

	1/4th		Training was carried on, but was somewhat interfered with by inoculation. Training comprised Company and Platoon training, classes for Officers and N.C.O's. in General Subjects, and special classes were held for specialists.	
	5th		Three Officers chargers were obtained for Brigade Headquarters to replace casualties suffered at YPRES.	
	6th		Instructions received that Brigade is to leave this area on the 9th instant, and move up to sector of line North of River LYS. 3rd Australian Division will become part of 1st ANZAC CORPS. Conference of Brigadiers and Brigade Majors - C.R.E. and Divisional Staff was held FAUQUEMBERGUES. Divisional Commander outlined the works policy to be adopted in the new Sector, i.e. - (1) Improvement of existing defences. (2) Only such new work was to be undertaken as was absolutely necessary for safe defence of the line. (3) Drainage of trenches, duckboarding and building of shelters was to be pushed on with. Everything was to be done to make the men as dry and comfortable during the winter as possible. Our defence policy in the line was to be generally 'Quiescent', but would include raiding. Training continued. Preliminary instructions re move to line North of ARMENTIERES were issued. vide APPENDIX 129.

(1). With reference to the move forward, the following information is now available:-

- On 9th instant (a) The 9th Infantry Brigade Group (less first-line transport and 9th Field Company) will be moved by 'bus to the BERQUIN area.
 (b) First-line transport of 9th Brigade Group (less transport of 9th Field Coy.) will march to AIRE area.

- On 10th instant (a) First-line transport will march from AIRE area to join up with units in BERQUIN area.
 (b) 9th Field Company will join remainder of Brigade Group in BERQUIN area.

(2). (a). Under the above arrangements units will not have their cookers available on night 9/10th. The Staff Captain will arrange for extra-dixies to be available to units so that men may have a hot meal on night 9/10th.

(b). Absolutely no baggage of any kind (including Officers' valises) is to be taken in the busses. Motor-lorries will be provided for the transport of authorised baggage.

Baggage wagons from the Train Company (horsed vehicles) will move on 9th instant, but owing to heavy draughts moving slower than first-line transport animals, baggage wagons will move under orders of an Officer to be detailed by O.C. 869th Company A.S.C. and not with first-line transport.

(c). Owing to the fact that large numbers of troops will be moving during the next few days it is essential that the greatest accuracy and punctuality is observed in carrying out instructions.

(3)(a) The portion of line to be taken over by the Division extends from the River LYS to the DOUVE

- (b) It will be held by
 9th Brigade on right
 10th Brigade on left
 11th Brigade in reserve.

(2).

- (c) Total frontage is approximately 7,000 yards -
 9th Bde. frontage = 5,000 yds. approximately
 10th Bde. frontage = 2,000 yds. approximately.

(d) This Brigade on going into line will take over existing dispositions which are

1 Battalion in the line ("A" Battalion) on a four - Company frontage.

1 Battalion in close support ("B" Battalion)

2 Battalions in reserve ("C" and "D" Bns.)

(e) Brigade Headquarters when in the line will be at BRUNE GAYE.

Battalion Headquarters will be as follows:

"A" Battalion THE CONVENT

"B" Battalion PONT DE NIEPPE

"C" Battalion BREWERY, PONT DE NIEPPE

"D" Battalion LE ROSEIGNOL.

(f) On taking over line Battalions will be as follows:

"A" Battalion 36th Battalion

"B" Battalion 35th Battalion

"C" Battalion 34th Battalion

"D" Battalion 33rd Battalion.

(4) (a). It is expected that the Brigade will be in the line for approximately 32 days

(b). Inter-Battalion reliefs will, it is intended, take place every fourth day, so that each Battalion has two tours as "A", "B", "C" and "D" Battalions.

This arrangement is subject to alteration.

(5). The outline of the relief is as follows:

On 12th instant Advanced parties of "A" Battalion go into the line and remain in.

Night 13/14th "A" Battalion (less advanced parties) and "B" Battalion relieve "A" and "B" Battalions of the 23rd Infantry Brigade B.E.F.

During daylight 15th inst. "C" and "D" Battalions relieve "C" and "D" Battalions of 23rd Infantry Brigade.

Details of M.G. Coy. and T.M. Bty. reliefs are not yet known, but the said units must be prepared to go into the line on night 12/13th.

(6). Detailed instructions will be issued later.

WORKS POLICY.

The following instructions are issued to ensure a uniform system of work throughout the Brigade. They are based on the normal system of holding a defensive line. Any special method of holding a defensive which may become necessary will be met by a specially arranged works policy but

THE PRINCIPLES SET OUT BELOW WILL APPLY IN ALL CASES.

1. "A" and "B" Battalions will be responsible for all work in their Battalion areas, i.e. from and to and including both front and subsidiary lines between their respective right and left boundaries.

2. "C" and "D" Battalions will work in "A" and "B" Battalion areas as may be decided by Brigade Headquarters, but the responsibility for the amount and efficiency of the work done will be with O's O. "A" and "B" Battalions who will report direct to Brigade Headquarters re work done by "C" and "D" Battalions in their areas. This means that O's C. "A" and "B" Battalions will be absolutely responsible for their areas as regards work.

3. Technical assistance will be given by Sappers or Pioneers.

4. The immediate responsibility for all work lies with the Officer or N.C.O. in charge of a Company, Platoon or Section as the case may be, who definitely commands such Company Platoon or Section throughout its work. No responsibility lies with any Engineer or Pioneer personnel and they are never in charge of or to be considered as being in charge of any infantry working party. Engineers and Pioneers are allotted to infantry working parties purely to give technical advice.

5. All Officers and N.C.O's will reconnoitre work by daylight prior to taking their men on to the job. They must be able to guide their own parties at night and must have knowledge of the work to be done from their reconnaissance that should no Engineers or Pioneers be on the job, they can carry on with the work without delay.

