





COPY OF DIARY OF CAPTAIN S. P GOODSELL.

Commanding "C" Coy. I8th Battalion, A.l. F., 21st. to 30th August 1915 inclusive.

Sat. 21st. Aug. 1915.

Ordered to take up left portion of trenches and flankfof Bo Cop Hill while Artillery bombardment and attack was made on Hill "W" and Turkish position in that direction. Attack commenced about 2 p.m. Battalion not required and "C" Coy. ordered back after bombardment ceased into small gully in rear previously occupied by N.Z.M.R. Regiment where we stayed until midnight. Regiment left at midnight, destination unknown. Said to be moving out to the left. After moving about an hour Capt. McKean of "A" Coy., 2nd. in command who was marching in rear of "A" Coy, and immediately in front of me, suddenly turned and reported that he had been cut off with two stretcher bearers from his Coy. As firing was going onmall around us I ordered the men to lie down and dig themselves in as it was pitch dark and you could not see any distance. I sent out an advance party under C.S.M. Webb, and patrol to right and left to see if they could pick up the other Coy. at the same time sending a message to the rear to Major McDonald and Major McPherson. Received message from Major McPherson not to move. He had been cut off and was trying to get in touch with me. Ten minutes later C.S.M. Webb reported good cover from fire just in front and advised me to move forward to it being a matter of only 300 or 400 yrds t Decided to move to cover patrol still out. Just as we reached it, Capy. Hinton came along looking for us. Patrols called in. We again moved. forward and were led into S.W.B. Gully and told to lie down and make ourselves comfortable, that we were in reserve and would probably not be required, (by the guide). I was awakened some time after, it was still dark. I do not know the time and ordered to assemble my men at once. Officers commanding Coy's were then called up. "C" Coy. were the only ones in S.W.B. Gully. "D" Coy. were further back, "A" Coy. in one of the other gullies. I don't know where "B" Coy. was, but all Coy. commanders were present at the conference. Bgde. Major Pooles read operation order and explained map. He gave each Coy. commander one, also Colonel Chapman. Five were distributed. This was done by the light of a candle. The order read that we were to attack with bayonet and hombs only. Col. Chapman explained that we had no bombs and the Brigade Major told him he would have to do the best he could. The Brig. Major then said that as it was commencing to get light, by the time we reached the position it would be light enough for us to see things for ourselves. He led the way accompanied by Col. Chapman who ordered me to come up with him. (The Pioneers and Signallers being between them and my Coy.) I moved up and we were led along to the Western side of Hill 60, through tremshes, under cover as much as possible in a Northerly direction. As we passed from covered road across Indian trenches on to open ground e were ordered to halt, two of my leading Platoons being then in the open, the remainder still in the manaxement covered road. Major Pooles explained that our line of attack would commence from where we were and that it would be in an Easterly direction and at right angles to our present line of advance and that as it was now getting light we would be under fire where we stood. The hill could now be clearly seen and our objective was pointed out, being the top of the Hill., strict instructions being given by the Brigade Major that we were not to overrun the crest of the hill under any circumstances. I was then ordered by Col. Chapman to lead the charge in the attack with "C" Coy. I immediately sent for my 2nd. in command, Capt. Morris, ordered bayonets to be fixed and magazines to be charged, NO. 1 and 2 Platoons to extend to the left and lie down, No. 3 and & to form 2nd line in support. I gave Captain Morris the first line and remained with the supports, as there appeared to be a lot of crowding and the line did not move off to the Commanding Officers I

