

	1st 2nd	Divisional Headquarters at the Chateau, BAIZIEUX. 1st Infantry Brigade at MAILLY, 2nd Infantry Brigade at BRESLE, 3rd Infantry Brigade at MAILLY. All Brigades in communication with Divisional Headquarters and with their respective Battalions.		
	3rd	A Tactical Exercise in the form of Night Operations was carried out by the 3rd Infantry Brigade near SERRE. No. 3 Signal Section laid telephones lines for the Exercise, during which they maintained communication with their Battalions moving forward, by means of both Lamp and Telephone.		
1	4th 5th 6th 7th 8th 9th	Besides the usual Signal Office Routine, Training in communication work was carried out by all Sections. At Divisional Headquarters a Class for men from all Sections was held, the men being trained in Power Buzzer work. Classes were held for Visual Signalling, Buzzer work and Fullerphones. A Course in Pigeon Flying for men from all Battalions of the Division was held at LAVEVILLE.

Communication to Division and all Battalions established. Training Schemes carried out by all Brigade Sections. Station Work, Lamp and Buzzer Work was carried out. Technical Equipment was overhauled. In view of an impending move to a new area old and unused telephone lines and other derelict cable were reeled in and salvaged for future use.

Communication was established to Sub-Sections at Becourt, as well as to 1st Australian Divisional Headquarters. "Q" Detachment rejoined No. 1 Section.

21s 22n 23n 24t 25t 26t 27t 28t 30t	th th th th	Ist Ametralian Divisional Artillery moved into position in old YPRES SALIENT under the Artillery Group System, the 1st and 2nd Field Artillery Brigades being under the command of "C" Group. The personnel of both Brigade Signal Sections were amalgamated under command of Lieut. N.P.M. Neal, and work was commenced in establishing new lines to the Group Batteries. Buried cables were supplemented by Ground Lines. Lines were also Iaid across Zillebeke Lake. Two Group O.P. Lines were established near the Front Line, and notwithstanding abnormal enemy shell fire, Batteries were able to carry out their programmes without a hitch, communications being well maintained. Lines were constantly cut by shell fire, but the Group Signal Personnel, and "Q" Cable Detachment as well, always quickly repaired the breaks. In spite of the heavy work required to be done in maintaining existing communications, new Lines were laid forward in anticipation of a forward movement by the Batteries. Attack by Fifth and French Armies commenced at 4.16 a.m. In accordance with the plan of operations Lieut. A.J. Walker proceeded forward with a Signal Station party to establish Sommunication for Forward Observation. At Zero hour the laying of a line forward was commenced, but this work was dis-continued owing to intense enemy shelling destroying the line in many places. However Visual Communication was established by Lieut. Walker barty, and important information regarding the progress of the operations was rapidly signalled back. At this Station Lieut. Walker was killed about 8 a.m., but the party maintained the Station throughout the day. During the whole day good telephonic communication was maintained between "C" Group and Bivisional Artillery Headquarters, and between the Group. The Guns had moved forward by 7 a.m. and communication established to Batteries. In this Attack communications were excellently maintained, and the work of the signal personnel employed was magnificently carried out.	
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
