	1st Nov.		Disposition of Units as follows:- 5th Aust. Divisional Headquarters ... OISEMONT 8th Aust. Infantry Brigade ... RAMBURES 14th Aust. Infantry Brigade ... MARTAINNVILLE 15th Aust. Infantry Brigade ... HUPPY 5th Aust. Machine Gun Battalion ... RAMBURES 5th Aust. Divisional Artillery ... BOUTILLERIE 13th Aust. F.A. Brigade ... CAGNY 14th Aust. F.A. Brigade ... CAMMON	
	2nd Nov.		At 1425 the Divisional Commander inspected the Company. The Company was formed up on ground next to the brick kilns at OISEMONT. After inspection by the General the Company marched past and re-formed on their original ground when the General addressed the troops. In the course of his remarks he expressed his satisfaction with the turnout of the Company, especially complimenting the transport. Parade state for this inspection forms appendix 5. The 14th Aust. Infantry Brigade was also inspected by the Divisional Commander at RAMBURES. No. 3 Section (attached to this Brigade) lead the Brigade in the march past.	
	3rd Nov.		The Company paraded at 1000 and after being inspected was dismissed, it being Sunday. The O.C. attended a conference of Divisional Officers held at the Mairie, OISEMONT at 1430, the chief subject dealt with was that of training.	
	4th Nov.		The O.C. visited the 5th Aust. Divisional Artillery Headquarters at BOUTILLERIE and the 13th Aust. F.A. Brigade Headquarters at CAGNY. The Company paraded at 1000 and route marched to RAMBURES and return.	
	5th Nov.		Heavy rain - no parade at Company Headquarters. The 14th Aust. Infantry Brigade were to have held sports but they were postponed on account of the rain. 5th Aust. Machine Gun Battalion held sports but the meeting was somewhat spoilt by the rain.	
	6th Nov.		No parade at Company Headquarters on account of the rain. In the evening the Company Orchestra assisted at a concert given by the 5th Divisional Concert party in the Recreation room at OISEMONT.	
	7th Nov.		Bathing parade held at Company Headquarters at 1000. The baths are situated on the parade ground next to the chateau at OISEMONT. The men have to undress and dress in the open and enter the baths (which are in a tent) in pairs. The O.C. visited the Corps Signal School at RUE. The Company Orchestra again assisted the Concert Party at night in the Recreation room.

	8th Nov.		Parade at Company Headquarters at 1000. After inspection men produced their paybooks for entry "Employment guaranteed" or "Employment not guaranteed" (on return to Australia) The Orchestra provided a musical programme in the Recreation room at night. In the interval during the proceedings the Divisional Education Officer outlined the proposed A.I.F. Education Scheme. There was a large audience of interested men. Divisional Boxing contest was held at MARTAINNVILLE. The Divisional Commander inspected the Divisional Artillery transport at BOUTILLERIE. The Signal transport attached to the Artillery was paraded for the inspection.	
	9th Nov.		Parade at 1000 - squad drill and rifle exercises. In the afternoon the Company football team played a team from the 5th Aust. Machine Gun Battalion (Australian rules) at RAMBURES and our team won by 5 points.	
	10th Nov.		Parade at Company Headquarters at 0930 for inspection only, it being Sunday. 5th Aust. Divisional Artillery closed at BOUTILLERIE at 1400 and marched to BRAY. Transport left at 1000 and arrived at BRAY at 1630. 13th Aust. F.A. Brigade moved from CAGNY to CAPPY No cables were laid and communication between Division and Brigades was by motor cyclist, and between Brigades and Batteries by mounted orderly or runner.	
