement and use of lines. (e) Employment of Airline Sections. The D.D. Signals, informed us with reference to (a) that the strictest economy was necessary, as supply and the means of transporting cable forward was limited. (b) Supplies of Stores from England work being cut down to an absolute minimum and as few issues as possible would be made from stock in hand. (c) Communicat whilst on the move would be limited almost entirely to Wireless and D.Rs., though use would be made, where possible, of existing routes. (d) Lines would be allotted in the usual manner by Army to Corps. (e) Airline Sections of the various Corps in the Army would probably used be be used jointly on construction of one main route along the line of advance.	
	17th	Nov.	I visited 3rd Australian Flying Squadron with reference to the employment of Aeroplanes for D.R. Service th 2nd, 3rd and 5th Australian Divisions. I sakes emphasised the fact that the Time Table must be adhered to and punctuality was absolutely necessary. I also arranged that the Squadron should notify the Signalmaster before 9 a.m. daily if flying was impossible so that the normal Motor Cycle D.R. Service could be reverted to. A 5th Bde. R.A.F. Instruction regarding their communication during march to Germany was received. An instruction regarding the use of Wireless communications during the march forward was issued to O.C. I visited the R.T.O. at EU with regard to the reconsignment of stores from that place to the Australian Corps Railhead. I was informed by him that one truck had already been reconsigned on 24th inst. The location of the Aeroplane Dropping Stations of 1st, and 4th Divisions and Corps Headquarters was received.	
	19th	Nov.	Extracts from "a note relative to Administrative consequent on the signing of the Armistice" were received and found to c-ontain certain points of interest regarding the German Signal Service. (Extracts attached).	App. 5.
	20 th	Nov.	I spent the day with the 5th Australian Div. Signal Coy. and discussed with the O.C. the situation in general and gave him information concerning points of interest which had been discussed in recent Conferences. I advised him also to dispose of all his spare and unnecessary equipment to the Signal Dump ABBEVILLE.	
	21st	Nov.	The 2nd Australian Division moved out from BELLTY - Sur - SOMME area enroute from BOHAIN area. I vosited the 3rd Australian Div. Sig. Coy. at HALLENCOURT and discussed various matters with the O.C. Information on the situation which affected the Signal Service generally was given him. I also advised him, in the event of his Unit moving, to send all unnecessary equipment to the Signal Dump ABBEVILLE.	
	22nd	Nov.	I visited No. 2 Airline Section which is working on the route, AVESNES-CHARLEROI, the main Army route. I went along the route as far as CHARLEROI. Very little work would be needed on either a French or German Route which goes in the direction to provide necessary communication.

Le	AU.23r	I instructed the O.C. Australian Corps Signal Company to employ Nos. 1 and 2 Aust. Cable Sections onnthe salvage of cable in the vicinity of Le CATEAU, and also to relay several cable pairs which run from the Signal Office to the main Airline Route near St BENEN.	Appendices
	2∳th	I visited 4th Aust. Div. Sig. Coy. at PRECHIES and once again impressed on the O.C. that the strictest economy must be exercised in regard to use of cable, and I also arranged with him, to commence salvage of cable in his Divisional Area. I made a further reconnaissance of lines towards SAINS, discovering one German route which may be of use during further advances. At night I was advised that 1st and 4th Divisions would move on the following morning, the former to SOLRE - Le - CHATEAU and the latter to SAINS. Owing to the short notice it will not be pessible to provide communication to the new Headquarters till some few hours after the move.	
	25th	The 1st Aust. Division closed at CARTIGNY at 1100, reopening at SOLRE - LE = CHATEAU at that hour. The 4th Aust. Division closed at PRECHIES at 1200, reopening at SAINS at that hour. Direct Communication was obtained to 1st Division during the afternoon but it was found impossible to get in touch with 4th Division until noon on 26th. No. 2 Aust. M.A.L. Section was employed on temporary repair of a German route to provide this communication to 4th Division. The Lines Officer at Army was able to assist but little as regards information concerning lines in the areas to which these Divisions moved, it being thus necessary to follow every route going in the direction of SAINS or Eclre-Le-CHATEAU until the most suitable one was discovered. In view of the distance now between Corps and Divisions, it was decided to open an Advanced Office at CARTIGNIES. Direct lines will be obtained from there to 1st, 2nd and 4th Australian Divisions and 4th Army. Two direct lines will be arranged from this advanced office back to Corps at Le CATEAU. The reduction of the number of D.R. runs to 1st and 4th Divisions to two instead of three daily was suggested to the B.G.G.S. and agreed to by him. The new Time Table came into force immediately.

Le CATEAU.	26th	Nov.	An Advanced Office was opened at CARTIGNIES at 1700 and excellent communication was obtained from there to 1st, 2nd and 4th Divisions. Half of No. 2 M.A.L. Section was instructed to go to CARTIGNIES as a Breakdown Gang in case of trouble on lines from there.	
	27th	Nov.	Detachments of No. 1 and 2 Cable Sebtions commenced work on relaying and generally straightening local cables and cables which run through the town and join the Airline route outside. This work will take some time to complete as a very large amount of CABLE cable has been run through the town by the various units.	
	28th	Nov.	A warning order for the move of Australian Corps Headquarters to AVESNES on November 30th was issued. An advanced Party was sent forward to prepare the Signal Office and gather all information about the area. I visited AVESNES and BEAUMONT, the latter a possible future Corps Headquarters.	
	29th	Nov.	4th Army Rear Office moved from AVESNES and the O.C. Australian Corps Sighal Coy. was instructed to take over the Office vacated by them. Nos. 1 and 2 Cable Sections moved forward to AVESNES. The move of Australian Corps Headquarters was postponed 24 hours, Headquarters closing here at 12 noon on December 1st and opening at AVESNES at the same time.	
	30th	Nov.	Necessary arrangements were made for the splitting and leading in to the new office at AVESNES of the lines to 1st and 4th Divisions and to 4th Army, and for the bridging through at CARTIGNIES and LE CATEAU of lines to 2nd and 5th Divisions and Corps Heavy Artillery. From AVESNES we will have direct communication to 1st, 2nd, 4th and 5th Divisions, Corps Heavy Artly and Fourth Army.



