

#### REPORT ON ENEMY RAID ON 19th. AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BATTALION

#### ON NIGHT 1/and MARCH 1918.

APPENDIX.

SUMMARY.

Strength of RAIDING PARTY (estimated) 3 Officers and 189 Other Ranks.

Party wore White Bands on Left Sleeve above the Elbow. FRONTAGE OF ATTACK .- From 9.6.c.4.3. to 0.12.a.3.8. (150 to 299 yards)

MILITARY CONDITIONS - Very favourable to the ENEMY as the Battalion was in the act of Relieving the 15th Battalion A.I.F.

WEATHER CONDITIONS .- The WIGHT was very dark. TIME OF ATTACK. 9.40 p.m.

ENEMY'S OBJECTIVE Company Headquarters in Pill Box at 0.13.a. 35.95, and Posts 3.0.13, 4.0.13 and 1.0.6.

RESULT. Enemy succedded in overcoming Post 1.9.6 and surrounded Coy. Hqrs. Pill Box taking Prisoners. They were driven off by Posts 3.0.12 and 4.0.12 sustaining casualties of lofficers 30 Other Ranks killed and 1 Officer 3 Other ranks wounded and Prisoners. One unwounded German was captured. They were also reported to have had casualties in getting back through our Barrage, and to have had 8 other ranks killed by Left Post of 5 3rd. Bn. (on our right) and 1 other rank wounded and prisoner.

OUR CASUALTIES .- Killed - 1 Officer (Major H.N. Henwood) and 3 other ranks Wounded- 1 Officer (Capt. A. H. Hacdonald) and 15 other ranks Missing(believed captured) 7 other ranks.

The 13th. A.I. Battalion also sustained casualties.

The ENEMY obtained no papers of value. Major Henwood's Maps, B.A.B. Code etc were found hidden in the Dugout when retaken. The Fullerphone was also found hidden under the Bed.

#### NARRATIVE.

War Diair

On Night 1/2nd March the 19th. Battalion relieved the 13th Battalion AIF in Right Battalion Sector of 1st. Division on Right of CANAL.

The Relief was nearing completion when at 9.40 p.m. the ENEMY put down a Barrage of Pineapple Bombs and Minnenwerfers on our wire and Front Line Posts. About 20 minutes later a heavy Barrage of 4.2",5.9", and 8# fell on our Front, Support, and Reserve Lines, on Battalion Headquarters, and on the OAK AVENUE and the Duckwalks leading back along the CANAL.

- 9.43 P.m. Our S.O.S. went up from the Front Line, and was repeated back by Visual Sig nal and by Buzzer to Brigade Headquarters and to Artillery.
- 9.50 P.m. Our Barrage opened. All Signals were reported down. Message sent by Runner to "B" Coy. (Reserve) at White Chateau to man Reserve Line Strong Posts and to "A" and "w" (Raiders) Companies to "Stand To"
- 19.5 p.m. An Officer of the 15th. Battalion came in from the Front Line Left and reported that the ENEMY was attacking on both Banks of the CANAL
- 19.15 P.m. ENEMY's fire slackened.
- 10.35 p.m. ENEMY'S fire almost ceased.
- 10.40 p.m. A Man from "D" Company front Line Posts reported that the

- Ememy had Raided our Right Posts and Captured Coy. HQ.

  10.40 p.m. Sent Message to O.C. "W" (Raiders) Coy. at White Chatsau
  to report immediately to Battalion Headquarters.
- 10.41 p.m. Verbal message received from 0.0. "C" Coy. (in Support Line) that "D" Company Headquarters had been raided and that he was attacking immediately to retake them.
- 10.58 p.m. Received message from O.C. "C" Coy. sent at 10.30 p.m. confirming verbal message as above.
- 11.19 p.m. Received message from O.C. "C" Coy. (Left Front Coy)
  "Have retaken "D" Coy. Hqrs., and replaced casualties
  in Posts. My Support Line is very thin."
- 11.20 p.m. Sent message to O.C. "A"Coy. to send two Platoons to report to O.C. "C"Coy. and reinforce Support Line.
- 11.31 p.m. O.C. "W" Coy. reported at HN.HQ.. Sent out a Fighting Patrol of 3 Officers and 35 other ranks from "W" Coy. under Capt. Macdonald with orders to report on situation of whole of Front Line.
- 11.50 P.M. Sent short report on situation to 3rd. A.I. Brigade HQ.