	11th Nov.		Parade at 1000 - squad drill and rifle exercises. Rumours were current during the earlier part of the day of the cessation of fighting and the signing of the Armistice. Nothing was officially received but at 1400 rumours were confirmed by the ringing of church and other bells and also by rapid production of display by the civilians in OISEMONT of all available bunting. There was a big demand for Australian flags but they were very scarce. One large one was obtained and flown from the front of the Mairie. Crowds of civilians and soldiers congregated in front of the Mairie and cheers were called for the Australian flag and were heartily given. There was great satisfaction at the successful termination of hostilities so highly favourable to the Allies. Lorries and vehicles were decorated with flags of all the Allies. One lorry bore a notice "WANTED A RELIABLE TOWN MAJOR FOR BERLIN" The 5th Aust. Divisional Artillery Headquarters closed at BRAY at 0900 and opened at ATHIES at 4 p.m. 13th and 14th Aust. F.A. Brigades Headquarters were also at ATHIES. D.R.L.S. service to 5th Aust. Division via Fourth Army at ETERPIGNY.	
	12th Nov.		No parade. 14th Brigade Group sports held at MARTAINNVILLE.	
	13th Nov.		Parade at 1000 - route march.	
	14th Nov.		Parade at 1000 - route march. Lieut. W. Forrest took over No. 3 Section (attached to 14th Aust. Infantry Brigade) from Lieut. G.S. Haining who proceeded to Wireless course at Aust. Corps School. 5th Aust. Div. Artillery located at G.23.b.2.8 (Sheet 62B) 13th and 14th Aust. F.A. Brigades in line.

Place	Date	Hour	Summary of Events and Information	Remarks and references to Appendices
	15th	Nov.	Parade at 1000 - squad drill and rifle exercises. No.4 Section carried out a visual scheme. The Section paraded at 0820 and was dismissed at 1300. Good communication was maintained throughout the scheme.	
	16th	Nov.	The O.C. attended a conference of Divisional Officers at the Mairie, OISEMONT in connection with a proposed march into GERMANY. A meeting of Company Officers was held afterwards at which the O.C. explained what was proposed and required. No.4 Section (attached 15th Aust. Infantry Brigade) had a full marching order parade and inspection of equipment.	
	17th	Nov.	Parade at 0930. Men were inspected and dismissed, it being Sunday. Thanksgiving services were held in the R.C.Church at OISEMONT at 1600. Roman catholic members of the Company paraded at 1530 and marched to the church. The Divisional Commander and staff were present. The 8th Aust. Infantry Brigade band rendered the music. The church (which was fully crowded) was elaborately decorated. The service was impressive and undoubtedly there was a spirit of thankfulness for the successful termination of hostilities. Each Brigade section reports Thanksgiving church services at which the Signal Sections were present.	
	18th	Nov.	A parade was held at Company Headquarters at 0900 at which a Medical Officer inspected the men as to their fitness for route marching. Only 4 were classed as unfit for marching. Divisional sports were held during the afternoon. Warning order received to be ready to move forward at 36 hours notice. No.3 Section paraded in full marching order for inspection of equipment and rifles.	
	19th	Nov.	Parade at 1000 - route march. A football team from the Wireless Section played a team from 8th Aust. Infantry Brigade which was won by the Wireless Section. Scores 8 goals 5 points to Nil. An aeroplane D.R. service was started between Australian Corps at LE CATEAU and the Division. The landing ground was near HALLENCOURT to which our Motor cyclists went and handed over and received packets from the airmen. Two planes engaged in the work which is to be carried out daily when the weather is favourable. No.2 Section had a full marching order parade for inspection of rifles and equipment. The Divisional Commander inspected the 14th Aust. Infantry Brigade. No.3 Section attached to this Brigade, headed the Brigade in the march past.	
	20th	Nov.	Parade at 1000. Issue of ammunition to men in connection with forthcoming march into GERMANY. The aeroplane service failed today on account of foggy weather. The 15th Aust. Infantry Brigade had a Brigade route march and inspection by the Divisional Commander. No.4 Section (attached to this Brigade) took part in the march.

	21st Nov.		In the afternoon the Section was engaged in reeling up cable between Brigade and Battalion Headquarters. Parade at 1000 - route march in full marching order. In the afternoon the Company's football team played the team from the 5th Pioneer Battalion and won by 7 goals 7 points. The scores were 10 goals 10 points to 3 goals 3 points. All lines forward of Brigades which were reeled up during the past three days were relaid. Cables went out from No.1 Section to assist in this work.	
