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



APPENDIX I.OUR OPERATIONS:

Artillery: Throughout the day our 18 prs. and 4.5" How. shelled the enemy forward and back areas. H.W. positions, including those at 3.10.s.30.70, in 3.17.s. and 3.23.s., DUMP at 3.18.s.08.90, and TRAFAY in 3.12.s.. Results observed were good.

Trench Mortars: At 12.15 p.m. our 6" MTM fired from positions near PLAIN AVENUE. 6 rounds on supposed L.G. position at 2.10 p.m. 10 more rounds, and again 10 more at 3.45 p.m.

The L.T.M. at 1.5.2.35.45 fired 10 rounds on T.P.L. at 1.5.2.70.00 at 2.15 p.m., and 10 rounds on H.W. positions at 1.5.2.70.00 at 3 p.m.

Machine Guns: Normal programme of indirect firing on targets previously indicated, in all about 9,000 rounds were fired.

Snipers: Nothing special to report.

Aerial: Two of our planes were patrolling during the day, but nothing of special importance occurred.

Patrols: Six Patrols were sent out on both sub-sectors; those on the left report no signs of enemy could be seen, and very little activity noticed in trenches.

One on the right reports that CRATERS in front of M. SHROOGI in 1.11.s.30.35 show no signs of being used - contain a great deal of water.

Another reconnoitring patrol reports that on reaching about 3.29.s.75.15, five of the enemy, followed by 10 others, were soon moving towards our lines - Our patrol moved back, two L.G.s. opened fire on the enemy - results unknown.

ENEMY ACTIVITIES:

Artillery: Practically no hostile shelling on this front, with the exception of 25 rounds 77 mm in vicinity of Headquarters T.M.P. in 1.10.d.18.70 from WEZ MICQUART, probably in reply to our H.T.M. shoot at 2 p.m., and a few 10.5 cm from PVR WOHL'S ING. ARMEMENTS at 5 a.m.

TRENCH MORTARS: From 2 p.m. to 2.30 p.m. H.W. fired about 70 rounds in 1.4.d and 1.10.a. from positions in 1.11.a., but no material damage was done.

Machine Guns: Except for the firing referred to below (see MISCELLANEOUS), very quiet day during the period under review. At night fairly constant swooping of N.W.L. interfering with our patrolling.

Works and Monuments: Considerable amount of work round OTTAWA TRENCH from CENSOR FARM in 3.04.s. A party of about 30 at 8.30 a.m. and about 10 at 8.45 a.m. were dispersed by 18 prs, and again about 12 noon other parties were noticed there.

Miscellaneous: At 10.30 p.m. the enemy, apparently to celebrate NEW YEAR, started heavy bursts of M.G. fire. The firing on right seemed high, but on the left the C.Ts. were sprinkled bullets.

This was accompanied by showers of PI AND S, S IN HANDLE GRENADES, into our wire, across wire, and even behind our front line, and VERN LIGHTS of all colours. This lasted till about 11.10 p.m. when a voice called out three times from enemy F.L. "HAPPY NEW YEAR, AUSTRALIA".



TRAINING.

It is possible that the present period of training may be slightly less prolonged than was thought at first. With this in view, every effort is to be made to push on with training and organisation in order to make every Battalion, Company and Platoon within the Brigade an efficient fighting unit.

Particular stress is to be laid on the necessity for the most rigid discipline, in which correction the effect of a certain amount of ceremonial drill cannot be over-estimated. Weather conditions must be taken into consideration and men must not be kept standing in one place for longer periods than absolutely necessary and essential to the work in hand. Rifle exercises can be interspersed to advantage with foot drill and other training.

Unit weekly Training Programmes will be submitted to Brigade Headquarters by 6 p.m. each Saturday in DUPLICATE.

The points as set out hereunder, which were brought forward at the C.O's conference held on the 4th instant, are to form the subject of the particular attention of all Officers concerned.

1. Calling to attention of parties by the senior present - C.O's to take disciplinary action where necessary; "turn-out" to be neat, uniform and clean; efforts to be made to discourage men from walking about in a slovenly manner with hands in pockets.
2. Color patches to be worn invariably; belts to be worn when walking out.
3. Platoon Commanders to display the keenest interest in their men.
4. Significance of flags on cars and arm-bands to be explained to all ranks; saluting.
5. (a) Cleanliness of billets and person to be insisted upon (b) Cleanliness of shelters, dugouts and rifles.
6. The question of pooling the Brigade transport is under discussion.
7. When in line, the Intelligence Officer of the D Battalion will probably be attached to Brigade Headquarters for instruction.
8. Forty specially-selected tradesmen per Battalion to be earmarked against the possibility of the Brigade being called upon to furnish a Company for special work under R.E., such as the construction of gun-pits. These details to be organised on paper - occasionally in practice, so that when word comes from Brigade H.Q. "Send Pioneer Battalion", the organisation of the Battalion concerned will not be affected.