6. During their reconnaissance (referred to in para. 5 above) officers and N.C.O's will take notes both of the particular work laid down for them and other portions where work is required to be done, i.e.: alternative positions for work (if

(if not previously allotted by higher authority) so that should it, for any reason, be impossible to work on the actual piece of work set down, the Officer or N.C.O. in charge can do the required number of hours work on some piece of trench etc where it is necessary; and not merely march his men home again.

To put the matter briefly the Officer or N.C.O. in charge of a working party is definitely responsible that his party work on the job allotted, or on some definite alternative job, for the number of hours specified. In the case of work on an alternative job the O.C. working party will on completion of work report in writing the place, number of hours worked and amount of work done, to the C.O. of "A" or "B" Battalion respectively.

7. Unless it has been impossible to reconnoitre the work by daylight, guides will not be furnished from outside sources but will be provided from the reconnoitring parties of the Platoons etc. concerned. This will be the normal way.

8. The position of R.E. and Brigade Dumps will be notified to units. After receipt of this notice all Officers and N.C.O.'s of Battalions will be held responsible for knowing the position on the ground of all R.E., Brigade and Battalion Dumps.

9. All Officers, N.C.O.'s and men must understand that all work in forward areas is a definite military operation and as such must be tackled and carried out in the same spirit and with the same pride as with any offensive operation.

In this respect also all Commanders of working parties must be prepared to suffer a certain number of casualties. This does not mean that normal precautions are not to be taken; but that all ranks must be prepared to suffer casualties in proportion to the urgency and importance of the work in hand.

NORMAL DISTRIBUTION OF WORK.

1. "A" and "B" Battalions.

- (a) Platoons in front and support lines will be responsible for the upkeep and improvements of their own sector of trench.
- (b) Company in subsidiary line will be responsible for the upkeep and improvement of C.T's between front and support lines.
- (c) If all Companies are in the front line system C.T's between front and support line will be looked after by the Companies in whose areas they are.

2. "C" and "D" Battalions.

"C" and "D" Battalions will work on:

1. Front line wiring
 2. Support line wiring
 3. C.T's between support and subsidiary lines
 4. All subsidiary line works including wiring.
- In addition Platoons of "C" and "D" Battalions will assist the Platoons of "A" and "B" Battalions on work allotted them, when necessary.

The distribution of "C" and "D" Battalions on the above work will be decided by Brigade Headquarters

(3).

CARRYING.

- (a). Carrying to "A" and "B" Battalions forward dumps will be done by "C" and "D" Battalions.
- (b). Carrying forward from "A" and "B" Battalion forward dumps will be done by front-line Companies of "A" and "B" Battalions.
- (c). If there are no forward "A" and "B" Battalion dumps "C" and "D" Battalions will carry right up to front line troops.

Commanding Officers will be held responsible that this policy and instructions contained therein are known at all future times by all officers and N.C.O's of their command.

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

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. None active generally - largely on back areas - but front line and communication trenches also subjected to fire. During the morning LONG AVENUE and DESPIERRE FARM, BUTCHERS SHOP in C.10.b. and UNA TRENCH - U.28.c. received a considerable number of 4.2 and 77cm. while on the left our front lines near SUGAR REFINERY - U.17.d. received a like treatment. Any damage caused was slight and has been practically made good.

In the afternoon and night large numbers of H.E. mixed gas shells fell

8-8.45 p.m. Close to MOTOR CAR CORNER, SURREY FARM and in C.8.d.

9.15 p.m.- 10 p.m. The same area and L.F. BIZET.

Trench Mortars. On the left from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. active shelling with Pineapples and I.T.M.'s, and in afternoon from 12.30 p.m. to 1 p.m. on AVEN CORNER in C.4.c.9.5. Very little damage was done and fire seemed rather erratic.

Twenty rounds also were fired on each of our Stokes positions in C. 28.d. and U.4.d.

Machine Guns. Fairly active during night with low swooping fire on our front line.

Rifle fire. Nil on the left, but in early morning sniping again from FRILINGHEN - position not yet accurately located.

Patrols. None encountered by our men.

Aircraft. Two captive balloons up all day S. of DULMONT and E.A. high on our lines, but quickly retired on appearance of our aeroplanes.

Movement. Working parties heard in trees in C.11.b. about 6 a.m., but generally speaking little activity noticed.

Artillery. Quieter than usual but more or less active during morning, the following being the chief features

6.30 a.m. 100 rds. of gas shell in C.15.a.
6 a.m. to 7 a.m. 50 rds. H.E. on UMA TRENCH and South of it in C.4.a. Some damage was done but has been repaired.
8.15 pm. to 8.45 pm. 45 rds of H.E. in rear of WHITE FARM and close to L.T.M. position in U.28.c.
10.30 pm. to 10.45 pm. Same area again shelled with H.E. and gas.
8 am - 1 pm. Intermittent shelling of dug-out in rear of SUGAR REFINERY, U.17.d. No material damage resulted.

Trench Mortars. From 8 p.m. till 1 a.m. about 20 Heavy Minenwerfer shells fell in rear of NOAT FARM in U.23.d., and 15 Light Minenwerfer shells in rear of BRICKFIELD, C.4.b., coming from direction of FREILINGEN.

Machine Guns. Quiet during day, but fairly active during night.

Snipers. Nil.

Patrols. None seen.

Miscellaneous. Enemy uncertain of our posts but apparently suspects one in rear of WHITE FARM. Work noticed going on near LAUNDRY in C.5.c. Road traffic was heard on the road to PONT ROUGE and appeared to stop at junction of road and railway at U.30.c. 2.7.

