

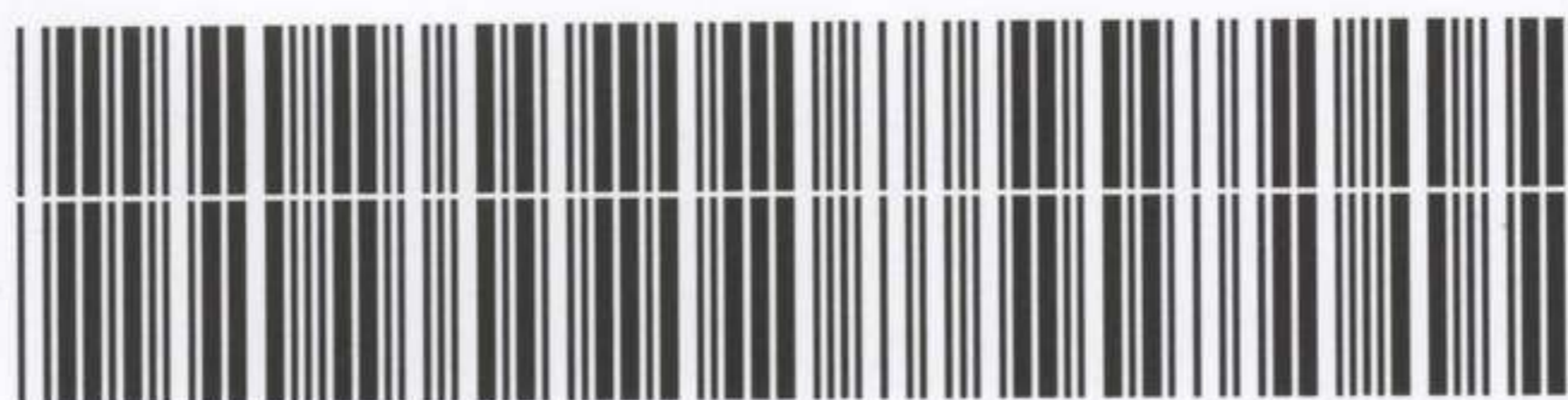

<p>REFERENCE MAP VALENCIENNES 1/100,000. ST. AUBIN.</p>	1/1/19		<p>Weather: dull and threatening. The band was up at reveille and paraded through the village playing our Regimental march and other soul-stirring pieces. This unusual proceeding was intended as a welcome to the new Year - the Peace Year - the year that is to take us back to our distant homes. Mass celebrated in the local church was attended by the R.C. members of the Battalion. No Educational classes were held and only the working parties necessary to gather fuel and vegetables were detailed. The Q.M. continues to build up a reserve of coal to tide us over the time when bad weather will render transport difficult. Coal is still available in any quantity at the AULNOYE dump abandoned by the enemy. The C.O. has instituted a system of Company Stock Books, with the object of enabling a stricter check to be kept on the Battalion Stores and Equipment. It is not now possible to lose stores in action and have them destroyed by shell fire. In future therefore every article must be accounted for. Leave to BRUSSELS is now available for two soldiers per Battalion every fourth day. The battalion met and defeated the 58th Battalion at football today. The match was keenly contested and provoked great excitement amongst the spectators</p>

