

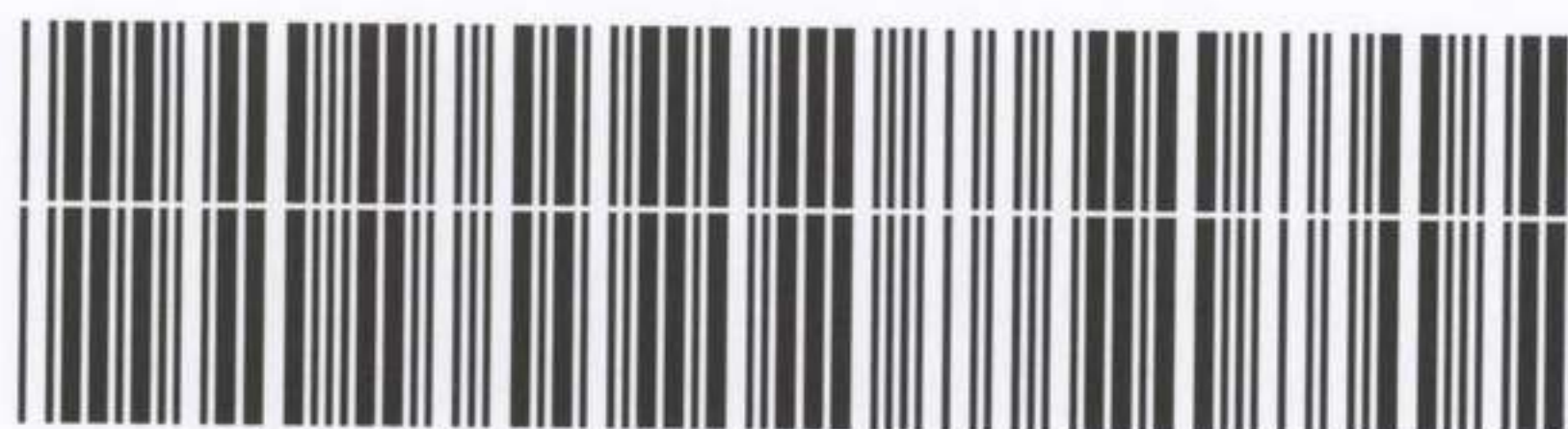

APPENDIX A

59th Battalion Order No 2

(Copy)

18th July 1916.

Information. 1. The 15th Infantry Brigade has been ordered to assault and capture the enemy's firing line and Support Trenches opposite our front where the River Laves cuts the German front Line (N 8 D 8 1/2 - 1 1/4) to N 9 C 7 - 1.

The 184th Brigade will attack on our right and the 14th Australian Infantry Brigade on our left.
One section 15th Machine Gun Company and the Lewis Machine Gun Section of the 59th Battalion from position between "BOND STREET" and "THE TRAM LINE" will cover the advance with fire. The 15th A.L.T.M. Battery from selected positions in the front trench will cover the advance from the time artillery fire lifts.
One section 15th Machine Gun Company from a position "JUNCTION POST" will use indirect fire on the enemy's second line system.
Engineer dumps are established at "TRAM HEAD", "BEE POST" and "TRAIN BASE".

INTENTION 2. The 59th Battalion will attack the enemy's trenches on a frontage to be pointed out personally to Company Commanders advancing to the assault in four "waves".

DISTRIBUTION "A" and "B" Companies will form the first two waves each

3. Company having two platoons in the first wave with two platoons in the second wave supporting them.

"C" and "D" Companies will form the third and fourth "wave" distributed the same as "A" and "B" Companies.

All platoons in the first "wave" and second "wave" will be made up to strength of 50.

The Lewis Machine Guns. Two guns each will be allotted to "C" and "D" Companies for the protection of their flanks and the remaining two will go forward independently in the centre of these two Companies, the whole moving forward with the third wave. One of the two independent guns to get into enemy's fire trench and assist in defence of "A" Company's right flank.