Between 12 midnight and 2 a.m. four Prisoners, 1 Officer and 3 other ranks wounded and 1 other rank unwounded were received at BN.HQ and dealt with by BN.I.O. in the usual manner.

- 1 a.m. Received message from O.C. "C" Coy. "Have reconneitred the whole of Battalion Front and report situation normal and all Posts manned."
- 2 a.m. Capt. A.H. Macdonald reported wounded and stated his Patrol had been fired at from direction of Lock 2 6 when at about 0.6.c.5.1.
- 2.39 a.m. I visited the Support Line and Front Line Posts and found all quiet. I obtained the following information :-

FROM LIEUT. C.J. SCOTT- At 9.40 p.m. what appeared to be a Box Barrage was put down on our Line. Some few minutes later men were observed moving through our wire from direction slightly Left of Post 1.0.6. After Bombing they rushed this Post. I was at Post 3.0.12 and turned Lewis Gun on the Party. About this time the S.O.S. went up. Another party was then observed advancing through wire between 3.0.13 and 4.0.13 The Lewis Gun was turned on them, and they were attacked with Bombs, when they retired. When I opened Fire on the First Party I sent a Runner to Coy. Hors. to report that Enemy was attacking our Front. By the time the Runner (Pte Searle) get to Coy. Hqrs. it was in the hands of the Enemy, and he was captured. I heard him shout out "Mr Scott" MrScott" I next saw a party of about 6 men advancing down road South from Coy. Hqrs. They shouted out in bad English "Don't Shoot" I opened fire on them and wounded and captured a German Officer, the party scattered, the Post opened fire with rifles and three were killed between posts 2.0.12 and 3.0.12 while attempting to recross our wire. Lance Corporal Wallace and Private Reach volunteered to accompany me and reconnoitre Posts 4.0.12 1.0.6. and Coy. Hars. We found Post 4.0.12 withdrawn 50 yards in rear.

NARRATIVE (Contd)

Corporal Duncan in charge of this Post stated that he was driven by shell fire from his post and took up a Position 59 yards in rear where he kept up a brisk rifle fire across front of Coy. Hqrs. and Post 1.0.6. I found Coy Hqrs. deserted except for one of our own men who was wounded. The Telephones were disconnected I then went to Post 1.0.6. and found two of the Garrison wounded and one in adazed condition. The Lewis Gun was still in the Post and undamaged. I manned the Post with some men from Post 4.9.13 and then got into touch with Platoon Commander on my Left.

From personal reconnaissance I estimate the Enemy's casualties - Killed 1 Officer and 30 other ranks wounded and Prisoners - 1 Officer & 2 Other ranks

All the Raiding Party wore white bands on the Left Arm above the elbow.

LIEUT. DURIEU

Post 1.0.6. which is under my Command also Coy. Hq. I was at Post 2.0.6. and the Raiders passed between me and Post 1.0.6. We opened Fire killing at least two of the Enemy. Lieut. Scott got into touch with me at about 10.30. p.m.

No. 284 Pte. Daley R. "D" Coy- When "D" Coy. reached Coy. Hqrs. the Company Sergeant Hajor of 13th.Bn. said a Raid was expected and Major Henwood placed anextra sentry outside Coy. Hqrs. I was in a small Pill Box in front of the big one with L. Cpl. Moody and 4 others: A barrage came down on Coy. Hqrs.. Lance Corporal Moody went outside. He rushed back and told us we were sunrounded by Germans. Foreign voices yelled out "Get out of here and come up" I went up with the others and found a large number of Germans with fixed batonets. They took us prisoners. They plut us in the middle and were all round us. When we had gone about 150 yards towards the German Lines a big shell landed right amongst us and the Germans scattered. I think several were hit. I made a bolt for it and got away. Private Thomas also got away but he was wounded. When I got back to Coy. Hqrs. there was no one there. I looked into the Pill Box where I'd been before but a bomb or something had been exploded in it and all my gear was blown up.

Report on the preliminary examination of one prisoner of the 8th.Coy. 76th.Res.I.R. 17th.Res.Div. captured on night 1/2nd March. 1918.