hurried forward and assumed control of the first line, handing over the supports to Lieut. Leslie, my nearest officer. As I arrived in line with the firing line I noticed the broken earth of trenches in my immediate front. I immediately gave the order to charge, leading the way into the Turkish trench out of which a number of Turks were seen retiring. As we moved forward we were met with a perfect hail of rigle and machine-gun fire which caused a large number of casualties. A number of Turks were still in the trench when we arrived and who were endeavouring to get out to retire which was rather difficult as the trench had a parapet on both sides too high to surmount in a hurry except in one place where the parapet was lower. This spot was evidently meant for exit as the Turks were attempting to leave at this spot and where 5 or 6 of them were either bayoneted or shot by our men entering the trench. A number of others were also shot by our men retiring towards their other trenches included in which was one who appeared to be a German Officer. Immediately we arrived in the trenches it was (explained) infiladed by machine gum fire from a Northerly direction, and bombed from the Eastern Turkish trench on the left. Casualties were then something awful and prevented any further advance. The Turks could be seen strongly entrenched on our left front and also directly in front. I called up reinforcements and endeavoured to alter the trench to make it safe being fairly successful in this respect at the same time sending a message to the E.O. of my instructions and observations. I received in reply instructions to "hold on to the trench I was in possession of and further attack would be made on the left flank." Later, an attack was made on the left flank in charge of Major Lane and men were literally mown down by machine gun fire as they went towards the Turkish trench in which a number of their men were able to get .. A little later they were seen retiring when they again met with disaster from what appeared to be several machine guns posted on their left flank. Further reinforecements having come to my assistance I had them extended to the right along the trench I already occupied until we came in touch with a small party of the Hampshire Regiment which were on the left of the left of the N.Z. Regiment on our right. This party evacuated the trench shortly after our arrival as an order apparently coming from nowhere was passed along to our men to retire. A number of my men taking the order to be authentic started to obey and were prevented by me from so doing as from one portion of the trench we could hold the Turks in check by a cross fire which prevented them from re-entering their trench after throwing a number of bombs. This they tried several times and were checked by this rifle fire. As we were now in touch with the N.Z. Regiment, a number of bombs were passed along which we soon learned to use although no one had any previous experience of these things. Four men soon got to work on their end of the trench running in an Easterly direction and gave the Turks bomb for bomb and one or two extra to go on with. I must say that our lads were something to be proud of and no praise of their gallantry is too good for them. Later on they were discovered that they had Splendad comrades in the N.Z. Reguments, members of both any officer would be proud to lead. I was assisted in the defence of this portion of the trench by Capt. Morris who was with me from the beginning and who had a most trying time, also Lieut. Roberts and Lieut. Pritchard who arrived later with reinforcements. We were sadly in need of water. In nearly every case it had run out and the heat was terrific. We recenved a small supply at night but not enough to go around and had to endure the thirst until about midday next day. The Turks made several attempts to bomb and retake the trench on the left but did not succeed. Colonel Chapman visited the trench late at night, about 9 p.m.; said that they were making a sap to connect up to us. I went out and arranged for water and returned to the trench the knuckles of my right hand being burnt by Bombs exploding near the trench.

Monday, 23rd. The Sihks connected up their firing trench with ours. August, 4 6.m. They were delighted to be allowed to throw bombs for us and it relieved our men for half-an-hour. "eceived word that we were to be relieved. We were all knocked up as it was not possible to get sleep at all, having to be constantly on the look-out for bombs from which we had no protection.

9.30 p.m. Relieved by N.Z. Regiment. As we passed out of trench I was instructed to report to General Russell at earliest opportunity by Major White. I returned to S.W.B. Gully and reported to Col. Chapman. I then endeavoured to find General Russell's Headquarters, but was not successful and as I was really knocked up I returned to the bivouac and turned in.

11 p.m. Reported full particulars of casualties.

Tuesday, 24th. Had hand dressed. Aug. 7.30 a.m. Found General Russell's Headquarters and reported to the General. He asked me if I had had breakfast and as I had not, told me to go back and have it and also have a rest until the afternoon as I had done quite enough and he dod not want me so urgently as that.

General Russell called at the bivouac and said if I 4 p. m. would come along then he could talk and have afternoon tea. I was asked to "Tell me all about it" which I did as best I could at the time. I was very hazy about things at that time and could not appear to think or consentrate my mind. Things have appeared a little clearer since. I was asked how I would like to make another attempt to take the remaining trenches. I said I would like to have a chance to re-organize my Coy. before doing so as my casualties out of 205 all ranks had been 21 killed, 87 wounded and 41 missing, a total of149. He said an attack was predemitated for the following day but it was subsequently postponed. Speht the day resting. Reinforcements taken on strength.