<p>VALENCIENNE 1/100,000. ST. AUBIN.</p>	<p>3/1/19</p>		<p>Commanders, the C.O. permitted them to utilise the morning for attention to interior economy. A party of one officer, two non-commissioned officers and thirty men was engaged during the morning in collecting sugar beet from the fields and stacking it by the roadside where it is collected under arrangements made by the French. The beet is urgently required by the French sugar factories. Returns are to be furnished to Brigade Headquarters setting out the number of men, horses and vehicles employed. It is understood that the cost of labour is to be charged against the French Government. In the vicinity there are some abandoned German dumps near which the French children sometimes play. One child was killed recently whilst playing with a grenade. It has been found necessary to issue a warning through the Maire.</p> <p>Weather:- dull and showery. The Companies were again placed at the disposal of Company Commanders for the morning. Officers Commanding Companies took advantage of the occasion to improve the approaches to their billets. A further party was employed in the collection of beet. It was estimated by the inhabitants that it would take six days to clear the field. The men decided they would let our allies see how Australians worked. They set to with a will and completed their task by midday. The task took them in all eight hours. Battalion Headquarters staffs and Company Commanders were present. The General spoke to officers individually and asked the service they had seen. Afterwards he inspected the platoons and asked to see those men who had been on Gallipoli with him. Lieut. GRIESE and 2/Lieut. Lieut. F.J. KENEALY (Battalion Musketry Officer) took a team from "A" Company to the rifle range which has been established on the outskirts of the village. It is safe to fire on the range up to 100 yards. Acting on the look ahead principle, the transport officer has asked that he be given at once men to replace 1915 men shortly leaving for Australia. The 59th Battalion defeated our team both in football and in tug-of-war. Capt. PEACOCK. M.C. returned from duty as Draft Conducting Officer to HAVRE. Advice was received of the mention in despatches of Capt. L.W. ELLIOTT.D.S.O. and No 2406 Pte A. McDONALD. A debate between teams from "A" and "B" Companies aroused great interest. The subject for discussion was " Has the Australian soldier gained or lost by coming to the war." The debate was won by "A" Company's team who supported an affirmative answer.</p>