	22nd Nov.		Parade at 1000 on the Company Parade ground. A rehearsal was held for the Review of the 8th Brigade Group to be held on the 23rd November in which the Company is to take part. The football team from the Wireless Section played a match with a combined team from Divisional Headquarters, defeating them by 3 points.	
	23rd Nov.		Parade at 1000. The parade was formed of 50 men from Headquarters and No.1 Sections and 25 men from Wireless Section. These, with 25 men from No.2 Section (attached 8th Aust. Infantry Brigade) are to represent the Signal Company in a review by the Divisional Commander of the 8th Brigade Group. The Signal Company formed the 4th Company of Divisional Engineers under the acting C.R.E. (Major Greenway, DSO) the Company being in charge of Major R.A. Stanley, DSO. At the 1000 parade the Company was inspected for the review. At 1300 the men paraded and were marched to the review ground situated about half a mile north of RAMBURELLES. The Divisional Commander arrived at 1430. After inspection, the troops forming the group marched past in column of Companies. The Divisional Commander expressed himself as being especially pleased with the turnout of the Signal Company and called upon the Officer Commanding to visit him on the 24th Nov. to receive his congratulations. A special Company Routine Order in connection with this review forms appendix No. 4.	
	24th Nov.		Parade at 0930. Company was inspected and dismissed, it being Sunday. At 1700 a lorry reported from "Q" Branch and loaded with Wireless gear and Signal Office equipment for an advance office ready to move to new location (FAVRIL) at 0600 on the 25th November.	
	25th Nov.		At 1700 a second lorry reported from "Q" Branch and after loading, left at 1845 with 4 of the Wireless personnel and 3 men for office staff at FAVRIL.	
