

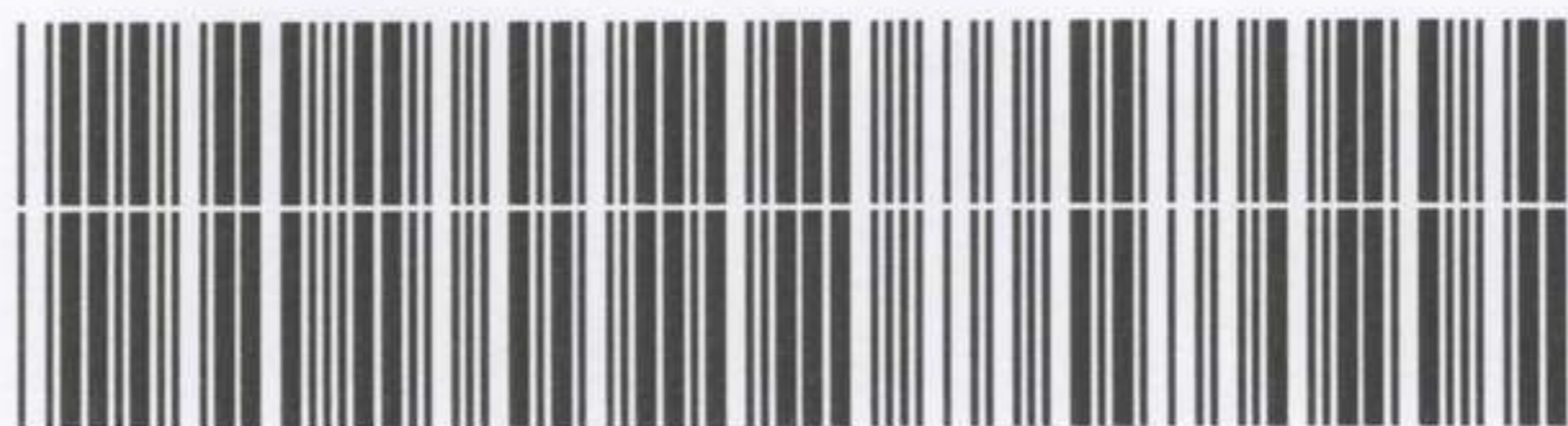

FOURTH AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BRIGADE SIGNAL TRAINING ORDER No.2

Reference Sheet 27 1/40,000.

4/10/1917.

1. In conjunction with the 1st Brigade on Right and 12th Brigade on Left the 4th Brigade will advance towards OUDEZEELE ridge on Saturday 6th October. Zero hour later.
2. Units half hour before Zero will be on jumping off line, approximately our Front Line which is the road from J.22.c. to J.27.central.
3. Right Boundary the road from J.22.c. - X roads in J.21.b. - X roads in J.15.c.
Left Boundary 3 houses near J.27.b.8.8. - east edge of wood - to X roads at J.20.b.
4. The 14th Battalion (Right) and 15th Battalion (Left) will consolidate on the Red Line (1st Objective) from X roads in J.21.b. to road junction J.21.a.5.0.
The 16th Battalion (Right) and 13th Battalion (Left) will consolidate on the BLUE Line (2nd Objective) X roads J.15.c. to X roads J.20.b.
5. The Left of 14th Battalion directs then left of 16th Battalion. Compass bearings to be taken.
6. (a) The barrage will be put down 150 yards in front of our forming up line at Zero.
(b) It will begin to advance at Zero plus 3 minutes at the rate of 100 yards in 4 minutes for 200 yards, thereafter and up to the RED LINE the rate will be 100 yards in 6 minutes.
(c) The barrage will remain on its protective position in front of RED LINE for 30 minutes. Just prior to movement it will be increased in intensity and troops will move up close under it.
(d) The rate of movement from RED to BLUE Line will probably be 100 yards in 6 minutes.
(e) Smoke will be fired by each Battery as it arrives on its protective barrage in front of the RED LINE and BLUE LINE so as to indicate the position to the troops.
7. Advanced Brigade Headquarters in Pill Box at J.28.b.6.9. (present Headquarters 13th Battalion).



