



The following scheme for anti-gas training based on the training laid down for Reinforcement Camps and Depots, is forwarded as a general guide for the training in this subject, while the Division is out of the line. Sufficient copies are issued. for distribution down to Companies and Battories,

Practical Demonstrations can be carried out by the

Divisional Gas Officer and his Staff in, -

a) Attacks with Gas Shell. (Lachrymator and asphyxiating.)

b) Cloud gas. (Chlorine and Smoke.)

e) nothed of using Flammenwerfer and Projectors. An opportunity will also be given all ranks to smell the chief enemy gasses.

War, being based mainly on offensive action, calls for instruction mainly in subjects meant to inculcate the offensive spirit. But prosent conditions have shown that in order to be in a position to carry out this offensive action, a unit must be able successfully to rosist all forms of gas attacks. Hence great care is necessary during the instructional period to teach men about the defence provided against gas, and the means used to ensure its proper use. Hitherto in many instances the tendency has been to sacrifico the so called "gas drill" to the claims of others of the various branches of instruction given to recruits.

Disciplinary drill, muskotry and bayonet fighting loom large in the daily programme, and rightly so; while instruction designed essentially to save the man who is to become eventually part of the offensive force, has been regarded as a very third rate subject. In spite of great efforts to apread information on Gas Dofonce, and to secure a better training of mon in the use of the respirator, one often finds that a unit regards "Gas Drill" as a boro and includes it out of mere compulsion rather than from a point of interest in its

men's welfare.

The usual type of Gas Drill has been 10 minutes adjustment of maks, wrong adjustments often going quite unnoticed.

ATIS OF GAS TRAINING. The aim of such "Gas Drill" was merely quick adjustment of masks. It succeeded in a half-hearted sort of way. But, as far as gas training is concorned, it failed because it did not impart certain necossary information and failed to secure its rightful place in the general scheme of training from the soldiers point of view. Gas training in fact achieved a place of isolation.

In the following scheme I propose to show how one can evercome this isolation and at the same time make "Gas Drill" periods real "Gas

Training" periods.

The old schome aimed at quick adjustment. The following schemo aims at three results, viz .-

(a) To secure quick and correct adjustment.

(b) To give more information about essential subjects, such as the respirator., and care of it, gas shelling and ways of averting casualtice, oto.

(o) To ensure mouring of respirators during prolonged periods ospocially during muskotry training, bayonet righting,

parados and bombing emorcises,

(2).

Portods of an hour should be devoted to gas training and this hour should be divided into three parts, not sharply divided, as follows:-

(1) Drill by numbers and in quick time. (11) Adjustment, using as many competitive games as possible.

(iii) A short talk on one of the following subjects;-

Small box respirator and how it works.
Inspection - so that the mon themselves can help in it.
Hethod of cleaning eyepieces.
Gare of respirator.
Gas shells, recognition, action to be taken; how to treat casualties.
Action after a gas shell bombardment.
Care of arms after a gas attack.
Importance of alarms.
Protection of dug-outs.
Gorman pretection. etc.

The first part of the hour should always be devoted to adjustment by numbers, even if the squad is far advanced. At first the whole of the time should be given by obtaining adjustment from the safe position wind dangerous position; when this is done the adjustment from safe position and the various exercises as detailed in S.S.534, introduced, so that the initial part of the hour's training should become fuller as the squad gets more advanced. However advanced the squad gets, the

adjustment by numbers should be included.

Having done the drill period, one wants to create a competitive spirit and secure quicker adjustment by matching squads. This can be done by apprion of certain physical drill games, which besides creating competition, secure adjustment of masks whilst the owner is to a certain extent in an excited state of mind. In these games the respirators can be adjusted from the wind dangerous position, from the plang position, and also from off the ground. Each game aims at three things, quick adjustment, exercise whilst wearing mask, providing occasions for longer periods of wear. Besides these things one can also teach a great deal from a type of 'victoria Cross Race' where the rescued man is supposed to be a "gassed case" in a gassed area.

During the third period of the hour (10 minutes either after the games, or in between drill and the games.) the instructor ought to give some instruction in one of the subjects mentioned above. These can be made extremely interesting and by suggestions and questions can stimulate thought and interest which the old drill scheme failed to do. The question of training instructors is not a dufficult one and the Officer i/c Gas Training might help them considerably in these small

loctures by giving them notes to help.

