



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

H.6.b.	1918 Sept 1st		Battalion Headquarters at H.6.b.70.50. East of CLERY. On the Battalions-38th, 39th, and 40th- being relieved in the forward positions in advance of CLERY, the 37th Battalion moved from its support position to CURLU- G.6.b arriving about dawn. The men had a hot meal which was awaiting them and immediately retired to the billets which had been prepared. The men were very tired after the previous days continuous fighting. Baths were allotted to the Battalion; half the battalion bathed and had a clean change of underclothing issued. Occasionally the enemy shelled the area at almost extreme range- with his 4-2-inch high velocity gun. The men began to settle down and make themselves as comfortable as spossible. Arrangement were made by Battalion headquarters to get the Battalion Canteen forward. Blankets were issued. Enemy aircraft were active during the night. The weather continued to remain fine.	
6.6.b.	Sept 2nd		B.H.Q. at CURLU G.6.b.60.60. The other half of the Battalion bathed and clean underclothing was issued. The companies which were very weak were reorganised. The men were in good spirits but they still needed rest. There remained the signs of the steenuous times they had passed through recently. Those who formed the Battalion Nucleus arrived from Echelon. The weather remained fine. The enemy's bombing planes were active in this vicinity during the night.	
6.6.b.	Sept 3rd		Battalion Headquarters at CURLU. G.6.b.60.60. The men rested during the day as well as at night. The period which tey would remain in this locality was uncertain and it was accordingly ordered that the men would rest the whole period The Q.M. issued new timics, breeches, etc. wherever required. Enemy bombing planes were still very active during the night. The men were in splendid spirits, though they were not keen for the line again. Arrangements by the Battalion staff for their comfort were excellent. Usual bombing activity in the vicinity at night. The weather still remained fine.

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

124 545	1918 Sept 4th		B.H.Q. at CURLU G.6.b.60.60 The men were still resting. Their short absence from the line so far had greatly improved them. C.O. attended in conference with G.O.C., Division at Brigade. Swimming in the Canal (Somme) was permitted and many availed themselves of the opportunity. The absence of artillery fire was noticeable though the hun still sent his bombing planes over during the night. They caused no casualties. The weather was still fine	
	Sept 5th		B.H.Q. at CURLU and later at CLEARY. The men were still resting at CURLU when orders came from Brigade to be ready to move forward at short notice. The Battalion moved from CURLU at 6 p,m, arriving about 9.30 p.m. after a difficult march in the rain. The men were very wet on arrival at Clery where there was practically no cover or accommodation. The conditions were very uncomfortable for the night. During the day the weather was fine but very heavy showers fell during the night.	
I.1.b.60	. Sept		B.H.Q. at CLERY, I.1.b.60.30. The Chaplain, Capt Goller, with others searched for members of the battalion who were missing from the 29/30th August operations and buried those bodies which were found. Men were able to rest under more favourable circumstances, having since their arrival had time to improve their conditions. Weather improved and was very fine. Efficers and N.C.Os reconnoitred localities around PERRNNE in anticipation of an early move forward to follow the retreating enemy.	
	Sept 7th		B.H.Q. at CLERY I.1.b.60.30 and TINCOURT K.24.d.40550. The Battalion moved forward at 9 a.m. moving overland to avoid the heavy traffic on the roads Passing over Mt. StQUENTIN and through the outskirts of PERONNE, battalion pushed forward and halted for dinner and a rest, moving forward again at about 5.30 p.m. to TINCOURT, where they arrived at about 8 p.m. Comfortable positions were found for the Transport and the men rested while a reconnoitring party went forward. There was scattered shell fire and Capt Towl was dangerously wounded while reconnoitring the right flank. On return of this party at about 11.30 p.m. the companies moved forward to new positions. Enemy planes were active during the night. The weather was fine but threatening.

C Company had 1 Officer and 15 O.Rs casualties from gas shelling. Weather was dull and wintry. Advance parties came into the line from the 22nd Battalion preparatory to taking over as per order No. 117.

His M.G. fire was fairly consistent. 2nd Battalion completed their relief about 9 p,m, and the men moved to BOUGLY where they had a hot meal prior to continuing their march to BUSSU where they arrived about midnight The weather was very wet and the march to BUSSU was consequently very hard on the men.



	1918 Sept 27th		The men were soon settled in their bivouacs and spent a quiet night.
F.19.a.	Sept 28th		There was slight rain on the morning of the 28th. The men breakfasted before daylight. Major Robertson attended a conference of C.Os. at 10 a.m. and at 2 p.m. called the Company Commanders together and gave them final instructions. Lieut P.Wilkinson (B Company) was sent forward with one N.C.O. per company to reconnoitre the route to the BROWN LINE. Ammunition, Bombs, picks and shovels, flares, etc were distributed during the afternoon, and watches were synchronised at 8 p.m. A quiet night was passed.
F.19.a.1 3.,F.23. 5.8., and F.18.b.0	a. 29t		The morning dawned fine with a slight mist. The Battalion moved off at 7.15 a.m. in artillery formation keeping about 400 yards south of the BLUM ROAD. We were soon amongst the heavy batteries and the advance proceeded without interruption until F.23.a. was reached, when it was found that the 38th Battalion were being held up, and the Battalion was spread out in cover of shell holes. Battalion Headquarters was established at F.23.a.5.8. At 1.p.m. information was received from the 38th Battalion that their A Company had been sent forward to endeavour to mop up the machine gum nests which were holding them up. It was soon evident that the American troops on this sector had not attained their objectives. Scattered groups of American stragglers spoke of heavy casualties and had no idea of the present position of their units. The Rev A.E.Goller was killed by a stray M.G.bullet at 2.15.p.m. At 2.45. instructions were received that the advance would be proceeded with at 3 p.m. but that the objective named would be the GREEN LINE.
