





The Army line running on the high ground on a line between GENTELLES WOOD and BLANGY-TRONVILLE was reconnoctred. A strong line of entanglements has now been constructed in front of this line which consists of small posts about 15 yards long and 50 to 100 yards apart with a second line of posts covering the gaps in the front line. Operation Order No. 22 issued, vide APPENDIX 8. Staff Captain visited 5th Aust.Inf.Bde.H.Q. in connection with Brigade Operation Order No. 22. Yesterday the Brigade was ordered to construct an Army Switch Line covering CACHW and BOIS d'AQUENNE. The ground was immediately reconnoitered and work commenced early this morning. The line is to run from U.9.a.9.6., U.3.c.8.7., U.4.a.9.6., 0.34.c.9.7., 0.34.c.1.9., 0.27.d.2.5. This work will be completed by early morning of the 5th instant.

Last night the 33rd Battalion moved from GACHY to VILLERS BRETONNEUX in immediate support to 35th Battalion. Battalion will be responsible for picketing VILLERS BRETONNEUX and for digging a reserve line about 1400 yards in rear of the front line held by 35th Battalion.


35th Battalion is well covered by artillery i.e., 24 - 18 pounders, 9 - 4.5 howitzers, 2 - 9.2. howitzers, 9 - 6" howitvers, 1 - 6" gum. 5 of our Machine gums cover the front line from rear positions, whilst 5 are held in reserve at VILLERS BRETONNEUX. 35th Battalion now has 24 Lewis Guns whilst 33rd Battalion has 22.

53rd and 35th Battalion Headquarters are within 100 yards of one another, whilst the Artillery Group Commander is about 300 yards away. The Artillery Group Commander has a heavy artillery liason officer with him and is taking advantage Of fleeting targets. Until the arrival of this Brigade there was apparently no liason between infantry and artillery, and no counter battery work. This is, however, being rectified.

As telephone communication between Brigade Headquarters and 35th Battalion is not very a tisfactory, the 33rd Battalion has been placed at the disposal of 35th Battalkon for action in the event of hostile attack.

It has been decided to place WILLERS BRETONNEUX out of bounds to all tropps except those on duty. Formed bodies are allowed to move through the town but they must be in charge of an Officer. We are doing our utmost to clean up the town in order to hand over to the French tidy billets. It will, however, be quite impossible to remove the very obvious signs of deliberate looting which appears to have been carried out by troops retiring through the town. Our own troops are not allowed out of their billets without passes and appear to be behaving themselves admirably.



I beg to forward herewith copy of report on 9th Australian Infuntry Brigade operations on 4th and 5th April before VILLERS-BRETONNEUX which perhaps you may find of interest.

May I take the opportunity of expressing my keen appreciation of the prompt and most valuable assistance rendered to my troops on my left flank by your let Dregoon Guards and 17th Lancers.

As has happened so often during the recent fighting, the cavalry on the morning of the 4th instant undoubtedly saved the situation. My left flank was in danger of serious trouble at the time because the infantry of the 14th Division had fallen baok

My Officers and men are just as enthusiastin in their appreciation of the work of the cavalry of your Division as they were on the SOth March when the 12th Lancers of 2nd Cavalry Division so sploudidly supported a counter-attack by my troops.

Personally I am proud to have had the opportunity of fighting on the same battle-ground with the British Cavalry.

Would you kindly inform the 1st Dragoon Guards and 17th Lancers.

At the commencement of operations entern the 4th inst. the Brigade was disposed in depth for the defence of VILLERS-BRET-ONHEUX as follows: 35th Battalton holding from V.2.d.7.3 to P.28. d.5.4 with throo Companies in the line and one in reserve; 33rd Batt -alien in immodilate support of 35th Dattalien; 34th and 36th Datt alions in Brigade Roservo in DOIS l'ADBE. Brigado Headquarters was located at GIHTELLES. The Line had been taken over from 61st Division on the night 50/Jist March. Fight Vickers guns had been placed at the disposal of the C.O. 35th Dattalien who elected to place four in the line whilst holding joth in reserve in VILLERS-BRETONNEUX. The remaining eight muchine gume of the 9th Australian Machine Gun Company were hold in Brigade Meserve in Bols 1 ADDE. The line was held by a sertes of posts unwired. The only communitor thom, oither laworally or from front to rear, was by runner; and this was impossible by day owing to the activity of onomy snipors and the fact that runners had no routes unobserved by hostile snipors. The Reservo Company had dug in a support line approximately 1,000 yards in rear of the front line. the road in U.S.a. and wore firstly one arealists in o.S. U al boom out Information received from the front in the late evening of the 3rd instant disclosed much movement in the meighbourhood of MARCELOAVE and WARFUSEE-ABANCOURT, and enomy artillery had been par ticularly active with all chlabres up to 5.9 on VILLERS-DRETONNEUX, CACHY, GENTELLES and BOIS I ADDE. THE DIRECT PLANE OF THE CAT THE BETTE At 5.30 a.m. on 4th instant the enomy commenced to bomber our forward system hosvily as well as VILLERS-DRETONNEUX, CACHY, and GENTELLES and other portions of the back area. At 6.30 a.m. the enomy appeared through the mist to be massing in mumorous small parties each about the size of a Platoon on the Wostern outskirts of WARDUSHE-ADANOOURT and at several other points opposite our front line. Those were immediately dealt with by machine guns, Lewis Guns and rifles with doadly offoct, very heavy, ossualties being inflicted upon the enemy who immediately retired slightly without persisting in the attack. This action was repeated three times at short intervals. At 7 a.m. the enemy advanced opposite our whole front. Our S.O.E. signal was sent up and immediately responded to by an accurate barrage which was right on the dense masses of advancing enemy, cutting gaps in his formations. In addition to artillery fire tho

enemy was subjected to the maximum fire pour of all units in the line, causing him enormous lesses.

Whom the enemy had advanced to a distance of 300 yards from our front line the 8th Dattauton Rillo Drigade on our left fell back expecting our loss flamin. who enemy, taking advantage, attacked our left by moving along the evaluated treach. This compelled the 35th Dattalion's loft thank to fall book stighting to the support line covered by our machine guns which later established themselves in the support Line. At this stage one of our machine guns was rushed and cantilred by the onemy, whilet one was destroyed by shell-The Duife on our right offung back their left flank in con formity with our slight change of front. The onemy was now hold up and heavy casualties inflicted on him.

Two Companies of the 33rd Dattalion were pushed up bohind our lort as this appeared to be the threatened flank, oight more Vickers guns were ordered into the line, making a total of 10. The line was then firmly established from V.1.d.0.7 to V.1.b.9.C, thence Worth to P.26.0.0.0, thonce West to P.25.d.0.3, and . Districted and a Bond Bond

> and North to P.25.b.O.1 where touch was gained with the 1st Dragoon Guards which had come up on our left and stayed the enemy's advance North of the WARFUSEE-ADANGOURT - VILLERS-DRETONNEUX Road.

> At 10.15 a.m. the cavalry (1st Dragoon Guards, 3rd Cavalry Division) came forward, dismounted, and took up a position on our lost North of the WARFUSEE-ADAHCOURT - VILLERS-DRETONNEUX Road. This filled the gap caused by the retirement of the 8th Dattalion Riflo Drigado. The cavalry at once opened fire on the onemy with one Hotehkiss and three Vickors guns, causing the enemy to fall back towards WARFUSEE-ADANCOURT.

> The 33rd Dattalion was ordered at 10.27 a.m. to move forward to ostablish a position East of the aerodrome at P.25.d. 80.25. This advance was immediately carried out, improving our

line considerably. At 11.10 a.m. the 34th Dattalion was ordered to move from BOIS 1'AME to a position of readiness at 0.29.a. and b. North of VILLERS-BRETONNEUR; whilst the 36th Lattalion was ordered to move to 0.35.0. and d. to the South. Both of these Batta lions wore placed at the disposal of C.O. 35th Battalion for counter attack purposes.

By 3.30 p.m. our line was firmly established, the enomy holding ground 300 yards to our front. The rain during the day had made the ground very muddy. The clean Lewis Guns of the 6th London Regiment were sent forward to our men.

At 3.50 p.m. the 36th Eattalien, which had moved to U.5.b., noticed troops of the units on our right retiring in dis order through our lines reporting that the enemy were advancing in thousands. Attempts made to rally them were unsuccessful. The situation appeared critical. By 5 p.m. the enemy had advanced to the road in U.S.a. and were firing at our artillery in U.S.a. and c. 0.0. 36th Eattalion, having then received orders, launched the mholo of his Battalion, less one Company in Dattalion Reservo, into a counter-attack South of the VILLERS-DRETONNEUX - MARCELCAVE railway line at 5.15 p.m. The Roserve Company of 35th Dattalion was just at this moment counter-attacking just North of the railway line and thus protected the left flank of the 36th Dattalion. party of the "Queens" which was reforming in U.5.d. decided to co-"operato and assisted very materially. A party of the "Buffs" digg -ing in in U.5.b. declined to co-operate.

