

4th AUSTRALIAN PIONEER BATTALION.

Commanding Officer's appreciation for Month of September 1918.

For the first week of month the Battalion was at LONGUEAU during which time some very useful training was done. Battalion embussed at LONGUEAU on morning of the 8th instant for BIACHES when it bivouaced for the night. While here two men were injured by a German "booby trap" The following day Battalion moved to neighbourhood of St. CRIN where it again bivouaced for the night in some copses and banks. During the night there was a very heavy storm and most of the men and officers were flooded out. On the loth the Battalion moved up to VRAIGNES and took over from the 5th Australian Pioneers. There was not a great deal of work to be done for the first few days. Two companies were employed repairing roads in the area in front of line running through BERNES and FLECHIN, the work up to that line being done by Corps Troops. No metal was available for this work and use was made of bricks from the neighbouring villages. The remaining two companies were employed erecting notice boards in the divisional area, and salvaging corrugated iron of which there was a great quantity in the area from the various hutments and stables which the Germans only partly destroyed when retreating. On the 15th two companies were put on building Headquarter for the Divisional Artillery, 4th and 12th Brigades and Machine Gun Battalion, in preparation for the operations which took place on the morning of 18th. These headquarters were not completed as well as could have been wished, owing to therebbeing too much work for the number of men available. 'A' and 'B' Companies were detailed to roads and tracks and erect notice boards in each Brigade area after the attack which they did very successfully, while 'B' Coy in addition taped a track from Brigade Headquarters forward. 2nd/Lieut.CALDER (who only joined a few days previously) and 12 men were given this work which was successfully performed, in spite of the fact that 10 out of the 12 men became casualties. 2nd/Lieut CALDER has been recommended for the Military Cross for this workand the two men with him for the Military

Medal. Following the operation two companied remained repairing metal roads, brick only being available, while the other two companies were employed assisting Brigades in consolidating red line. On the 21st the Battalion was relieved by the Pioneers of 46th Division, Battalion Headquarters being taken over for Divisional Headquarters and the Battalion moved to near ROISEL. Here a camp was built and the Battalion remained unemployed standing by for use if required in the operations commencing on 29th.

RATIONS. These have been good throughout the month. The new scale came into force only towards the end of the month and its effect cannot yet be properly gauged.

D.A.D.O.S. Drawings have been light as the Battalion was reclothed and equipment brought up to date at end of August.

BOOTMAKERS. Work has been normal and the present staff has been able to scope with all requirements.

TAILOR. He has been kept hard at work throughout the month and to properly tope with all the work that could with advantage be done. I consider it advisable to obtain the services of another tailor in addition and also if possible, to purchase a proper tailors sewing machine.

BATHS. The Battalion was bathed 3 times during the month.

1. INTENTION.

The 4th Australian Division, with 1st Division on right and 1st Australian Division on left, will attack on the frontage of Approx. 3,500 yards in length, objectives are represented by GREEN RED and BLUE Lines.

2. PIONEERS.

The 4th Australian Pioneer Battalion will work under C.R.E. They will be responsible for the making and erection of Direction Boardson Roads, Tracks to H.Q. FRONT LINE etc. They will be employed on Road Repairs assisting Artillery, constructing accommodation, etc. as may be required during the advance.

O's.C. 'A' and 'B' Coys will arrange for road reconnaissance to be made forwarding results to this Office as early as possible. (See Para4).

With regard to the operations with the dummy tamks. I beg to report as follows.:-

Ballard to operate in the left Brigade sector and 5 under Lieut.

Whitehead in the right Brigade sector. For each group of five tanks 35 men were told off but these proved quite inadequate for the work and in both cases it was found that not more than three dummies could be taken forward by the number of men available. Three of those alloted to the left Brigade area broke down and although the Officer in charge attempted to get the remaining two forward he was unable to get them up in time to be of any use. On the right Brigade sector four tanks were got into position on high ground in front of the jumping off tape, but owing to the poor visibility they were not seen by the enemy. One of these tanks however was seen by an enemy areoplane who directed machine gun fire on it.

Great difficulty was experienced by both parties in getting the dummies across shell holes, trenches and wire entanglements.

The dummies were forward of the line where the enemy barrage fell and no casualties were suffered by the parties.

The following conclusions are drawn which may prove useful, should any future attempt be made to utilise dummies .:-

- (1) The dummies were too heavy. Five men might have been able to move them along a level metelled road but across country it would require at least a dozen men to ensure their being taken forward at any reasonable pace.
- (2) They were too flimsy. Four broke down the wheels proving the weak spot.
- (3) They proved very difficult to handle across country and over any sort of obstacle however small.
- (4) The rain during the night added to the difficulties.

REPORT IN GENERAL ON THE 18th SEPTEMBER OPERATIONS.

The most noticeable feature at the beginning and througher out the operation was the absence of the enemy counter Artillery barrage inasmuch that it was possible to immediately follow up the Infantry and begin work on roads and tracks. In isolated sectors there was a fair amount of enemy Artillery fire, but usually it was of temporary duration and could easily be avoided by the various working parties. It appeared to me, on my sector (left half of divisional area) unnecessary at any time to have men working under fire. My orders to Platoon Commanders were to avoid repairing any section of road that was being shelled, but to go ahead of it, carry on and send necessary parties back as soon as the shelling lifted. If that action had not been carried out, casualties would certainly have been heavy.

Under the present condition of minor open warfare in areas void of old defence systems the amount of work to be done on roads is likely to be overestimated, reasons for which are the lighter type of shell used, the sensitive fuses and the short duration a barrage rests on any line.

Dry weather tracks or Artillery tracks should not be established until after the Artillery have moved forward. Once the Artillery have set themselves a track by day, they are bound to use it by night and it is for that reason we should make passable the tracks they have formed for themselves and not Artillery tracks they cannot acquaint themselves with in the dark.

I would like to suggest that a Company of platoon other than those doing the main roads, behind the Infantry, be detached for such work.

After the first wave had gone forward, and for an hour subsequently, the enemy shelled our old front line positions fairly heavily, but did not pay much attention to the main road, the northerly boundary of my Sector. Forward of this point the shell fire was localised on different positions, such as CAMBRIERES WOOD, which was very heavily shelled, but as a whole the fire could be avoided. Later in the day the enemy seemed to concentrate H.V.Batteries on forward roads, especially around the Tumulus & Hudson's Post, but the material damage to roads was very slight, owing to the fact that mostly grazing fuse was used. I found it a great advantage to have Company H.Q.with the Infantry B.H.Q.as runners were able to locate Company H.Q.with reports very quickly.

WAR DIARY.

NOTES on Enemy defences of LE VERGUIER (SHEET 62.C. N.E. L.33.34).
See Appendix No 29. for sketch.

The strong points and trench systems were originally constructed by the British Forces, but were largely elaborated by the Germans. The elaboration of these defences made the village a veritable stronghold and the defence system of this village may be taken as a typical illustration of the German method of the defence of a village, to withstand attack as organised at the present time.

The principal points of the German supplementary defences in this instance were .:-

- 1. A large number of Machine Gun outposts up to 500 yards in front of wire entanglements and large dumps of flares. Some of the Machine Gun Outposts were connected by telephone to the inner defence system
- ll. Use of large trees on permeter of wood at L.28.central as "Abatis" with machine gum positions a long same. These form a second line of Machine Gun Defences.
- 111. Trenches manned at frequent intervals with both light and heavy Machine Guns.
- 1V. Low wire obstacles in the grass in front of apron wire entanglements Anti tank defences.
 - 1. There were no artificial earthwork defences.
- 11. A light field gun battery was distributed on South and East sides of the village, the guns being protected by Machine Guns.
- 111. Road mines were laid at junction of roads on North of Village.

DUGOUTS .

There were a large number of dugouts, constructed in sunken roads and off trenches.

Two shafts for mining a series of dugouts were in process of construction, also a gallery was being constructed connecting up two strong posts in the heart of the village.

Notes made from reconnaissance of the village after the attack.

One field gun had not been used at all up to the time of capture No attemp was made to get the field guns away from the village, their main object being to stop tanks getting into the village by firing over open sights.

The trenches were apparently lightly manned by Infantry but work

contained numerous Machine Guns . The "Abatis" defence system, shown in position on map was useless.

The roads in the village were not badly damaged by German shell fire, apparently little howitzer artillery being used. The buildings protected the roads as the trajectory of shells used meant few direct hits on the roads themselves. The enemy was apparently firing for the two main village roads running S.E. as these were covered with building debris.

The quantity of shelters and dugouts in trenches generally suggest the enemy believed he was secure in the position.