Store, but the Lewis Gun Officer will remain responsible, for their being always in good condition. 58th Battalion defeated 57th Battalion at rifle shooting today. The former scored 677 points, whilst our score was 674 points.</p> <p>Weather:- wet early in morning clearing a little towards midday. Companies were bathed at DOURLERS during the morning and afternoon; a clean change of underclothing was issued to each man bathed. A special party of 10 men was detailed to assist the transport personnel with preparations for the forthcoming inspection by the Brigadier. The usual Educational classes were held. One hundred and twenty volumes for the battalion are stated to be at the Central Library whence they will be forwarded to us in the course of a few days. The Education Officer has endeavoured to secure the services of a qualified instructor from another unit, but so far without success. The class meets three times weekly and carries out a certain amount of practice work. Chaplain Rodgers delivered one of a series of lectures on his recent tour through ITALY. Brigade Headquarters were defeated at tug-of-war by our team. Lieut. L. COCKRAM marched out to Australia. The 57th Battalion club defeated Brigade Headquarters in a rifle match at DOUBLERS today.</p> <p>Weather:- dull and cold; no rain. The usual church parades were held. The men were asked to circulate information regarding all points brought out by the lecturer amongst their comrades who, owing to lack of accommodation were unable to hear the address. The 57th Battalion defeated the 15th A.L.T.M.B. and 15th Field Coy. Engineers in Rifle Shooting today, scores being 57th Battalion 668 Points, Combined team 666 points. The Educational classes were well attended today in spite of the Cross Country run. Great interest is being maintained.</p> <p>Weather: Bright, exceptionally fine for this period of the year. The 57th Battalion football team to-day against the M.G. Battalion, was probably the strongest ever put into the field. We had six players included from the 15th Field Ambulance and 15th A.L.T.M.B. and we had an easy victory scoring 14 goals 12 behinds to 2 goals 6 behinds. In the tug-o-war we were beaten in two straight out pulls. 