appx. 112.SECTION 1.BOUNDARIES AND DISTRIBUTION OF TROOPS.BOUNDARIES:

1. Southern Bde. Boundary: E. and W. line through W 26 d 0 6.
- Northern Bde. Boundary: E. and W. line through W 15 e 6 0.
- Inter-Bn. Boundary: W 21 e 6 0 - W 20 e 35 00, along road to W 19 d 6 4.

DISTRIBUTION OF TROOPS:

2. (a) The forward system is held by two battalions, 'A' Bn. on Right, 'B' Bn on the left. 'A' Battalion has 3 Coys. in the line, and 1 Coy. in reserve in W 25 b 2 7 - W 19 d 7 3.

'B' Bn. has 2 Coys. in the line W 21 e 4 0 - W 15 d 4 0, 1 Coy. in close support in W 21 e 25 10 to W 21 a 20 65, and 1 Coy. in reserve in W 13 d 75 60 to W 13 d 95 20.

(b) One Battalion ('C' Bn) is in Bde. Reserve with 2 Coys. in old FRENCH line between V 30 b 4 0 and V 24 d 95 95, and 2 Coys. in redoubt in V 24 d finding nucleus garrisons of 1 platoon from each Company, each at V 30 b 3 5, V 24 d 9 5, V 24 d 6 8, and V 24 b 8 7.

(c) One battalion ('D' Bn) is in Divisional Reserve in WARLOY. Trenches are being constructed in V 22 a and c for this battalion, and will be occupied as soon as they have been completed.

SECTION 2.
PRINCIPLES OF DEFENCE.

1. The defence will be based on the necessity for maintaining intact our positions on the high ground in W 25 a and b, W 19 c and d and W 21., and to deny to the enemy the valley running N.W. from W 27 central.
Experience of recent operations has shown that the enemy's method of attack has been to work up the valleys and 'pinch' the spurs. Special dispositions will be made to protect the valley in W 26 b, W 20 c and d, W 27 a, and to assist the brigade on the right flank in the defence of the valley W 25 c and d, W 26 c and d, also to protect high ground in W 21 by Vickers Machine Guns and Lewis Guns.
2. 'A' and 'B' battalions are responsible for the defence of the front line system which is the main line of resistance.
3. The front line system will be held as thinly as possible consistent with security. Troops will be distributed in depth.
4. The front line will be held. Troops will not fall back, but will maintain their position whether flanks have been turned or not.
5. 'A' and 'B' battalions will keep sufficient troops in hand for the immediate delivery of local counter-attacks. Plans for such counter attacks will be thought out beforehand and made known to all reserves.
6. Should the enemy succeed in penetrating our trenches on a limited front, and immediate counter attack will be organized by the senior officer on the spot.
7. In order to guard against surprise, and to keep in touch with enemy intentions, front line battalions will carry out active patrolling. The enemy will be kept under constant observation from O.P's. In misty weather and at night, battalions will push out listening posts well in advance of our front line.

SECTION 3.ACTION OF BRIGADE RESERVE.

The probable action of the enemy may be one of three alternatives :-

- (i) A raid.
- (ii) An attack with a limited objective.
- (iii) An attack on a large scale with deeper objectives.

Battalions in the line will probably be able to deal with (i).

In the case of (ii) 'C' Battalion will be prepared to move forward and to counter-attack and restore the line on any part of the Brigade front, and if communication between 'C' Battalion commander and Brigade is cut, 'C' Battalion commander must act on his own initiative. . .

The counter attack will be launched as quickly as possible, as soon as the situation is known. *

If the attack comes obviously under the heading (iii) the Brigade support line will be manned and held at all costs.

*
One platoon per Coy will be left as nucleus garrison and to serve as rallying point (See Section 1 Para. 2. (b)).

SECTION A.

ACTION OF DIVISIONAL RESERVE.

1. Each of the three brigades in the line holds one battalion ('D' Bn) in Divisional Reserve.
These battalions are available to reinforce or counter-attack in any part of the Divisional Area.
Necessary reconnaissances will therefore be carried out forthwith.
'D' Battalion will normally be dispersed in and behind the BRESCLE - HENNINGOURE system, within the Bde. boundaries, with 2 platoons supplying a nucleus garrison for this system. The remainder of the battalion will be ready for deliberate counter-attack with artillery preparation under orders of Divisional Headquarters.
2. A company of Light Tanks "Whippets" may be used to co-operate with infantry for counter-attack referred to above.