1. PERSONAL. Prisoner is 20 years of age, was called up for service in 1917 and sont to do railway work at KIEL. Joined the ERSATZ Battalion of his regiment at MAMBURG on 5th.Aug. and remained there till 2nd. November, when he joined his regiment in the field.

He is of poor physique and moral. He had only been two

He is of poor physique and moral. He had only been two days with his company before capture, having spent about four weeks in the regimental rest station at HALLUIN.

- 2. HETHOD OF CAPTURE. Prisoner was a member of a large raiding party which made an attack on our posts in 0.12.A. and 0.6.C. at about 9.45.p.m. The commander of the raiding party became a casualty and prisoner attended to him and another comrado. When he left them he lost his way and wandered into one of our posts.
- ORDER OF BATTLE. N to S 76. R.I.R. 162nd I.R. 163. I.R. (Normal.) prisoner did not know what regiment was on his right, but knew it belonged to another Division. He thought there were Bavarians on their right.
- 4. DISPOSITIONS. Three companies hold the front line at present the 10th 11th and 12th (N.to.S.) Three in support, three in reserve and three in rest billets at HALLUIN.
- distance in front of the actual first line. These are, in the prisoner's company, manned only at night. During the day the garrisons sleep in dugouts. Two light M.Gs are taken into the posts.
- 6. RELIEFS. Nothing is known of a probable Divisional relief. The three companies in front line are relieved at the end of 4 days in line. One of these reliefs took place on night 27/28th Feby. thus another is due on night 3/4th March. The relieving Companies are due to arrive in line at about 9. to 10. p.m.
- 7. REST BILLETS. Are in HALLUIN.
- 8. COMPANY STRENGTH. The rifle strength is about 80.
- 9. ROUTE TO FRONT LINE. Prisoner does not know what routes were taken by the troops. The raiding party came from HALLUIN, but prison could not say where they debussed.
- 10. MACHINE GUNS. The 8th. Coy has 3 light machine guns two of which are taken into the outpost line; the third is kept in the support line as a reserve.
- 11. AIR RAIDS. Hany bombs have been dropped on HALLUIN and MENIN lately but very little military damage was done although there were a number of civilian casualties.
- 12. GINFRAL. The object of last nights raid was to secure prisoners.

  The total number taking part was stated to be 120 all ranks;
  composed of 8 men of each company, 20 pioneers, and the office.

  The pioneers carried two torpedoes for blowing up the ware and it was their job to see that the wire was cut. None of the mean of raiding parties bore any traces of identification.

They produced a blue cloud, with a strong smell of mustard and phosphorus, which sank slowly to the ground."

# INTELLIGENCE SURMARY NO. 13.

From 6.a.m. 15-3-18. to 6.a.m. 14-3-18.

Enemy Raid. At 10.p.m. enemy placed a heavy barrage on 1. OPERATIONS. the support line and C. T.'s on our Southern battalion front.

This became exceptionally heavy at 11.50.p.m.

At 12.5.a.m. under cover of this barrage a party of the onomy about 70 strong approached our wire between posts 2. 0.6. and They were immediately engaged with Lowis Gun and rifle fire and bombs. The leader of the party was killed, and a . fow succeeded in crossing our wire.

A hand to hand fight ensured, and as a result at least 13 onemy were taken prisoner, and about 10 enemy dead are lying in the vicinity of the posts. Patrols report that enemy stretener bearers were at work in No Hans Land after the raid for some time. On account of the fact that most of the prisoners were wounded

the exact number taken is not yet known.

A party of 1 Officer and 20 men were out from 3.30.a.m. until 5.30.a.m. to examine our wire and look for enemy dead in front of the posts where the enemy raided.

Distinct gaps were found in our wire in front of posts 4. 0.12. and 3. 0.6. Wire cutters had apparently been used. No enemy doad were found but enemy stretcher bearers could be

A fighting patrol of 28 men under Lieuts HEAD and SHARLANI heard at work. left our lines in two parties to reconneitre enemy post at 0.12. A.6.8. and if possible secure prisoners. The wire around the post was found to be much improved. Two rows were negotiated and patrol was penotrating the third when the enemy opened up heavy H.G., rifle and bombing fire. Our patrol retaliated but being in the open sustained 5 casualties and had to withdraw.

Preliminary interrogation of prisoners captured by 1st Australian Division this morning in 0.6.C.