II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Occasional shelling of back areas during morning, about 12 8" shells fall in FREILINGEN at 6.30 a.m. but generally inactive.

Trench Mortars. At 8 p.m. we engaged a target at C.5.c.70.72 with 30 rounds but the effect was not observed.

Machine Guns. From C.9.b.82.03 we fired 1,000 rds on U.30.c.20.72 From C.15.b.10.05 q,000 rds on C.11.c.8.8.

Snipers. No targets.

Aircraft. Nothing special to report.

Patrols. On the left, area in U.23.d. and U.29.b. and the River was patrolled but signs of the enemy appeared.

A special patrol further examined the bridge at C.5.c. 28.40. Water was lower and there was found a double tram-line instead of a single one as reported yesterday. Bad state of repair. Some piles 5 ft out of the water, and battens connect same with tram-rails resting on battens. Traffic width about 6 ft. Plenty of floating timber on S. side.

Miscellaneous. Visibility poor through fog and mist; wind West to N.W. 3 m.p.h.

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. On the right up to 3 a.m. a few H.E. fell in the vicinity of C.M. central, but during the day practically no shelling took place. On the left during the morning 20 or 30 4.2 shells were fired on our front line in U.23.c. doing slight damage which was soon repaired.

Trench Mortars. A gun, apparently in the rear of WHITE DARM ~~222222222~~ and another from about X.11.a.80.30, fired bursts over our Right Company Headquarters on the Right Battalion front.

Snipers. Nil.

Patrols. None seen on the right. On the left at 1 p.m. during rather misty weather movement was noticed in old trench in U.29.a.9.5 and a party of 12 enemy was seen. On fire being opened on them they made off to hedges in U.23.d. and were last seen and fired on on the other side of the River in U.24.c. A party immediately scoured the ground but no trace of dead or wounded could be found. Further search was made during the night but no traces of enemy later movements were found.

II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. About 4 p.m. Howitzers and 18-pdrs. fired a number of rounds well to the South of FREILINGEN, and at 9.40 p.m. in response to our call 18-pdrs. fired 12 rounds on C.M.b.central.

Machine Guns. One gun fired 1,000 rounds on road junction in U.24.d.3.3 from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. One hundred rounds were fired on E.A. at 2.16 p.m. with satisfactory results. Targets were also engaged at C.3.a.05.50 and C.11.b.70.90.

Snipers. Nil.

Patrols. Patrols worked along the front and found no signs of the enemy, but one patrol on the right reported sounds of working and hammering of wood and iron in C.11.c.

Miscellaneous. Mist and fog prevented observation to any extent.

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. More active than usual. On the right at 8.40 a.m. 30 rounds 4.2 gas shells fell near MOTOR CAR CORNER immediately after hostile plane had been over. From 7.30 p.m. to 10 p.m. intermittent shelling with 77, H.E. and tear, coming from the direction of FLEMINGHEM. From 9.45 p.m. to 10 p.m. 90 to 100 gas shells fall close to MOTOR CAR CORNER.

On the left during the morning 400 to 500 shells - including 77, 4.2, 5.9 and gas shells - fell in the area U.29.a and U.29.c. from the direction of DEUDEMONT. Very little damage was done to the trenches. From 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. 120 4.2 and 5.9 shells from the same direction fell close to the SUGAR REFINERY. Between 10.45 p.m. and 11.5 p.m. our front line area in U.29.a. and c. was subjected to 200 to 250 77 and 4.2 mixed with gas shells.

Trench Mortars. From 6 a.m. to 8 a.m. 50 T.M. shells fell in the vicinity of IDA POST in U.29.c. and in U.29.a. but no material damage was done. Area round NAPOO AVENUE in C.10.b. was subjected to T.M. fire several times during the day, and 20 Heavy H.M. shells fell there between 7.30 p.m. and 8.45 p.m. but retaliation stopped further activity.

Machine Guns. On the right active for one hour about dusk but quiet afterwards.

Snipers. Nil.

Patrols. None seen.

Aircraft. Several E.A. flew over our lines during the morning, and two observation balloons were up.

Communications. At 5.30 p.m. ten rod rockets were fired opposite HOUPLES Sector but no apparent action resulted.

Sounds were heard as though of movement among the rushes on the other side of the river but nothing was seen of the enemy. Another patrol found the remains of a pontoon N.E. of PAPER HOUSE and one East of PLANTATION FARM, but both in dilapidated state.

Later on STATION REDOUBT, LONG AV. and NAPOO AV. were shelled with 25 rounds of 4.2, H.E. and gas shells. SUGAR REFINERY in U.17.d. again shelled with 4.2 and 77's. I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Special attention was paid by guns, firing from the direction of DEULEMONT, on the SUGAR REFINERY and our front line in U.29.b. and a. From 9.55 p.m. to 10.30 p.m. this sector was shelled with 77's but on retaliation being given matters became very quiet. WHITE FARM was intermittently shelled with 4.2 and H.E., and BARKENHAM AVENUE, STATION REDoubt and HORAKAU AVENUE and posts in C.10.central were shelled from the direction of FRELINGHIEN during the day; the trenches were slight knocked in but the damage has been repaired.

Trench Mortars. Ten H.T.M. shells fell about C.10.central and one more was located at C.11.c.55.55. From 9 o.m. to 9.39 p.m. 12 shells fell on our L.T.M. emplacement at U.28.b.9.7 No damage was caused.

Machine Guns. Active against our aircraft - one in particular at C.5.b.20.00 (DURIEZ FME) was also used during the night on our trenches.

Snipers. Nil.

Aircraft. Several aeroplanes were flying over their own lines and one higher up over our lines was fired on by our machine guns. Two observation balloons were noticed - one in rear of DEULEMONT and one in rear of WARNETON.

Patrols. No sign of enemy patrols.