SUBJECT: TRAINING - COMMUNICATION PERSONNEL.

The training of communication personnel will in future be carried out in accordance with the terms of this letter, the authority being Australian Corps General Staff Circular No. 1, dated 4th January 1918, and O.E. 1926.

1. The great importance of communication within Infantry Brigades and Battalions has again been emphasised in the recent operations, but the results obtained point to the fact that in some cases inadequate attention has been paid by units to the organisation and training of the signal personnel at their disposal.

2. (a) It is hoped that in future the A.I.F. Depots in England will be able to meet requirements in trained signal personnel for infantry. Signal training in France will therefore be devoted entirely to the training of instructors and to the maintenance and improvement of the standard of signalling throughout units.

(b) To ensure the best results, however, it is essential that the Officers and N.C.O's sent Home from units in the field for the tour of duty as instructors at these Depots should be very carefully selected and only those who are likely to make good instructors should be sent.

(c) It is doubtful, however, whether sufficient Regimental signalling Officers can be provided from Home, and arrangements have been made by the Brigade for the elementary signal training of signal personnel at the Brigade School. On completion of course at the Brigade Signal School candidates will be able to pass easily the entrance tests for the Instructors classes at Army and Corps Signal Schools if required. They should, however, be used as instructors prior to attending an Army or Corps Signal School. There will always be a second officer in each unit under training to replace the Signal Officer when required.

(d) To obtain the best possible standard of signalling in units it is essential that the Regimental Signalling Officer, after being trained at an Instructors course, should fill the position for as long a period as possible and not be transferred to another appointment if it can be avoided.

3. The principle on which signal training will be conducted in France is to train at Army and Corps Schools Battalion Signal Officers and N.C.O's as Instructors and Assistant Instructors. These Officers and N.C.O's will then carry on the training of the signallers in their units and at the Brigade Signal School which it is hoped will be permanent.

4. (a) The number of signallers to be maintained by a Battalion and to be employed exclusively on signalling duties, will be 1 Officer and 57 other ranks distributed as follows:-

6 Includes 6 signallers specially trained in power buzzer - amplifier work who will normally form a Brigade pool at the disposal of the Brigadier.

(b) The 6 signallers per Battalion, specially trained in power buzzer - amplifier work, normally to form a Brigade pool at the disposal of the Brigadier will be in addition to the two squads of three signallers each permanently attached to each Brigade Signal Section under A.I.F. Order 574 of 7.7.1917, but they will include the 1 signallers per Battalion, earmarked as a reserve for these squads.

5. (a) To keep up the standard of signalling it is considered that 2 Officers and 12 N.C.O's per Battalion should do a six weeks' course at an Army or Corps Signal School each year.

(b) Students before being sent to one of these Courses should be able to pass the following tests:-

(i) To read a classification message:-

- (a) on a buzzer at 2 words a minute.
- (b) on the flag at 3 words a minute.
- (c) on the lamp at 4 words a minute.

(ii) To read a half message on the disc at four words a minute.

(iii) To show a sound knowledge of map reading.

(iv) To be able to ride a bicycle.

The percentage of accuracy required in the reading tests above will be 95 on the aggregate, and not less than 93 per cent in each case.

The training of Signal personnel is being carried out in accordance with the terms of the instructions forwarded under the above quoted letter.

A Brigade Signalling Class has been established. The first Course assembled on 8th instant, and will disperse probably during the first week of February. For this School each Battalion has detailed a Signalling Officer and an understudy Officer as well as 9 selected N.C.O.'s and men; The Machine Gun Coy has detailed 1 officer and 5 other ranks; and the Light Trench Mortar Battery 1 officer and 3 other ranks.

This Course is being carried out with the primary object of providing instructors for units and at the same time in order to ensure a uniform system of instruction and method of working within the Brigade in so far as Signal communication is concerned. Nominations for attendance at Army and Corps Signal Schools will be made from Officers and N.C.O.'s who have undergone instruction at the Brigade Signal School.

It is intended that ultimately each Battalion will have continuously 9 qualified instructors in Signalling to be allotted as follows :-

- 1 to Battalion Headquarters
- 2 to each Company.

By this means Battalions will always have at their own disposal instructional personnel sufficiently qualified to ensure that every opportunity is seized when the Battalion is out of the line to run refresher courses for all Battalion Signallers.





SECTION I. INFORMATION.

