

AUROY	Octo		At 1 a.m. instructions were received from the Brigadier over the phone that the Battalion would co-operate in an attack upon an allotted frontage lying North of NAUROY (see App.1) This was immediately confirmed by wire; Company Commanders and Specialist Officers were then called to a meeting by the C.O. and after details had been discussed orders were issued for the move and subsequent operation. At 3 a.m. rain was still falling and showed little promise of clearing, yet shortly afterwards a slight breeze springing up cleared the sky and made the atmosphere for marching more favourable. The move to the assembly position was made independently by Companies: Headquarters having the pack animals carrying technical and medical goar and tools took the roa route by way of BELLICOURT. It had been arranged with the 29th Battalion that guides were to meet companies near the cross roads in G.1O.b.8.3. but these failing to report to time caused a considerable amount of delay until a further party was furnished by that Battalion. The route from this point was subjected to a fair amount of shelling; in places too, marching was particularly laborious on account of the clayey nature of the ground. By 5.45 a.m. Companies were in position and at Zero (6 a.m.) the barrageopened; three minutes later this lifted and the infantry assault commenced. The country lying before the attacking troops was undulating with rising slopes and right up to the BEAUREVOIR Line hardly any trench system of strength existed; indeed the ground afforded little scope for prolonged defense if subjected to heavy artillery fire and little recistance was met with. Here and there only, in isolated places, Machine gum posts held out, but the crews of these were either rapidly put out of action or taken prisoners. By 6.45 a.m. the first objective was reached and half an hour later report was received that the final objective was being consolidated. October	salient into the valley, commanded by a strong German defence system, and having practically no flank protection would have been a dangerous point in the event of a determined counter attack and have placed its garrison in a very critical position. Recognising this, Colonel Marshall D.S.O., M.C. at once returned to Battalion Headquarters with the intention of advising Brigade of the situation and bointing out the necessity of that unit withdrawing to the high ground in rear of the village. Before this message could be communicated however the following was received from Brigade: "8th Brigade are to capture and consolidate BEAUREVOTR system from JONGOURT Hill to ESTREES-BEAUREVOIR ROAD in ASSEGAI VALLEY inc. aaa 54th and 56th Bns. are to be withdrawn into reserve in G.Y.b. & d. and H.d.a.& c. aaa 54th and 55th Bns. will stand fast on line at present held until assault troops of 8th Brigade pass through and will then withdraw to reserve positions." The C.O. was then instructed to make arrangements direct with 15th Brigade: the result of this was that the 54th Battalion would take over from the 58th Battalion after that unit had established itself. This was completed by 6 p.m. Soon after this it was intimated that the 54th Battalion would come under the 8th Brigade for releif that night. This releif did not take place. Headquarters of the 54th Battalion was at the established at G.6.d.2.7. it being considered not worth while moving to a more central position in view of the impending releif. 	ober	enemy, placing faith in his advantageous position and the strength of his defences fought with a violence only encountered in the earlier days of the war. This time demoralised with the knowledge of his vaunted stronghold - The HINDENBURG LINE - broken, closely followed up and placed in a bocation where effective defences were few, the enemy resistance savoured very much of the small boy who finding a fight inevitable deals a few weak frightened blows with the fervent prayer that his antagenist will be merciful in return. The one difficulty met with in earlier in this operation was the question of food supply but the discovery that the Red Route leading from BELLICOURT to LE CATELET FARM was passable to limbers solved this. Except for occasional shelling in the support areas the day passed in comparative quietness, At 6 p.m. a wire was received stating that the 54th Battalion came under the orders of the 7th A.I.Brigade. The C.O. was later informed that the 2nd Division would pass the through our front line next morning at 6 ovclock after which the Battalion would withdraw to a location west of VILLARET. About this time too, report came to hand that the enemy were massing for a probable counter attack along the 5th Brigade front. Upon this the C.O. sent ou the following message to 60ys. "Following from 96th Brigade on right of 5th Brigade:- 'Enemy reported massing for probable counter attack along front of 5th Brigade. Posts should be warned to be especially alert. You are to push out protective patrols to the road running N.E. and S.W. in A.24.b. working along the road as far as outskirts of GRANDCOURT and covering your whole front. These patrols are not to be withdrawn until attacking Battalions have passed through. I would suggest that patrols be sent out about 12 midnight to find out what they can about the road and return. Fresh patrols could the sent out under guidance shortly before dawn and remain out until passed through by the attacking Battalion. The above patrols are to be mutally arranged between Coy. Commanders. Action in this matter must be taken immediately. Please report what you are doing in regard to it."	en

TOURS-en- VIMEU.	8th. OCTOBER.	There was no training during the day. In many places readjustment of billets was necessary on account of the circumstances under which the troops were billeted the previous night. By 3.p.m. this was completed.	
do.	9th. OCTOBER.	The Commanding Officer was instructed during the morning that the original intention of withdrawing the 54th Battalion as a fighting unit from the field was to be proceeded with. The procedure of distribution of personnel however, was for various reasons not stated altered, the decision being that the 54th Battalion was to amalgamate with the 56th Battalion with the designation 56/54th Battalion. LieutColonel MARSHALL.D.S.O.,M.C., was to command the new unit. In order to preserve the "espirit de corps" of the old unit and to gratify a sentiment, the men were allowed to retain their old colors. The effect of this new arrangement was entirely in contrast to the situation created on the 25rd September, by the previous order. The latter method was recognised to be the best possible way in which the question could be dealt with, and was unanimously accepted. As a matter of fact the alteration being purely administrative, hardly effected the men from a personal point of view, and apart from the very necessary transfer of some officers to different Battalions, it was expected that everything would go on exactly as usual without any variations.

54TH. BATTALION, A.I.F.

REPORT on OPERATIONS of 54TH.BATTALION during period 28th September to 3rd. October, 1918.

The Battalion having been reorganised to meet the exigency of the situation the move to the HERVILLY Area was made on the evening of the 27th of September.

A stay was made there on the 28th: on the evening of that date the Brigadier called a Conference of Commanding Officers and Officers Commanding Specialist Units under the Brigade Command, and after delineating the operation program discussed details.

The role of the Brigade was revealed in 14th Brigade Battle Instructions, Series "E", No.5, dated 28th September and the disposit-

ions are best outlined by questions:-

Sth.Brigade Group.

JONCOURT RIDGE (with exploitation to LEHANCOURT RIDGE), JONCOURT HILL (inc-).

The 14th Brigade Group is to follow the 8th Brigade Group and to be disposed in the area between NAUROY and ESTREES, East of the GREEN LINE, as support Brigade to the Division.

Time of movement will be contingent on that of the 8th Brigade.

Relative positions of Battalions to be as follows:-

54th Battalion Line Right.

55th Battalion Line Left,

with the other Battalions of the Brigade in support.

The 9th Corps is to attack in conjunction with and on the right of the 30th American Division, and if successful in crossing the Canal will move forward on the right flank of that Division."

The move was to be made via way of the BLACK ROUTE. The Battalion assembled and marched off at 8.30.a.m. on the

29th:

The scene on the road that morning was a memorable one.

French country roads are seldom good, and this one, deep in mud with the recent rain, pitted with shell holes, and strewn with the debris of barbed wire and broken timber, it would have presented even to ordinary traffic a problem.

On this morning heavy guns forced their way along: heavily laden ammunition limbers, Cavalry, Tanks and long lines of Pack Transport: intermingled with these, often marching in single file were the infantry.

To disturb still further the order of things a heavy fog settled on the low ground West of BELLICOURT and for a considerable time brought movement to a standstill.

Upon reaching the high ground about G.8.d. a block occurred on the road and the Battalion had to be sheltered in the trench system nearby.

It is well this precaution was taken for shortly after wards heavy fire was directed on the area from enemy Batteries in

the direction of NAUROY.

At this juncture I reconnoitred forward and finding that further progress was unlikely for some time issued orders for the trench system in G.8.b.& 9.a. to be occupied. This position later came under heavy shell fire and the Battalion was moved into the system of trenches South of the road (approximately G.9.central) and everlooking BELLICOURT. These dispositions were approved by the Brigade Major who further intimated that the 55th Battalion would be brought up into line on the left and that we were to remain in that position pending further instructions.

At 4.p.m. I again went forward and got into touch with the 30th Battalion who were then about 200 yards to the South of BELLICOURT as 8th Brigade Reserve and in the trench system approximately G.10.c.& d.

At 11.p.m. a meeting of Battalion Commanders was held at the 53rd Battalion H.Q. Here details of an operation to be carried out by the 53rd Battalion with the 55th Battalion in support, the next morning were gone into. This minor operation was to be in a Northerly direction along RAILWAY RIDGE and to link up with the 41st Battalion at about the KNOB in A.10.a. - Trench System LE CATALET-NAUROY LINE to be the right of their advance.

At 3.p.m. on the 30th I visited the Brigade Forward Report Centre and got into telephonic communication with Brigade H.Q. Upon returning to the Battalion the following order was issued to the

C.O., 56th Pattalion:-

"C.O., 56th Battalion.

Following from G.O.C., 14th A.I.Brigade through me:You are to move your Battalion and take up position in square A.27. to be in position of readiness to support the 53rd and 55th Battalions.

H.Qrs. of 53rd Battalion G.4.a.4.2. from whence ther is telephonic communication on to Advanced Brigade Headquarters.

Position should be reconnoitred and move carried out at once.

Would advise you getting into touch with Colonel CHEESEMAN and finding out forward situation from him.

My Headquarters G.9.b.3.5. and am not moving at

present."

At 1.a.m. on the morning of the 1st October the following message was received over the 'phone and later confirmed by Brigade Memorandum 310:-

A meeting of Company Commanders was then held at B.H.Q.

After details were discussed orders were issued for the move to the "Start Point". At 3.p.m. the Officer in Charge of the Tanks - Capt. CHICK - reported and was informed of the dispositions made.

Rain had fallen earlier in the night which by 3.a.m. had turned into a heavy downpour. At that hour the weather could not have been more unpropitious. By 4.a.m. a sudden change had occurred and the march was undertaken under a starry sky.

It had been arranged that guides from the 29th Battalion were to be picked up near the Cross Roads at G.10.b.8.3. but these failed to report to time.

Considerable delay consequently ensued until a further party could be obtained from the 29th Battalion Headquarters which was then situated about G.10.b.9.3.

The route from here was subjected to considerable attention from enemy artillery, but no casualties were suffered. By 5.45.a.m. the positions allotted on the "jumping off" line were occupied. At 6.a.m. the barrage fell; at 3 minutes past 6 the Infantry Assault commenced but little opposition was met with. In isolated places only machine gun fire was encountered but these posts were rapidly put out of action. The following messages were then received in order:-

(No. 1.)

"A. & C. Coys. are up to first objective - gained at 6.20.a.m. We are in touch with left and right troops. Left 59th Bn. right 56th Bn." (Sgd) S.A.BENSON.Captain. 6.25.a.m.

(No. 2.) "D. & B. Coys, are up in line with A. & C. Coys. To fill gaps between A. & C. Coys. and 59th Bn. Casualties were light. Tanks working in front of us." (Sgd).S.A.BENSON, Captain. 6.30.a.m.

(No.3.). "We are at present reorganising on line from Halte at H.l.d.4.1. to trenches at B.25.c.2.2. at 7.30.a.m. Opposition nil. Identifications nil. On the left flank we are in touch with 59th Bn. On the right 56th Bn. The 56th Bn. are now up to us; we started off without them and took over their sector with No.1. Coy. No.2. Coy. coming up to get touch with 59th Bn. At present we are getting into our correct sectors and digging The tanks have gone back; they report the village of ESTREES clear of enemy troops. Our casualties are light and estimated about 10 Other Ranks caused by gunfire from our own artillery barrage." (Sgd).S.A.BENSON, Captain. 7.40.a.m.

(No.4.). "We will be moving forward to village of ESTREES will you please notify artillery." (Sgd).S.A.BENSON, Captain. 8.15.a.m.

This disposition was immediately communicated to Brigade H.Q. by telephone at 8.30.a.m. (No.5.).

"I am established in old railway line behind A. & C. Coys. -10.a.m. - shelling a little - few casualties. (Sgd).A. VINE-HALL, Captain. 10.a.m.

(No.6.). "We are being shelled by our own guns. We cannot advance on left of village (ESTREES) owing to machine gun fire. Am remaining on objective." (Sgd) . A. VINE_HALL, Captain. 11.a.m.

(No.7.). "We are consolidating on line shown on attached map. Coy. H.Q. is at present at H.1.b.0.3. The 56th Bn. are not occupying their full sector and the 15th Brigade are crowding us down to the right so we are at present in the sector marked.

On reaching the objective 1 Coy. of the 56th Bn.and "A" . Coy . of ours exploited forward to the middle of the village . "A" . Coy . passed on the left flank of it. The 56th retired because his other Coys. would not support him so I ordered A. Coy to come back and consolidate. The 15th Brigade did not go over the final objective at all. The enemy is engaging all movement with artillery and machine gun fire. The enemy is holding the BEAUREVOIR LINE with advanced posts in front and many machine guns.". (Sgd).S.A.BENSON, Captain. 11.15.a.m.

During that afternoon I visited the front line with The 56th Bn. were at this the intention to check the dispositions. time in an extended formation encircling the village of ESTREES with the 8th Brigade on their right. The 54th Battalion was in occupation of the trench system running from G.6.b. into H.1.c. It was clear that the situation would be a critical one for the 56th Bn. in the event of an enemy counter-attack. I therefore returned to B.H.W. with the intention of advising Brigade of the situation and pointing out the necessity of that unit withdrawing to the high ground in rear of the village. Before this message could be communicated the following was received from Brigade:-

"8th Brigade are to capture and consolidate BEAUREVOIR SYSTEM from JONCOURT HILL to ESTREES-BEAUREVOIR ROAD in ASSEGAI VALLEY inc. asa 54th and 56th Bns. are to be withdrawn into reserve in G.6.b.& d. and H.1.a.& c. asa 54th and 56th Bns. will stand fast on line at present held until assault troops of the 8th Brigade pass through and will then withdraw to reserve positions asa"

This move was not carried out.

At 4.p.m. telephonic instructions were received which were la er confirmed by Brigade Memorandum 323:-

"Move from present position and take over line from 15th Brigade between A.25.central and the intersection of present line with the following line which will be your right boundary aaa G.25.central CABARET COPSE MINT COPSE aaa 55td Bn. join you at A.25.central. aaa 56th are being relieved by 8th Brigade and are withdrawing to H.1.a.& c."

Coy. Commanders were at once given orders to this effect,
Lieut.STEBER and myself going forward beforehand to pick up the new
line. Finding that the 58th Bn. had similar orders to ourselves
I at once got into communication with 14th Brigade H.Q. and informed them
of the situation whereupon I was instructed to get into touch with
the 15th Brigade and make arrangements direct with them. This was
done with the result that it was agreed that we were to take over
from the 58th Bn. after they had established the position and gained
touch with their flanks. This movement was completed.

Communication was at this time established with the 55th

Battalion on the left and the 20th Battalion on the right.

At 6.p.m. intomation was received that the 54th Bn. would come under the 8th rigade for relief that night. This relief mid not take place. Headquarters of the 54th Bn. were at this time established at G.6.d.2.7. it being considered not woth while moving to a more central location on account of the impending relief.

The next day was passed in comparative quietness.

At 6.p.m. on the 2nd. the 54th Bn. came under the orders of the 7th rigade. The same night information was received that the 2nd. Aust. Division would pads through our front line next morning at 6.0 clock, after which the Bn. would withdraw to location West of VILLARET. I then sent out the following message to Coys:-

"Following from 96th Brigade onnright of 5th Brigade:Enemy reported massing for probable counter-attack along front of
5th Brigade. Posts should be warned to be especially alert. You
are to push out protective patrols to the road running N.E. and S.WW
in A.24.b. working along the road as far as outskirts of GRANDCOURT
and covering your whole front. These patrols are not to be
withdrawn until attacking Battalions have passed through. I
would suggest that patrols be sent out about 12.midnight to find out
what they can about the road and return. Fresh patrols could
then be sent out under guidance shortly before dawn and remain out
until passed through by the attacking Bn. The above patrols are
to be mutually arranged between Coy. Commanders. Action in
this matter must be taken immediately. Please report what you
are doing in regard to it."

from Captain VINE_HALL at 3.15.a.m:
"A patrol of 6 men under Lieut.CHRISTIE has been sent out from the right of Bn. line with orders to proceed along the road to outskirts of GRANDCOURT and report back. Same patrol will go out again at 4.a.m. for the same purpose and will remain out until attack passes through and then return. This patrol will send in a report while out.

APPENDIX 14

Visited the front line and met a few of the officers (including the 0.0.) of the Battalion which was to pass through us in the morning. I was able to give them useful information concerning the front and pointed out lines of approach for their troops in the morning.

on the 5rd. whereupon Coys. withdrew to a location in the trench system in G.9.b. which had been previously occupied on the 29th.

Here breakfast awaited them and after a very short stay movement was made to our allotted area West of VILLARET. By 10.30.a.m. H.Q. and Coys. were in position and report to that effect forwarded to Brigade.

REPORT on MOVE from LE MESNIL Area to ST. MAXENT Area.

The LE MESNIL Area was vacated at 0830, 7/10 18, the Brass Band of an American Unit nearby playing the Battalion to PERONNE Station.

All 1st. Line Transport had been loaded by 0700 according to Brigade instructions, and at 0915 - 5 minutes after the personnel arrived-

"all clear" report was sent to the R.T.O.

The train moved out at 1010 - 20 minutes before schedule time - and took approximately 11 hours to run the journey to the detraining

station, OISEMONT.

At LONGPRE Station a detachment of reinforcements from the Base under the charge of Cap tain WEBSTER, entrained. These were subsequently taken over with the Battalion to TOURS for the night and distributed to their Battalions the following morning.

Upon arrival at OISEMONT detraining immediately commenced. Coys.

were clear of the Station by 2130 and the transport by 2215.

During the process of detraining the vehicles, a G.S. Wagon laden with Mob. Stores was overturned through the train shunting without

warning: practically no damage was done.

The march to billets occupied 2 hours. The villages of TOURS and HAMICOURT being allotted to this Battalion, Headquarters, "A" and "C".Coys. moved to TOURS, "B". and "D". Coys. to HAMICOURT; hot meals were then served from the cookers.

By 0030 on the 8th instant the whole of the Battalion including

transport was billeted.

The entraining officer at PERONNE was Lieut.K.WARK.D.C.M. The detraining officer at OISEMONT was Lieut.J.STEBER.
