

ST. AUBIN.	3/1/19	commanders, the C.O. permitted them to utilise the morning for attention to interior economy. A party of one officer, two non-commissioned officers and thirty men was eggaged during the morning in collecting sugar beet from the fields and stacking it by the roadside where it is collected under arrangements made by the French. The beet is urgently required by the French sugar factories. Returns are to be furnished to Brigade Headquarters setting out the number of men, horses and vehicles employed. It is understood that the cost of labour is to be charged against the French Government. In the vicinity there are some abandoned German dumps near which the French children sometimes play. One child was killed recently whilst playing with a grenade. It has been found necessary to issue a warning through the maire. Weather:- dull and showery, The companies were again placed at the disposal of Company Commanders for the morning. Officers Commanding Companies took advantage of the occasion to improve the approaches to their billets. A further party was employed in the collection of beet. It was estimated by the inhabitants that it would take six days to clear the field. The men decided they would let our allies see how Australians worked. They set to with a will and completed their task by midday. The task took them in all eight hours. The evening educational classes are not proving the success they were expected to do. KENEALY (Battalion Musketry Officer) took a team from "A" Company to the rifle range which has been established on the outskirts of the village. It is safe to fire on the range up to loo yards. Acting on the look ahead principle, the transport officer has asked that he be given at once men to replace 1915 men shortly leaving for Australia. The 59th Battalion defeated our team both in football and in tug-of-war. Capt. PEACOCK. M.C. returned from duty as Draft Conducting Officer to HAVRE. Store, but the Lewis Gun Officer will remain responsible. for their being always in good condition. 58th Battalion defeated 57th Battalion at rifle shooting today. The former scored 677 points, whilst our score was 674 points. Weather: - wet early in morning clearing a little towards midday. Companies were bathed at DOURLERS during the morning and afternoon; a clean change of underclothing was issued to each man bathed. A special party of 10 men was detailed to assist the transport personnel with preparations for the forthocoming inspection by the Brigadier. The usual Educational classes were held. Men marched light (in drill order) and greatly enjoyed their exercise. The Brigadier held an inspection of the transport of the Brigade at DOURLERS and expressed himself satisfied with the general standard maintained. Capt. R.V. LINTON marched in from U.K. Leave and assumed the duties of 2nd in Command, Major G.S. SMITH.M.C., (59th BN. Attached 57th BN) having marched out to Senior Officers' School, ALDERSHOT, ENGLAND. Capt. Each officer expressed, on behalf of his command, the sentiments of thankfulness for the General's words of the morning, admiration for him as a wise and fearless leader, and loyalty to him and the Brigade. 

since the classes began (II/IZ/I8) there have been 385 enrolments in the Unit and Brigade Classes. In addition, I7 students are attending the Divisional: School and 4I are undergoing courses at workshops, Corps Technical School etc. making a total of 443.

The total present enrolments for Unit Classes are I65, Brigade Technical Classes 42, - a total of 207 as against 296 for last week for these Classes.

The chief reasons for this decreasebare

(a) The classes in Fruitgrowing and Business Correspondence, with a combined enrolment of 51, have been disbanded owing to the Instructors having left the Unit.

(b) The drafts for Australia.

(c) Men having gone to various Courses, Workshops etc.

Three new classes have been formed this week, namely Poultry Farming, Magnetism and Electricity and Salesmanship. It is hoped that the class in Fruitgrowing may be got together again under another Instructor.

It is sometimes found , when applications are called for various courses, that very little information is given in regard to the durarion of the course, time of commencement, locality etc. Intending applicants naturally wish to know these things beforehand especially when asked if they are prepared to do the full course.

EDUCATION NOTES TO 25. 1. 1919.

Since the classes commenced on 11/12/18, there have been 385 enrolments. The actual present enrolments are 251 in the Unit classes and 45 for Brigade Classes - a total of 296 as shown in Appendix "A".

In addition, 17 Students from this whit are attending the Divisional Educational School, while 31 others are attending various extra unit courses (Schools, Workshops, &c.) making a total of 344. See Appendix "B".

Certain students take more than one subject. The total number of individual Students at present receiving instruction in the Unit classes is 151. There are 40 individual students attending Brigade Classes for Technical Instruction, See Appendix "C".

As regards the 151 individual students attending the Unit classes Appendix "D" shows the number of subjects taken. Of the 4 Illiterates who were in the Unit, 3 are receiving instruction at the Divisional School and the other has returned to Australia.

Forty-two applications from this Unit and 6 from the 15th A.L.T.M.B. have been made for courses at the Agricultural Training Depot at SUTTON VENY. Other applications are being made for Non-Military Employment in the United Kingdom.

Some difficulty exists in filling vacancies at the various workshops owing to the fact that only skilled tradesmen are generally required.

Interest in the classes has been difficult to maintain chiefly because text books have been unobtainable. Some text books have come to hand and also supplies of stationery for students, but had the books been available when the classes commenced there would have been a ready sale and the interest shown in the classes would have been more general in the unit. Text books for shorthand and bookkeeping for which there would have been a great demand are still unobtainable. These books were particularly required.

The keenest men have already enrolled, and as students leave the unit for various schools and courses attendances at Unit classes decrease accordingly.

Certain men show a lack of interest in the work and do not take part in any of the courses, the chief reason being the feeling of uncertainty in the minds of the men in regard to repatriation etc.

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EDUCATION REPORT

Week ending 18/1/19.

During the past week there were IS new enrolments, the the number of actual present enrolments being 216. This, in spite of the new enrolments, is slightly less than last week's total owing to the fact that men have left the Unit permanently or are attending various schools and courses away from the Unit.

The attendances at classes have been affected by men being engaged in essential military duties and fatigues and also by certain men attending Brigade classes two or three times a week.

47 students attend Brigade classes, while II have gone to the Divisional School.

Three illiterate, or partly illiterate, men from this Unit have gone to the Divisional School.

A supply of about IOO text books has been arranged for through the Divisional Education Officer and these will be in the hands of students in a day or two.

It has been found that the interest shown in Book-keeping (chiefly for farmers and small tradesmen) is very keen. This applies also in the case of Arithmetic; especially in the work dealing with fencing, excavating dams etc. Now that the text books are at last in sight, interest will be further stimulated.

During the week Chaplain W. Rodgers gave an interesting and well-attended lecture on "Rome, Naples and Pompeii".

An interchange of Instructors for Book-keeping and Business Correspondence has been arranged between the I5th F. Amb. and this Unit.

Week; ending 25/1/19.

At present there are 25I enrolments in the various Unit Classes. Forty five students are attending Brigadeclasses, Twenty five of whom are not included in the above total.

In addition seventeen students have gone to the Divisional School and two officers and fifteen O.R.'s are undergoing various courses at schools and work-shops away from the Unit.

The classes in Fruit-growing and Business Correspondence are now disbanded owing to the fact that the Instructors in these two subjects have left the Unit. The Instructor in Fruit-growing has been called to the Agricultural Training Depot in England as a lecturer.

A beginning has been made in this formation of study circles. so far the average attendance at such has been twenty-five.

Free stationery is now available for students and certain textbooks are at hand, but the books wanted most urgently - Elementary Book-keeping, Arithmetic and Shorthand - are not yet available. The demand for books will not be as great as it would have been s soon as the Classes commenced, Many of the Students are leaving the Unit for Australia, Schools etc. and others will begiven in the near future. The absence of text-books has certainly had a dampening effect on the interest of students.
