

Summary - 6 a.m. 16th June to 6 a.m. 17th June.

No. I. Section .. Except for heavy shelling between 3 and 5 p.m. the day was uneventful. A party was sent out from the 9th Battalion last night against the enemy's new trenches towards TWIN POINTS. The enemy evacuated on their approach and the result achieved therefore was negligible.

No.II. Section .. Trenches in this section were heavily shelled during the morning and again in the evening. A certain amount of damage was done to our parapets, which was were repaired during the night. The enemy were heard picking in tunnel D.9 (where we exploded a mine some days ago) and it is now being kept under close observation; at a favourable time the enemy's tunnel will be blown up again. The enemy is still improving his works at JOHNSON'S JOLLY and during last night appears to have advanced his sap about 10 yards.

Artillery .. At 7.15 a.m. the guns on GABA TEPE opened fire on us but were silenced by the howitzer and Jopp's battery. At 9.20 a.m. the enemy were observed to be constructing in considerable numbers

a sunken road in 203 F.2 - F.3; the party was dispersed

by fire from JOPP'S battery.

The enemy's guns from GUN RIDGE in the afternoon fired very accurately at HUGHES'S battery and a gun was placed out of action - it can be repaired locally.

The 6-inch howitzer engaged an enemy heavy gun about 7 p.m., which hitherto had not been located. The position of the gun is about 238 V.. The big gun which fires from the direction of BOGHALI has not yet been located.

Greater activity was shown during the day by the enemy's artillery than has been the case for axeonsided and some time past. Our guns, however, replied,

apparently with effect.




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

Summary - 6 a.m. 17th June to 6 a.m. 18th June.

No. I. Section .. Uneventful twenty-four hours. Ground in the front of the 12th Battalion reconnoitred with a view to advancing works. Patrol verified new enemy trenches on PINE RIDGE SOUTH.

No.II. Section .. Japanese mortar put some good shots into the enemy's sapheads and trenches in front of JOHNSON'S JOLLY.

The enemy gun in the tunnel opposite the 4th Battalion opened fire yesterday evening; our guns replied demolishing the opening of the tunnel.

An high explosive shell penetrated the roof of our tunnel No. D.16 (8th Battalion) and did a certain

amount of damage which has been repaired.

Sounds of digging and coughing were reported from the direction of the valley at the foot of JOHNSON'S JOLLY.

Enemy very quiet during the night.

Artillery .

A party was again observed constructing the sunken road in 203 F.2 - 3. Fire from JOPP'S battery dispersed the

working party.

The OLIVE GROVE battery shelled the beach at various times during the day but on each occasion was stopped by JOPP'S battery. At 16.20 the KABA TEFE gun opened fire and was silenced by JOPP'S battery. A little later on a single gun from the direction of the OLIVE GROVE opened fire on the beach. This gun could not be located and it would appear that the enemy has some power of moving guns fairly rapidly in this vicinity.

CADDY'S battery succeeded in makking bursting some rounds in the enemy's gun emplacement on 971 and caused the gun to cease fire. BROWNE'S battery also claims to have got two direct hits on the emplacement of another gun on 971.


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

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

1. Some misconception appears to exist as to the responsibility of engineer officers and the authority of brigade commanders over the engineer companies allotted for their assistance. The object of this memo is to make these points clear.

2. A Field Company or portion of a field company will be allotted to sections of defence as follows :-

No. 1 Sec. (Southern No. 1) ... 3rd F. Co.

- 3. The officers commanding these companies will be the technical advisers of the section commander. The main duties of the companies will be forward or offensive works. The officers commanding field companies will be responsible for bringing to the notice of brigade commanders the general policy approved by D.H.Q.
- of the firing line should be done by infan ry labour on the initiative of the commander concerned. Radical changes should not be made however without the approval of section commanders who will if they think necessary obtain the opinion thereon of the O.C. F.Co.
- be referred to D.H.Q. Suggestions or proposals may however emphate from any source. Before submission to D.H.Q. they will be worked out by the section commander or F.Co. officer concerned. Copies of all orders and instructions affecting work in sections issued by the O.C. D.E. to F.Co. Commanders will be given to section commanders.
- 6. The O.C.D.E. is responsible for the general supervision of all the work of the field companies. He will work in close touch with section commanders.

When action is taking place in any tunnel - such as the explosion of a charge - the work will be carried out under the orders of the

### Summary - 6 a.m. 18th June to 6 a.m. 19th June.

No. I. Section .. Very quiet for the whole twenty-four hours. Patrols out last night ascertained that the enemy was digging both in THE CORNFIELD and "A" ridge. Sounds of pegs being driven as if for entanglements were heard.