Communications. At 5 p.m. red rockets were noticed as before opposite HOULINES but no definite resulting action was observed.

Works. Bailing of water from trench near DURIEZ FME at C.5.d.5.9.

Signalling. Flashes were seen on a bearing of 60° from our post at C.23.c.75.22. but no answering could be observed.

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II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Our How. and 18-pdr. Batteries retaliated upon Batteries near DEULEMONT and checked heavy shelling on our front in U.29.a. and also on the trench system in C.5.c.

Trench Mortars. Nil.

Machine Guns. Night firing carried out on the same targets as previously notified.

Snipers. Nil.

Patrols. Five patrols were sent out on the Right Battalion front. One examined disused trench running S.E. along hedge from C.4.d.90.35 to C.5.c.15.80 to C.5.c.30.55 and found it impassable. Ground in C.5.central and to East for 200 yards in good order and duck-boarded with British duckboards. Working parties were heard in trenches opposite WHITE FARM. Patrol which left our post in U.23.c.75.40 and worked towards MOAT FARM was subjected to systematic fire by machine guns from direction of PONT ROUGE but could see no enemy patrol. Machine gun fire played consistently in NO MAN'S LAND and harassed our patrol parties.

Aircraft. Three or four of our aircraft flew over enemy's lines using their magazines on the trenches.

Observation. A hundred yards of screen along the road at U.30.b.30.75.

Miscellaneous. Visibility fair but became bad. Wind W. to S.W., 16 m.p.h.

1. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. During the morning areas in C.7.a.5.d. and GRAND RABEQUE FME in C.8 central were subjected to shelling and D.12.c. also. Altogether about 100 rounds fell apparently searching for Battery positions. Light shelling of front line in U.28.d. and U.29.a.8.c. during the day, and about 8 p.m., for a few minutes, a rapid bombardment of our front line in U.29.a. Very little damage was done by all this shelling.

Trench Mortars. During the morning, PLANTATION FME again shelled and from 9 p.m. to midnight U.23.b. was fired on by Light Trench Mortars, but no damage was done.

Machino Guns. A gun close to BRIDGE HOUSE in C.11.a.5.s. fired several bursts over our lines in C.10.a.2.d. and one gun close to DURIEZ FME at C.5.d.33.95. was active from 5 p.m. to 7.30 p.m. H.G's located at C.11.a.55.15. firing in the direction of CROWN PRINCE FME.

Snipers. Nil.

Aircraft. No activity.

Communications. Flashlight signalling from North of DEULWOUT was observed at 6 p.m. 21st instant, but nothing definite was obtained.

Patrols. One party was seen by one of our patrols (see Patrol Report below).

Works. Sounds of hammering of iron and working generally heard in rear of WHITE FME.

2. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Active counter battery work by our howitzers and 18 pdrs. on area beyond DEULWOUT and in the direction of LES EGLISES, also from a "batter" on track loading from cross roads in D.7.a.5.1. to D.7.a.5.7.

French Mortars. Nil

Machino Guns. The usual targets were engaged at dusk and also Machino Gun position in VICART FME at U.24.a.15.98. A 1000 rounds were fired on the junction of the road and tramway in U.24.d.32.31.

Aircraft. Nothing to report.

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2. OUR OPERATIONS (Contd.).

Patrols. One scouting party on the left, making a reconnaissance in U.29.a., saw 2 enemy get out of an old C.T. and on trying to intercept them, saw another party about 20 strong making for the river. Patrol on the right reports no traces of enemy in No Man's Land. Posts soon to be established at C.11.a.88. and C.11.a.80.15. No Man's Land in good condition in vicinity of WHITE FUR, but becomes marshy and difficult near or the river.

Miscellaneous. The 35th and 39th Battalions were relieved by 33rd and 34th Battalions respectively, the former moving back to billets.

The relief passed off without any special incident.

SUMMARY OF INTELLIGENCE No 108
From 6 a.m. 22.11.17 to 6 a.m. 23.11.1917.

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. During the morning light shelling of trenches in the vicinity of LE BIZET STATION and again during the afternoon. Some 5.9 shells fall near LE BIZET all coming from the rear of FRELINGHIEN in C.11.b. and d.

On the left there was considerable activity from 77's and 10.5 c.m's, shells falling in U.29.a. and U.23.c. and d. From 8.5 p.m. to 8.20 p.m. 77 mm. shells also fall in U.23.a. from four guns firing quickly (about 10 rds. per minute) from the direction of DEULHONT. During the afternoon and night also 77's and 4.2's shelled fairly consistently near MOUTH and LONG AVENUES. Not very much damage resulted from any of the shelling but one post at U.23.c.75.30 was considerably knocked about.

Trench Mortars. About 8 a.m. Trench mortars fired on our front line from direction of LAUNDRY (probably No. 11 at C.5.d.c.6); and round BUTCHERS SHOP and HOREKAU AV. in C.10.c. and a. the trench were slightly damaged by T.M. fire from FRELINGHIEN. The latter was quickly silenced by our retaliatory fire. During the morning ten shells fell near U.23.c.7.1 but no damage was done.

Machine Guns. Bursts of fire at frequent intervals from guns at U.30.a.85.80 and C.5.b.10.10. Considerable activity against our planes from 9.30 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. from LAUNDRY WOOD and FRELINGHIEN. A gun in the latter place also enfiled CEDILLA TRENCH in C.10.b. and C.4.d.

Snipers. Nil.

Aircraft. Only one machine was noticed over our lines and was chased back by a Nieuport.

Works and Movement. A party of about 15 enemy was seen working at a trench from U.29.d.8.0. to U.29.d.8.8. and was dispersed by Lewis Gun fire. Hammering of iron was heard from the direction of DYE WORKS in C.11.c.5.7. - ceased immediately on 18-pdrs. being turned on. A party of three were seen to come out of SOAP HOUSE ruins at C.5.c.7.1. carrying something tied to a pole and disappeared into a small wood at C.5.8.0.