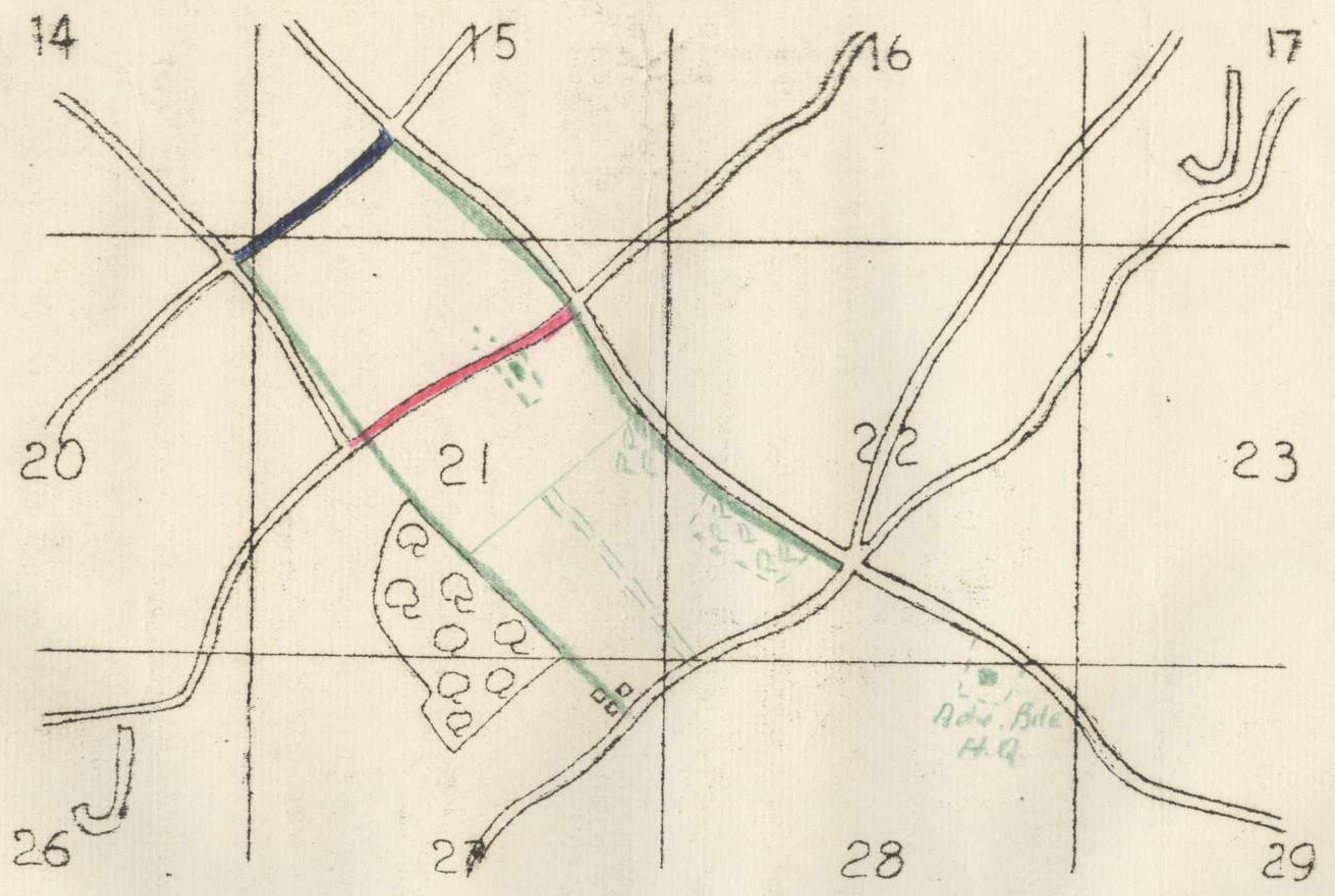

2. O. C. 13th Battalion will detail 1 Officer and 12 others carrying Blue flags to indicate the barrage.
3. O. C. Battalions will arrange for a man with a Blue and White flag to represent the Battalion on their flanks which are as follows :-
 - 4th Battalion on right of 16th Battalion.
 - 48th Battalion on left of 13th Battalion.
 - 2nd Battalion on right of 14th Battalion.
 - 47th Battalion on left of 15th Battalion.
4. The 14th and 16th Battalions will provide directing personnel with compasses.
5. The Brigade Forward Party under (Lieut. BEAR 14th Battalion) will establish themselves at cable head J.22.c.5.1. half an hour before Zero and eventually at Pill Box J.21.b.1.4. in RED Line.
6. Battalion Headquarters will be represented by C. O. or Senior Major with Signal personnel and Runners.
7. Company Headquarters will be represented by an Officer (who can be spared from Company Training) and Company Runners.
8. ^{Special} Service messages will be handed to Company Commanders by a Staff Officer detailed from Brigade.
9. If occasion demands Battalions may send forward a Battalion Forward Party which will connect with the Brigade Forward Party. No wires are to be laid from Battalion Headquarters to Battalion Forward Party.
10. Brigade Signal Officer will arrange for Power Buzzer and Amplifier to be established with Brigade Forward Party.
11. Brigade Signal Officer will arrange for the synchronization of watches at 7.a.m. and 9.a.m.
12. Zero hour will be 10.a.m. Exercise will be completed about 12.30.p.m.

ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS ISSUED IN CONNECTION WITH
FOURTH AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BRIGADE ORDER NO. 107.

9/10/1917.

1. LEWIS GUNS. If any Lewis Guns are knocked out in action Units will wire direct to D.A.D.O.S., who has a reserve, and will send a gun to replace immediately to Units Transport Lines.
2. SUPPLIES. Railhead on 11th at DICKEBUSCH.
Units will arrange with Supply Officer 4th Brigade for delivery on the 11th of rations for consumption on 12th at HALIFAX. After that period the A.S.C. will deliver automatically by H.T. to Units Transport Lines.
3. PACK TROOP. Location KRUISSTAART.
4. BATTLE STORES. 600 Water Bottles will be issued to Brigade Headquarters and the allotment will be made at a later date for Units who will most require them.
Water Tins and Wire-cutters may be had on requisition to Brigade Headquarters.
Solidified Alcohol will be issued on the following scale -
Forward Brigades 500 tins per week.
Support Brigade 250 tins per week.
5. AREA STORES. No Area Stores (tents etc.) will be moved from the present area but will be returned to Area Commandant and receipt taken.
6. AMMUNITION. MAIN DIVISIONAL DUMP will be BARMY DUMP H.22.b.9.2.
ADVANCED DIVISIONAL DUMP WESTHOEK J.7.b.7.4. Forward Brigades Ammunition Dump at CEMETERY D.22.d.6.5.
S.A.A. Indents will be submitted to complete to 220 rounds per man to Brigade Headquarters to-day.
This will be available on arrival in CANAL AREA.
Bombs. Indents will be submitted to complete to 2 bombs per man to Brigade Headquarters to-day.
Supplies will be available on arrival in CANAL AREA.
S.O.S. & Ground Flares. On arrival in CANAL AREA.
7. QUARTERING. Allotment in HALIFAX Area will be the same as when the Brigade moved back to STEENVOORDE last. Billeting Parties to report to Area Commandant HALIFAX Area on 11th by 11.a.m.
8. SOCKS. An issue of 600 pairs of socks per Battalion will be made through Brigade Headquarters. This will serve as a floating stock and will be exchanged by Battalions with D.A.D.O.S. at SMYTHE Camp H.22.d. as necessary. This stock will be accounted for by Brigade Headquarters.
9. EXTRA SUPPLIES. Ingredients for Trench Foot preventative have been issued to 4th Field Ambulance and demands will be made by R.M.O's. immediately for their requirements of them.
10. REINFORCEMENT CAMP. Category "C" personnel will rendezvous along STEENVOORDE - EECHE Road at Q.1.d. at 7.45.a.m. on the 11th and move under command of Captain C.AHEARN 16th Battalion in time to arrive at Railway Station CAESTRE at 10.a.m. on 11th instant where they will be met by guides.
One G.S. Limbered Wagon per Battalion nucleus will be detailed to them. Sufficient Cooking Utensils for all ranks will be sent including enough for reinforcements likely to arrive.
Tentage is provided at the reinforcement camp at rate of one tent per four Officers or ten Other Ranks.

