Sheet 620 1/40,000 M.17.b.7.7.	1-9-18		<p><u>DISPOSITIONS.</u> Battalion Headquarters is situated as at last day of last month's War Diary at M.17.b.7.7. During the morning the 8th M.G. Company moved forward, Advanced Headquarters being established N.10.b.2.8., sections operating with Battalions of the 8th A.I. Brigade and Rear Headquarters N.14.b.5.0. The 14th M.G. Company remains with the 14th A.I. Brigade with Advanced Headquarters at H.17.d.9.0. and Rear Headquarters at N.14.b.8.7. The 15th Company is in Reserve with Headquarters at N.8.b.8.7. The 25th Company is operating with the 15th A.I. Brigade with Advanced Headquarters at O.13.b.9.9. and Rear Headquarters M.18.c.8.7.</p> <p><u>SITUATION.</u> The battle for the occupation of PERONNE commenced, the 14th A.I. Brigade with the 14th M.G. Company managing to occupy the N.E. corner of that village. The 15th A.I. Brigade managed to cross the Canal at I.33.d.4.9. but the tactical situation compelled them to retire to the western bank once again.</p> <p>The 2nd Australian Division were ejected from MONT ST. QUENTIN on our left flank, but by an immediate counter-attack, it was retaken.</p> <p>Battalion Intelligence Summary attached.</p> <p><u>WEATHER.</u> Fine but threatening. Cold during the night.</p>

			<p><u>RESUME. (Contd.)</u></p> <p><u>SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION, ETC.</u></p> <p>Lieut. LILLEGRAFF and Lieut J. SCOTT and 4 N.C.O.s. proceeded to G.H.Q. Machine Gun Course, CAMIERS on 22-9-18.</p> <p>One other rank to G.H.Q. Draughtsman's Course, CAMIERS, on 29-9-18 and one other rank to Vet. School at No. 7 and No. 8 Veterinary Hospital for course on Horse management 27-9-18.</p> <p><u>OPERATIONS.</u> During the month the Unit was engaged in particularly heavy fighting resulting in the capture of PERONNE. This was a continuation of last months heavy work as well as heavy fighting.</p> <p>At all times the Infantry to whom the machine guns were attached expressed greatest satisfaction with the work done.</p> <p>Later in the month when the Unit was co-operating with 4th Australian Division the lack of sufficient gun numbers was keenly felt, thus demonstrating that machine gun teams must be at all times full strength. It is regretted to have to record that during this operation Lieut.-Col. T.R. MARDEN was taken prisoner. Whilst making a reconnaissance of the battery positions the Colonel, led astray by a front line incorrectly marked on the map, walked into an enemy post and was taken prisoner.</p> <p>Again in the operations which breached the Hindenberg Line the necessity for "pack" transport being close up was clearly demonstrated. Without this means the guns would never have been transported through the thick wire and muddy roads of that area.</p> <p>The casualties at PERONNE and again on the HINDENBERG LINE were particularly heavy. This has been a month of extremely heavy fighting but working up to a crowning success in the final thrust through the defences of the HINDENBERG LINE.</p> <p><u>CONCLUSION.</u> It is pleasing to note that there has been very little or no sickness during the month. This reflects credit on the medical arrangements as well as being a proof of the fine physique of the personnel of the Battalion.</p> <p>The rations during the period have been good with the exception of the fresh vegetable ration, to the lack of which is attributed a high percentage of the minor ailments.</p>	<p><i>ad</i></p>



INCIDENTS IN RECENT FIGHTING.

1. Prisoner's Statement.

An Officer made a statement that applications were asked amongst the troops for men who were willing to defend PERONNE against the Australians.

2. INCIDENTS THAT OCCURRED.

(a). A Hun Officer who was wounded in the face, on the left of PERONNE, was approached by a Machine Gunner whom he attempted to shoot, whereupon the revolver was taken from him. He then commenced to kick and spit at the Gunner who knocked him on the head with the butt of the revolver. As he still resisted vigorously he was shot.

(b). In another place, a Hun who had his leg blown off at the knee, raised himself on the knee of the unwounded leg and stump of the other and continued to fight.

