



		"D" Company) was to be detailed to take over the Command temporarily of 58th Battalion from Major FERRES (wounded). Capt. Peacock proceeded as instructed at 12.15 pm. The F.O.O. from the heavy group continued his shooting from our O.P. today. At 3 pm he claimed to have knocked out 4 enemy batteries. At 3.15 pm Brigade ordered two strong platoons to be sent forward to guard the bridges in I 33 D. Battalion Operation Memo. No 3/32 (Appendix No 3) was issued at 3.30 pm and the party left at 4.20 pm (When later the battalion was ordered to relieve 58th Battalion these posts formed part of the line to be relieved). At 6 pm an urgent command for the C.O. and Adjutant to report at Brigade Headquarters was received. The B.G.C. issued instructions to the effect the 57th Battalion would relieve elements of 58th Battalion and 54th (14th Brigade) Battalion as early as possible tonight. The C.O. proceeded forward at once to the Headquarters of these two battalions. The Adjutant returned to the Battalion and arranged for the vacation of present positions. Companies moved off in the order: Headquarters, "R", "A", "D", "G" Companies at 7.55 pm by half platoons at 30 yards and proceeded via overland tracks to I 33 D 3.9 where guides, which had been arranged for by the G.O. were met. 

Remarks and Summary of Events and Information Hour Date Place references to its own carrying party. I 27 B 2.8 Weather fine and warm. Observation good. In the early hours of the morning hostile PERONNE 620 artillery was very active. The fire was mainly directed on to northern edge of the 4/9/18. village and at times it amounted to barrage fire. The approaches over the river were heavily shelled at very frequent intervals. A great deal of gas was used in these bombardments. A heavy enemy machine gun fire was opened along our front just about dawn apparently in anticipation of an attack. A patrol went out from our left company at 3.30 am and worked along the railway in I 22 A. The party returned at 4.20 am reporting exceedingly heavy machine gun fire but no enemy movement. A party of 1 N.C.O. and 6 men left 0 22 D 3.2 at 3.45 am and proceeded along the right of the road to 0 22 D 6.4. The · buildings and sheds (marked hangars) were examined and found free of enemy. The route 0 22 D 9.3. 0 22 D 9.0 was followed and the party returned at 4.45 am. They were sniped at from vicinity of 0 22 D 7.4 and a machine gun fired at them from 0 22 D 9.5. Very few flares are used by the enemy in the sector. Our observers searched the CITADEL and found a quantity of German mining material (fuses, dynamo for exploding mines, detonators etc.). No traces of prepared mines could be found. At 7.30 pm yesterday Brigade advised D. D. & L., London, E.C. (A10266) Wt W5300/P713 750,000 2/18 Sch. 52 Forms/C2118/16.

			that 58th Battalion would take over from 57th Battalion all posts on the FLAMICOURT	
			railway from I 33 D 4.3 to I 28 C 1.5. The inter battalion houndary would then be the	
			railway inclusive to 58th Battalion and exclusive to 57th Battalion. This relief was	
			completed at 11.15 pm. "C" Company, 57th Battalion left-closed until the railway was	
			excluded. Fractically no enemy aerial movement was noted from dawn to dusk. His	
			artillery was quieter than yesterday: but harassing shoots were put down on roads, bridges	
			and the village of PERONNE at intervals during the day. In the late afternoon our forward	
			area was shelled. At night a 10 inch naval gun fired on road in vicinity of Battalion	
			Headquarters. The signal office was wrecked and 6 signallers were injured. M.G's were	
			fairly active but fired only at good targets. At various times during tha day Brigade	
			advised that it was considered extremely probable that enemy would withdraw from our	
			front today or during the night. Our artillery heavily shelled FLAMICOURT and the railway	
			embankment north east of the village throughout the day. About 5 pm during one of these	
			shoots, a party of 20 enemy was observed to flee from the ambankment to the surrounding	
			scrub. At dusk "A" and "B" Companies pushed out patrols as far as the railway running	
			through I 22 D. Parties reported no signs of enemy. Each of these companies therefore