Patrols. None seen.

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II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Fairly active during the day, most of the shooting being to rear of enemy's line, but between 2 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. we effectively shelled a building - probably a Headquarters. Enemy lines were shelled by about 8 H.E. in U.29.d. at 2.30 pm and 40 rounds in U.3C.a. at 4 p.m. Retaliation on the Trench Mortar in FRELINGHIEN was very satisfactory.

Trench Mortars. Nil.

Machine Guns. Normal firing on cross-roads and tramtracks during the early part of the evening.

Snipers. Nil.

Aircraft. Six Nieuport machines flew over our lines on the right and over FRELINGHIEN about 9.30 a.m. and were heavily engaged by enemy machine guns but all returned safely.

Patrols. Report CROWN PRINCE FARM much knocked about. Enemy could be heard knocking in steel pickets at C.11.a.55.15. Sounds of trucks were distinctly heard on the tramway in the rear of LAUNDRY in C.5.d. and C.6.c. Reports about WHITE FARM bear out previous investigation. East of TWIN COTS in C.5.c. the ground is impassable with a large reedy swamp. A patrol also reports considerable transport heard on the FRELINGHIEN - LA HULETTE Road. A foot track was found running from the river bank at C.11.c.30.15 along the edge of the water towards C.10.d.75.45. No further movement was noticed in PONT ROUGE. No attempt has been made to rebuild the pontoon bridges near PAPER HOUSE in U.29.c.

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Our front line was shelled consistently during the day with shells of various calibres; not very much gas shell, the latter being used in considerable numbers in C.7.b. and d. and C.14.a. and b. From 10.30 a.m. to 11 a.m. 90 77 mm. shells fell in front line and vicinity and area from CARTER'S FARM to NAPOO AVENUE where the trenches were blown in slightly and will need repair. The same spot was again shelled with 50 - 60 4.2's and 77's from 2.15 p.m. to 2.45 p.m. The area East of MOTOR CAR CORNER was also shelled with 4.2's from about 10 p.m. to 1 a.m. All this fire was from direction of FRELINGHIEN. Guns from the direction of DEULEMONT put 110 rounds of the same calibres, H.E. and shrapnel on UNA SUPPORT and LONG AVENUE during the morning and early afternoon, but very little damage resulted. On the left during the morning H.E. and shrapnel fell in considerable numbers in U.29.a., and 30 rounds of 4.2's in salvos of three fell in U.23.c., and also gas shells - about 50 rounds.

Trench Mortars. Not nearly so active as earlier in the week.

Machine Guns. Guns from LAUNDRY and wood near it very active during the morning against our aircraft. In the afternoon quiet but at dusk livened up considerably especially along KIWI AV. in C.4.d. Patrols reported guns at BREWERE (C.17.a.15.75) and BRIDGE HOUSE (C.11.c.5.7) as fairly active during the night.

Snipers. Nil.

Patrols. No sign of any enemy in NO MAN'S LAND seen during this period.

Aircraft. Four E.A. patrolled in front of our lines for about an hour and a half in the morning and again in the afternoon. They were fired on by our machine guns and were driven back.

Work and Movements. Sounds of working, with galvanised iron being moved, in vicinity of DYE WORKS and BRIDGE HOUSE in C.11.c.

Working parties also heard close to LAUNDRY and SCREENED FARM.

II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Much more active than on previous day. Area round DEULEMONT and FRELINCHIEN was subjected to fairly heavy shelling. From 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. LAUNDRY received 26 rounds of 4.5 H.E. From 12 noon to 12.45 p.m. 50 rounds were fired on the DYE WORKS. Between 2 p.m. and 3 p.m. 4.5 Howitzers fired on trenches in rear of the BREWERY and were apparently successful for enemy retaliated on STATION REDOUBT and MOTOR CAR CORNER. Attention given to T.M's was evidently very effective as they were quiet all day.

Machine Guns. Engaged enemy aircraft on several occasions and also fired 1,000 rounds on DURIEZ FILE in C.5.b. at dusk and on tramtrack and road at C.11.d.50.80 in addition to targets previously indicated.

Snipers. No targets offered themselves.

Patrols. NO MAN'S LAND was patrolled very thoroughly along the whole front. Ground in C.10.d. found very wet and swampy. BRICKFIELD in C.4.b. drier, but machine gun fire fairly heavy.

Area East of CROWN PRINCE FARM a stretch of water about six inches deep preventing good patrol work near River German dugout at C.4.b. 8.6. was examined but nothing of interest found.

No system of trenches exists in the vicinity of PONT ROUGE on the North; the ground is open and not very much affected by shells.

Staging found at MOAT FARM showed no signs of recent use.

Miscellaneous. Visibility very fair during the day. At night the wind freshened and rose to 20 m. p. h.

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. During the morning on the left 80 - 100 rounds 4.2, shrapnel and gas shells fell in the trenches in U.22.d. an' U.22.b. but no damage resulted; and again from 9 p.m. to midnight about 100 rounds of similar shelling in the same area; otherwise not very active. Light shelling on the right in the vicinity of LE BIZET - PLOEGSTEERT ROAD. At night 100 rounds of 4.2 and 5.9 mixed with gas shells in the same area.

Trench Mortars. From 10 p.m. to 12 midnight 20 I.T.M. shells fell on the front line in U.22.a. and c. and U.22.d., coming from about U.22.b. 70.05. From 4 p.m. to 4.30 pm. 12 I.T.M. shells fell on the trenches in C.4.d. 80.40, coming from C.11.b. 80.50.