(c). After passing through the centre of the North Eastern part of PERONNE the resistance of the enemy stiffened considerably and groups of 10 and 20 BOSCHE would stand and fire back at Machine Guns which were firing at point blank range at them, in one instance one of our Guns being as close as 20 yards to them, the enemy continuing to fire until completely wiped out.

(d). Not only on collective occasions did he fight to the end but also in individual cases. One Hun remained in a cellar at the "On guard" position and although on his own, he fought until he received the point and was killed.

3. TO SUM UP.

By the numerous occurrences similar to these it would seem as if the enemy had strict orders to hold the village at all costs, and would not surrender even when they had not the least chance of escaping, but would stand and fight until disabled or killed.

One Gun was blown up in the front line.

Our Artillery was very active throughout the day on FLAMICOURT.

Large clouds of smoke were observed at different times in rear of enemy lines.

The charges, painted yellow, explode after an interval of 3 days. Those painted red and blue explode after more than 8 days. The mines are placed in floors of cellars.

It has been brought to my notice that Infantry are making practically no use of their rifles in battle, and are leaving the defence entirely to M.G. and artillery. Numerous cases have also occurred where Infantry have broken through the artillery lines in escaping from enemy tanks, and have failed to take advantage to demand the artillery to protect them.

I must request G.O.s.C. to prevent with the severest measures such conduct which amounts to forgetfulness of duty.

Artillery Officers have the power to establish by name the identity of any Unit and leader who denies support to the artillery, and to report them.

Men who come from the front without rifles will be taken over by the authorities and will be punished according to Military Law.

Leaders have every opportunity to make use of the discharge of Infantry fire on demand. Control through senior officers.

"Corps has ordered that the bridges which are still standing at CLERY, whatever happens, are to be completely destroyed and rendered wholly useless for traffic as soon as possible.

It is imperative that an attempt be made to carry out the above Corps Order. Perhaps it will be possible for a small patrol of 2 or 3 courageous men to cross the destroyed bridges on the northern arm of the SOMME and reach the bridges which are still standing and carry out the demolition with concentrated charges.

Division offers the Iron Cross, First Class, leave and a money reward for a successful attempt..

Men who volunteer for the task, and make a determined effort to carry out the task, will receive 14 days leave, even if they are not successful."

The result of the above order was that an Ensign Commanding the 2nd Pioneer Platoon made a plucky attempt to blow up these bridges, but was not wholly successful, as he states in his report, owing to the deterioration of the charges. He also states that it was "only by violence" that he could induce his men to go forward.

REPORT ON RECENT OPERATIONS.

BRIEF RECOUNTAL OF PLAN.

1. Instructions were issued on 30th August that the advance of the Australian Corps was to be continued in a North Easterly direction. The advance to be carried out by the 5th, 2nd and 3rd Australian Divisions in that order from right to left.
2. Any successes achieved in forcing a crossing over the SOMME in either the 5th or 2nd Australian Divisional Section were to be exploited to the full.
3. The first objective of the Corps was to establish a bridgehead in the vicinity of PERONNE from which to continue its further advance.

BRIEF RECOUNTAL OF EVENTS.

1. The change in Divisional boundaries necessitated a side slip to the left, a cross country night march being entailed in order that the 15th A.I. Brigade could relieve 5th A.I. Brigade, 2nd Division.

Machine Gun Companies were moving in support of their named Brigades with 25th M.G. Company in Reserve.

Owing to the broken nature of the country and limited time available for the move, Transport could not be used, but the cross country march carrying heavy loads was a big strain on the personnel of the Machine Gun Companies; so much so that the 15th M.G. Company who had been digging positions all night on 30th to cover the crossing of the 15th Brigade had to be relieved by 25th M.G. Company on night 31st.

DEDUCTIONS.

1. This operation differed from the advance from VILLERS-FRETONNEUX in that it was across very broken country with the River SOMME forming a very strong natural object.
  2. Transport therefore could not be so effectively used and a much greater strain fell on Machine Gunners in consequence.
  3. Some Infantry Brigadiers are still inclined to allot a Section of Machine Guns to each Battalion in their Brigade when Companies are under their control, it is then almost impossible for them to concentrate the fire power of the Company at any given point should the situation so demand, and many opportunities of assisting the advance of the Infantry are lost in consequence.
- Similarly some Infantry Battalion Commanders still ask for work from the Vickers Gunners that are obviously tasks for Lewis Gunners.