Finally to finish up the hour the squad spends a few minutes in treating eye-pieces with anti-dimming composition.

worth while. Keenness is evinced such as is impossible in the older 10 minutes system. Each hour ought to add to the amount of knowledge gained by the man, ought to increase his ability to adjust and use his mask properly, and in ne period ought the instructor to let cas Training get uninteresting.

Having suggested a scheme for the Gas Training hour itself, it is essential to get such training linked up with the other subjects now taught. This is necessary to overcome the isolation achieved by the old gas drill; and it also gives the man a chance to wear his respirator and become used to doing simple exercises in it.

In musketry training the fire positions, aiming, rapid loading might well be done whilst wearing respirators. A few rounds might be fired on the range, too, with S.B.R.'s adjusted. rounds might be fired on the range, too, with S.B.R.'s adjusted. During the bayonet fighting, the earlier practices could be done buring the bayonet fighting, the men might go over the assault in respirators, and eventually the men might go over the assault course in masks. Bombing instructions can include Gas Fraining. In actual bombing, occasions have arisen when the enemy has raided in conjunction with a discharge of gas when it became raided in conjunction with a discharge of gas when it became necessary for men wearing masks to bomb him out of our trenches

Such a co-operation between the various subjects should be possible in all units as well as in Reinforcement Depots, where instructors are general rather than specialists and where each branch is under the control of a specialist Officer. The aim in such a scheme would not be directly utilitarian, but would be such as to ensure the exercises being carried out under all conditions. For example - a beyonet charge in masks, though not an impossible example - a beyonet charge in masks, though not an impossible occurrence, is not an every day occurrence. Yet the man does his essault under the most difficult conditions and at the same time succeeds in wearing his respirator. Gas training especially benefits in this way, without detriment to the other subjects. Details of co-operation could thus be worked out and the whole scheme of recruit training linked into a composite whole.

Roforonce your No.17/130/18 dated 5-2-18. Officers commanding units are responsible for the inspection of all anti-gas appliances on their charge. These inspections are usually carried out by officers with the assistance of Unit Gas. N.C.Os. I suggest that horse respirators should be inspected weekly

Dvory unit should have at least 2 Gas N.C.Os. who have beer under unit arrangements. trained at a Gas School and recommended by the Commandant of the School as suitable for duty as Gas N.C.Os. (S.S. 554. Defence incapures against Gas Attacks, page 7.). Training of Gas N.C.Os includes the use, care,

and inspoction of horse respirators.

It is impossible for Officers and N.C.Os of the Gas Service. with formations to undertake the regular inspection of anti-gas appliances in units but I concur in your suggestion that whenever a Gau Officer makes a special inspection of horse respirators he should work in conjunction with a Voterinary Officer. Warning has been received that this Division will relieve the 4th Aust.Div. in the left Divisional Sector by about Larch 1st.

Two Infantry Brigades are in the line and one is in Divisional Reserve. Of the line Brigades, the Right Brigade has two battaliens in the Forward Zone, one in Support, partly in the Forward Zone and partly in the Speil Bank and one in Reserve.

The left Drigade, has one battalion in the forward Zone, one partly in the Forward Zone and partly in the Spoil Bank and two in Reserve.

The Reserve and Right Brigades relieve one another and the Loft Brigade arranges its own reliefs.

TESTS OF SIGNALS TO & FROM CONTACT PLANES

GENERAL IDEA. (See attached map.)

An advance has been made from the line - LANCASHIRE FARM - S. ZWAANHOF FARM in a northerly direction, with the old Gorman Front line as the final objective from C.14. central to the CANAL at C.7.0.0.9.

Two planes will fly over the Infantry in first test and remain over the Infantry during remaining tests and will each render an independent report on the comparative value of the signals made by the Infantry.


A different plane will be employed to carry out each of the tests except No.5.

One of the planes employed in first test and each of the planes employed for second, third and fourth tests will mark on a map the position of the Infantry as observed and drop the map at the dropping station near BOESINGHE.

Six Officers who have had practical experience in action of signals from contact planes will be with the Infantry and will on the conclusion of the tests render an independent report as to the comparative values of the signals used by the planes.

On the conclusion of the fifth test the Infantry taking part will stand up to show to spectators the position of the line they have been occupying.