Machine Guns. Active from direct on of DOLLS HOUSE in U.24.c. 70.20. One gun from U.22.d. 50.30 swept our front line in U.22.a. for a couple of hours about dusk. Guns in DURIEZ FME. and LAUNDRY were active against our patrols.

Snipers. Four shots fired from a Post in FRILINGHIEN, but location not definitely fixed.

Aircraft. Six M.A., flying over our sector about 8 a.m., were driven off by our A.A. guns.

Communications. More Veroy lights were used than has been the case up to the present. During bombardment of sector on our right double red Veroy lights, followed by other red and green mingled, brought a vigorous reply to our shelling.

Patrols. No enemy patrols were seen.

Round POINT ROUGE, where enemy were reported previously, no trace whatever of enemy was found.

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II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. From 10 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. our Howitzers fired 20 rounds on enemy battery near DEUIL-MONT, and from 4.15 p.m. to 4.30 p.m. about 20 rounds on position in rear of C.5.b; also the rear lines of the enemy were shelled fairly consistently.

Machine Guns. The following targets were fired on from dusk for two or three hours:

Tramway from DURIEZ FME to C.5.d.9c.38.
Road from C.11.b.32.93 to C.12.a.10.60
Road from U.24.c.8c.55 to U.24.d.10.00

Snipers. Nil.

Aircraft. Ten Nieuports patrolled the enemy's lines flying high and were continuously fired on by A.A. guns in LAUNDRY WOOD and others in FRELINGHIEU.

Patrols. Ground in the vicinity of WHITE FARM appears to be drying up a little; the FARM itself is a mass of bricks and shell-holes which is also the case with POND HOUSE in C.10.d.95.95. The road running North East from C.4.d.4c.15 is very badly knocked about.

The bridge at C.5.a.38.52 was again examined but no signs of recent work or movement noticed there.

A special patrol of 1 Officer and 30 other ranks with Scout Officer and four Scouts left No. 3 Post in C.10.d. with the object of attacking and capturing any enemy patrols seen and inflict casualties. No enemy were seen and the ground is reported as being very difficult indeed for troops to negotiate especially near the River, with the exception of about 150 yards lying South West of DYE WORKS which is a little dryer.

Miscellaneous. Visibility fair; wind Westerly varying from 20-30 m.p.h.

SUMMARY OF INTELLIGENCE No. 111

From 6 a.m. 25.11.1917. to 6 a.m. 26.11.1917.

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Very moderate shelling during this period. - A little more active on the left than on the right. The area around MOTOR CAR CORNER was subjected to a few rounds during the day, but no damage was done. From FRELINGHIEN 4.2, shrapnel and H.E. fell along the road MOTOR CAR CORNER - PLOEGSTEERT evidently searching for Batteries.

On the left guns from DEULEMONT fired 20 - 30 rds of gas shells in quick succession in the early part of the evening in C.29.a. and later on the same area was shelled with H.E. and shrapnel.

Trench Mortars. Restricted to a few Pineapples on the front line in the vicinity of Post 9 in C.4.d.9.9 from THE LAUNDRY, and between Post 3 and Post 5 in C.10.b.

Machine Guns. The usual amount of traversing fire from the so from positions reported before. Apparently two guns - one at C.5.b.00.10 and the other at the North end of THE LAUNDRY - cover the old bridge positions close to WHITE FARM.

Snipers. One active between 4.30 p.m. and 5 p.m. from FRELINGHIEN on our No. 2 Post at CARTERS FARM.

Patrols. Nothing seen of any during this period.

Works and Movement. Patrols report signs of work as usual in the rear of DYE WORKS and traffic on the tramway route in the rear of that place. Also transport could be plainly heard on the FRELINGHIEN Road at 10.0 p.m. In the direction of DURIEZ FME what sounded like wiring parties at work was also heard.

II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Quiet during the day on the enemy front lines with occasional shelling of the back area. At 10.0 a.m. 18-pdrs. fired on the wood North of THE LAUNDRY and Howitzers shelled FRELINGHIEN Church with 50 rounds, and about 100 rounds on Battery positions South - East of it

Machine Guns. The usual targets were swept with fire during the night and also a trench running from DURIEZ FME to C.11.b.35.90 from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. The roads in FRELINGHIEN were also traversed thoroughly.

Snipers. Inactive.

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26.11.1917.

Aircraft. One of our aeroplanes was engaged in observation work from 3.15 p.m. to 3.45 p.m. but did not go over the lines.

Patrols. The whole front was patrolled regularly during the night and in addition special fighting patrols were sent out, in the vicinity of PONT ROUGE and on the right front covered by protecting parties, but were not called upon to engage any of the enemy. Investigation showed that at present on the right the only means of crossing other than pontoon which could be made possible is the bridge near WHITE FARM, and that would be difficult. In the vicinity of PONT ROUGE no evidence of recent presence of the enemy could be found.

Miscellaneous. Visibility fair during the day, but poor later on. Wind: West, to W.S.W. - 20 m.p.h.

From 6 a.m. ~~26~~ 16.11.17 to 6 a.m. 27.11.17.

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I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. During the day the trenches - front line and support - in C.4.b. and U.22.d. received considerable attention from 4.2 and 77 mm., and also our front line close to the BRICKFIELD. As usual, numbers of shrapnel and gas shells were fired in C.2.d., C.2.b. and in the vicinity of MOTOR CORNER. LONG AVENUE and MONMOUTH AVENUE in C.4.c. were subjected to shrapnel and H.A. fire about 12.30 p.m., but no damage was sustained.

On the left as usual the front line in U.29.a. and e. and U.23.b. were subjected to considerable shelling during the greater part of the night. VANCOUVER AVENUE and the trenches South of it in U.22.b. were also shelled fairly heavily from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Trench Mortars. Shells from Trench Mortars in the region of WICART FME in U.24.a. and U.30.b.e. fell round MOAT FARM in U.23.d., and GRANDE HAIE FME, about a dozen in each place.