## APPENDIX

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4. The necessity of keeping transport moved close up and maintaining touch with it even when the guns are being carried forward was brought out in this operation.

INFORMATION FROM OTHER SOURCES.

1. Prisoners statements. A prisoner states that the Alpine Corps will be withdrawn through a Prussian Division lately in the VOSGES sector, when the retirement has reached the HINDENBURG line.

Prisoners belonging to the 259 F.A.R. (att. 105th Divn.) and 66 Res. F.A.R. (att. 80th Res. Div.) state that the enemy intends retiring to St. QUENTIN and then delivering a powerful counter offensive in this sector.

TRANSLATION OF A GERMAN DOCUMENT.

A memorandum on firing with M.G. on hostile aircraft from experiences of German contact patrols in English ground defences states, "The most valuable parts of the motor, propellar, and cooling apparatus. They can be engaged most successfully when the plane is rising. Engaging the plane when it is descending secures success against the occupants. Allow the airman to fly into the fire zone. When the plane is sideslipping, keep up heavy fire. The existence of armoured English aeroplanes has up till now not been substantiated.

"R" ammunition pierces. "S" and "K" (armour piercing) ammunition is not available. Small supplies of "S" and "K" ammunition ~~will~~ may be indetned for all the same from Army Headquarters in order to make penetration into the motor more certain.

The moral effect of M.G. fire on an airman is already considerable as soon as the flash is observed and the shots go near by.

The actaul effect is far greater than the troops who are shooting realise. The majority of ~~damages~~ damages incurred compel the plane to turn back at once and make a forced landing in the back areas.

Between the 9th and 30th April the 6th Army lost 23 contact patrol machines through A.A. and M.G. fire.

The English were able to do this in spite of the heaviest fighting on the earth, and for the most part he was dealing with armoured aeroplanes.

Considering this, our prepared defence against the unarmoured enemy must be made to provide better results.

For every aeroplane shot down out of control, a prize of 200 marks has been granted by the Ministry of War.

PART II.INFORMATION FROM OTHER SOURCES.GERMAN DISCIPLINE.

A captured order of 225th Inf. Division dated 20-3-18, at which time the Division was in the line in the WOEVRE, indicating that the remarkable discipline and industry of the enemy in the construction of field works is at any rate in that Division a thing of the past. The order, which is more than two and a half pages of close type is nothing but reprimand.

The principle complaints are as follows :-

(a) In spite of absolutely insufficient shelter, the work being done is inadequate, and progresses particularly slowly. In one instance only 12 men of a Reserve Company, all of whom should have been at work, were found usefully employed. In consequence, a report is to be made by every regiment to show how "each individual is employed".

(b) In spite of repeated orders and instructions protection from aeroplane observation is neglected in the most careless manner.

(c) There are a large number of sign-boards in all sections of all troops with wrong names or indicating things that do not exist.

(d) The trench officers are by no means sufficiently active, and must therefore, keep a written account of the information that they should have.

(e) Nearly every camp and dug-out is lacking in proper shelter security and cleanliness, dugouts have only one entrance, ammunition is kept in living huts, etc.

(f) Men go up to the front without their gas masks and without weapons.

(g) In one machine gun nest in a supporting point visited, I found the men and the commander completely ignorant of the employment, and object of the gun; all my questions and remarks confirmed a regretable lack of competent control and inspections by the Commanding Officer concerned.

CAPTURED ORDER.

The following is the translation of a Secret order issued by LUDENDORFF on 16-8-18 :-

"The Commander in Chief is prepared to mention in the official communiqué the names of units, as well as the names of individual officers, N.C.O's and men who have specially distinguished themselves in action against tanks."

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## PART II (Contd.).

"Armies will include the necessary particulars in their daily reports. These particulars will be based upon the reports received from Commanders of troops in the line (Brigade, Regimental, Battalion, etc. Commanders). Each case must be examined on its merits, in order to see whether ~~the~~ conspicuous gallantry was shown. It is not practicable to base these special mentions on the despatches of a specific number of tanks.