2/Lieut. K.G.M. Selby marched in from the O.C.B. and was taken on the strength of the Battalion.</p> <p>Weather bright and frosty. A full muster parade of the Brigade was held in the Chateau Grounds DOURLERS, at 1100. The principal object of the parade was the presentation to the survivors of the platoon of the 58th Battalion of the medals gained by them as winners of the A.R.A. field firing competition in the 5th Division. Of the original platoon that competed in the final tests in June 1918 only seven were present. The B.G.C. having congratulated the men; addressed the assembled Brigade. VALENCIENNES 1/100,000. ST. AUBIN.			<p>winters and nerve racking experiences had any one of the Battalions failed him, officers and men had carried out their duties to the letter. At the conclusion of the parade the Battalions marched past. As it was realized that no response could be made to the Brigadier's remarks on the formal parade, and as the general desire was that his eulogium of the troops should not be allowed to pass without a demonstration of appreciation of his words, Battalion Commanders decided to call an informal parade for the afternoon to afford the men the desired opportunity. At 1500 the Battalions carrying their colours arrived at the church, DOUJERS, every available man being present. Incidentally it is of interest to record that this was the first occasion on which the flags presented by the women of Australia were carried on parade by this Brigade. With bands playing the whole Brigade including H.Q. personnel marched without arms on to the lawn in front of the Chateau used as Brigade H.Q. The troops entered by companies and as each company passed the Chateau steps the men, led by their company commanders, gave three cheers. The B.G.C. appeared and took his stand on the steps, acknowledging each Company's cheer with a salute. 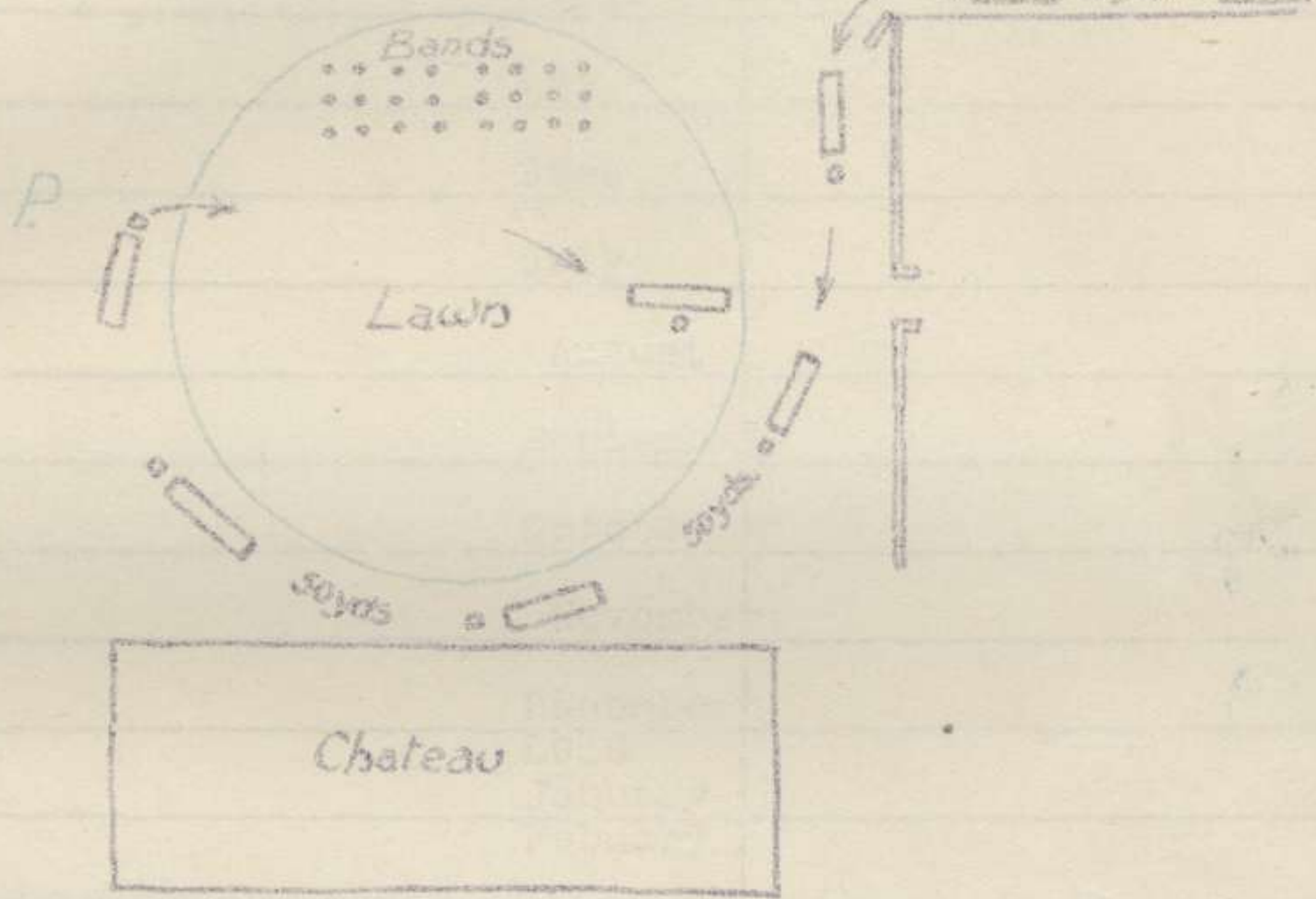
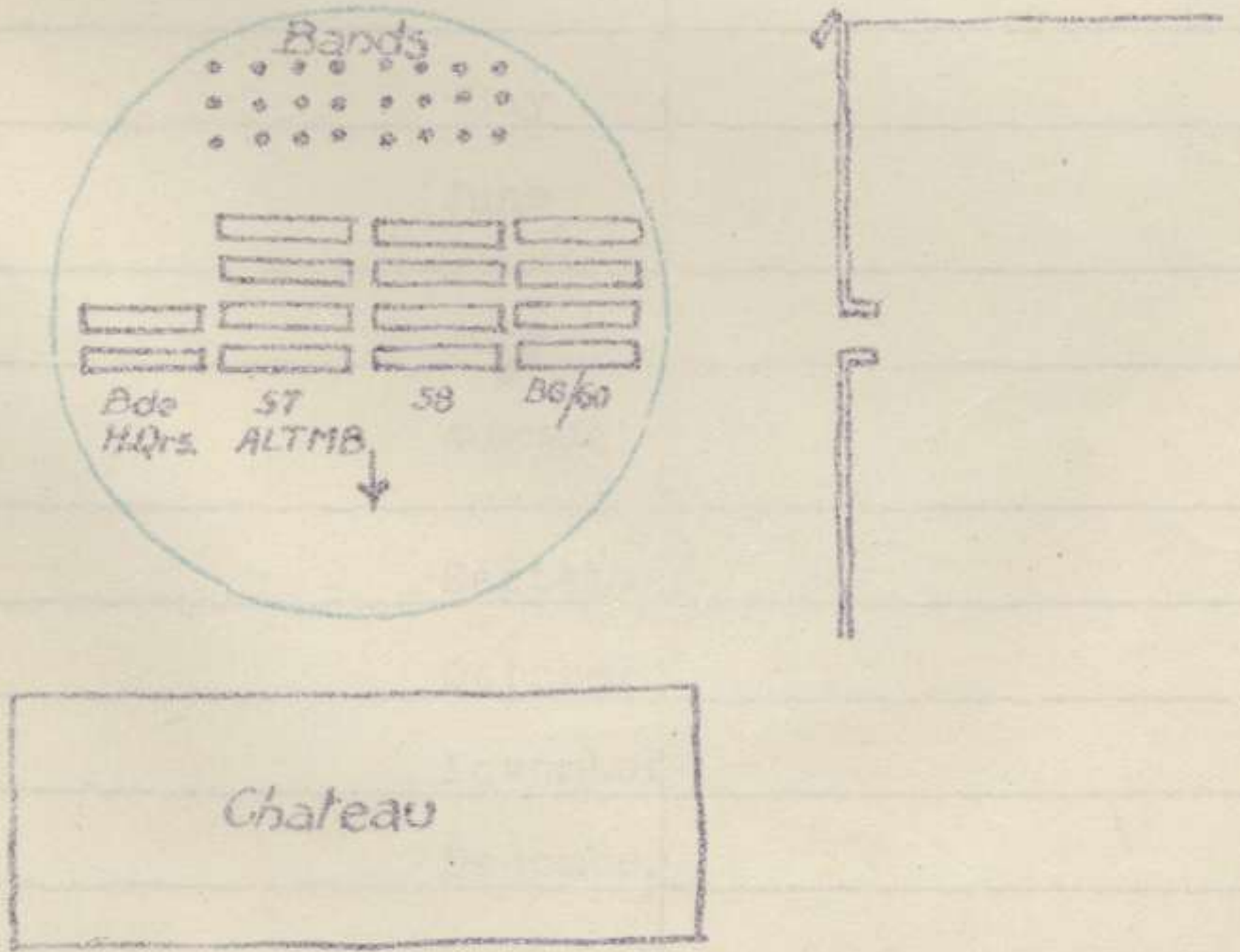