Machine Guns. Normal fire during the night from guns at C.11.e.55.78 and C.17.e.20.75. LYS FARM was subjected to bursts of fire from one South of THE BREWERY; while at 11 a.m. one from the vicinity of THE LAUNDRY fired over our line at C.4.d.29.65 close to No. 8 Post.

Snipers. A few shots from the direction of FRELINGHIEN.

Aircraft. Four or five E.A. were over our lines during the morning but nothing of special note occurred in connection with them.

Communications. While one of our planes was over HOULINES at 4.15 p.m. the enemy fired two strings of yellow lights from FRELINGHIEN and A.A. guns immediately opened fire. At 4.30 p.m. opposite the Left Battalion front strings of blue and gold lights, varying in length and number, were sent up, but no definite action could be noticed.

Movement. At 3.30 p.m. a party of 12 enemy was seen moving in single file South of THE LAUNDRY. The party disappeared among the reeds on the river bank; it seems that a baton track has been worn at this spot between the trenches onto River bank.

The usual sounds of working could be heard in THE LAUNDRY.

Patrols. No signs of enemy patrols were observed.

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II. SUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. LAUNDRY WOOD and DURIEZ FME were shelled with good effect by 18-pdrs. about 9 a.m. A large building on the Northern edge of FRFLINGHÉEN (G.II.b.25.40) was bombarded at 10 a.m. and 5 direct hits were obtained.

Machine Guns. CEMETERY CRESCENT and the vicinity in C.11.d were traversed with fire from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. One thousand rounds each were fired on THE LAUNDRY, TURIEZ FME and roads in U.24.d. and U.30.b.

Patrols. The whole front was patrolled systematically during the night, special attention being paid to the vicinity of WHITE FARU, PONT ROUGE and the road from LE TOUQUET to FRELINGHIEN. No enemy were seen and no important changes to note, except that the ground North of the BRICKFIELD up to within 100 yards of the River can be patrolled freely and has dried up considerably.

From 6 a.m. 27.11.17 to 6 a.m. 28.11.1917.

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I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Between 3 a.m. and 9 a.m. the enemy shelled GUNTERS COTTAGE and F.L. in U.23 with 77's and 4.2's. He obtained two direct hits on F.L.

Forty rounds of 4.2 fell in front of UMPIRE AVENUE in U.28.a.

At 1 p.m. salvos of gas shells fell in U.27.a. From 8.30 p.m. to midnight U.26.a. was shelled with gas shells.

THE CONVENT and the vicinity were shelled very heavily with 4.2, H.E. and gas for ten minutes during the morning. Similar attention was paid to PIOTGSTEFRT Road near GASMEETER CORNER.

Between 2 p.m. and 3 p.m. enemy put 4.2 H.E. and shrapnel along the road past GUNTERS FARM and on SEVEN TREES AVENUE.

MOTOR CAR CORNER was shelled with about 100 rounds of 4.2.

Trench Mortars. L.T.M's fired on U.29.a.48.30 and U.29.a.24.30 between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m.

Six Pineapples were fired at C.10.b.30.22 at 11.15 a.m. from the direction of FRELINGHIEN.

Machine Guns. Very active between 4.30 p.m. and 5.15 p.m. firing long bursts over our parapet.

At periods between 12 noon and 3.45 p.m. the A.A.M.Gs were very active from FRELINGHIEN and THE LAUNDRY.

Snipers. There is a sniper in FRELINGHIEN who is not definitely located but who fires on the F.L. between Posts 2 and 3 in C.10.d.

Communications. At 10.15 p.m. pale green lights in strings of 2, 4, and 10 went up from DURIEZ FME. Immediately after an enemy plane dropped two white lights.

Movement. Smoke was seen rising from 7.17.2.34.60 at 9 a.m.

One man was seen entering DURIEZ FME and another entering a battered building at C.11.b.20.40.

Patrols. (See report of our own patrols).

II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Between 2.45 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. our Heavies engaged target in FRELINGHIEN. Our 18-pdrs. fired 14 rounds on targets in rear of PIAUL MONT.

There was frequent firing during the day.

Machine Guns. A thousand rounds were expended on the tramway from C.5.d.30.90 to C.5.d.90.30 and a similar amount on road from C.11.b.35.92 to C.12.t.60.45.

LAUNDRY (C.5.c.67.50), Road junction (U.24.d.32.31)

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and Road in U.30.b. were also fired on.

Snipers. Targets presented were at too long a range.

Communications. A trial S. & S. was sent up at 12.45 p.m. but received no response. The visibility was poor and the signal was indistinct at 1,000 yards.

Patrols. We patrolled ground along the River from LAUNDRY to WHITE FARM between 9 a.m. and 11 p.m. Did not see any enemy patrols.

The patrol which went forward to C.11.c.35.91 heard work and conversation going on in FRUIT GARDEN.

The patrol working between DYE WORKS and SOAP HOUSE reports three Machine Guns firing from C.11.c.47.05 and rifle shots from THE BREWERY.

Scouting parties working with our fighting patrols on Left Battalion front came into contact with party of enemy, about 12 in number, near PONT ROUGE. The enemy party had also been seen from Post close to River at about 7 p.m. On endeavouring to intercept the enemy, who replied to our L.G. and rifle fire with hand grenades, the party of our Scouts came under fire from our own lines. The enemy were soon going back to their own lines and were fired on by our left patrol, but succeeded in retreating. Our Scouts searched PONT ROUGE but found no trace of wounded enemy. Our casualties were 1 O/R wounded.