PART II.INFORMATION FROM OTHER SOURCES.

Morale of Enemy Machine Gunners. - In the last few days, prisoners from M.G. Companies have often stated that when the English attacked, they did not fire their guns.

Yesterday a closer examination was made :-

In the 232nd Division, Infantrymen stated that the morale of the Machine Gunners was superior to their own, and it seems that the guns of the 445th I.R. weren't on the whole well fought. On the other hand the 2nd. M.G. Co. of 447th I.R. only got one Gun into action. The Sgt. Major commanding the latter Company, who has fought since 1914 and wears the Iron Cross, was glad to be taken prisoner and said that the morale of his men was low, though not so bad as that of the Infantry.

In the 14th Reserve Division, gunners of the 1st and 2nd M.G. Companies 16th R.I.R. surrendered without firing a shot. The 1st M.G. Company 159th I.R. were little better. The 3rd Company of the 53rd R.I.R. where the morale is fairly good, were prevented from getting their guns into action at RANCOURT by our extremely accurate artillery barrage.







REPORT ON OPERATIONS COMMENCING 18th SEPTEMBER, 1918.

PLAN.

The 5th Aust. Machine Gun Battalion was placed at the disposal of the 4th Aust. Division for purposes of the attack up to G.21 to G.33.

The Battalion was used mainly for barrage for the 1st Objective and then concentrated by Companies as Divisional Reserve.

The machine gun barrage was placed well ahead of the artillery barrage and stood still until safety of our troops necessitated lifting.

EVENTS.

Owing to the distance of the 1st Objective, all guns had to be sited in what was, till "Y" day, "No Man's Land". This rendered the task very difficult, but arrangements were complete and the barrage was fired to time table.

The artillery barrage drove the enemy back and into the machine gun barrage which inflicted considerable loss.

The barrage was stated by both our own Infantry and by prisoners to be very accurate and to have caused many casualties and much demoralisation to the enemy.

The Companies were then concentrated as arranged. At 5 p.m. 18th instant, owing to the unsatisfactory situation on the right flank, a defensive flank of machine guns was formed, one section of guns of this Battalion moving to R.11.b. as part thereof. This section was withdrawn, without becoming engaged, at 12 noon 19th instant.


DEDUCTIONS.

The Start Line is shown in BROWN on map issued and the objectives are shown in a continuous GREEN line.

4. (b) Second Phase.

The 5th Australian Division on the Right and the 3rd Australian Division on the Left, each with its own Divisional Artillery and a proportion of Tanks, and organised in Brigade Groups, will pass through the 30th and 27th American Divisions respectively in open warfare formations at a time to be decided later. The objective is shown in RED on the map issued. In order to secure the flanks of this operation and to extend the base of the salient created by the advance, the reserve troops of the 30th and 27th American Divisions will extend their operations to the south and north respectively with the object of seizing the objectives shown in RED on map issued.

5. Light Signals.

The only Light Signals to be employed will be ~~them~~ -

(1) The S.O.S. Signal which will be a No. 32 Rifle Grenade, bursting into three Red Lights.

(2) Success Signal which will be a No. 32 Rifle Grenade, bursting into three White Lights.

(3) Red Flares will be issued and will be lit for the purpose indicating our position when the aeroplane calls.

All ranks must be made to understand that when the aeroplane calls Flares must be lit.

Company Commanders

Report on Operations through  
Hindenburg Line.

Report on Operations from 29.9.18 to 2.10.18.

At 6.45 am on the morning of the 29<sup>th</sup> ult. after 174 Sections under O.C. reported to C.O. 3<sup>rd</sup> Batta in accordance with instruction received. At 7 am. the 3<sup>rd</sup> Batta commenced to move towards the line, the M.G. Sections bringing up the rear.

The route was the "Black Rd." leading to Villerset. Up to this point each Section had the forward portion of its fighting hinkers with them, but it was found impossible to get them any further forward, so the men had to carry from there on.

From Villerset the troops proceeded towards Bellicourt. A smoke barrage was put down whilst we were between those two places.

Owing to the wind blowing in our direction the smoke was blown back over the our own troops; which made it difficult to maintain direction. Apparently this smoke was the cause of the American getting hopelessly lost & confused. A great deal of M.G. fire from the Right Flank was experienced, but little or no shelling.