- 2. The following principles have been laid down by the Corps Commander concorning the responsibility for the services of roconnaissance and protection in defensive warfare of the

(a) The general responsibility for patrolling rests with the prosont naturo. brigade commander, the execution with the battalion commander, That is to say, that the brigade commander supervises to the

oxtont -

that the brigade front is adequately patrolled. that important localities in the enemy line are watched;

that the method of patrolling does not become too

storeotypod;

- that a minimum number of patrols are out on each night, especially during reliefs, dark nights and feggy weather (iv)
- that reconnaissance is made of any particular portion of the enemy line on which he requires information. (V)
- (b) The battalion commander is responsible for the actual arrangoments in detail :-

the formation, strongth, and route of patrols;

(ii) the allotment of objectives in detail;

(iii) the maintenance of liaison patrols; the prompt rondition of reports and passage of urgent (iv)

information to higher formations;

detailed arrangements for protective patrols during (V) battalion reliefs and inter-company reliefs.

The battalion commander, in organising patrols, naturally will do so in consultation with his company commanders; and he should emplain to them that battalion control in no way absolbes them from their responsibility for vigilance in the dafonce of their portion of the front.

- 3. Patrolling requires careful preparation, e,g, study of ground by day, aeroplane photographs, etc. A programme of patrolling should be mapped out after such study and pabools should be warned, and receive their orders, well in advance.
- 4. In view of the proximity of the opposing lines patrolling is, to a great extent limited to night time and foggy days. To ensure that troops are competent to carry out patrols in the darknoss caroful training by night is ossential. There has been a marked absence of this in the training syllabi of some units. The Divisional Commander directs that immediate action be taken to ensure that this is remedied. Training by night includes training in -

(a) Location of position, and maintenance of direction. On clear nights a knowledge of the principal stars is the best means on dull nights conformation of the ground and facility in distinguishing the sound of the discharge of our own field guns and

the simplest.

(b) Knowledge of the compass and facility in its use

(c) Lovement in set formation and in silence. Training should be made interesting by employing an enemy. The should put up a flare of some kind whonever movement is detected. The interest in training of this kind can be developed until the men become thoroughly keen on scout and patrol work.

Names of lecturers and dates available will be communicated as soon as possible.

Arrangements should be made in accordance with para. 1
(b) and (c) of 0.B./2176 for officers experienced in lecturing to meet and hear these lecturers with a view to preparing and delivering similar lectures.

4. At each of these lectures there should be a responsible chairman who will advise the audience at the commencement of the lecture that questions may be asked in writing.

Every man desiring to ask a question should put his No. name and unit on a piece of paper with the question. If the lecturer has no time to reply verbally an answer will be sent in writing.



With reference to 0.B./1903 dated 27th December, 1917, the following arrangements have been made to enlarge the lecture scheme.


- 1. (a) Representatives of the various Government Departments will shortly visit France with the express purpose of explaining what the Government has already done, and is preparing to do, along the lines of the training and employment of disabled soldiers, development of agriculture, reconstruction, etc.
- (b) As it will be impossible for these gentlemen to lecture to more than a small percentage of the troops, it is proposed that G.H.Q shall make arrangements for them to meet officers of ability and experience in lecturing, willing to undertake the preparation and delivery through their respective formations of authoritative lectures on these lines, after full oppostunties of listening to and questioning the representatives from the Government Departments.
- (c) Armies will arrange for the selection from each Division, and G.O.C. L of C. Area from each base, of two officers for this purpose whose names should be submitted to G.H.Q. as soon as possible as the Government representatives will be arriving in France at an early date.
- (d) Armies and G.O.C., L of C. Area will subsequently arrange for these officers to deliver lectures in their respective areas.
- Further efforts should be made to meet what would appear to 2. be a real need for fostering and developing the intellectual life of the troops. Their moral may be appreciably raised by stimulating their interest in subjects other than the War.

This may be accomplished in part by the encouragement of officers to give lectures on subjects of general interest. A list of officers willing to give such lectures is being prepared and will be circulated by G.H.Q.

It may even be found possible to arrange for small classes in general and technical educational subjects conducted by officers or men with previous educational experience. These would be of special value at bases where the hours of work are regular, and the mer have considerable periods of leisure at present employed largely in an unprofitable manner.

Courses in such subjects are being prepared, and in such a way that they could be adopted even by a fighting unit whose opportunities would be intermittent.

- 3. (a) It is proposed that General Staff, Training Branch, shall supervise the arrangements for lectures, etc. An officer has already been attached to the Staff at u.H.Q. for this purpose.
- (b) Should it appear necessary, officers may be attached to the Staff at Headquarters of Armies, Corps, R.F.C. Tank Corps, etc., and of Infantry Brigades.
- (c) An officer should be attached to the Staff of Divisions, of Bases, and of G.HQQ. Troops for the same purpose. It is essential that the officers selected should be keen on this kind of work and qualified by previous experience. No pay will be allowed for the appointment.



(d) It will be the duty of such officers as are appointed to make arrangements for lectures and to search for new lecturers and submit their names to G.H.Q. for approval.

- (e) They will also take steps to find out what opportunities for general and technical education are desired by the troops and will keep a list of such subjects. A list will also be prepared of officers and men whose previous education and experience qualify them to give instruction. The lists of teachers and subjects must be submitted to G.H.Q. for approval.
- (f) With the lists of subjects and teachers before gim the officer appointed should endeavour to work out a simple plan of educational classes.
- 4. Considerable assistance may be expected from the Y.M.C.A. and similar organisations in regard to the loan of class-rooms, books, etc., and the existing educational facilities of these institutions may be made use of by arrangement.
- 5. All arrangements must receive the approval of the General Staff, G.H.Q. before being carried into effect. No assistance may, however, be expected from the Staff except in, the provision to a limited extent of outline courses of study, books, equipment and other facilities.

Dr. IRVINE has had 28 years experience in America and is an old soldier. Irish born. On discovering he could not read or write, he began to look round for a chance to learn. He went to Scotland to the coal pits and stayed there for a considerable length of time, no 'open door' however appeared techniques there for gaining an education, except the British Army and he will be grateful for the keigin beginning which ke gave him It gave him a chance to see the world. He matriculated and went to U.S.A. where it took him 5 years to get to the University. After getting his University course, he became a preacher. A friend of his named Jack London got him out of the ministry and said you ought to be writing books and Dr. IRVINE took his advice After writing for some months and having such a salary as he never expected, the Church called him back as they could not get a crowd. Later on, he became professor of English literature. On reading of the retreat from MONS in the daily paper one morning he decided to return to his home land and assist his countrymen if it even came to sweeping the streets. On the morning in question, three German professors who had not spoken a word previously said to him 'What do you think of your British Army now?' He replied to the effect that the British Army appeared to be wiped out but that tomorrow there will be another one and the third day a third one; he knew John Bull and also that it took him about 5 years to open his eyes, but when he did he made no mistake, and would give the Germans something to think about for the next 7 years.

Substitute for TEA - Camolile, blackberry, birch and hazelwood leaves also dry nettle leaves.

Substitute for TOBACCO - As a whole this is made of hops and birch leaves.

The result of these substitutes is that tuberculosis has increased 78 per cent in Germany and there were 40,000 prosecutions for hoarding in PRWSSIA alone. Nearly two million food cards were fraudulent.

65 per cent of the all the essential food stuffs of the United Kingdom and United Kingdom Armies comes from CANADA.

Four million food cards will shortly be issued through -out England (from the King down. It will be a democratic food ration and scheme all included - absolute democracy in the food question in England. This being an absolutely new thing, there are bound to be mistakes, hitches, etc. brought about in a measure by the following - 500,000 people change their addresses every week in consequence of which the distribution machinery will of course be knocked out of order to a certain extent. I 6000 children are born every week. This is the first time in the history of the British Nation that a child enters into this world under such conditions were as now prevail. The child is the supreme thing of 1918 and it always ought to have been a supreme thing - we know the value of man-power now. queues Food ques are too new at present to work easily, but when the rationing comes into full force and apportioned, the queues will diminish just as our efficiency will increase. Lord RHONDA says to tell the men that we will answer every individual question by every soldier on the food question individually. He wishes the troops told that the first milk ration will go to the mother and when the child comes into the world it has first claim on the molk ration.

It will take a tremendous amount of shipping to get food to our shores. President WILSON waited and waited, but when did U.S.A. entered the war, they entered it to end it. On the morn--ing of the makitimation declaration they mobilised the farmers. have been 9,750,000 men baing registered in U.S.A. and they are coming across the ocean now and this is one reason for the shortage of food at present

They established in every county an experimental station more spending money on experiments of how to raise hogs, grain etc. with the result that half a billion extra bushels of wheat were raised. The Food Controller sent out little leaflets wonderfully written, powerful and appealing, telling the people what they were up against and asking them to cut out unnecessary foods, and to have a meatless and wheatless meal one day in every week.

1ast year. United States was previous to the declaration of war behind in ship-building. At the present moment, the shipbuilding is in a very prosperous state and if England adds to this, we need not fear the U boats. America is now experimenting and also has in the waters of U.S.A., anti-V boat appliances, and it is pro-posed to build an avenue of such ships across the Atlantic, which, with the assistance of torpedo boats and our own submarines, will ensure the safe passage of food stuffs.