Identification. Prisoners belonged 1st Battalion 70th.Inf.
Regiment. 51st. Division.

Until the Sist Decr., 1917, the Div, was holding the Lake NAROTCH sector in Russia, On that date they entrained at KOBYLNICK and travelled via KONSTANTINOFF and LYNPUPY to VILNA, where they detrained on the evening of 2nd Feby, and in which Town they remained until the 12th, billeted in the JUNKERSCHULF. On the 12th they entrained and travelled via KONIGSBERG. ELBING. DIRSCHAU. BALBURG. SIEGBURG. AIX-LA-CHAPELLE. VERVIER and ST NICHOLAS to ST GILLIES, where they detrained about 18th Dec. Two companies, including the prisoner's, then marched to METRONICK on the Dutch frontier, where they remained until 14th Jan. Other companies were hilleted at VERREBROECK. On the 14th Jan. they entrained at ST GILLES and detrained at WAERENGHEN, whence they narched to OOSTROOSEBENT They remained two days and two nights at OOSTROOSEBENT, then went into the sector on the YPRES front.

A silent raiding party of 2 Officers 1 Offizierstellvertreter a d between 70 - 80 other ranks, after special training, and
careful preparation embussed in MENIN at 8.p.m. on the 13th Inst,
with the ultimate objective of surrounding 3 of our posts located

with the ultimate objective of surrounding 3 of our posts located in 0.6.0. and netting in, or dealing with, any of our smaller patrols, should they have had the misfortune to run across them.

The training for this fruitless enterprise appears to have been carried out with extreme precision and care, on no loss than 5 occasions did the party practice the scheme on a replica of the ground to be covered. in MENIN.

The idea was for the whole patrol to get out into NO MANS LAND, there divide into two parties one to work round the northern most post and the other party round the southern most post, meet behind, extend, then sweep to their lines.

A light 08 pattern M.G. was to take up a position on the bank of the canal, thus affording flank protection on the right. \* (See Diagram.)

First prisoner was on the left of the left party and owing to the fog failed to recognise, points he had been taught to remember by heart, his friend who accompanied him fell wounded in NO MANS LAND prisoner continued leaving the wounded man to his fate, until he himself fell into a deep shell hole filled with water, after which he seemed to have little care for this world, and being completely alone and desolate, wandered on until he found himself being escerted down the duckboards.

All means of identification had been removed from prisoners including identity discs, and before the maid took place, they were told to give the number of any regiment other than their own.

Prisoners having never been in the sector before had absolutely no knowledge of any headquarters, or rear locations, and were therefore unable to furnish any acceptable targets for our own or flank divisions.

Our wire. Prisoners states our wire hampered them, but it being dark, they were able to climb over it, shewing as a proof 2 holes in his trouser knees. ( their wire prisoner stated was just about the same strongth as our own.)

Except for above activity and a working party heard well in rear of GAME COPSE, the enemy was very quiet, no signs of hostile patrols wer seen. Gas in No Mans Land hampered patrol movement.

From our left Brigade Sector the two following reports are the outstanding features of the nights patrolling.

From 6.a.m. 19-3-18. to 6.a.m. 20-3-18.

1. OPERATIONS. Our policy of aggressive harassing fire was continued by all batteries in accordance with recent intelligence. Intermittent bursts of fire were directed on to the following locations CHALK and UGLY FARMS. DAMP COPSE. JELLY and JAEGER trenches ZANDVOORDE, QUART BUILDINGS. CIRCUS POINT. BUND COTTS and dugouts at J.32.B.45.25. In addition roads in P.2.B.&.C. were thoroughly searched and swept during the late evening and early morning.

The Right Group wore successful in silencing hostile Trench Mortars and M.GS at P.1.C.95.10. P.1.C. 15.45. P.1.D.46.95. P.2.A.6.9. P.2.C.35.05. P.2.C.08.97. by a systematic gas bombardment at 9.5.p.m. 10.48.p.m. and 12.10.a.m. At6.30.a.m. movement in P.1.C.75.82. and P.1.D.40.95. was

doalt with by our 18-pdrs.

No.1.M.T.E. Battory carried out a destructive shoot on to

Trench Mortars at 0.8.D.35.25.