On reaching Bellicourt it was found that the town had not been cleared of the enemy, & that the left end of the town was still in their hands. The sections had to hold in village from about 10 am to midday. During this period the enemy heavily shelled this area village, but fortunately no casualties were inflicted.

About noon the 3<sup>rd</sup> Batta commenced to move forward in artillery formation, in the direction of Spauvillers, on the right flank. The M.G. Sections followed in similar formation by gun teams.

On receiving a line of trenches in G17D the section halted, whilst the Infantry moved forward & established a line.

on a second class road running through G18C, with two Companies in support in G24H. In accordance with the C.O. of the 31<sup>st</sup> Batt it was decided to put two guns in the front line & two back with the Support Companies. The other four were placed in position in trenches in G17D so as to cover Flavroy which was still held by the Enemy, & the valley running to it.

At 4pm the Infantry moved forward to the sunken road running from Etricourt to Flavroy. No guns were sent further forward. But the four guns in support in G17D were taken forward to trenches in G18C & a barrage placed on trenches in H1C which lasted for 15 minutes. 3000 rounds expended.

The two guns with Support Companies were moved up to the second class road in G18C, as were two of the guns from G17D, the remaining two being in position in G17D.

Thus there were 6 guns in G18C & two in G17D.

The enemy had consistently shelled this area with 5.9 & 4.2 also gas shells. One gun was blown out during the night of the 30<sup>th</sup>.

Coy H.Q. was formed G17D S.O.

At 6am on the 1<sup>st</sup> Oct the 31<sup>st</sup> Batt again attacked & with the 32<sup>nd</sup> Batt on their right, took Etricourt & Hill Ridge to Estrees.

About 9 am the O.C. proceeded forward with the C.O. 31<sup>st</sup> Batt to see position for guns to be placed. The four guns of H.C. 1 to H 157 & the three of H.C. 4 to H 138 & H 78. The sections moved forward about 1 pm, but owing to another explosion, did not dig in. As the explosion did not evacuate by 6 pm, orders were given for them to do so.

The 31<sup>st</sup> Batt notified me that they were being relieved by a Batt of the 5<sup>th</sup> Bde that night.

About midnight I was informed through the 8<sup>th</sup> Bde that it would be relieved by a section of guns from the 5<sup>th</sup> Amg Corp. Orders were sent out to meet them, but ruined. At 5 am <sup>10/10/15</sup> they were located & the relief arranged & completed by 6 am. Under cover from the 8<sup>th</sup> Bde we moved back to the area in H 26 D. Eventually moving back to Kruicy that evening.

During the whole of this period liaison was maintained by runners & the O.C. with the 31<sup>st</sup> Batt.

## Date

29<sup>th</sup> Sept. : The boy, less Rec. H.A.B moved forward with 14<sup>th</sup> Inf Bde & took up positions at G.T.C. 4.5 Sheet 62<sup>b</sup>.

30<sup>th</sup> .. : Under instructions from the 14<sup>th</sup> Inf Bde nos 1 & 4 Sections 14<sup>th</sup> Arng boy. under Lts Hansen & Watson respectively moved forward at 4 a. m. & reported to the C. O. of 53rd & 55<sup>th</sup> Battalions.

No<sup>o</sup> 2 & 3 Sections remained at boy. H.A.B at G.T.C. 4.5 (62<sup>b</sup>)

The 4 guns of No 1 section were placed in position along the road running through A 28. c. (Battery position approx. A 28.c. 3.8), in rear of infantry of 53rd Batt.

During the night 30<sup>th</sup> / 1st this battery harassed the Low Ground & sunken road in A. 16. d., 8000 rounds being expended.

The 4 guns of No 4 section took up positions in trenches running through A 28.c. & A 28.d. for the purpose of covering the infantry of

The 53rd & 55<sup>th</sup> Batt.

1st Oct. : No 1. Sect. advanced with 53rd Batt. at 6 a.m. & took up new positions. Two guns were placed in position at A 22.c. 5.4 & two at A 22.d. 5.6. The function of these guns was to assist the infantry by direct fire in stopping any counter-attack which might develop from the battle.