	27th Nov.		Company transport paraded at 1400 and left for PONT REMY for entrainment en route to FAVRIL. Signal Office closed at OISEMONT at 2200. At midnight on the night of 27th/28th November the remainder of the Company paraded and route marched to PONT REMY, a distance of about 12 miles. A lorry provided by "Q" Branch carried men's blankets and stores with the cooks from OISEMONT to PONT REMY. 5th Aust. Divisional Artillery closed at ATHIES at 0900 and moved to FRESNOY LE GRAND at 1800. Communication via Australian Corps at LE CATEAU.

	28th	Nov.	<p>The Company arrived at PONT REMY at 0445. The train was timed to leave to 0840 but did not leave until 2015. The cooks, who had arrived on the previous night, had a hot breakfast for the men at 0600. A hot dinner was also provided at midday. After the train leaving at 2015 and when near LONGPRE, the floor of a truck containing 6 of the Company's horses, gave way. Four of the animals fell through resting on beams. One of the drivers in charge of the horses leaving the truck, climbed along the tops of other trucks and reaching the engine, succeeded in pulling up the train. An investigation proved that the horses were not seriously injured. The truck, however, had to be detached and arrangements made for the horses to be sent on by the following train.</p>	
	29th	Nov.	<p>Train travelling was very slow. The Company arrived at EERTRY at 1630 and immediately detrained. Rations had to be drawn from a supply dump in this town which caused a delay until 1845 in the departure for BUSIGNY (a distance of about 7 kilos) where we billeted for the night. A short cut was taken along a direct second class road which, we were informed, was in good order for transport. It proved the reverse. When within 3 kilos of BUSIGNY an overhead bridge across a double railway track was found to have been blown up. A side track had to be taken across the railway, which, being very soft and muddy, was very difficult to traverse