The counter-attacking ir cops were greeted by heavy machino gun fire from CHATEAU in U.C.a. and later from haystacks at about V.12.b.6.8 but managed to establish a line from V.1.b.5.6 to U.6.c.contral. The Reserve Company was then thrown in and suce coded in filling a gap botween two of the assaulting Companies. Throe Companies of the 6th London Regiment arrived at

During the advance feur onemy machine guns were cap-

tured and were utilized in consolidation. At 6 p.m. the situation on the left flank became obscurs, and at 6.20 p.m. the 54th Dattalion was ordered to establish a line getting into touch with 33rd Battalion on the right and cavalry on the left. This was carried out successfully by the 34th Dattalion moving across the Eastern outskirts of VILLERS -DRETONNEUX in a South-Eastorly direction in order to take up a line running from railway line at V.1.b.2.8 to P.31.a.8.2. Battalion then hold if om P. 31.a.8.2 to P. 25.0.6.3, whilst the 36th Dattalion together with the Queens and 8th London Regiment held from the railway line to the South as far as U.S.c.central. About cavalry wars than holding the line North of 33rd Dattalion. this time the 17th Lancers arranged to advance to restore our line on the loft in conjunction with 35rd Dattalion, this action boing carried out successfully.

At 6.40 p.m. a line running from P.25.d.2.3 to the

In the mountime three armoured ears had come forward along the AHIEES Road as soon as it was soon that the town was endangered. They patrolled the streets of VILLERS-DRETONNEUX and then moved to our left flank heavily engaging the enemy. These ears did magnificent work particularly in engaging enemy machine gums.

On surveying the situation at about 10 p.m. 1t was found that our line lay in low ground in the vicinity of the railway line. In order to gain a position giving a good field of fire it was decided to move forward during the night and re-establish support line occupied by the 35th Dattalion at 11 a.m. that day. The 34th Dattalion was therefore ordered to attack and capture the railway bridge at V.1.b.6.7, whilst the other units of the Erigade were to co-operate and advance their portions of the line accordingly. In preparation for this attack the 35th and 36th Battalions closed to the South and 34th Dattalion occupied the line from V.1.a.0.6 to P.31.0.8.6. During the advance strong opposition was amcountered along the Northern side of the railway, but our casualties were not severe. Our Lowis Guns, fired from the hip, had considerable moral effect on the enemy. From this time onward the fighting died down and our troops prosseded with the work of consolidation.

Q was very much struck by the courtesy of your officers in coming to see me personally and for your own and their keen desire to do everything in their power to help. As you know we hade a curious collection of units to do with, and it was a real releaf to know that I had yourstout-hearted fellows on my left flank and later also on my right flank and that all worry was therefore eliminated as to the safety of my flanks. Your order for the placing of your heavy guns and batteries so as to cover our front wasof very real assistance; incidentally they killed a lot of huns, and was much appreciated by us all. Will you convey to all concerned my own appreciation and that of all ranks of the 1st Cavalary Division. It was a pleasure and an honour to be fighting alongside troops who displayed such magnificant moral. I only hope we may have the chance of co-operating with you again and under more favourable circumstances. We have been kept on the move and very busy trying to refit at the same time, and have left your area for the moment or I should certainly have been myself to tender you our thanks and congratulations.





REPORT ON GAS SHELL BOMBARDMENT OF VILLERS-BRETONNEUX BOIS D'AQUENNE AND BOIS 1'ABBE ON 17TH AND 18TH APRIL, 1918.

(Reference Sheet - 60D - 1/40,000.)

1. The areas shelled were the town of VILLERS-BRETONNEUX - the two woods close to the town on the West side, and the undulating country between these and the village of CACHY; i.e., Squares U. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

2. The times of shelling were:
17th April - 4.0 a.m. - 9.30 a.m.

5.0 p.m. - 5.0 p.m.

18th April - 4.30 a.m. - 9.0 a.m.

3. Shells used were 7.7 cm, 10.5 cm and 15 cm, "blinds" of each calibre being picked up, while others of larger size were most probably used.

On VILLERS-BRETONNEUX from 8,000 to 9,000 shells fell chiefly VELLOW CROSS while on the Woods in addition about 3,000 fell including GREEN CROSS as well as VELLOW GROSS.

4. The units of this Brigade concerned were 33rd Battalion, 9th A.L.T.M. Battery and the 9th A.M.G. Company in VILLERS-BRETONNEUX, The 34th and 35th Battalions in BOIS d'AQUENNE and BOIS 1'ABBE. The Western end of the latter was affected very little by the shelling as the light North wind blowing carried the gas well away.

to the fact that, though Respirators were promptly put on and worm for some considerable time, they were removed too soon, owing to the smell of gas becoming less pronounced.

In one case direct hits were made on a cellar containing

a considerable number of men.

Casualties occurred for several days after the shelling,

evacuations taking place as late as 26th April, 1918.

A few shells were used again on the morning of 20th April, on working parties in the support trenches - about 20 rounds falling in the vicinity. Respirators were at once put on, but owing to the high wind prevailing, the gas was dissipated almost immediately, and no further shelling took place.