No 4 sect. moved forward with 53<sup>rd</sup> & 55<sup>th</sup> Batt. & took up new positions at A 28 a. 5.0. on high ground in rear of main infantry outpost line.

At 6 a.m. No 2 section with 4 guns under Lt Muir moved forward with 54<sup>th</sup> Batt. & took up positions in front of Estrees at approx. H 1.c. 8.4

No 3 section at the same time with 4 guns under Lt Hill moved forward with 56<sup>th</sup> Batt. & took up positions at H 7 a 7.7.

At 5.30. Coy. H 5 moved forward to a position at A 28.c. 2.9 (62<sup>b</sup>)

2nd. : On night of the 2nd, No 2 section moved with 54<sup>th</sup> Batt. to positions at night of Grand Court, commanding

## South Valley &amp; Folemprise Farm.

3rd Oct.

On morning of the 3rd the 2nd Aust. Div. went forward through our positions & on Horribin taking their objective No 2 sect. withdrew to Coy. HQ.

No 3 sections were relieved on night of the 3rd by the 5th Aust. m. g. Coy.

No 1 sections were relieved at 1 a.m. on the morning of the 3rd by the 50th English m. g. Batt. & our English troops taking over the line No 4 section withdrew & returned to Coy. HQ.

No counter attacks developed while our sections were in line.

Summary:- The greatest trouble was experienced during operations - keeping up communications.

Owing to the wet weather & theretched state of roads & tracks, gun limbers could not be used & guns, rations etc. had to be taken forward on pack.

Communication with "Rear" particularly Batt. HQ was a matter of great difficulty. It was some considerable time before the location of Batt. HQ was supplied to this Coy. HQ.

At 6 a.m. on morning of 1<sup>st</sup> October, the 15<sup>th</sup> Bn advanced again supported by overhead fire from Nos 1, 3 & 11 Sections. All objectives were gained and sections moved forward to assist in consolidating. No 2 section advanced after 58<sup>th</sup> Bn from LE CATELET line to gun pits in A.23.d. and A.29.b. No 3 section took up positions on sunken road G.4.b. 2.s. No 4 section in trenches in G.6.b., whilst reserve section (No 1) advanced with C HQ from G.3.b. to LE CATELET line in A.28.b. These dispositions were not altered until the Company was withdrawn from the line on the morning of 2<sup>nd</sup> Oct.

Casualties sustained during operations  
1 O.R. killed. 20% wounded or missing. 2 horses  
killed, 3 wounded. Three guns were blown out.

#### Reactions:

The very formidable defences, and in places very obstinate resistance encountered, made the battle very different from others in which this Unit has been engaged. The fog and smoke greatly hampered movement during the earlier stages of the attack on 29<sup>th</sup> Sept. and was entirely responsible for the loss of direction sustained by No 3 Section.

Rationing by Battalions was not as satisfactory as in the past, but this was due no doubt to the obscurity of the situation, and the tremendous difficulties encountered by the transport.

The use of pack-horses was on the whole satisfactory.

communication to the rear was very difficult because of the great distance which a runner had to travel. It is suggested that, where the objectives of an attack, are distant, and the use of bicycles for runners is impracticable, as in the operation just concluded, a forward report centre, at which a motor cyclist could collect reports, should be established.

*Report. on Operations. (29<sup>th</sup> Sept — 2<sup>nd</sup> Oct. 1918).*

General Plan. : The part to be played by M.G.s of this Company was clearly and easily understood. Attached to 15<sup>th</sup> A.S. Bde., who were to pass through the Americans, on a 2 Battalion front — 59<sup>th</sup> Bn. on left and 57<sup>th</sup> Bn. on right — with one Battalion (58<sup>th</sup> Bn.) in support, Sections were detailed to operate as follows. No 3 Section to support 59<sup>th</sup> Bn. and No 4 Section to support 57<sup>th</sup> Bn.; remaining 8 guns were to gain summit of hill in G. b. d. in time to give covering fire to 15<sup>th</sup> Bde. when advancing beyond ESTREES, and having accomplished this, were then to take up positions, in vicinity of 58<sup>th</sup> Bn. in BEAUREVOIR line, and become Brigade reserve.