1. ENEMY OPERATIONS:

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Artillery: Between 1.45 p.m. and 3.12 p.m. enemy put 144 rounds H.E. and Gas on the road running along the South side of PLOEGSTEERT WOOD. This same road was again shelled between 4.30 a.m. and 5 a.m. 300 rounds of 4.2 were fired on F.L. from U.29.d.53.80 to U.23.d.20.85. Post No. 23 at U.23.d.20.85 was destroyed. GUNNERS FARM was shelled with 70 rounds 4.2s between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m.

MOTOR CAR CORNER and vicinity again received enemy fire, i.e. BIZET receiving over 200 rounds 4.2s between 4.15 and 5.30 p.m.

Trench Mortars: Enemy M.T.M. at U.29.d.53.14 shelled U.28.a. 83.55 between 10 a.m. and 11 a.m., and U.29.c.30.90 between 2 p.m. and 3.30 p.m., but no damage was done.

A heavy T.M. fired 16 rounds from a N.E. direction. Target about C.4.b.70.50. At 2.35 p.m. a L.T.M. fired into HUPLINES from the direction of FRELINGHIEN.

At 4.30 p.m. a L.T.M. fired 6 rounds in vicinity of C.10.b.82.22.

Machine Guns: Little activity reported. Two guns firing from the direction of the LAUNDRY towards F.L. in C.4.d.

Snipers: NIL.

Aircraft: A few enemy planes came over during the day apparently for observation or for artillery shoots.

Communication: Four pigeons flew from the direction of FRELINGHIEN towards ARMENTIERES at 11.34 a.m.

At 6 a.m. enemy fired from the direction of FRELINGHIEN a rocket breaking into a lot of silver lights. No result observed.

At 1 a.m. enemy fired from the River a green light, very low, past the tool house. No action followed.

The following message was read at 9.30 a.m.

Patrols: None detected.

II. OUR OPERATIONS:

Artillery: Between 1.30 p.m. and 2 p.m. our 18 pounders fired 40 rounds into FRELINGHIEN. They also fired onto the LAUNDRY.

Machine Guns: Cross roads C.11.b.35.90, Tramway Junction C.11.d.85.45, Road Junction C.11.c.80.80 and Road U.30.b. 30.75 - each received 1000 rounds.

1500 rounds were fired into LAUNDRY.

2000 rounds were expended on hostile planes.

Aircraft: One of our observation balloons broke loose and drifted away. Our A.A. Guns fired on it but did not hit it.

Patrols: A battle patrol went out along the N.E. side of road running through PONT ROUGE in order to cut off any enemy patrols that might be encountered. However no enemy were seen.

The River was also patrolled between PAPER HOUSE and PONT ROUGE, but no enemy were encountered.

The patrol working in the vicinity of WHITE FARM reports M.G. active in the LAUNDRY. This patrol reports two white lights bursting into two green sent up about 200 yards apart.

Another patrol reports six white and four green lights at 1.15 a. No resultant action observed in either case.

Men were again heard working in the LAUNDRY.

The brilliant moonlight made movements difficult.

From 6 a.m. 29.11.17 to 6 a.m. 30.11.17.

I. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Between 6 a.m. and 3 p.m. U.23. received 130 rounds 4.2 and 100 pounds 5.9. The enemy expended 52 rounds 4.2 H.E. in searching near LANCASTER COTTAGE between 6.30 a.m. and 8 a.m.

Our F.L. about U.29. received from the direction of FRELINGHIEN 130 rounds of 77, 4.2 and 5.9 but no damage is reported. Similar attention was paid to our F.L. in U.23. from the direction of WARFETON.

Gun or Howitzer flash seen at C.6.c.30.10.

Trench Mortars. Posts No. 11 - 12 were shelled by Light trench mortar in the LAUNDRY. About 30 rounds were expended. A large trench mortar (C.11.c.30.50) shelled the rear of Post No. 3 and also CEDILLA TRENCH, the latter at 1.30 p.m. and 4 p.m. L.T.H. (not located) fired S. of No. 5 Post at intervals during the day.

Machine Guns. Active from the direction of FRELINGHIEN during the early part of the night.

Snipers. Nil.

Aircraft. From 10.15 a.m. to 10.45 a.m. two planes were over our Loft Battalion area; they were driven off by A.A. fire.

Single planes reported passing over at intervals during the day.

Three enemy balloons were seen in the afternoon.

Communications. Red, white and green lights were fired at intervals during the night from behind POINT ROUGE and slightly South of there. Green lights predominated. No resultant action observed. A searchlight is reported about C.3. central.

Movement. At 7.30 a.m. and 7.50 a.m. a man was observed at C.5.d.33.82 walking up and down as if on sentry duty.

At 8.35 a.m. two men were seen passing the same place one carrying a bundle.

Party of about 15 seen between 8 a.m. and 8.30 a.m. seen on road at C.12.b.25.27 wearing steel helmets, equipment and rifles. This road is in frequent use. Working party (17 men) at C.5.d.35.35 with steel helmets, no equipment. This was 9.30 a.m. At 10 a.m. a party of 20 was seen and dispersed by our Artillery.

II. OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Our Heavies carried out a Counter-Battery Shoot and 18-pdrs. engaged targets in FRELINGHIEN and behind DEUTSCHFELD. The 4.5's fired on T.M. at C.11.c.30.50 in response to our call. T.M. ceased fire.

Machino Guns, Engaged enemy planes during the day.

Aircraft. Very active during the afternoon.

Patrols. From PONT ROUGE to our left bound arr a battle patrol reconnoitred but did not encounter the enemy. Patrols working N. of PAPER HOUSE report sounds of work about 11 a.m. immediately S. of DEJEGOUT.

Generally quiet.

Enemy occasionally bombed his own wire in the Southern part of the line. Enemy Machine Guns fired from LAUNDRY and BREWERY.