Resting. Promotions recommended. Wrote home. Thursday Additional casualties reported. 26th. Aug.

Further attack on "Hill 60"

Major Lane, 2 officers, IOO men, 3rd Line. Self , 2 " , 100 " , Supports. Orders read to all concerned by Major White in charge of operations. Major McDonald, Major Lane and self present at Brigade Headquarters. Moved out at 4.30 p.m., entered communication trench and moved up to N.Z. Trench in rear of men already in trenches. The Staff Officer at head of sap gave instructions to reinforce at once. I passed an order to advance axxees in two lines of Platoons in single line. Mr Pritchard with first line, and Mr Blackett with second. I then led the way. We were assisted over the parapet of the trench by the N.Z. Regiment and dashed across open ground in N.E. direction under an awful fire, machine gun, rifle and shell. Men dropped like flies. Mr Pritchard was hit just after leaving the trench. I carried a rifle and bayonet which I picked up in N.Z. trench. The fore-end was blown completely off in my hand leaving the barrely bare and bent. I had to discard it and pick up another from one of our dead as we passed. We charged towards a short Turkish trench a little advanced from their long communication trench which was our object. When we arrived at the former I I found that I had only about 20 men left. The 2nd Platoon had not apparently followed out instructions or else had become diverted elsewhere. The remainder of the leading platoon had become casualties. Fortunately

when we entered the trench we found nothing but dead and wounded Turks lying in it heaped along about three deep as if in addition to those that had been killed in the trench apparently a number had been carried from some other portion, and placed there out of the way. Shrapnel was falling everywhere including in the trench and smashing up the bodies in a frightful way and causing a number of casualties to my party. We endeavoured to put up overhead shelter with long-handled shovels and rifles of Turks covered by their rolled great coats and equipment to save us from the splinters. I carried a Red Signal pennant which was to be hoisted on the left of our position. I hoisted it on a bayonet fixed to a rifle on the end of the trench to see if it would have any effect on artillery fire, keeping as far as possible from it, but it had not been there three or four minutes before it and the bayonet were blowm completely off the rifle. As our position was becoming untenable (and a number of my men being hit in the trench) I decided to again face the open and attempt to get to the next trench running north and south, my casualties in the trench having been replaced by men who had worked their way up. I lost about 8 men getting across, arriving with about 12 men in the next trench which was unoccupied by Turks. I pushed along to the right and found a N.Z. officer with 3 or 4 men. I arranged with him to try and see what was on our right while I had the extreme left of the trench (which ran out on a slope being used as an entrance by the Turks) barricaded, using any tools we could find in addition to a few brought along by the men, also sand bags three each of which werexpressized each of the men were provided. We had to deepen the trench considerably as it was very shallow. The shell fire prevented us from practically doing anything for time until it ceased. We found a sap leading back in a W direction towards the trench we had just left. The communication was not complete. I set a working party on to this latter and completed the communication and converted it into a fire trench facing our left flank. The Turks were entrenched further down the hill and firing on the end of our front trench trying to prevent us from putting up barricades, bombs being freely used on both sides. Word was brought along that the right of our front trench was filled up with wounded men, our own and a large number of Turks, and that Major Lane and a N.Z. Officer had just been killed 30 or 40 yards to the right by a shell. Reinforcements commenced to come up about dark making up connection with right to the N. Z. Regts. Lieut. O'Donnell appeared with the Reinforcements and I sent him back to clear up the Turks Trench in rear, (of the of the dead bodies) and put it into a state of defence, as I was afraid the Turks on the Northern side might attempt to retake it which they did try to do but without success not half-an-hour later. A number of attacks on us were made in the night in an endeavour to retake the trenches but owing to a plentiful supply of bombs and reinforcements we succeeded in repelling all such attempts. We were visited by Gen. Russell and Major White who passed very complimentary remarks on our success. About 25 or 30 Turks were compelled to vacate a trench onhour left real (which was causing us a lot of trouble) about 9 p. m. and were cut to pieces by our rifle fire and bombs. We saw them coming and waited our time. I am positive not a man escaped. We were really uncertain at first as to them being Turks thinking they might be Sihks and therefore reserved our fire till the last minute. I had Major Lane's body placed over the back parapet of the trench as I found men using him as a barricade on the front trench. Someone had already taken his valuables from him and I understand they were handed in later to the C. O. of the Regt.