SECTION 5.ARTILLERY.

1. The front is covered by one Field Artillery Brigade, and one Heavy Artillery Brigade.
2. Field Arty. Bde. maintains a Liaison officer not below rank of Captain at Bde. Hdqrs. and an officer with each Battalion as F.O.O. and Liaison Officer.
3. The present S.O.S. is a rifle grenade bursting into parachute lights -
 WHITE

4. The S.O.S. line for 18-pdrs is W 27 c 17 -
 W 21 d 35 15 - W 27 d 60 45 - W 27 d 85 05.
 4.5 Hows. on W 27 b 95 20 - W 20 a 95 50 -
 W 22 d 75 60, sweep road W 22 a and c.
 Heavy artillery fire on similar lines further to the east of 18-pdr S.O.S. lines.
5. With reference to para ⁴ - 18-pdr S.O.S. lines - an attack on a large scale by the enemy is not expected, but what is anticipated is a local attack which would have for its object the spur in W 15 and W 21, as it is considered that the enemy would not attempt to attack it frontally, but would attack from the north (AVELUY WOOD) and from the south (up the re-entrant in W 27 a and c), the concentrated 18-pdr S.O.S. lines have been laid down on the above.
 If the attack is a frontal one only, barrage fire from W 21 d 35 15 north ^{to} W 21 d 53 82 - W 21 b 72 45 - W 15 d 9 1 can be obtained by asking the artillery for Task 'A' when fire will be switched across. It must be clearly understood that Task A is only to be applied for if there is no infantry attack up the re-entrant in W 27 c which is the danger point.
 Arrangements have also been made with the Artillery Group on the right to assist on the line W 26 d 7 6 - W 27 a 60 45. If this assistance is required, application is to be made to Brigade Headquarters.
6. Rates of fire for S.O.S. and Task A. -
 18-pdrs. 3 rds per gun per min. for 5 mins.
 2 rds per gun per min. for 10 mins.
 4.5 Hows. 2 rds per How per min. for 10 mins.
 1 rd. per How. per min. for 5 mins.
 Fire will then stop unless S.O.S. is repeated, or it is apparent that an attack is in progress.

SECTION 6.

MACHINE GUN ACTION IN DEFENCE.

1. A Machine Gun Company is attached to the Left Bde. in the line. 14 guns are disposed in the line, with 2 in reserve. All guns in the line are laid for direct fire.

4. Application has been made for Vickers Machine Guns of the Brigade on left flank to place a barrage on the line W 23 d 0 5 - W 15 d 9 1 when an S.O.S. goes up on this front.

SECTION 7

TRENCH MORTARS IN DEFENCE.

- 1. (a) Four 3-inch Stokes Mortars are in the line; 2 emplaced at W 26 b 6 5 and 2 at W 26 b 6 8. Battery Headquarters in line W 19 c 2 8. 50 rounds per mortar at each position. The remainder are in Reserve at Battery Headquarters, V 30 b 4 5. Alternative emplacements have been constructed at -
 - W 25 b 1 4 (2) with 160 rounds each.
 - W 19 b 3 2 (2) with 150 rounds each.
 - W 26 a 80 15 (2) with no ammunition.

(b) The 4 mortars in the line have been emplaced in the above positions to strengthen the defence of re-entrant in W 27 a. S.O.S. line from W 26 d 8 9 to W 27 b 6 8.

- 2. (a) There are at present 3 6-inch mortars covering the S.O.S. front. Positions are as follows :-

- (b) S.O.S. targets are :-
 - No. 1 Sunken road in W 27 c
 - No. 2 Sunken road in W 21 d and W 27 b.
 - No. 3 Copse and sunken road in W 27 a.

- 3. (a) Owing to the fact that the positions occupied, specified in para 1 (a) and 2(a) are easily visible to the enemy, and only approachable at night, they are to be used for S.O.S. purposes only. Mortars will always be laid on S.O.S. lines, but will not be fired unless the enemy is actually attacking.
 - (b) In the event of mortars being required to deal with enemy targets, they will be emplaced with special reference to these targets and withdrawn after the shoot.

SECRET

SECTION 8.L I A I S O N.

1. Each battalion in the line will detail one officer whose duties will be to maintain liaison with the battalion on either flank.
 2. 'C' Bn. will be responsible for the maintenance of liaison with 'A' and 'B' battalions, and 'D' Battalion with 'C' Battalion. An officer will be definitely detailed to carry out this duty in each case.
 3. 'A' and 'B' battalions will make an exchange of runners with the battalions on their flanks, these runners to be used only in case of emergency. 'C' battalion will maintain 2 runners at Headquarters of 'A' and 'B' Battalions.
 4. Officers detailed by Brigade for liaison with flank Brigades live at Rear Sde. Hdqrs. WARLOY. They will make themselves fully conversant with this Brigade sector, distribution of troops, and the principles of defence, and visit flank brigades daily during normal conditions, reporting there with 2 runners for duty during operations.

SECTION 9.

WORKS POLICY.

1. The works policy will be :-
 - (a) The joining up of front line posts to form a continuous line.
 - (b) Wiring of front line system.
 - (c) Construction and wiring of support line.
 - (d) Tactical wiring of re-entrant in W 20 c and d.
 - (e) Construction of trench to be occupied by 'D' Battalion, running from V 22 c 3 3 - V 22 c 3 5 - V 22 a 7 0 - V 22 b 0 3 - V 22 b 5 5 - V 17 c 0 0.
 - (f) Provision of communication trenches.
2. A Field Company is attached to the Ede. for work in Left Brigade sub-sector.
3. Battalions will detail a works officer who will be responsible for the work of the battalion. He will deal direct with the engineer officer attached to his sector.
4. As far as possible, the responsibility for various portions of work will be definitely allotted to Company Officers and the same parties detailed for the work.
5. 'A' and 'B' battalions will be responsible for the work set forth in para. 1 (a) and (b). 'C' Battalion, under orders from Brigade H.Q. for (c) and (d), 'D' Bn. under orders from Brigade H.Q. for (e).

SECTION. 10.

ADMINISTRATIVE ARRANGEMENTS.

AMMUNITION: Dumps are situated in the Brigade area at the following points :-

- Right Battalion V 13 d 2 3
- Left Battalion W 19 a 7 1
- Support Battalion U 23 b 1 3
- V 23 d 3 3

System of Supply:

Brigade Mobile Reserve of S.A.A. and grenades is held at Rear Bde. H.Q. WARLOY. 12 limbers, each loaded with 22,000 rounds S.A.A. are held ready to be moved immediately to any point. Ammunition is taken by limbers to each Bn. H.Q. and thence carried under Battalion arrangements to required points. Mobile Echelon is refilled from Divisional Dump - U 27 central, CONTAY, by Brigade Transport Officer, immediately any ammunition is moved forward.

RATIONS: Bde. Refilling Point is at BEAUCOURT. Supply wagons deliver to Quartermasters' Stores. Rations are moved by limbers to Battalion Headquarters after dusk, and distributed to men under Bn. arrangements. Cooking is done at Q.Ms' stores and hot food is sent up to Front Line Bns. in hot food containers, a supply of which is on issue to each Front Line Battalion. Solidified alcohol is issued daily. The issue is supplemented by improvised 'Tommy Cookers' containing a mixture of sawdust, fat, and petrol or kerosene. Water is sent up in petrol tins each night with the rations from WARLOY. There is also a small supply of water in MILLENCOURT.

TRANSPORT LINES & STORES:

These are situated in WARLOY. Bde. Transport is under command of the Bde. Transport Officer and Q.Ms' stores under the Brigade Quartermaster.

APPENDIX I.

SIGNAL COMMUNICATIONS.1. CABLES.

From front line Coy. Headquarters are connected by cable to Battalion Headquarters, thence Battalion Headquarters direct to Brigade forward exchange (V 23 d 0 1), the latter being finally connected to Brigade Headquarters (V 23 d 20 20).

Brigade H.Q. is directly in communication by telephone and telegraph to Division. Right and Left Brigades and Artillery Group are connected laterally to Brigade H.Q.

2. VISUAL.

Lamp signalling from Coy. H.Q. in line direct to Battalion, thence to support Battalion transmitting Station. The latter working to Brigade Visual Station (V 23 d 8 8), the latter station being connected by phone to Brigade Forward Exchange. From Brigade Headquarters to Advanced Div. Headquarters (BAIZIEUX). Lamp signalling is also existent.

3. RUNNER RELAYS.

A Runner Relay Service is established from Brigade H.Q. to No. 1 Brigade Relay Station (V 23 d 0 1) to No. 2 Brigade Relay Station (V 23 b 1 3) thence to Right and Left Battalions.

FIFTH AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BRIGADE.

Intelligence Summary for 24 hours ended 6 am 28th April, 1918.

OUR OPERATIONS:

Patrols: Patrol of 1 Off 6 o.r. went out from W 27 a 3 6 at 10 pm and moved S.E. along road. Parties of the enemy were seen leaving post at W 27 a 3 4, who moved S.W. crossing road and later returned to their post. Another post was located at W 27 a 6 5 in which talking was plainly heard. Patrol returned through W 27 a 3 6. at 12.15 am.

ENEMY OPERATIONS:

Artillery: The Right Bn reports artillery very quiet. W 21 a and b was lightly shelled throughout the period with 4.2 and 5.9 H.E. During the afternoon, BOUZINCOURT and W 14 B O O were shelled by 5.9 and 4.2 H.E.

Machine Guns: Quiet during the day and night.

Movement & Organisation: Smoke and slight movement were observed at QUARRY W 27 c 2 8 during daylight. At 9 am 1 two-horse transport moved along road in W 24 d going towards LA BOISSELLE. 6 men followed behind. At 9 am 1 4-horse and 1 2-horse transport seen on road in W 24 d going towards ALBERT. 10.15 am, 3 2-horse transports seen on road in W 24 d going towards LA BOISSELLE. 11.15 am. 2 2-horse transport on road in W 24 d went towards LA BOISSELLE. 2.45 pm. 2 men seen working with pick and shovel at W 24 d O 6. 3.15 pm, Motor lorry seen on road in W 24 b and c. going towards BRAY-SUR-SOMME. 5.50 pm, Red Cross car seen on road in W 24 d going towards ALBERT.



BRIGADE TRAINING MEMORANDUM.

1. The following is proposed general syllabus of training to be carried out by units of this Brigade on relief.-
 - Organized Games
 - Short Route Marches
 - Musketry
 - including rapid loading, bolt manipulation, etc.
 - Battalion Tactical Schemes

2. In tactical schemes the role of the battalion should be mainly that of a battalion forming part of a brigade in counter-attack, its object being rather to out-manoeuvre the enemy, than to deliver frontal attacks.
 - Casualties to officers and N.C.O's will be practised.
 - Suggested means of doing this is by firing flares:- 1st Flare all officers casualties, 2nd flare, all sergeants casualties, etc.
 - The principle that all ground is to be held even though flanks may be turned, is to be impressed on all ranks.

3. The first day after arrival, reorganisation, refitting, etc. will be carried out.
 - Second Day: Short route march. Musketry details of scheme for following day to be arranged. Officers to go over ground.
 - Third Day: Morning - Organized games, Close order drill, explanation of scheme to N.C.O's and men.
 - Afternoon - Scheme to be carried out.
 - The above scheme on general lines will be followed out on succeeding days; Saturday afternoons and Sundays holidays.

MACHINE GUN PROTECTION

In order to protect the re-entrant in W 27 e which is considered the most vital spot in this Brigade Sector, the Artillery S.O.S. has been concentrated on the line W 27 c 1 7 - W 27 a 50 18 - W 27 a 84 40 - W 21 d 35 15. This leaves the defence of the left flank dependant on Vickers Machine Guns and Lewis Guns. The 22nd Aust. M.G. Coy. will barrage the line W 21 b 9 4 - W 21 d 1 7 on S.O.S. signal being sent up, but owing to the nature of the country, this barrage cannot be extended further north to Brigade boundary.

