



VAUCHELLES	April 1st		Day opened fine with fair amount of aerial activity. Training in battle formation is being carried out and all ranks are fit and well. G.O.C. and B.M. to 31st and 32nd Bns. and to 14th Inf. Bde. H.Qrs. War news is good, the New Zealand Division having done some very successful shows. We are still reserve to 3rd Army under 3 hours notice to move.	No 1
#	2nd		Day was cloudy with intermittent showers. G.O.C. to 29th and 30th Bns. B.M. and S.C. to all units. Still no word of a move, but news has come to hand that the Corps should be down here very soon, and then we should get a job to do. Everybody is anxious to be busy but the period of waiting is having a good effect on the men generally.	
#	3rd		Day was wet. Training in Musketry and B.F. was carried out indoors. Word was received that the Corps was on its way down. News from the South is scarce but we appear to be hold-ing the boche in conjunction with the French.	
	1/5th		Day wet. It was reported that we should move on 6th inst. At 3.40 p.m. word was received from G.S.O. 1 to stand by to embus at 7 p.m. Debussing point DMOURSm destination AUBIGNY. Brigadier and Staff moved off at 5 p.m. and arrived at H.Q. 3rd Cav. Division at 6.30 p.m. Cav. Div. had no orders for us and Brigadier decided to use DAOURS and VECQUEMONT to billet troops for the night. Battalions arrived at 2 a.m. and by 3 a.m. were settled in billets. At 3.35 a.m. an Officer from 19th Corps arrived and instructed us to move to BOIS DM GENTELLES by march route. Bns. moved off at about 3.50 a.m. and Brigadier and Brigade Major by car to H.Q. 8 D.A. at T 9 b 9 O. Bns. arrived at 9 a.m. and concentration was complete at 10.30 a.m. We are now reserve to 19th Corps and will be used for counter attack purposes. At 6 p.m. orders arrived to effect that we were transferred to 58th Div. and to move H.Q. to St NICHOLAS. T 8 c and to relieve the 24th Div. in reserve line. 32nd Bn. were detailed for the work and relief was complete by 9.20 p.m. Brigade H.Q. was opened at T 8 c at 8 p.m. and Staff arrived back. Quiet night on front and our men had a good rest and are now quite fit again.

Relief was carried on with and completed by 5,45 p.m. We have since come under orders of 18th Division and are to be used for counter-attack. Brigadier and B.M. to 18th Div H. Qrs. where situation was discussed. 30th and 31st Bns. were detailed for the work and reconnaissant of the assembly positions was carried out. The 5th A.I.Bde. are now holding the line with 5th Division on the left. We are now in reserve to 18th Division. The 5th Brigade are attacking to straighten the line in front of BOIS de HANGARD tomorrow, and the operation should be successful. We junction with the French at HANGARD and they are fighting well. BI	LANGY- RONVILLE	7th		Day opened fine with light showers of rain. Brigadier, Brigade Major and Staff Captain to all Bns. and 5th A.I.Bde during the day. A boche attack on BOIS de HANGARD was anticipated by our attack by 5 minutes, which resulted in his attack being unsuccessful. At 4.30 p.m. G.S.O.1 5th Aust. Div. 'phoned that two Bns. of Brigade were to relieve 41st and 45rd Bdes. of the 14th Div. in the Northern portion of reserve line from about 0.27 central Nth to R. SOMMIN as early as possible. The remainder of the Brigade were to be concentrated at BLANGY-TRONVILLE and the Brigade to come under orders of 5th Aust. Div. 30th and 31st Bns. detailed to take over reserve line. Brigadier, Brigade Major and C.O's of 30th and 31st Bns. visited Brigade Commanders 41st and 43rd Brigades at BLANGY-TRONVILLE and arranged relief. All units on move by 6 p.m. 30th and 31st relief complete by 1 a.m. Remaining units of Brigade settled in billets by 9 p.m. 8th M.Gum Coy. moved under orders of 5th Aust. M.G.Bn. to AUBIGNY. Move was carried out very quickly and without confusion. Situation quiet; intermittent shelling of rear areas. All ranks very fit and in good spirits.	104

BLANGY- TRONVILLE	8th April 1918		During the morning 31st Bn moved Bn H.Qrs and one Company to VECQUEMONT. Brigade Major and Staff Captain to 30th and 31st Bns, holding RESERVE LINE. In the afternoon Brigadier attended a conference at 15th Bde H.Qrs CORBIE. Corps, Divisiona and 14th and 15th Bde Commanders were present. A Scheme for an attack by the Division on front of about 5000 yards and depth of 3000 yards against HAMEL was formulated and discussed. Sth and 14th Bde to carry out the operation each with three Battalions and one Battalion in support. Bde Major to Div. H.Qrs to discuss operation with G.S.O.1. Brigadier held a conference with Bn Commanders in the evening. The projected operation was discussed. It was decided that the 32nd, 30th and 31st Bns would do the attack, with 29th Bn in support. C.O's were instructed to make an exhaustive reconnaissance of the ground with as many officers and N.C.Os as time would permit. Day was very wet with poor visibility. All ranks in good spirits and very fit and well.

CORBIE	13th April 1918		Fine day with fair visibility. During the morning the Brigadier viewed sites suggested for alternative H.Qrs. It was decided to commence digging operations at once. Staff Captain to all front line Battalions. Division intimated that an enemy attack was expected on the Divisional front on the 14th Inst. Artillery concentration shoots were arranged to take place from midnight to 6.30 a.m. as a counter preparation Right Battalion carried out an inter-company relief. All ranks are very fit and well. Hot food is supplied regularly and is much appreciated. Casualties for past 24 hours ended 12 noon 13th - 5 O.R. killed, 10 O.R. wounded. Intelligence summary for past 24 hours is attached.	No. //

At 1.15 p.m. a fire broke out in CORBIE but was extinguished in half an hour by men from the Reserve Battalion. CORBIE	loth April 1918		Fine day with good visibility. Brigadier to Right and Centre Bns. A.A. & Q.M.G. Division called in and discussed "Q" matters with the Staff Captain. Two Staff Officers for Intelligence III Army visited Brigade Headquarters during the afternoon. Early in the afternoon intimation was received from Division that there were indications of an ememy attack on VILLERS BRETONNEUX developing. Several hundred of the enemy, including transport were observed by Bde O.P's on main road between CERISY and LAMOTTE during the afternoon. The artillery were informed and the road was bombarded at intervals during the afternoon and night. Artillery concentration carried out during the night on centres of activity and roads All ranks are very cheerful but are in need of clean underclothing. 130 O.R. were bathed today and every endeavour is being made to obtain the underclothing. Casualties for past 24 hours ended 12 noon 16th, 3,0.R. wounded. Intelligence summary is attached.	No. 14
	17th April		Day opened misty with intermittent light showers. Brigadier to Right and Centre Bhs. Staff Captain to all Bhs. during the day. Divisional Commander called in during the afternoon to discuss the re-allotment of boundaries. The Brigade are extending their front 2000 yards to the left across the SOMME. The 29th Bh. will take over the new portion of the line Nth. of the SOMME and 32nd Bh. and one Coy. 30th Bh. front will be taken over by 14th A.I.Bde. The 32nd Bh will then become the reserve Bh. to the Bde. VILLERS BRETTONEUX was subjected to a heavy gas bombardment throughout the day. The village was evacuated and about 86 casualties sustained. An examination of a prisoner captured near HANGARD WOOD indicates that an attack on VILLERS BRETTONEUX may be expected within the next few days. Two Companies of 29th Bh. were bathed during the day. All ranks are keen and ready to meet the boche if he attacks.