Saturday Still 1 28th. Aug. bombs.

Still holding trench, very busy all night and day with bombs. Completely worn out. Fumes of lyddite and bombs very sickening. Shrapnel flying everywhere. Relieved by Capt. Fitzgerald at 6 p.m. with 25 men. Could only find 15 men of 18th. Battalion. Left balance



LOCAL NEWS

ATTACK ON KNOLL 60, 27th, 28th, 29th. AUGUST.

September 3rd. 1915.

During the action of 21st. August a footing had been gained on Knoll 60 north of KAIAJIK AGHALA but the Knoll itself had not been captured. The capture of the Hill was entrusted to Major-General Cox. The bombardment commenced at 4-Op.m. and was continued until 5-0 p.m. at which hour the assault was delivered. on the right by 350 rifles from the 4th. and 5th. Australian Brigades, in the centre by 400 rifles of the New Zealand Mounted Riflesand 5th. Australian Brigade, and on the leftandxenxkke by 250 rifles of the 5th. Bn. Connaught Rangers. The attack instantly drew a heavy fire of enemy's shrapnel, machine gurs and rifles, followed shortly afterwards by heavy shell on the Knoll and shrapmel all over the position, including trenches -till occupied by the Turks. The Connaught Rangers shewing brilliant dash in attack, reached their objective and commenced a gallant fight along the communication trench. column was, however, checked by machine gun fire, and for some time could make no headway. In the centre the New Zealanders with splendid dash, carried the cross communication trench but were held up before reaching the top of the Knoll, and confused fighting continued till 9-30 p.m. by which time about ninetenths of the objective had been taken. It was arranged to mut fresh troops in to capture the remainder of the Hill at midnight. Before this could be done however, the Connaught Rangers were bombed out of their position, and the 9th. Australian Light Horsewho attempted to retake it at 3-45 a. m. were unable to do so. During the 28th. the day was spent in consolidating gains and making communication trenches from the original line and preparations were made to take the remainder of the Knoll on the night of 28th.-29th. At one O'clock on the morning of the 29th. the 10th. KightxHoram Australian Light Horse, carried the trench on the top and retained it, and the Knoll passed into our possession. The position has been consolidated, and a good view is now obtained over the valley to the North. This gallant action adds 400 acres more of Turkish territory to the country occupied by ANZAC. The fighting during these operations was almost entirely hand-to-hand and of a very severe nature. The brunt of the fighting was borne by the Indian Brigade, the New Zealanda Mounted Rifles, the 5th. Battalion Connadght Rangers, the 4th. Battalion South Wales Borderers, the 13th. and 14th. Battalions of the 4th. Australian Infantry Brigade and the 18th. Battalion of the 5th. Australian Brigade. The 9th. and 10th. Australian Light Horse Regimentswere also engaged and took a conspicuous part in the final assualt, the posts of honour in the line of Turkish trenches which we eventually heldbeing occupied by the New Zealand Mounted Mifle Brigade and the 10th. Australian Light Horse supported by a mixed detachment of the 4th. Australian Infantry Brigade. The casualties in this force amounted to about 1,000 of all ranks but very heavy loss was inflicted on the Turks, not only in the desparate hand-to-hand fighting in the tronches but also from the artil ery bombardment. Three machine guns, two of which were used at once against the Turks, and 46 prisoners were taken, as well as three trench mortars 300 Turkish Rifles, 60,000 rounds of small arm ammunition and 500 bombs. Judging by the heaps of Turkish dead in the trenches, and observation from the KAIAJIK DERE trenches, which command the Turkish line of retreat, and owing to our artillery getting at the Turks during the retreat, it is estimated that the Turkish

losses must have been at least 5,000.