in the darkness. BUSIGNY was reached at 2025 and the men comfortably billeted in a large unoccupied house. Three G.S. waggons were provided by the detraining Officer for transport of men's blankets and cookers from EERTRY to BUSIGNY.</p>	
	30th	Nov.	<p>It was intended that the Unit should stage at MAZIENHEIM for the night enroute for FAVRIL. Arrangements were, however, made to push through to FAVRIL (a distance of 18 miles) The men were relieved of their packs which were stacked and placed under a guard until arrival of transport for their delivery. In order to get as far as possible in daylight a halt was not made for lunch until 1400. FAVRIL was reached at about 1650 and the men billeted.</p>

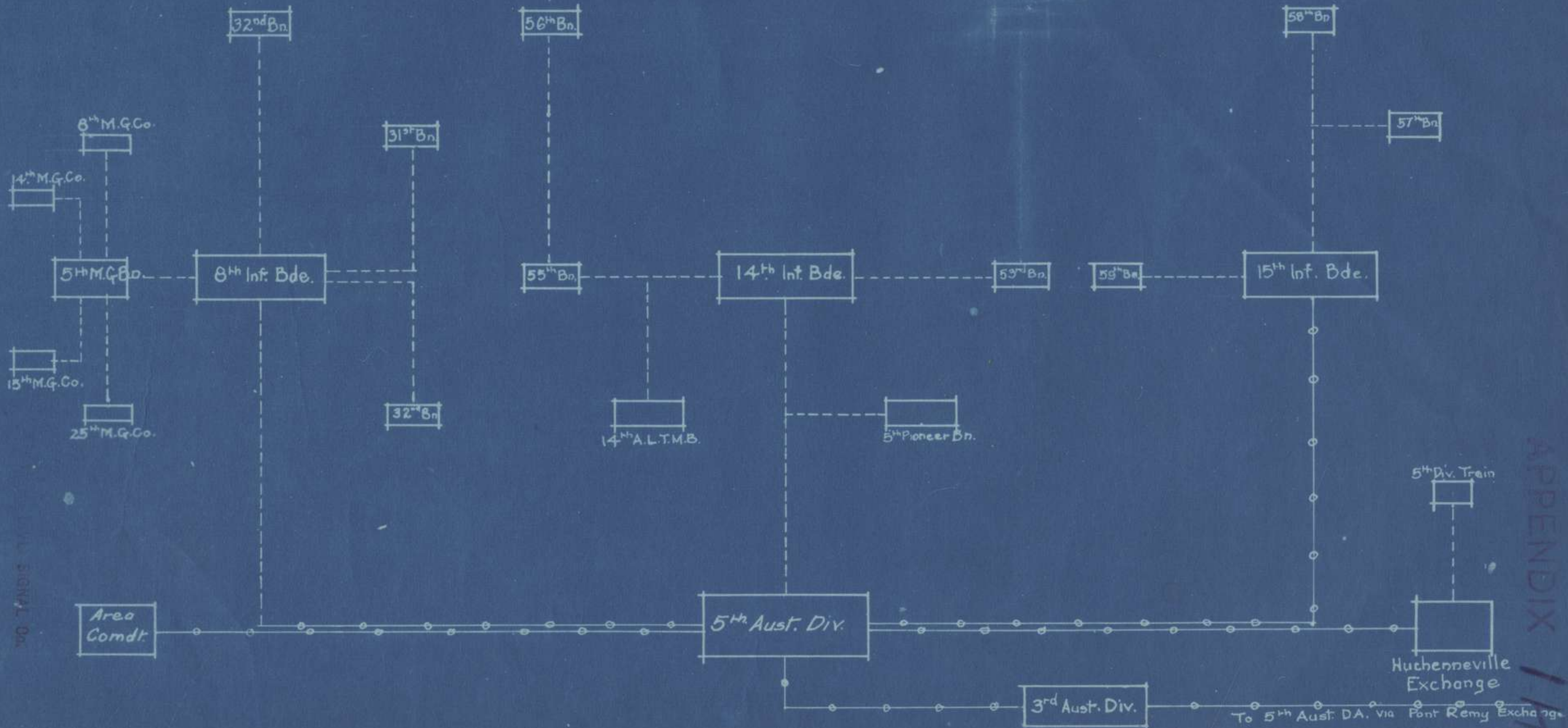


# DIAGRAM OF COMMUNICATIONS 14/11/18

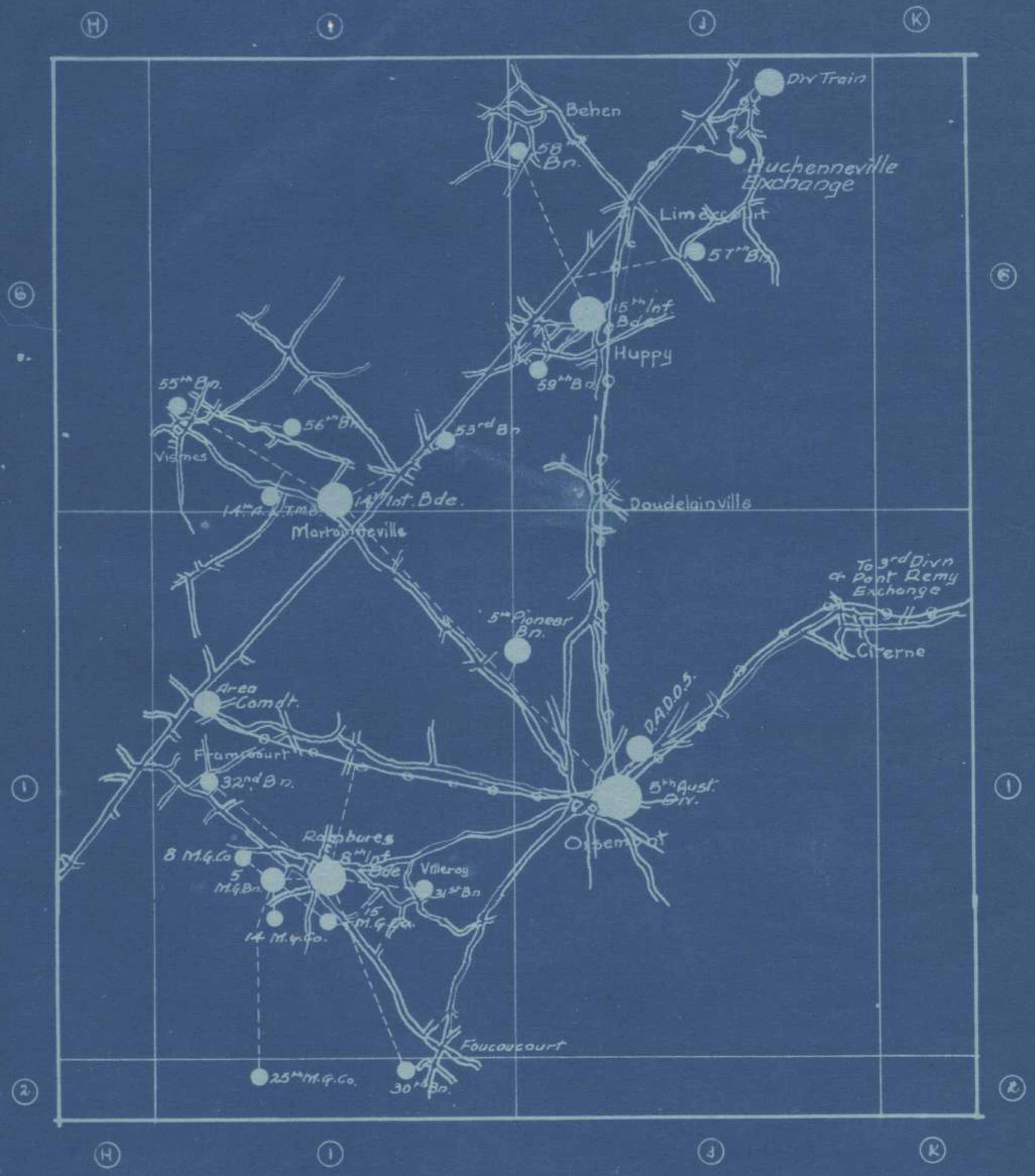

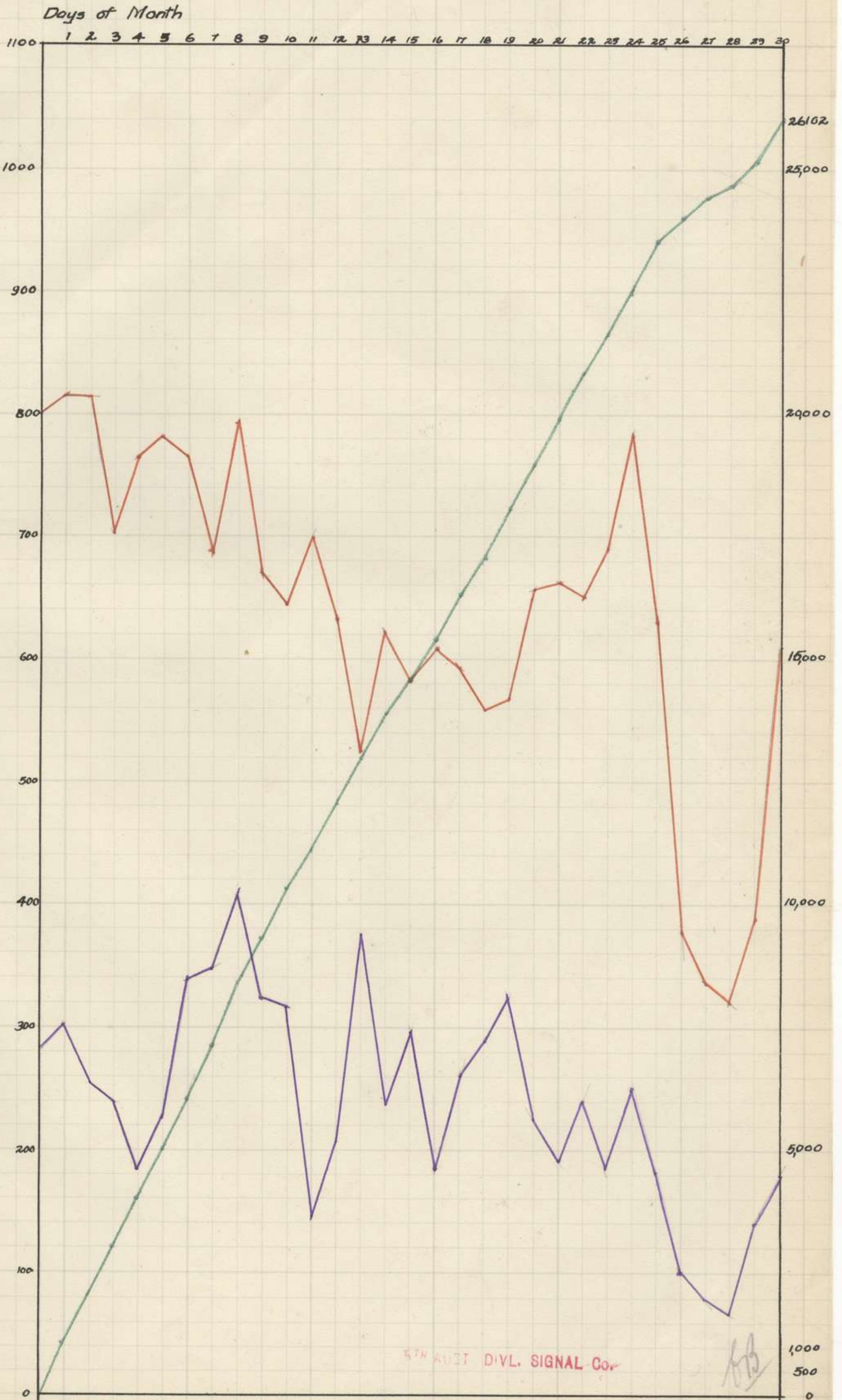
# Traffic Chart of D.R.L.S. & Telegrams

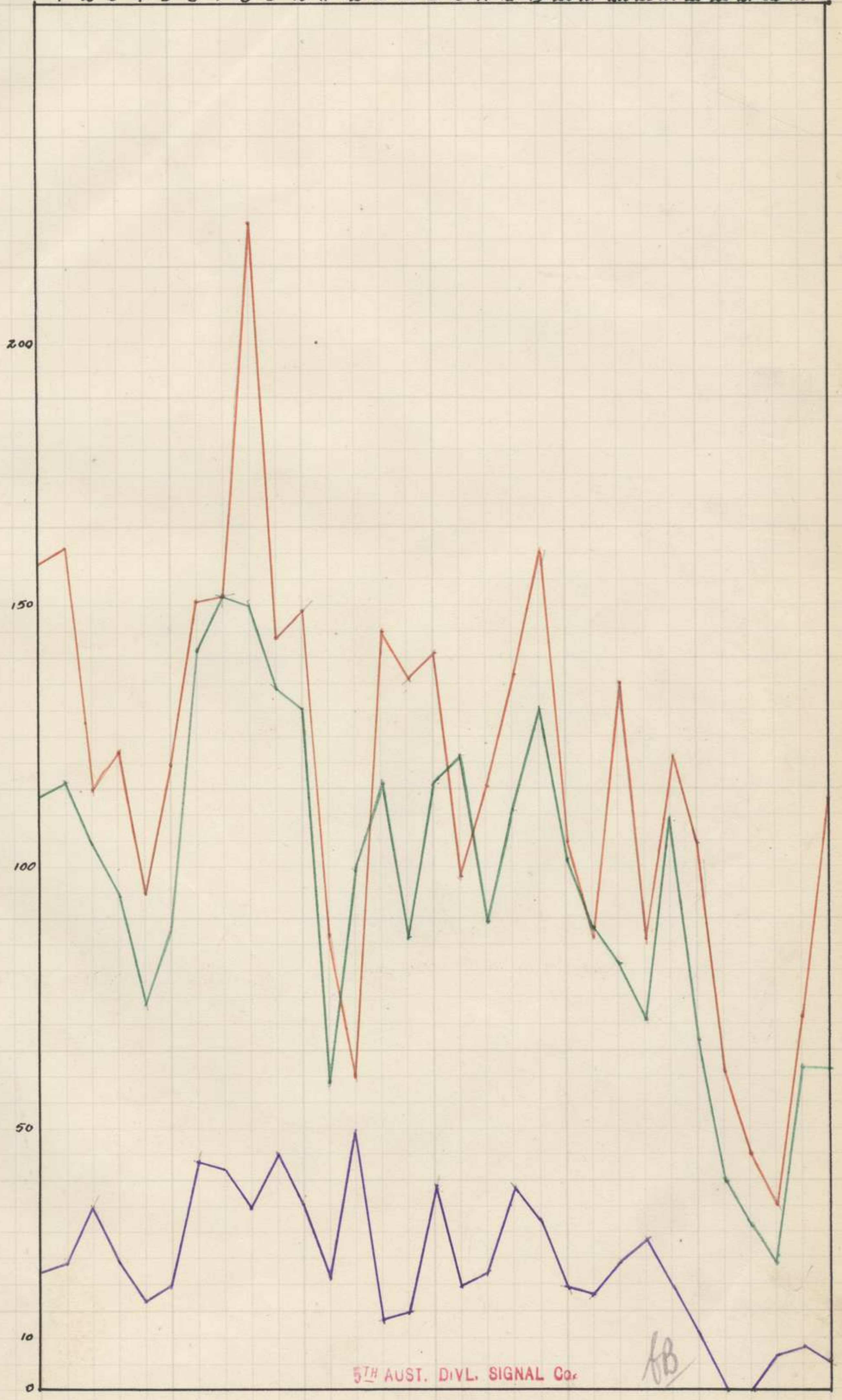