Operations. : Nos 1 & 2 Sections, in order to reach position at G. b. b. and give covering fire, moved from camp at L. b. d. o. o. at 6.20. a.m. 29<sup>th</sup> ulto. and joined 57<sup>th</sup> Bn. on right flank of 15<sup>th</sup> Bde before reaching "Start. line". Lieut. Hackworth's "mc" in order to reconnoitre, moved with most advanced party of 57<sup>th</sup> Bn. leaving Lieut. C. Cameron, to move both Sections to vicinity of G. b. b.

Everything progressed satisfactorily until BELLICOURT was reached, when further progress was stopped by enemy elements remaining in NAUROY. and LE CATELET. — NAUROY line. Infantry suffered heavy casualties in reaching BELLICOURT. and, though they attacked most gallantly, on several occasions, they were

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To adopt defensive positions, along the line of the Canal tunnel. Nos 1 & 2 Sections, were then ordered to support. The 58<sup>th</sup> Bn., which had by that time been brought into the front fighting. Defensive positions were taken up on the Canal line and held for the night.

Nos. 3 & 4 Sections moved from "start line" in rear of 59<sup>th</sup> and 58<sup>th</sup> Bns. respectively, and though direction was hard to maintain, owing to the heavy fog & smoke, the line of the Canal tunnel was reached. Thus far satisfactory liaison with Infantry, had obtained, with the exception of No 3 Section, attached to 59<sup>th</sup> Bn. This Battalion operating on the left flank of the Brigade were prevented from gaining as much ground as the right flank, and No 3 Section, which had receded slightly to the right during the fog, had advanced beyond the line held by the 59<sup>th</sup> Bn. This however was remedied, during the night. 29-30<sup>th</sup> Sept, when the 59<sup>th</sup> Bn received orders to move to the right flank of the Brigade, resting about BELLICOURT.

About 7 am. 30<sup>th</sup> Sept. the 14<sup>th</sup> Bde, advanced through the 15<sup>th</sup> Bde, and attacked LE CATELET line in the vicinity of CABARET FARM. The attack, although only partially successful, gained a certain sector of the LE CATELET line, and No 2 Section advanced and occupied positions in that trench system (A.28.d. - A.29.c.). Previous to moving, enemy transport before wood in A22, was successfully engaged by guns of this section. Nos 3 & 4 Sections, stood fast during 30<sup>th</sup> Sept. on Canal line, and No 1 Section was withdrawn to vicinity of CHQ at G. S. B. H. T. in

## 52 Report of Operations of 25th M.S. Coy. 55

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The 25th M.S. Coy was attached to the 4th A & S Bde for the attack on 29th Ultmo. One section<sup>each</sup> was attached to the 29th & 32nd Batt respectively. The two sections & Hlps with other support battalion of the Bde the 30th Batt.

C section with the 29th Batt moved off at 7 a.m.

D section with the 32nd at about the same time.

A & B sections with Hlps moved in rear of 30th Batt. at 8 a.m. all gun gear & ammunition was carried on pack horses. A heavy fog was on. Art. smoke was maintained.

An artificial fog was put over which made adding to the natural fog which prevailed made the question of keeping in touch extremely difficult, nevertheless the two sections with me (A & B) kept well up to the support battalions. By some means the 29th & 32nd Batt did not get through to them. Shelling was considerable from Villers to Bellicourt we suffered in casualties both to horses & personal. No sooner did intend we passed Bellicourt on our return our intention being to approach Maroy on our right. On the march back to the

once & another gun put out of  
action.

The 30<sup>th</sup> Batt pushed patrols out  
which enabled the 29<sup>th</sup> to come  
up. Meanwhile the Section

tank), but they also suffered  
casualties going over. The  
sections with the 29<sup>th</sup> & 32<sup>nd</sup>  
advanced with the Batt when they  
made a minor attack.

The coy the Bde was relieved on  
the night 1/2 Oct. & moved to a  
support area. The coy accompanying  
them.

It would have been impossible to -  
get into action without the use  
of pack horses as the distance  
was too great to carry the  
gear etc.

The Infantry Batt CO have  
expressed their appreciation of  
the effective covering fire given  
by the sections for the Inf while  
advancing. also for the manner  
in which they engaged strong  
posts of the enemy.