AIRCRAFT. During the afternoon a considerable amount of low reconnaissance was done by our planes, the fire of our heavies being directed by them.

At 3.30.p.m. one of our planes was attacked by four enemy planes and forced to descend in enemy lines. The enemy were seen leading away Pilot and Observer, one of whom being apparently wounded.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. Very active throughout the 24 hours. At midnight it increased in volume, firing particularly heavy bursts every hour. Special attention was paid to vicinity of ZONNEBEKE, Sunken Road at D.16.d.8.1. and YPRES - ROULERS Railway. Most of fire came from direction of MOORSLEDE. From 2.a.m. to 6.a.m. northern end of WESTHOEK RIDGE and the CHAPEL and RECTORY were heavily shelled with gas shells - 5.9's. being chiefly used. Vicinity of Headquarters at D.26.c.1.3. was shelled at intervals with 8 inch shells. This gun was firing from direction of DADIZEE.

AIRCRAFT. Enemy planes were very active throughout the day. At 1.p.m. two large flights flew over our lines, one flight at a very high altitude and the other which consisted of a large type of plane - flew very low. These planes were engaged by our A.A. guns but with no result. At 9.p.m. three planes flew over our lines, dropping white flares.

PATROLS. Enemy patrol of 8 men were seen at dawn at approx. D.17.d. 90.90. and dispersed by L.G. fire.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. Our artillery was active from 2.p.m. until 4.p.m. ASSYRIA was shelled about 1.p.m. many of the shots fell short of the mark. Several enemy parties were observed running away from locality after shelling ceased. At 5.45.p.m. in answer to an S.O.S. on right of our sector put down a barrage. The heavy batteries kept up intermittent fire throughout the day.

AIRCRAFT. Our planes were active throughout the day, large flights flying over the lines. Much artillery fire appeared to be directed by them. At 10.p.m. several planes passed over our lines towards enemy territory.

MACHINE GUNS. Our Machine Guns actively engaged enemy aircraft.
LEWIS GUNS. Good targets were obtained at intervals throughout the day, chiefly in the vicinity of DECLINE COPSE and YPRES - ROULERS Railway.

AIRCRAFT. Large flights of enemy planes flew over our lines during the day, and were engaged by our A.A. and on one occasion by our planes. During the encounter at 3.p.m. a plane was seen to crash in vicinity of POLYGON WOOD. At 5.p.m. a large flight flew very low over our lines, one of the planes dropping bombs on gun positions, and they also opened fire on our support lines and on tracks.

PATROLS. No enemy patrols were seen.

MACHINE GUNS AND SHIPERS. Enemy Machine Guns and Snipers were very quiet on our front.

ENEMY MOVEMENT. About 5.p.m. much movement was observed opposite unit on our left in the vicinity of D.18.a.70.60. Enemy were wearing full equipment with packs. Lewis Gun fire was brought to bear on them with good result. Further movement was seen along Railway.



ZONNEBEKE, YPRES - ROULERS Railway D.26. and YPRES - ZONNEBEKE were also heavily shelled. The enemy is using a greater amount of shrapnel than usual. His field guns appear to be firing from N.E. of PASSCHENDAELE and E. of ASSYRIA while his heavier guns fire from direction of DADIZEE.

AIRCRAFT. Quiet during the day but active in early morning and from 4.p.m. to 5.p.m.. They flew at a low altitude along our lines and were engaged with Lewis Gun fire.