- 1. The 14th Australian Infantry Brigade are in PERONNE. The situation there is not quite clear. Three Companies of 58th Battalion and three Companies of 59th Battalion have worked along the road running NORTH through I 33 B and D with the intention of encircling FLAMICOURT. 60th Battalion has been ordered to reconnoitre the same area with a view to attacking SOUTH EAST through Squares I 34 and 35 and 0 4 and 5.
- 2. "D" Company, 57th Battalion has crossed the canal at 0 9 Central and are pushing out the bridge across the swamp with Engineer's super-vision.
- 3. "C" Company are to push out two platoons as soon as the route is practicable and establish posts covering the NORTH WESTERN side of the wood in 0 10 and 11 linking up with "D" Company who will establish posts facing the enemy trench running NORTH and SOUTH through 0 10 B.
- 4. Other posts will be pushed forward during the evening to strengthen the line until eventually the ground will be firmly held.
- 5. A line run from 0 15 Central to 0 6 Central to P 1 Central to J 22 Central gives the right flank which this Brigade has to defend.
- 6. "B"Company will move forward when ordered and occupy positions vacated by "C" and "D" Companies.
- 7. Battalion Headquarters will move forward to "C" Company's present headquarters as soon as "B" Company has moved up.





In the event of our being able to move forward the following general line of advance is laid down :

DARMSTARDT TR. HIGH GROUND in I 24 thence through woods in J 25 thence south east to our own sector.

Our own sector - that is, our line of advance - is bounded on the South by the grid line east and west between 0 9 and 0 15. The 58th Battalion will operate along the southern boundary and act as flank guard. 60th Battalion will operate on our left and 59th Battalion on their left. The FLAMICOURT district will be mopped up by 58th Battalion who are entering by the railway.

The order of advance will be "D" Company on the right, "B" Company on the left in advanced guard formation. They will be followed by "A" Company on the right and "C" Company on the left.

The advance may commence in the hours of darkness in which case frequent halts must be made to ensure that allare in touch.

If necessary the advance should be conducted by short moves of 10 to 20 yards.

As far as is known at present our advance will be first, DUE EAST until the high ground in I 24 and the woods in I 24 and 30 have been reached; thence SOUTH EAST skirting DOINGT.

Until it becomes light the right flank will be the directing one and progress will be regulated by its advance.

Great caution must be exercised about entering dugouts or interfering with unusual or interesting looking objects. Watch for trip wires etc. The roads are certainly mined. On no account linger in vicinity of cross roads.

Be prepared for modifications of this order which is merely the outline of the plan.





Narrative of events during operations connected with Forcing the passage of the somme.

August 30th - September 5th

Night 29th/30th August.

The 57th Battalion on the cancellation of the order for the attack on BRIE withdrew from the front line and by 9.50 pm were in the reserve trenches west of VILLERS-CARBONNEL astride the Roman road. The enemy shelled this road very heavily making very difficult the work of transporting rations and material. In spite of the difficulties hot rations were got to the Companies by 2.30 am. The men however were very tired and in many cases preferred to sleep. At 4.30 am a verbal order from Brigade arrived in compliance with which the Battalion moved out at 6 am on the morning of the 30th august to a position S.E. of BARLEUX.

August 30th - near BARLEUX.

Recountal of Plans.

The 7th A. I. Brigade was holding the line S. of PERONNE facing the SOMME. At 5 am the 7th Brigade was to force the passage of the SOMME at various points between PERONNE and ETERPIGNY. The 57th Battalion with other units of the Brigade was to move from reserve positions and cross the river, pass through the 7th Brigade and continue the advance in a north easterly direction for a distance of about 7000 yards and take up a position on the high ground.

Narrative of Events.

At 7.30 am the 57th Battalion was in position S.E. of BARLEUX when, in compliance with a verbal order from Brigade, it moved forward to the trenches overlooking the river, so as to be prepared to follow through without delay. On arrival it was found that the 7th Brigade had failed to effect a crossing and on receipt of a verbal message from Brigade, we returned to the reserve position. At 12.30 pm I received a telephone message to report to Brigade H.Qrs. There I was directed to proceed forward again and take over the front line position overlooking the Somme N.E. of BARLEUX, relieving the 27th Battalion. After the men had received their rations and a hot meal they proceeded to the line moving in very small parties. During the process of relief 1 man was killed and six wounded. Relief complete 7.25 pm. During thenight efforts were made to discover a passage across the marshes. There was a good deal of artillery and M.G. fire and Lieut. Hedgecock was mortally wounded. No bridges or pathways existed that would enable troops to cross the marsh.

August 31st.