Could arrangements be made please for the Vickers Machine Guns of the Brigade on left flank to barrage the line W 22 d 0 5 - W 15 d 9 1 as soon as an S.O.S. goes up on this point. This task to be definitely allotted to them and not to be applied for.

Patrols: Patrol of 1 Cff and 6 B.R. went out from W 26 c⁷⁷ at 12.30 am and moved to W 27 c 0 0 and located a line of trench running N. and S. through the Quarry in W 27 c; the length of trench is not known. No wire was seen but sounds of stakes being driven could be heard to the North. Patrol returned through W 26 c 7 7 at 2 am.

Patrol of 1 Officer and 10 O.R. went out from W 27 a 4 6 at 10.30 pm and moved along road in W 27 a with object of mopping up a suspected listening post at W 27 a 5 6. The ground was thoroughly searched but no trace of the enemy found. Patrol returned at 1.10 am through W 27 a 4 6.

Patrol of 2 O.R. approached enemy listening post at W 21 b 40 35. 20 stick bombs were found 20 yards from the post, 2 of which were thrown into the post, upon which enemy opened with bombs and M.G. fire. Rifle grenades were fired on the post but no results were observed.

Patrol of 6 C.R. went out from W 21 a 53 15 at 11.40 pm and located a post at W 27 c 90 35. A party of 50 were observed digging at about W 27 a 4 3. Patrol returned at 2.10 am through W 21 a 53 15.

BLUE RINGS FOR 3" STOKES MORTAR.

The unsatisfactory nature of these rings has been represented before by reports on experiemnts carried out at the Australian Corps School, but the following report is submitted in confirmation and to draw attention again to the marked superiority of WHITE rings over BLUE. -

'Report on Operations 14th/15th April'

On night 14th/15th inst. 2 3 inch Stokes mortars bombarded CEMETERY COPSE near HANGARD, each mortar firing 100 rounds at the rate of 10 per minute. No. 1 Mortar used GREEN Ctgs. and 2 WHITE rings. No. 2 Mortar used BLUE Ctgs. and 3 BLUE rings. It was observed that the flash from No. 1 Mortar was normal, but from No. 2 a ball of flame would play round the muzzle and then float in the air, sometimes to a height of 15 feet before disappearing. The ammunition was in good order and had been carefully cleaned. The mortar had to be sponged out after every 3 or 4 rounds to expel the burning gases. This mortar became so hot that sandbags had to be used to treat a misfire which occurred in the first 20 rounds. The BLUE rings are most unsatisfactory as concealment of a position is impossible, while using them. Previous experience proves that they will not give the ranges as laid down in the range table for BLUE Cartridges and BLUE rings" -

Administrative Memorandum to accompany Bde. Order No. 171

AMMUNITION, ETC: Units will hand over to relieving units the 3 bombs per man and the extra 100 rounds S. A. A. carried in bandoliers on the man. These will be immediately replenished under Bde. arrangements on arrival in new area, being retained in boxes and issued to platoons and not to the men until receipt of orders from Bde. H. Q.

RATIONS: Refilling point will continue to remain at BEAUCOURT. Supply wagons will deliver to unit Q.M. stores.

ADVANCE PARTIES: Para. 7 of Bde. Order No. 170 is cancelled. Advance parties for WARLOY will report for guides at 142nd Inf. Bde. H. Q., Billet 37, WARLOY, at 10 am on 1st May. Units will take over billets as follows :-
17th Bn. 22nd Bn. London Regt.
19th Bn. 23rd do.
20th Bn. 24th do.
5th A.L.T.M. Bty. 142nd T.M. Bty.
5th A.M.G. Coy. 'C' Coy. 47th Bn. M.G. Corps.

Advance parties for MONTIGNY area will report at 8 pm 1st May to Town Major of town to which they are allotted.

TRENCH STORES: Hot food containers at Q.M. stores will be returned to present Rear Bde. H. Q. by 11 am 1st May. Hot food containers in the line will be handed over in the line and receipts obtained. Trench shelters, S.O.S., picks and shovels (over and above mobile echelon and the extra 100 shovels carried by battalions) will be handed over and receipts obtained.