The following are extracts from 5th Bde. R.A.F. - Instruction - Series 'A' No. 4. :-

" Communibations - WIRELESS.

- During the advance to the RHINE, communications between Army, Corps, Divisions R.A.F., H.Q., R.A.F., Bdes., Wings, Squadrons and Parks will be maintained by Wireless Telegraphy.
- 2 STATIONS.
 In 5th Bde., C.W. Stations will be established at :5th Brigade, H.Q.
 15th Wing, H.Q.
 22nd Wing, H.Q.
 5th Balloon Wing, H.Q.

and one Station at each Aerodrome, at 4 A.P. and at Reserve Lorry Park. Where two or more Squadrons are on the one Aerodrome, the senior operator will arrange for his station to be erected, operators of remaining Squadrons will act as orderlies between the Wireless Signal Office and their own unit.

- Messages for the most part may be sent in clear, provided always the Official Code Names of Units, as per attached addendum are used. Unit Commanders are xidex direct representatives will be held responsible for authenticity of all messages. Operators will not accept messages for transmission unless signed by an Officer. All messages will be sent in the turn received by each station, except priority messages. In 5th Brigade, the privilege of priority will be restricted to G.O.C., or direct representatives and Wing Commanders or direct representatives.
- Corps Squadron Wireless Officers will make arrangements with their Corps Wireless Officers and will exchange calls and wavelengths, so that Corps Squadrons may always be in touch with their Corps direct for Liaison purposes.
- 6 GROUP WORKING.
 Of communications become congested, a system of Group working will be issued later. This can only be ascertained by trial. For the present, the Brigade Station will act as Control Stn. for 5th Briaged Group.
- As wireless traffic will be heavyn strict attention will be paid to procedure (S.SM 209.). Lenghtly calls must be avoided and operators must endeavour to get messages through without repetition.

 The minimum power which will ensure communication must be only used. Aerials can be very low for short distances: the height of an Air Line Pole should invariably be sufficient for Squadron Stations. Correct wavelenghts are most essential, arrangements are being made for Brigade Station to transmit standard wavelengths each day.

WIRELESS COMMUNICATION DURING MARCH TO GERMANY.

- 1. Wireless communication between Army and Corps, and between Corps and Divisions will be carried out by C.W. using 1130 metres wavelength.
- 2. The Calls for all formations concerned have been issued under this office T.S. 195 of 16-11-18.
- one will be kept installed at Division Headquarters and a second set kept available for stepping up during the march. Any other sets available may be distributed to lower formations at the discretion of the O's.C. Divisional Signal Companies.
- 4. While Divisions are on the move the regular "stepping up" procedure will be adopted. One C.W. Set will be sent in advance to the next position selected for Headquarters am shouldbe in touch with Corps by the time the H.Q. Staff arrives.
- 5. A general relaxation of the instructions regarding the use of cipher and clear is permitted. All messages may be sent in clear except the designation or identification of units. The "Four Letter Code Call" will in every case be substituted for the clear address.
 - 6. No spark wireless will be used without reference to A.D. Signals.
- 7. All Power-Buzzer Amplifier, and Loop set apparatus may be left behind in Divisional Dumps but should be carefully looked after as it will become part of the vocabulary stores on return to Australia.
- 8. Every endeavour must be made to keep in touch by Wireless and full advantage taken of its increased utility now that the necessity of interespicing is eliminated.

Herewith copies of extract from note relative to Administrative darrangements, Q.M.G's. Branch, consequent on the signing of the Convention of Armistice.

x x x x x x x x " V. TELEGRAPHIC AND TELEPHONIC COMMUNICATIONS. All telegraph and telephone lines and all fixed Wireless Signal Stations shall be handed over to the Allied Armies complete woth milltary and civil personnel and all material, including all stores installed on the left bank of the RHINE.

Supplementary supplies required for the maintenance of the Signal System shall be furnished by the German Government during the continuance of the Armistice as they become necessary.

The Commander; in-Chief of the Allied Armies will effect a military occupation of the Signal System, assume its direction, and will make such changes or replacements in the personnel as he may deem advisable.

He will send back to the German Army such military personnel as he may consider surplus to requirements for the exploitation and maintenance of the signal system.

All plans relating to the German telegraph and telephone system shall be handed over to the Commander-in-Chief of the Allied Armies

(a). In France and in Belgium each Allied Army chall re-establish the telegraph and telephone systems not only with a view to purely military requirements, but also to assist in the resuscitation of the economic of the Country and for the use of the civil administ_ rative services.

(b). In Belgian TERRITORY. The operation of the telegraph and teephone services will be carried out by the Belgian Authorities, it being understood that all circuits required by the Allied Armies for their own use shall be put at their disposal.

(c). In Alsace-lorraine. The organisation shall be analagous to that in re-occupied French Territory.

(d). Between Line 3 and the RHINE. The operation of the system will be under the direction of an Inter Allied Commission which will include a military member, assisted by such Technical personnel as he may consider necessary, for each of the Allied Armies. The location of the commission will be decided by the Marshal Commanding-in-Chief the Allied Armies who will also nominate the President.

The Marshal Commanding-in-Chief will decide, in agreement with the Allied Armies, as to which lines shall be specially reserved as main arteries for the common use.