Trench Mortars. 60 rounds were fired from our STOKES Mortars during the period, 25 of which were used on GAME COPSE the remainder directed on hostile M.G. and T.M. positions at LOCKS 5 and 6.

Machine Guns. Vickers guns constantly swept enemy positions and approaches with bursts of fire during the night. 26.500 rounds of S.A.A. were expended. The following were included in the list of targets to receive special attention. CHALK FARM. PIE FARM. CIRCUS POINT. BASSEVILLE FARM. BERRY COTTS. CAPITAL FARM. TROT HOUSE. PACK. LONG and KENT FARMS. numerous road junctions and known centres of activity.

Snipers. On account of low visibility snipors opportunities

did not present themselves, they were therefore inactive.

Aerial Activity. Adverse weather conditions considerably hamporod our aerial activity, and with the exception of a few planes soen during the early morning, conditions prevented flying during the remainder of the day.

ALLIED AIRCRAFT ACHIEVEMENTS. A remarkable record has been achieved by Allied Aviators this year. An analysis compiled from official despatches shows no fewer than 843 aerial victories attained by Allied aviators and of these 484 are credited to British airmen in the West. The allied total is rade up as follows; - January 292, February 273, seventeen days of karch 278. During January British airmen on the Western Front and Mayal airmon in fighter patrols accounted for 144 enomy machines, which 90 were dostroyed. 53 driven down out of control and on captured intact. In February they accounted for 138 Gorman machines. In 4 days alone, from 16th to 19th Feby., British at men dostroyed 49 German aeroplanes and drove down 14 with loss o 13 only to themsolvos. Of the 138, 92 were destroyed, 3 brought down by gunners and infantry, 6 landed in our lines and 37 were driven down out of control. Of the March totals 202 are to the credit of British Army and Naval aviators in the West, of which 123 Ger. machines destroyed, I four-seater captured, 78 driven down out of control and doubtless many of these rendered useless for further service. British Western total for 1918 thus summarised; Destroyed 316, Disabled 168, total 484. Comparing the number of enemy machines actually destroyed and captured with those of British machines reported as missing the German total losses are 316 and the British total losses 117; balance in British favor 199. The French do not regularly return their losses. Their victories, however are 123 Gorman machines totally dostroyed and 93 disabled. Thus of the total of 843 German machines accounted for, 770 have been lost on the Western Front. These losses are progressive in severity and enemy aviation corps have never suffered a more decisive defeat than during the last fortnight. In addition the enemy suffered heavy losses on the Italian front. German headquarter Communique states that Germany lost 61 aeroplanes during February. The above analysis shows the inaccuracy of this announcement. Britis and French airmen alone definitely destroyed 14 0 during February and probably destroyed a considerably larger number,

R.N.A.S.OPERATIONS. The Admiralty announces that during offersive patrols carried out by British Naval airmen from Dunkirk March 14/17th five enemy machines were destroyed and five shot down out of control. In one engagement two enemy observers were seen to have be

killed. All British machines returned safely.

GERMAN OCCUPATION IN BELGIUM. It is reported from Le Havre that at Tournai all the raw material has been removed from the wool, flox, as cotton spinning factories and the furnaces seized and dismantled in the mertal factories. All the copper in stock was seized. The Germans have installed themselves in various factories where workmen are forced under direct constraint to work for their account and under their orders. Since October 1916 the Germans have seized at Tournai all the copper, all wine and empty bottles, even to the extension of the corks, also all fruit, milk, eggs, butter and meat. The inhabitants are only allowed 75 grammes of meat per head por week. All the wool in mattresses was requisitioned by the Germans at a cheap price for which they offered in exchange under the name of vegetable horse-hair a kind of hay for which they charged a very high price. The death rate increased by half in the last six menths of 1917.

p.m. to 6.a.m. in anticipation of an onemy relief.

Working parties at P.2.C. and J.33., were dispersed during the day A number of rounds were expended by the LEFT GROUP in cutting wire from J.32.B.51.30., to J.32.B.50.25., Hostilo Trench Mortars in P.1.C.&.D., P.2.C. and O.12.B. were dealt with by gas from our 4.5" Hows., and H.E. from 18-pdrs.