57TH BATTALION. A.I.F.EDUCATION REPORT

Week ending 1/2/19.

Since the classes began (II/12/18) there have been 385 enrolments in the Unit and Brigade Classes. In addition, 17 students are attending the Divisional School and 41 are undergoing courses at Workshops, Corps Technical school etc. making a total of 443.

The total present enrolments for Unit Classes are 165, Brigade Technical Classes 42, - a total of 207 as against 296 for last week for these Classes.

The chief reasons for this decrease are

- (a) The classes in Fruitgrowing and Business Correspondence, with a combined enrolment of 51, have been disbanded owing to the Instructors having left the Unit.
- (b) The drafts for Australia.
- (c) Men having gone to various Courses, Workshops etc.

Three new classes have been formed this week, namely poultry Farming, Magnetism and Electricity and Salesmanship. It is hoped that the class in Fruitgrowing may be got together again under another Instructor.

It is sometimes found, when applications are called for various courses, that very little information is given in regard to the duration of the course, time of commencement, locality etc. Intending applicants naturally wish to know these things beforehand especially when asked if they are prepared to do the full course.

57TH BATTALION A.I.F.EDUCATION NOTES TO 25. 1. 1919.

Since the classes commenced on 11/12/18, there have been 385 enrolments. The actual present enrolments are 251 in the Unit classes and 45 for Brigade Classes - a total of 296 as shown in Appendix "A".

In addition, 17 students from this Unit are attending the Divisional Educational School, while 31 others are attending various extra unit courses (Schools, Workshops, &c.) making a total of 344. See Appendix "B".

Certain students take more than one subject. The total number of individual students at present receiving instruction in the Unit classes is 151. There are 40 individual students attending Brigade Classes for Technical Instruction, See Appendix "C".

As regards the 151 individual students attending the Unit classes Appendix "D" shows the number of subjects taken. Of the 4 illiterates who were in the Unit, 3 are receiving instruction at the Divisional School and the other has returned to Australia.

Forty-two applications from this Unit and 6 from the 15th A.L.T.M.B. have been made for courses at the Agricultural Training Depot at SUTTON VENY. Other applications are being made for Non-Military Employment in the United Kingdom.

Some difficulty exists in filling vacancies at the various workshops owing to the fact that only skilled tradesmen are generally required.

Interest in the classes has been difficult to maintain chiefly because text books have been unobtainable. Some text books have come to hand and also supplies of stationery for students, but had the books been available when the classes commenced there would have been a ready sale and the interest shown in the classes would have been more general in the unit. Text books for shorthand and bookkeeping for which there would have been a great demand are still unobtainable. These books were particularly required.

The keenest men have already enrolled, and as students leave the unit for various schools and courses attendances at Unit classes decrease accordingly.

Certain men show a lack of interest in the work and do not take part in any of the courses, the chief reason being the feeling of uncertainty in the minds of the men in regard to repatriation etc.

EDUCATION REPORTWeek ending 18/1/19.

During the past week there were 18 new enrolments, the number of actual present enrolments being 216. This, in spite of the new enrolments, is slightly less than last week's total owing to the fact that men have left the Unit permanently or are attending various schools and courses away from the Unit.

The attendances at classes have been affected by men being engaged in essential military duties and fatigues and also by certain men attending Brigade classes two or three times a week.

47 students attend Brigade classes, while 11 have gone to the Divisional School.

Three illiterate, or partly illiterate, men from this Unit have gone to the Divisional School.

A supply of about 100 text books has been arranged for through the Divisional Education Officer and these will be in the hands of students in a day or two.

It has been found that the interest shown in Book-keeping (chiefly for farmers and small tradesmen) is very keen. This applies also in the case of Arithmetic; especially in the work dealing with fencing, excavating dams etc. Now that the text books are at last in sight, interest will be further stimulated.

During the week Chaplain W. Rodgers gave an interesting and well-attended lecture on "Rome, Naples and Pompeii".

