





BLANKETS FOR MEN PROCEEDING ON LEAVE TO UNITED KINGDOM. 255.

The number of blankets issued to men proceeding on leave will be entered on the back of the perforated slip of leave warrant. Men arriving at BASE with less than number of blankets entered on leave warrant will be reported by BASE to their Unit and charged with cost thereof on return. Men returning from leave to Units with less than Two blankets will be similarly treated.

SALE OF ARTICLES PURCHASED IN CANTEENS. (G.R.O. 6146) 256.

It has come to notice that soldiers are selling goods purchased from canteens and regimental institutes to French and Belgian civilians. This practice will cease forthwith. It is pointed out that Canteens have been established solely for the use and benefit of the British Army in the Field; all goods being sold therein being through the courtesy of the French Government, imported into this country duty free, and articles are therefore saleable at a cheaper rate than is possible in French and Belgian shops.

It has been brought to notice that a large number of soldiers are offering for sale in England various patterns of German and Austrian automatic pistols, many of which must have found their way there from France. This practice is strictly forbidden. The only Souvenirs that may be taken or sent home without special authority are German Helmets, caps, badges, numerals and buttons. All other captured articles are to be handed to the R.A.O.C.

Leave men will be inspected before leaving their Units to ensure that no pistols or souvenirs of any sort other than those

in the preceding paragraph are in their possession.

Further inspections will be carried out at the Port of Embarkation from time to time and any man found in possession of prohibited souvenirs will be sent back to his Unit and his leave cancelled.

The kits of all ranks passing through Embarkation Camps for demobilisation will be inspected and any officer or man found in possession of prohibited articles will be arrested and his conduct investigated with a view to bringing him to trial on a charge of theft or other suitable charge.

Any man Officer or man found attempting to send prohibited articles out of the country by post or the Military Forwarding

Establishment will be dealt with similarly.

### 259. RAILWAYS - DAMAGE TO STOCK AND REMOVAL OF BITTINGS (G.R.O. 6239)

The following is an extract from a report on the condition of a leave train on its arrival at the Base: - coolegant of "Dirty- Many Stoves missing - Many Stove Pipes missing where stoves have been left. Benches have been burnt in several trucks. First Class French Coach D.P.Y. 140 has been entirely gutted : not only have cushions been taken but the general structure of the inside of the ceach has been destroyed apparently with an axe. All windows broken - sashes, straps, cords, and curtains cut out or in other ways destroyed. The coach is in a disgraceful state and is certainly of no use on the train."

The above is only one of very many similar reports which have been received of damage being caused to railway stock of trains employed for the movement of personnel both for demobilisation and leave. The damage usually takes two forms, either damage done by carelessness, such as broken windows and doors of passenger stock, or damage due to deliberate abstraction of fittings, such as stoves

seat cushions etc.

This damage has lately reached such proportions that it is impossible to effect repairs, or to replace fittings sufficiently quickly to maintain the stock in condition, and considerable hardship is inevitably caused to troops who have subsequently to use the damaged trains, more particularly in cold weather. Damage of this nature can be avoided. Deliberate damage is caused by a small minority who do not appreciate the hardships they inflict on their comrades by their action. Damage caused by carelessness is only caused by thoughtlessness. All ranks are urged therefore, in the general interest to do everything in their power by loyal cooperation to maintain trains in the best possible condition. ### 259. RAILWAYS - DAMAGE TO STOCK AND REMOVAL OF FITTINGS (G.R.O. 6239).

The following is an extract from a report on the condition of a leave train on its arrival at the Base:"Dirty - Many stoves missing - Many stove pipes missing where stoves have been left. Benches have been burnt in several trucks. First Class French Coach D.P.Y. 140 has been entirely gutted: not only have cushions been taken but the general structure of the inside of the coach have been destroyed, apparently with an axe. All windows broken - sashes, straps, cords, and curtains cut out or in other ways destroyed. The coach is in a disgraceful state and is certainly of no use on the train."

The above is only one of many similar reports which have been received of damage being caused to railway stock of trains employed for the movement of personnel both for demobilisation and leave. The damage usually takes Two forms, either damage done by carelessness such as broken windows and doors of passenger stock, or damage due to deliberate abstraction of fittings, such as stoves seat cushions

eto.

This damage has lately reached such proportions that it is impossible to effect repairs, or to replace fittings sufficiently quickly to maintain the stock in condition, and considerable hardship is inevitably caused to troops who have subsequently to use the damaged trains, more particularly in cold weather. Damage of this nature can be avoided. Deliberate damage is caused by a small minority who do not appreciate the hardships they inflict on their comrades by their action. Damage caused by carelessness is only caused by thoughtlessness. All ranks are urged therefore, in the general interest to do everything in their power by loyal cooperation to maintain trains in the best possible condition.