Signallers will be where they can best carry out instructions given personally to signalling officer.

Pioneers and Police will report to the R.S.M. and be used for carrying forward supplies.

INSTRUCTIONS Each man will carry 170 rounds S.A.A. Entrenching tool

4. will be carried in the belt. Each man will also carry a SAND BAG CONTAINING ONE SAND BAG AND TWO HAND GRENADES. When he reaches the trench in which he is intended to use his bayonet he will drop both sand bags and grenades in the trench these being collected into dumps by detailed parties. Each third man should carry a shovel or pick slung over the back with a piece of string. Bombs will be carried in green canvas buckets. Company Commanders will be responsible that they carry sufficient ladders for crossing ditches in "NO MANS LAND" and also for crossing enemy's fire trench, specially detailing which ladders are to be carried to enemy's trench. These ladders to be placed in position across enemy's trench before the men carrying them jump into them. They are intended to assist the following assaulting lines to cross. Special canvases or failing these blankets fastened to poles will be carried to be used for crossing barbed wire, men to be instructed that this is for use on enemy's wire.

10 men per platoon will be detailed as wire cutters and will deal with uncut portions of enemy's wire.

1 N.C.O. and 4 men will be detailed by each Company for the purpose of collecting BOMBS AND SAND BAGS into dumps near enemy's communication trenches.

INSTRUCTIONS 1 N.C.O. and 6 sappers (15th Field Company Engineers) will go forward with the third wave and a similar party with the fourth wave. The N.C.O. in charge will detail two of these men to search for wires and cut them immediately they arrive in the trenches. The remainder will be used to assist in blocking communication trenches. 6 runners per Battalion and 4 runners per Company will be detailed for communication. Wires will be run out to enemy's trenches as early as possible.

The first and second "waves" will enter and deal with the enemy's fire trench, particular attention being paid to dugouts. Should this prove an easy job these "waves" will then proceed towards enemy's second line, sufficient men being detailed by each Company to form a chain down ONE SAP for the purpose of passing supplies.

The third and fourth "waves" will pass over enemy's fire trench and deal with the enemy's support trench. This support trench will when taken be immediately put into a condition to resist counter attack. No effort will be spared to make this trench as strong as possible in the short time that will probably be at their disposal.

Grenadiers. 10 teams will accompany the second wave and act under instructions from Grenade Officer. The remaining 6 teams will accompany the fourth wave. All teams will receive specific instructions from the Grenade Officer as to what their job is on reaching the enemy's trenches.

Dress. Fighting Order, one day's ration and one iron ration will be carried by all ranks also waterproof sheet. Water bottles must be full.

PROGRAMME 19th JULY 1916.

Zero to 0.30	Registration by Divisional Artillery and Trench Mortars.
0.30 to 2.00	Registration and bombardment by heavy artillery (9.2 howitzer and upwards), also registration by 6 inch howitzers.
2.00 to 4.00	Wire cutting by 18 pdrs.
4.00 to 7.00	Wire cutting by 18 pdrs continued, wire cutting by trench mortar battery, bombardment by 18 pdrs, bombardment by 5.5 inch howitzers, bombardment by 6 inch howitzers.
5.00 to 7.00	Heavy artillery 9.2 howitzers and upwards (slow deliberate fire) Artillery lift to form barage.
At 7.00	Artillery lift to form barage.

During bombardment fire will lift to barage line as under:-

4.25 to 4.29

5.04 to 5.09

5.29 to 5.36

6.21 to 6.31

On each lift to barage line infantry in the trenches show bayonets over the parapet, dummy heads and shoulders will be shown, Officers blow whistles, shout orders, in order to induce the enemy to man his parapets. At the end of each of these "lifts" artillery will shorten range on to enemy's front parapet and continue bombardment. The assault will take place precisely at 7.00 after zero, working by the watch. Officers will not wait for an order but will signal the advance at the hour.