- (a). The Australian Corps front extends from the River LYS on the South to HOLLEBEKE on the North, a trench length of approximately 13,000 yards.
- (b). The Corps Area is subdivided into Right and Left forward Divisional Areas and a support Divisional Area (vide Map 1).
- (c). Each of the two Forward Divisions has two Brigades in the line with one Brigade in Reserve.
- (d). The Third Australian Division is the Support Division and has one Brigade quartered in each of the following Areas:
NEUVE EGLISE
LOCRE
METEREN.
- (e). The 9th Australian Infantry Brigade is quartered in the METEREN Area and is known as the METEREN BRIGADE. (vide Map 1).

SECTION II. GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE CORPS AREA.

- (a) The main features of the Corps Area are:
 - (i) The MESSINES-WITSCHAETE RIDGE in the Northern forward area, with its four spurs sloping gradually Eastward. Those spurs are the:
HOLLEBEKE
COSTTAVERNE
WAMBEKE and
GAPAARD SPURS,
all of which are flanked by BEEKS which ultimately run into the LYS River.
 - (ii) The East and West ridge of hills, of which KEMMEL is the principal height, and NEUVE EGLISE is a Southern spur.
 - (iii) The LYS, which together with the defended town of ARMENTIERES, lies on the right front and flank respectively of the Corps Sector.

(b) The area held by the Right Division is, with the exception of HILL 63, level and low-lying, the principal features being HILL 63, PLOEGSTEERT WOOD and the River LYS.

The area held by the Left Division is virtually the battlefield of the MESSINES offensive, and is in process of being developed. This area is marked by distinct tactical features, and has great defensive qualities in the shape of command and observation.

SECTION III. PRINCIPLE OF DEFENSIVE PREPARATIONS.

The principle governing defensive preparations aims at a disposition in depth of both troops and defences by the construction of:

- (i) A Forward Zone
- (ii) A Second Zone
- (iii) A Third Zone.

Each Zone will be organised in depth in three systems - Firing line, Support and Reserve Systems. Troops will be distributed accordingly.

SECTION IV. PRINCIPLES GOVERNING EMPLOYMENT OF SUPPORT DIVISION.

(a). The Support Division may be employed in three ways, as follows:

- (i) Offensively, either to counter-attack and regain losses, or to follow up any successes against the enemy.
- (ii) In the event of a sudden overwhelming of the Forward Zone the Support Division may be employed to aid in the defence of the Second Zone.
- (iii) In case of an attack by the enemy which may deny the opportunity of employing the Division in defence of either the Forward or Second Zones, it may be employed to hold the Third Zone. This Zone has been subdivided and marked in 8 Battalion areas, the limits of which are shown in Map 8. This Map gives the allotment of Battalion areas to the two Forward Brigades of the Support Division. It is not intended to divide the Southern portion of the Third Zone with Battalion areas, nor to occupy it. When so ordered those 8 Battalion areas will be occupied by the two Brigades of the Support Division quartered in the NEUVE EGLISE and LOORE Areas.

(b). The co-operation of Artillery is arranged so as to further the rôle of the Support Division.

SECTION V.

ACTION IN CASE OF ATTACK.

(a). In order to give effect to the foregoing, in the event of attack on the Corps front, the Support Division will, when ordered, be assembled and moved to positions of readiness in rear of the Third Zone. Those positions of readiness for the units of the two Forward Brigades are shown on Map 8. The action of the third Brigade is defined below.

(b). Nuclear Garrisons, furnished by the two Forward Brigades, for selected Machine Gun positions in the Third Zone, have been detailed so that they may, in case of need, be rapidly despatched to their posts. The list of those Machine Gun Positions is shown in Appendix "A".

(c). In the event of attack the Third or METZEREN Brigade will be assembled and moved in accordance with the attached March Table (Appendix "B") to the billets vacated by the LOORE Brigade, which by that time would have moved forward. All units of the Brigade will assemble on parade grounds on the order from Brigade Headquarters "METZEREN BRIGADE assembles at (time) ... which will be delivered to units by Special D. R. ..."

SECTION VI.

MEASURES FOR DEFENCE.

(a). Commanders and a proportion of other Officers of all units of the Brigade must reconnoitre the positions to which their Commands may have to move, and the best means of approach. They must also acquaint themselves with the areas over which they might have to fight.

(b). All units of the METZEREN BRIGADE will prepare and keep up to date short Defence Schemes, including March and Time Tables in accordance with Appendix "B". These will be handed over when the Brigade is relieved.

(c). Subsequent to arrival in the LOORE Area the action of the Brigade will depend upon the situation.

(d). In the case of defensive action on either the Second or Third Zones the Headquarters of the Division and Infantry Brigades, until changes are ordered, will be as follows:


