

During this night our fig hting patrols had gained complete mastery of No Man's Land and had located all posts and M.G. positions held by the enemy along the front, and it was arranged that battery would deal with these positions during the forthcoming operation. SICK - evacuated - O.R STRENGTH - 5 Offs., 60 O. Ranks. | |
| CERISY VALI | 8th EY | 0420 0430 1100 | Fine and hot. Slight haze. Zero hour for offensive. At this time our artillery, M.Gs., and our Mortars opened fire in one well-timed and terrific burst. Battery for this operation had 8 guns in action, 2 guns having been brought in on the night previous. Battery co-operated with artillery engaging enemy positions in Approache Wood and covering advance of infantry. Battery guns were withdrawn to advance H.Q. in Vaire Wood where they were joined by the Battery nucleus. Ger Battery moved from Headquarters and marched via Warfusse - Abancourt to Lena wood, Country over which the infantry advanced earlier in the day and had been captured from the enemy. | |

Battery was present at conference at Brigade where verbal instructions were issued him for the capture of the spur on the west of CHUICNOLLES between main Amiens-St. Quentin road and the Somme. 4 guns WERE attached to 39th Battalion with a supply of ammunition and marched forward in rear of column along Amiens-St. Quentin Road. At checking point at 0.30.C.5.5 enemy planes, were one constitute and by bombing inflicted casualties both on personnel and transport. The road was continually shelled by the enemy during approach march. | |

| SAILLY LAURETTE | 23rd | | Bright and warm with good visibility. Battery marched out of line at Sailly Laurette and moved forward to Rendezvous in front of Bray under the command of Lieut. Cahill who was acting C.O. for operation. 8 guns in co-operation with 40th Bn. STRENGTH - 5 Offs., 52 O. Ranks. LOCATION OF H. Q. in front of Bray - L. 14.d | |
| BRAY | 24th 25th | 0100 | Clear and warm. Visibility good. Zero hour for operation. At this time 6 guns with 3 platoons of the 40th Bn. moved forward under orders to mop up bray after infantry had captured same. Lt. Bridie was in charge of Nos. 1 and 2 guns, Sergt. Ohiver in charge of \$\frac{3}{8}\text{ & 4}\text{ guns., Lt. Fidler in charge of Nos. 5 \text{ & 6}\text{ guns. }\text{ 2 guns remained in} Reserve at Battery Headquarters. During the advance and shorthy after Zero No. 2 gun was put out of action by one of our 18 pounders, the base of the gun being shot away whilst being carried by a member of this gun crew. The man had a remarkable escape only suffering from slight shock. During the advance through Bray the right and centre platoons were held up by enemy M.G. fire at L. 16. C.75.75. These guns were engaged by No. 1 gun and prompt— ly put out of action a direct hit being obtained on one and many casualties caused through the enemy crews. Lt. Bridie then took up his position at L.16.c.2.5. with No. 1 gun covering the ground in front. Sergt. Oliver took up his position at L.15.4.3.5. with No. 3 & 4 guns at Lt. Fidler his with Nos. \$\frac{3}{6}\text{ guns at L} L.15.5.4.7. During the morning the members of No. 1 gun captured \$\frac{7}{6}\text{ prisoners and} 3 enemy M. Gs. which had been giving trouble and with whom they had to deal. In the night Nos. 3 & 4 guns moved to new position at Railway Line Bray at L.16.c. One gun was brought from Battery H. Qs. at Bray to replace damaged one. Weather mild and clear— Again in conjunction with "D" Coy. of 40th Bn. The 1/40,000 62 D former 2 guns at 10,00 opened fire on the opposing machine guns with good 1/20,000 62 D SE results, dispersing the enemy and silencing the guns. 1/20,000 62 D SE This machine gun posta again gave considerable trouble and was again dealt with causing the enemy many casualties and the remainder of the crews to fly back in disorder and leave their guns and the positions clear.