At 5.46. a.m. our LEFT GROUP reported having received an S.O.S. from the Left Battalion, and opened up on their S.O.S. lines. The Superimposed Group were also instructed to open up and did so at 5.48.a.m. Later reports were to the effect that Infantry did not require S.O.S. and at 5.55, and 6.1. a.m. our LEFT and SUPERIMPOSED GROUPS respectively coased firing.

A second S.O.S. was reported to have gone up on the RIGHT GROUP front at 6.30.a.m. and our RIGHT AND SUPERIMPOSED GROUPS again put down their S.O.S. barrages, until 7.a.m., when Infantry having reported everything practically normal, all Batteries ceased firing.

Tronch Mortars. 490 rounds were fired by our Stokes Mortars during the period, 340 of which were fired on to our S.O.S. lines between 5.30. and 6.a.m. the remainder being used in harassing and dostructive shoots, on known enemy targets.

Machine Guns. Vickers Guns expended some 23.500 rounds of S.A.A. against enemy positions and approaches during the night, they also put down a barrage on their S.O.S. lines when S.O.S. sign i was

Aorial Activity. For the greater part of the day, no activity occurred. Towards evening, when weather became more favourable, a few of our planes patrolled our own and the enemy's forward areas.

Patrols. Our Right Brigade patrols report as follows. Hostilo H. Guns were active from LOCKS 5 and 6. Pillbox at 0.6.0.9.2.

It took part in the Siege of LOUVAIN, the entry into BRUSSELS, the Battle of MONS and the Battle of the MARNE. In September, 1914, it was engaged against the British left Wing east of SOISSONS, during the battle of the AISNE. Towards the end of Septembor, 1914, it was transferred from the First Army to the Sixth Army, under the Crown Prince of Bavaria, in which it still remains. In the early days of October, 1914, after attacking south of ARRAS, the Corps ostablished its line from south of the SCARPE to MONCHY-au-BOIS. At the and of May, 1915, the 8th Division was relieved in the MONCHY Sector by the lllth Division, and withdrawn into Army Reserve near DOUAI. In the first fortnight of June, the 7th Division was relieved south of the SCARPE by the 1 Bavarian Roservo Corps, and both divisions of the IV Corps came up to relieve the 117th Division, which had had to bear the brunt of the French attacks at NOTRE DAME de LORETTE and SOUCHELL.

After having resisted the French attacks at SOUCHEZ in May and June together with the 7th Division, the 8th Division was relieved at the beginning of Septembor by the 123rd Division, and went into Army Reserve in the neighbourhood of ROUBAIX-TOURCOING. At the Battle of LOOS the 8th Div. was rushed up hurriedly to take part in the counter. attacks against LOOS. Here it ostablished itself in its new line and

The Corps was thrown into the battle immediately on the POZIERES-LONGUEVAL-DELVILLE WOOD front, and suffered extraordinarily heavy lossos in its fruitless attempts to recover the ground lost by the divisions previously in line on this front. 28th July the Corps was relieved by the IK Reserve Army Corps, and went to refit in the VALENCIENNES area. Thence it went into line in a quiet sector opposite ARRAS relieving the 1 Bavarian Reserve Corps and the 38th Landwehr Brigade on the 9th August. After five weeks' rost on this front the Corps was again called upon to take part in the SOMIN battle. It was relieved opposite ARRAS by the IX Army Corps and came into line in the THIEPVAL-COURCELETTE sector, where it replaced the 45th Reserve Division on about the 18th Septr. Here again it saw very heavy fighting and suffered severely. It was relieved on the 1st October; by the 7th. . Division by the 2nd Naval Division and the 8th Division by the 4th Ersatz Division. It then returned to its old sector on the LOOS salient Whore the 7th Division relieved the 33rd Reserve Division southeast of LOOS, while the 8th Division relieved the 54th Reservo Division north east of LOOS, The 7th Division, however, was relieved by the 11th Reserve Division on the 10th November and came into line again, almost immediately on the right flank of the 8th Division, where it replaced the 50th Roserve Division south of LA BASSEE Canal.