When the adjustment has been completed two Battalions of the Brigade will be on the left bank of the SOMME and two on the right bank, one of the latter being in reserve to the Brigade. Orders for the operation were discussed. Brigade Major and Staff Captain to 11th A.I.Bde duringthe afternoon to arrange the taking over of the right Bn sector of the 11th A.I.Bde. C.O. 5th M.G.Bn discussed the question of the Edefence of the Canal with the Bde Major and arrangements were made for the allotment of a percantage of Vickers guns for Canal defence. CORBIE was subjected to a bombardment with 5.9" and 8" shells, a direct hit being obtained on the Church. Enemy artillery fire has slightly increased during the past few days and increased aerial activity has been most marked. All ranks are fit but, with the exception of the 29th Bn, feel the want of a bath and a clean change of underclothing. Casualties for past 24 hours ended 12 noon, 19/4/13 - 1 O.R. CORBIE 20th April 1918	ril 18.	At 11.15 p.m. a patrol from 32nd Bn, Commanded by Lieut TREASURE engaged an enemy patrol of 1 off and 20 o.R. Six of the enemy were killed and a wounded prisoner brought in. Prisoner belonged to 43 I.R. of 1st Division and gave quite a lot of useful information. Order of battle normal. G.O.C. and Staff Captain to Right Bn Headquarters and Brigade Major to Left Bn during day. The day was very fine with good visibility and enemy aircraft, in consequence, was very active. Three enemy aerophanes were brought down by our 'planes. Hostile artillery fire was very active shelling roads and villages. The Battalions are pushing ahead with wiring and strengthening the defences in the forward	Appendices
		area. A considerable amount of useful work has been done since the Bde took over the sector. Casualties for past 24 hours ended noon 20th - 3 O.R. killed, 9 O.R. wounded. Intelligence summary for past 24 hours is attached.	No. 19

It was decided to hold the bridge-heads with one company of Reserve Battalion, supported by Vickers guns distributed in depth along the CANAL for about 3,000 yards. Brigade Major to new Brigade Headquarters under construction. The tunnellers working on these Headquarters discovered some subterranean passages leading the in the direction of CORBIE COURCH. Staff Captain to 11th A.I.Bde Headquarters. Both our planes and the Bothe were very active today and several airfights took place. The famous air pilot Baron Von RICHTHOFFEN was brought down by a Lewis gunner from the 53rd Battery 14th Aust. F.A.Bde. HAMMLET was shelled with 50 rounds of "Green Cross" gas at 2.35 a.m. today but no casualties were caused. The 32nd Bn and Right Coy 30th Bn were relieved by 53rd Bn and one Coy of 54th Bn; relief complete by 1 a.m. On relief 32nd Bn billeted in CORBIE. The 29th Bn relieved the 42nd Bn in the Right Bn sector of 11th A.I.Bde on the Right Bank of the SOMME River, relief complete by 10.45 p.m. The Brigade is now disposed as follows: - 30th and 31st Bns on left bank of SOMME River, 29th Bn Right Bank of SOMME River, 8th L.T.M.B. at VAIRE. No casualties occurred during the relief and night was very quiet. Casualties for past 24 hours ended noon 21st - 3 O.R. killed, 9 O.R. wounded. They were driven off with Lewis Gun and Rifle fire. Later, a patrol found some Boche rifles and a Machine Gun belt and blood was seen on the ground. Brigadier to centre Battalion during the morning. One company 32nd Bn took over the defence of SOMME River and Canal from the 50th Bn, 13th A.I.Bde. The remainder of the 32nd Bn moved into position as Reserve Battalion supporting the 29th Bn, at dusk. At 9:45 p.m. information was received from Division from 4th Guards Division captured near VILLERS BRETONNEUA in night of 20/21st inst stated that his Division would probably attack VILLERS BRETONNEUA on 23rd April. All units were notified and special precautions ordered.

CORBIE	Night 1918		At 3:30 a.m. the enemy put down a heavy barrage on the front line system of the 8th Div in the right but very little on our front. At 6 a.m. the enemy attacked with 4 divisions on a front of about 5,000 yards with VILLERS BRETONNEUA and BOLS de l'ABBE as his main objectives. It is reported that 6 tanks were imployed in the attack. The enemy succeeded in pushing back the British troops after very hard fighting, to the outskirts of BOLS de l'ABBE. The 14th A.I. Bde on the right of our Division protected their exposed flank by moving up one of their support battalions and formed a defensive flank. At 5 a.m. an S.O.S. was fired by the right and centre companies of the left Battalion of of our Brigade. The enemy had placed a heavy artillery and mineuwefer box barrage around the right company and portion of the centre company and attacked with 200 or 300 men in two waves. The attack was broken up by the Lewis gun and Rifle fire. The enemy retired and after reorganising, again attacked and was again driven off in disorder. Our casualties were very slight about 50 enemy were estimated to have been killed.
