



#### Narrative.

Whilst flying towards Estaires I saw an L.V.G. flying West from North of Estaires. I kept in his blind spot above his top plane until he was warned by A.A. I then dived on E.A. from front; his observer opened fire from range of about 600 Yards but I reserved my fire until I got underneath his tail. I closed in to a very short range and fired about 200 rounds from both guns. I then noticed that tracer bullets were ricicheting off bottom of fuselage of E.A. which was armoured. While I was firing the pilot was endeavouring to get me out of his blind spot and I overshot him, getting on the left of his observer. I then fired a burst of 150 rounds from point blank range into the side of the E.A. which silenced the observer; but, not before he had fired a burst into my machine one of which was an explosive bullet which hit a longeron in front of the dash board and temporarily blinded me.

I immediately half rolled to get away and on looking back saw

E.A. diving steeply with smoke pouring out behind.

I did not again engage E.A. as my machine was badly shot about I saw E.A. go down ateeply with a partial side slip to the lef for about 3,000 It. before I eventually lost sight of him; on account of having to keep turning to avoid A.A. fire.
"D" Battery saw this combat and confirms that E.A. went down

but were unable to observe ultimate result on account of distance.

#### Narrative.

I first saw Enemy 2-str East of Metren. I dived towards this machine and he went away East. I watched E.A. which came towards line again N.E. of Mervile.

I Manouevered to get East of this E.A. but when about level with him

I was observed and the machine turned East.

I dived on E.A. and fired about 150 Rounds from range of 200 ft. This machine dived practically vertically and went down absolutely out of control.

I did not observe ultimate crash. As I turned over E.A. and then saw him still diving steeply out of control and disappear in the mist quite close to the ground.

A.G.O., dark camouflaged, small national markings. Speed and armament unknown.

#### Narrative.

While flying N.E. of LaBassee we observed an A.G.O. flying towards Festubert. We immediately turned and climbed between this machine and enemy territory. The E.A. apparently did not observe us. Lieut. Watson first dived on E.A. and fired about 30 rounds from very close range. Observer was apparently hit as he ceased firing. This E.A. immediately dived and turned East underneath him. Lieut. King then attacked E.A. from ahead firing a short burst from close range. The E.A. continued to dive and Lieut. King did a climbing turn gaining height. Lieuts. Watson and King then both attacked E.A. from above and behind - Lieut. Watson on right and Lieut. King on left. Lieut. Watson fired about 100 rounds and Lieut. King 150 rounds from close range and machine half stalled and went down in a slow spin side-slipping completely out of control. This E.A. crashed just South of Laventie.


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

I dived on E.A. from above and behind. I flattened out just below his tail and fired a burst of about 150 rounds from 50 feet. This machine began to side-slip and then did two turns of a spin. I followed it down firing another 100 rounds from close range. E.A. continued to spin and crashed just S.E. of Bac St Maur. Lieut. R.King observed this combat but was too far off to observe ultimate result.

I could not catch this E.A. in the dive but followed him right down to the ground. The Pilot flattened out and endeavoured to land but crashed imming turning over on to his nose and breaking all the right side of the

machino.




