

The Battalien will be relieved during the night 5/6th RELIEF. August, 1916, by the 54th Battalien.

The 54th Battalien will commence from their Billets at HOUR OF RELIEF. 2 9,30 p.m., this evening and will march by Plateens with 50 yards interval,

One guide per Plateen (or in the case of pests - one GUIDES. guide per pest) of each Company will meet 0.C., 54th Battalien, at the entrance to TIN BARN AVENUE, at 9.45 p.m., for the purpose of guiding that Battalien into the front line trenches, also different posts in the 300 yards line,

4. TIN BARN AVENUE, also ABBOTT'S LANE AND GUNNER'S WALK ROUTES FOR and BAY AVENUE can be used to reach the second pertien RELIEF. of TIN BARN AVENUE, if Company Commanders so desire,

5 On the completion of each Company's relief, Company COMPLETION Commanders will send the fellowing message through to REPORT. Bn., Hgrs., by telephone :- "PADRE", after despatching this message, Company Commanders will immediately move their commands out to Billets.

The Battalian will accupy the present 54th Battalian BILLETS. area, with additional accommedation which will be notified later.

The relief of Command Post will be carried out on the NOTE. night of the 6/7th August. Particulars regarding this relief can be obtained to-day from the New Zealanders, whe are at present eccupying the Pest. As this post has not yet been shelled, special steps must be taken to warn all ranks against expesing themselves to the enemy observers.

Trench Steres, Leg Beeks etc., will be handed ever TRENCH STORES. during daylight, under Company arrangements.

Company Commanders will ensure that all Bn., private BN. PROPERTY. preperty, such as Periscepes etc., is not handed ever.

The attached table of Guards and Fatigues to be re-GUARDS AND lieved, will be taken ever by D Company. Fatigues PATIGUES. according to time - Reliefs as soon as possible.