THE REVAL POSITION. The navy's most arduous task has been the incessant struggle to guard our lines, both military and eco omic, and no work it ever had to perform has called for more exact. 18 % toll of devotion or higher technical skill. The result has been to defeat the energis purpose. The convey system has been markening effective in reducing losses and since it started the total tage of loss to vessels while actually in convoy, whether as the result of enemy action or marine richts, has been 0.88. Since the beginning of the war between 40% and 50% of the German submartnes which operated in home-waters have been captured, sunk or de 10,6d. In September the over-seas sailings of all ships were 20% grade in numbers and 50% greater in tonnage than in April. The net re or or in tonnage is 50% loss than the estimated framed last July h own authorities of the probable losses in the second half of the year and the total net reduction from all causes to the end of Deceri r 1917 since the beginning of the war of ships over 1300 tons on the official register is 24 million tons gross or 16%. As against this the American mercantile floet has very largely increased.

Regarding the German losses during the present war at the commencement Germany had SES merchant ships abroad wheroof 158 reached home. In the aggregate the German mercantile marine consisted of over five million tons. At the present time nearly half this has been sunk or captured by the Allies and the bulk of the rest are lying useless in harbour.

How far from the truth is the German legend that our fleet is always lurking in harbour appears from the record of its movements. During one recent month the mileage steamed by battleships cruisers, and destroyers in home-waters alone exceeded one million miles and it is estimated that in the same period the mileage of the auxilary patrol forces in home-waters exceeded six million miles. In transportation up to the end of last August, the last date where for complete statistics are available, there have been shipped overseas 15 million men, 2 million horses and mules, half a million vehicles and 25 million tons of explosives. Out of 13 million men transported the losses total only 5500 whereof 2700 were caused by enemy action including 542 in hospital-ships.



Both above identifications being normal.

1. OPERATIONS.

(a) Artillery. Bursts of fire were directed at intervals on active enemy centres and roads and tracks. Two direct hits were obtained on POLL HOUSE. A gas bombardment was carried out against FORT BUILDINGS and centres of movement around DICE FARM from 10.30. p.m. to 11.30.p.m. Our 4.5s shelled an enemy battery in P.15.C. starting fire among the ammunition and causing the enemy to run for cover. On several occasions active enemy T.Ms were effectively silenced. At 4.10.a.m. in answer to an S.O.S. Signal on the right of the left brigade our guns opened fire and continued until 4.25.a.m.

(b) Trench Mortars. 255 rounds were expended on the left brigade front. 25 rounds were fired into an enemy working party near HOLLESEKE Several enemy casualties are reported and the party hastily dispersed.

On the right brigade front our 3" Stokes fired 53 rounds and the heavies fired 13. A direct hit was obtained on the GIANT effectively silencing a M.G. there.

(c) Machine Guns. On our left front 9.000 rounds S.A.A. were fired on enemy centres and approaches. In addition 1.750 rounds were expended on a low flying enemy plane in the early evening.

Enemy Minor Operation. At 4.a.m. this morning, the enemy opened a T.M. barrage round our posts 1.0.8. and 2.0.8. on the right

front of the left brigade.

At 4.9.a.m. a party of the enemy about 10 in number approached post 1.0.6. They were immediately engaged by Lewis Guns, rifle fire and bombs. The artillery responded immediately to our S.O.S. The nearest post of the flank brigade assisted and the enemy retired. Two of the enemy were seen to fall. Following on the enemy retirement a strong Fighting Patrol left our lines to search for any of the enemy. None were found but there were signs of a body having been dragged along the ground. No identification was obtaine by the enemy.

(i) The following is a brief summary of the work done by three Squadrons working with the 3rd. Army on the 26th and 27th Inst. 26th.Inst.

240 - 201b bombs were dropped on BaPAUHE and on troops transport and camps between BAPAULE and ALBERT, and approximately

52.450 rounds were gired from H.Gs.

Direct hits with bombs were obtained on many objectives. Horso transport was disporsed, troops were scattered and great disorder A camp at SAPIGHIES was set on fire, transport between OROISILLES and FONTAIN-OROISILLES was observed to pile up in a hear. It was practically impossible to miss them with bombs or machine guns, since the targets presented were usually immense masses of Germans crowded together on reads and in terms. A panic was inevitably saused overy time each pilot attacked. Pilote report seeing dead literally piled in hears by the sides of the reads. Almost all the above work was done under 1.000 feet.

27th. Inst. 186 - 20 1b bombs were dropped and about 14.840 rounds fired. Direct hits were obtained on a column of German infantry on the march along a road near HONT UBAN, on the railway lost of ERVILLERS, and on transport between HARICOURT and BRAY, at CHINGUES,

on the SUZANIII-BRAY read and near FRVILLIRS.