No.II. Section .. Guns from the direction of MORTAR RIDGE fired a few shells into the 8th Battalion during the day but caused very little damage. Work on JOHNSON'S JOLLY was consistent throughout the day. Japanese bomb mortar threw a bomb most effectively into a Turkish trench, completely wrecking it. Patrol from 8th Battalion reports new works in the vicinity of COURTNEY'S POST, and work to the left front not yet connected with GERMAN OFFICERS TRENCH.

opposite the 2nd Battalion appeared during the night to be fixing wire entanglements and was vigourously attacked by rifle fire. An enemy bomb, apparently thrown by a trench mortar, cleared our 2nd

Battalion trenches.

Artillery .. At 5 a.m. some movement was noticed in the trenches opposite QUINN'S POST, and eleven rounds were fired by BROWNE'S battery, which effectively covered the trenches.

At 7.25 a.m. a double company of infantry was observed moving in a north-easterly direction in column in square 203 H.8. Twenty-five rounds were fired from JOPP'S battery against this target with good effect. At 12.15 p.m. a party of horsemen dismounted and tied up their horses in square 212 X.9. The horses stampeded after five rounds.

No. I. Section .. No.I Section was yesterday sub-divided into the latter being taken over by the 2nd Light Horse Brigade.

The day was quiet. The enemy guns from KABA TERE

The day was quiet. The enemy guns from KABA TEPE fired some rounds into the position where the 9th Battalion is going into reserve - the rear of our right flank is greatly exposed to management view from KABA TEPE.

During the night we moved out on to HOLLY SPUR and began some new trenches in order to take in more ground and prevent the enemy coming too close. Satisfactory progress was made during the night and without molestation.

During the night we also began the establishment of a post on "A" ridge and the construction of communication trenches from our extreme right. Satisfactory progress was made and the covering party discovered a body of Turks in the vicinity and accounted for three of them killed.

No.II. Section .. Enemy shelled the trenches on the southern portion of No.II.

Section for a time during the day and fired a few bombs
from what is evidently a new trench mortar. The Japanese
mortar was used with good effect on JOHNSON'S JOLLY.

Three patrols were out during the night but gained very
little fresh information.

In the northern portion of No.II. Section the day was uneventful. We kept up an energetic sniping and appeared to harass the enemy somewhat.

Artillery

HUGHES'S battery and the first round was said to be effective. At 10 a.m. while one of our aeroplanes was over the OLIVE GROVE two rounds were fired by us with the intention of directing the observer's attention to this part. The gun on KABA TEPE opened fire at 4.32 p.m. but was stopped by JOPP'S battery. At 4 p.m. CADDY'S battery fired four rounds at a new gun located on the western sispe side of BATTLESHIP HILL; the gun ceased fire. At 4.30 p.m. a gun opened from a dip on the north-western slope of BATTLESHIP HILL and it was engaged by BROWNE'S battery, apparently with effect.

The heavy gun which put several shells into Anzac during the day from an easterly direction could not be

located.

1. - For the proper protection of the force and in order that the power of the offensive may not be lost to us, it is essential that the tunnelling and opening of new fire trenches should be expedited. The rate of work latterly has diminished considerably, and it is thought that this can be remedied by a little organization and closer supervision.


2. - It is suggested therefore :-


- (1) that the responsible engineer officer will make all applications for working parties promptly to brigade commanders;
- (ii) that battalion commanders will keep a list of man with mining experience and detail these whomever available:
- (iii) that working parties be supervised by their own officers. One officer could probably supervise the work at two or three tunnels, but relief officers would be necessary;
  - (iv) that the necessary administrative steps regarding rations and preparation of meals be taken to facilitate the work of men detailed to working parties;
  - (v) that task work be resorted to care being taken that tasks are reasonably set.
- 3. The divisional commander commends these suggestions to brigade commanders, and hopes that the urgency of the work will be realized and steps taken accordingly. If brigade commanders have alternative proposals to submit the divisional commander will be pleased to consider them.

MEMORANDUM.

Officer commanding 3 Sy. Bdes, 2nd L. St. Bde. 4DW. Art.

1. - With a view to obtaining uniformity in the compilation of information regarding the enemy in all formations of the division, the following amplified instructions are issued :-

2. - Each formation will make such arrangements as will ensure that the whole enemy area which can be seen from its position is continually under observation, and that every change in the situation is recorded.

In working out the details of the organisation of the intelligence service in formations, suitability to more active conditions must be kept in mind.

duty of the staff of the formation.

Mormally the complete daily information reports should reach headquarters of brigades, &c., very shortly after nightfall.

On the receipt of these they should be collated and a single general report forwarded to Divisional Headquarters as soon as possible the same night. Generally it is not necessary to forward battalion reports to Divisional Headquarters unless they are of exceptional interest or value, or too long to be conveniently summarised. They should be retained and entered as an appendix to the diary of the formation.

These should show :-

(1) the position held by :-

(b) the enemy as far as it can be seen;

(11) the works under construction by :-

(a) the formation; (b) the enemy;

(iii) proposed works.

Copies of outline maps of the situation, scale 1/10,000, have been issued for this purpose.