At 9.30 am Brigade advised that 14th Brigade were to cross the SOMME at OMMIECOURT-les-CLERY and to move round through PERONNE and down the east bank of the river and seize the high ground. When our troops were observed moving on the eastern bank through FLAMICOURT the 57th Battalion was to cross on improvised rafts or by wading. No troops of 14th Brigade appeared, however, and the day passed without incident for us. Many good targets were observed from the high ground occupied by us and artillery liaison officer endeavoured to engage them, but owing to lack of direct communication with batteries many good opportunities were lost. At dusk our patrols using collapsible boats with the assistance of engineers endeavoured to reach the eastern margin of the swamp. Reed-covered, sodden ground blocked the exit in every case.

57th. Baltslinn A. I. F.

Engineers were busy on the construction of a bridge across the swamp.

September 1st.

Patrol activity continued till daylight and after. At 9.5 Brigade advised that 58th and 59th Battalions were crossing the river by the bridge in I 33 d in touch with the 14th Brigade who had entered PERONNE. The 57th Battalion was to stand by ready to cross on the bridges in course of construction as soon as our troops appeared on the high ground opposite. The Battalion was to push forward and occupy a north and south line from I 34 Central along the line of woods in 0 4 b and c. No sign of our troops on the opposite side of the river being noticed, we attempted to push forward and establish ourselves on the eastern edge of the swamp. Capt. Peacock had established a post at 0 4 c 6.1 to protect the engineer partywhich had almost completed the bridge. He then led a fighting patrol along the bridge. They came under such heavy fire, however, and suffered so many casualties that they were compelled to retire. Thenceforth the enemy kept the locality under constant M.G. fire. Artillery was directed on to the M.G. positions but failed to silence them. Improved communications enabled several artillery F.O.Os to direct fire from our O.P's and hostile batteries were silenced and enemy movement shelled.

September 2nd.

Artillery shoots again successfully carried out. Two platoons of "C" Company under Lt. Marxsen were detached to guard the approaches to FLAMICOURT over the road and railway bridges W. of PERONNE. At 6 pm my Adjutant and myself were called to Brigade Headquarters where we received orders to relieve the 58th Battalion and elements of 54th Battalion in the line on the eastern outskirts of PERONNE. I went forward to reconnoitre and the adjutant returned to bring up the battalion. The situation was obscure and the locality of the posts uncertain but by dint of the energetic co-operation of the units concerned guides were dispatched and the battalion was met at the western outskirts of PERONNE at 7.55 pm; led through the town and settled in position by 11.30 pm. The enemy constantly shelled the town but the difficult relief was completed without a casualty. The battalion had been obliged to leave its previous location without rations. These and a hot meal were however brought forward to the new position and safely delivered. The Q.M. and T.O. and their staffs in accomplishing this put up an excellent performance. The Signalling Officer and staff did excellent service and had linked up Companies by 'phone by 2.30 am. The battalion was really holding two fronts, one on the eastern ramparts of PERONNE and the other facing South along the edge of the town fronting the most and swamps between PERONNE and FLAMICOURT. Battalion H.Q. was in PERONNE on the northern outskirts centrally situated between the two frontages. Patrols on both fronts began at once to push out. It. Marxsen had previous to the arrival of the Battalion pushed along the railway embankment, the only means of access to FLAMICOURT Railway Station. He was driven back from the narrow approach by machine gun fire.

September 3rd.

The enemy shelled our area heavily with guns of various calibres up to 8 inch using a lot of sneezing gas. After dawn things became a little calmer. "C" and "D" Companies facing FLAMICOURT tried to make progress along the railway from the west and the causeway from the north. The narrow approaches were however too well covered by enemy fire. "A" and "B" Companies facing east pushed out under machine gun fire feeling for the enemy posts. Lt. Meara ("A" company) worked to his right flank and with a patrol of 4 men got to the curved railway embankmenton the eastern side of FLAMICOURT. Here the party stumbled upon a large enemy party in a tunnel. The German gunners manned the embankment and fired on our patrol. Our artillery put down a heavy shoot on the areas giving trouble and at dusk patrols went out again on both fronts. Lt. Marxsen was leading his patrol along the railway embankment and had made good progress towards the

station when he came again under heavy fire and was killed. His party withdrew some distance and dug in and established a post. During the night a hot meal was got forward to the men. They were very tired from long marching, gas, and lack of sleep, but carried on gamely. Artillery fire had been fairly heavy and much gas was put over by the enemy. Our artillery shoots on FLAMICOURT were very successful and the enemy was observed to be running from place to place seeking shelter. His M.G. opposition was not, however quelled. A patrol of "A" Company went out to try and capture the post in the tunnel but a shell blew up a foot bridge they had to cross and they had to give up the attempt for the time.