In many cases transport stampoded, great confusion was caused amongst large bodies of troops and many casualties were inflicted. Two F.A. word dostroyed,

### INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY NO. 50.

From 6.a.m. 50-3-18. to 6.a.m. 51-5-18.

1. OPERATIONS.

Artillory. With the object of harassing the enemys communication to the utmost extent all Batteries maintained sweeping, and searching fire on roads and tracks east of S.O.S. lines along the Divisional front.

In addition, the following locations were selected as centres of much recent activity and subjected to intermittent bursts of fire, GAME COPSE. HAY FARM. CIRCUS POINT. CHALK FARM. TUBE CROSS ROADS. POMP. PIP. LAKE. CODE. SPUD. MURPHY. COPSE. DITE PAT and HIGH FARMS. FORT and FLY BUILDINGS.

A number of gas shells were expended on to hostile trench

mortar positions.

Trench Lortars. At 3.30.p.m. Our heavy trench mortars fired on WHIZ FARM for 15 minutes with good offect. Our Stokes mortars fired about 100 rounds during the poriod, special targets receiving attention included GAME COPSE and hostile H.G. in vicinity. Enemy working party at P.1.C.1.3. Were dispersed by 16 rounds. LOOKS 5 and 6 rocoived 41 rounds of harassing fire.

Machino Guns. The usual harassing fire was carried out by our machine guns during the darker hours of evening, and night, and one hostile aeroplane were engaged by our machine gummers when flying at

a low altitude.

Aorial Activity. During the spolls of favourable weather our planes were to be seen, patrolling our own and the enemy forward positions, throughout the day.

Patrols. The following information is collated from reconnaiss-

anco patrols roports.

Night 39/30th Inst. JILL FARM was found water logged. A granatemworfer fired from direction of FLY BUILDINGS. H.Guns fired from BAB FARM and 0.25.B.2.8. No Hans Land was found wet in 0.25.A.

Night 30/31st. Wire about 15 yards wide and 3 foot high, 40 yards in front of WAH FARM was discovered. A. H. Gun fired from WAM FARM. No Hans Land along the valloy of the WAMBERE is very wet No Mans Land in 0.17.C.a.D. is in fair condition, but shell holes contain a good deal of water. Two dugouts could be discorned at about 0.12.A.4.2. Talking heard in THE GIANT. Two flares were fired from LOCK 5 and a H.G. opened fire from the THINS. No Hans Land in 0.11.B. and 0.12.A. was found in bad condition.

In vicinity of 0.5.D.55.55. two listening posts (ovacuated by the enemy two nights ago on approach of our patrol) were examined and found unoccupied. At 0.6.D.15.25. there are three single-lines

of German wire.

No Hans Land opposite our Loft Brigade front is again reported as being very muddy, and passage by patrols made extremely

Attiliery. Hostile sholling was much below normal during the 24 hours under review with the exception of a destructive shoot on battery positions in 0.9. the romainder, consisted of harassing fire against our forward areas, and communications.

Tronch Mortars. Enomy tronch Mortars displayed a normal activity their main items being 20 rounds in GREEN WOOD from a heavy T.H. at 0.18.C.85.70. Granatenwerfer bombs fired from LOCK 5 on to vicinity of FORRET FARM and at 8.a.m. 10 rounds foll in vicinity of WALL FARE from WHIZ FARM.

H.Guns. General activity much below normal. Active machine guns were located at the following centres -BAB. JULY. WAII. WHIZ FARMS. LOCK 5. The TWINS. FLY BUILDINGS. 0.23.B. 2.8. and from about 0.17.D.55.40.

7. Hostilo Acrial Activity. Betwoon 11 and 11.30.a.m. an enomy scout machine flow vory low over our forward area, it was heavily engaged by A.A. and H.Gunc. Af 7.a.m. enomy machine was observed at a high altitude, but did not attempt to cross our lines.

8. Movement and Organisation in and behind enemys lines.

Small parties of men were observed throughout the day, moving from one location to another. When within range fire was brought to bear on them.

9. Miscellaneous. Two mon observed repairing telephone wire at 0.12.8.6.6. A well defined track can be traced from pill-box at P.7.A.75.30. to P.7.A.10.25.