An interchange of Instructors for Book-keeping and Business Correspondence has been arranged between the 15th F. Amb. and this Unit.

Week ending 25/1/19.

At present there are 251 enrolments in the various Unit Classes. Forty five students are attending Brigade Classes, Twenty five of whom are not included in the above total.

In addition seventeen students have gone to the Divisional school and two officers and fifteen O.R.'s are undergoing various courses at schools and work-shops away from the Unit.

The classes in Fruit-growing and Business Correspondence are now disbanded owing to the fact that the instructors in these two subjects have left the Unit. The instructor in Fruit-growing has been called to the Agricultural Training Depot in England as a lecturer.

A beginning has been made in this formation of Study Circles, so far the average attendance at such has been twenty-five.

Free stationery is now available for students and certain text-books are at hand, but the books wanted most urgently - elementary Book-keeping, Arithmetic and shorthand - are not yet available. The demand for books will not be as great as it would have been as soon as the Classes commenced. Many of the students are leaving the Unit for Australia, schools etc, and others will be given in the near future. The absence of text-books has certainly had a dampening effect on the interest of students.

The local school-room is still available for the use of students.

CLASSES: This week there have been 6 new enrolments; actual total present enrolments now being 221. 17 students are attending Brigade classes.

The attendances must necessarily fluctuate from week to week owing to men leaving the Battalion for various reasons, either temporarily or permanently, and also on account of men attending courses and classes away from the Unit.

INSTRUCTORS:- The Instructors in Bookkeeping and English have been called upon to act as Instructors at the Corps Central School, but their work can be satisfactorily carried on by the remaining Instructors. The Instructor in Shorthand has marched out on U.K. Leave. Endeavours were made to secure the services of the shorthand Instructor of the 15th P.A. but he is about to return to Australia. It may still be possible to secure the services of an Instructor from one of the neighbouring units to take the class temporarily.

LECTURES:- On Saturday evening last Chaplain Charles W. RODGERS gave an interesting and well attended lecture entitled, "A Trip through Italy." This is to be supplemented by a second lecture on the same subject.

DEBATES:- During the week a debate was held between teams from two of the Companies. The subject for discussion was; "Has the Australian soldier gained or lost through coming to the war."

GENERAL:- There is still a good demand for the books in the Library. Several pamphlets on Victoria and a copy of the Victorian Year Book have been received from the Victorian Agent General's Office.

The shorthand Instructor has two books which were obtained from private sources. No further books or supplies of stationery have come to hand.

During the month in which the classes have been in operation there have been 249 enrolments. Some names have been crossed off the rolls for different subjects for various reasons (Men evacuated to Hospital and left for Australia). Other men have in some cases allowed a subject to lapse and are continuing with other subjects, or have changed from one subject to another, leaving the total actual enrolments in classes for the present at 233.

In view of the resources at present at our disposal, it has not been deemed advisable to form new classes in other subjects. The evening class in French for men who are unable to attend the day classes (Q.M. Personnel, Transport &c) has proved satisfactory. Fifteen students attend this class.

No further books have been received but a limited supply of scribbling blocks and foolscap which has come to hand has been of some help in satisfying students' requirements.

The lamps which were borrowed from the Maire have proved adequate for the lighting of the schoolroom at night.

With a view to stimulating interest in Debating, Companies are arranging debates. One Company has had some interesting discussions on various subjects. All this will help to lead up to evening debates and discussions on various topics and social problems.

Owing to the probable re-opening of the local school, the schoolroom may not be available for our use during the daytime; but provision is being made for such an event so that our classes may be able to continue without interruption.

A lecture - "A Trip through Italy" - is set down for Saturday evening next. A lecture, entitled "ST AUBIN", by Col. DENEHY, D.S.O. is also listed for next week.

We have also done quite a lot of work for Civilians one or two teams being innuse for them every day. All animals are in splendid condition.

The rations have been good; oat and hay ration especially. We have all the animals in good warm stables. The limbers are all in good order. The harness and steel work are in good condition and all repairs up to date.

The supply of shoes good and the shoeing well in hand. The health of men and horses excellent.