September 4th.


During the night the 58th Battalion took over the posts at the western end of the FLAMICOURT railway, thus releasing about a company of this Battalion. During the day there were many indications that the enemy contemplated retiring, and a sharp look—out was kept. During the night he shelled us heavily. Our artillery shelled FLAMICOURT and the Railway curve and our patrols again moved out. "B" Company was sent to the eastern rampart and "A" and "B" Companies pushed out fighting patrols and got a footing in DARMSTADT and MANNHEIM trenches and on the right flank got in touch along the railway line with the 58th Battalion, who had at last succeeded in reaching the FLAMICOURT station. Battalion H.Qrs moved to the eastern ramparts at dawn and "C" Company, being released by the success of the 58th Battalion, also moved to the eastern frontage. With daylight sharp, fighting and machine gun duels commenced.


September 5th.

"A" and "B" Companies inflicted severe casualties on the garrisons of posts, and captured prisoners and machine guns. Meanwhile "D" Company under Capt. Elliott was sent south towards DOINGT to protect the flank of the 58th, who were advancing South through FLAMICOURT. "D" Company were ordered to skirt DOINGT on its western side and "C" Company was dispatched to mop up the village. The enemy's resistance was weakening, but from the high ground further east he still kept up a heavy machine gun fire. To protect the Companies moving south across the enemy's front I called for an artillery barrage with smoke on the trenches and woods east of DOINGT. This was successful but our artillery fired badly, many shells falling short and inflicting 5 casualties on our own troops. By midday the 57th Battalion held the line of the DOINGT - LE MESNIL road and our right flank rested on our southern boundary just north of LE MESNIL. The 58th had also reached the southern boundary and was in position. "A" and "B" Companies then moved down south of DOINGT, the position vacated by them being taken over by the 60th Battalion.

Comrades of the 5th Australian Division,

I take the opportunity of the Division being relieved for a period of rest and training to most heartify affirming on their splendic work and successes achieved since the 1st February last, and especially since taking part in the operations commencing with the enemy at tack on VILLERS BRETONNEUX on the 24th April last, when the magnificent stand by the 14th Brigade against the enemy's attacks and the night counter attack by the 15th Brigade led to such splendid results, to the complete successes by the 8th and 15th Brigades at the Battle of VILLERS BRETONNEUX on the 8th and 9th August, and ending with the brilliant advance to the SOMME in the last days of August and the capture of PERONNE where the 14th and 15th Brigades and the 5th Machine Gun Battalion have earned imperishable fame for their gallantry and valour.

In all this work the infantry have, at all times, been most perfectly and whole-heartedly supported by the Divisional Artillery, Engineers and Signal Service, while the Ambulances, Army Service Corps and Divisional Units have never failed to respond most fully at all times,

and especially in any emergency.

puring this period the Division has captured 50 square miles of country, 1 town and 23 villages, 110 officers and 3,400 other ranks, 53 guns of all calibres (including one 11" gun on railway mounting complete), about 450 machine guns, and about 50 Trench Mortars. Immense quantities of enemy ammunition, engineer and other warlike stores, and even railway locomotives and trains have been captured, vast quantities of material have been salved, and even of greater importance, our sick casualties have been very moderate indeed - lowest as a rule among all the Australian Divisions.

This is a record that we may well be proud of, and is the result of good discipline, perfect co-operation and co-ordination, and the spirit of self-sacrifice, devotion to duty, and determination to succeed at all costs which has permeated all ranks of the Division.

I know and fully appreciate the long period of almost unbroken front line service that the Division has gone through, the hardships, the often severe and bitter fighting by night and day, the long marches, digging and wiring, and of the loss of dear and gallant friends and comrades.

But, Comrades, you have the intense satisfaction of knowing that you have done your duty, that your efforts have assisted in no small measure to break the Boche and turn defeat into victory, and that your splendid work, success achieved, and sacrifices made by our devoted and gallant comrades who have fallen during the last month - and especially during the last few days - means beyond doubt the appreciable shortening of the War and the saving of hundreds - probably thousands - of the lives

of our fellow-countrymen in the days to come.

your magnificent service has been fully recognised and deeply appreciated by the Commander-in-Chief, Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig; by the Army Commander, General Sir Henry Rawlinson; by the G.O.C. 
