



The G.S.O. 11 resumed duty having been recalled from England after short leave and before the assembly of the Senior Staff Course for which he had been nominated. Major-General. H.H. TUDOR. CB. OMG. Commanding the 9th Division arrived with some of his Staff and took up his quarters in this H.Q. The 9th Division is to take over our present Left Brigade sub-sector. For summary of operations etc, on the Divisional front for the period April 1st to April 6th see Appendix 1. Daily morning and evening situation reports for the same period are attached appendix. II. 1st.Addendum to 1st.Aust.DivOrder No. 67 was issued, a copy is attached to Appendix 4 and 5. 1. The Army Commander Sir. Herbert Plumer, called a meeting of Divisional and Brigade Commanders at this H.Q. and communicated the latest information from the SOMME Battle area. After the meeting a demonstration was given of message carrying rockets. The rocket has a range up to 2200 yards with an error of about 400 yards. It emits a whistle and shews a light during its flight and indicates its position by smoke for four minutes after landing. 80. to 0.12.C.30.40.n Our left group assisted by 2 6" T.Ms; simultaneously put down a chinese bembardment on the area lying within 0.6.D.25.20. 0.12.B.80.50. 0.12.B.35.20. and 0.12.A.25.87.

The Heavy Artillery co-operated by bembarding BOHB FARM. POOL HOUSE. MIDGE FARM. HIGH FARM and LOCK 5.

The objective comprised four pillboxes and the posts in the vicinity of WHIZ FARM. It was found to be strongly garrisoned. Although the wire had been cut by our artillery, it nevertheless formed a serious obstacle.

Tho pillboxes were bembed and otherwise damaged and it is reported that a large number of Germans were killed.

We captured two wounded and four unwounded prisoners.

Our casualties were very light.

(b) Artillory. During the day and night systematic shoots were carried out on the chief enemy centres of recent activity and on his approaches. Our forward observers reported a number of suitable targets which were effectively engaged. We fired on movement in HOLLEBEKE MILL. KIWI FARM. P.13.D. APPLE FARM. DUDLEY FARM and BAB FARM. In the early morning we caught an enemy party working forward in 0.6.



1. Identification. Prisoners belong to the 8th company 2nd Battalion 73.R.I.R. 17th. Ros. Division.

Order of Battle. According to a reliable Sergeant the order of battle from N to S 76.R.I.R. 162. I.R. 133. I.R.

Method of Holding the line. -

The same prisoner gave the following information as regards the holding, and evacuating of the front posts by night and day. The garrisons of front posts mostly hold by 3 men are all withdrawn during the day and remain in Pillbones. Opposite this particular sector, the posts are located as follows 0.17.D.3.6. 0.17.D.5.5.65.
0.17.D.55.90. These three posts are known as "double posts", 2 men being on duty, whilst the relief of two, are in an adjoining splinter proof post.

There is a larger post of about 8 men on the enemys right hand side of VERNE ROAD 0.17.B.65.20. The majority of men garrisoning those posts withdraw during the day time, to the one remaining intact pillbox at 0.17.D.77.87. A plateon consisting of 5 gruppen of 8 men each, held these posts on a frent of rather more than 250 yards. Prisoner states that 4 days age the 8th company of the 2nd Battalion 76.R.I.E. took over a company sector of the adjoining regiment viz, 168. I.R., He was almost certain that this was an additional sector to their original one,

From 6.a.m. 3-4-18. to 6.a.m. 4-4-18.

1. OPTRATIONS. Throughout the period under review all batteries were Artillory. actively engaged in harassing known enemy communications, tracks and contros of activity in accordance with recent Intelligence.

CIRCUS POINT, DAMP COPSE. MLY FARM. MAY FARM. DEVOORSTRAAT. BUND COTTS. THE BAB HAIZE and POUL FARMS wore all included in a pro-arranged programmo and subjected to intermittent bursts of fire.

Owing to considerable movement being observed during the carly evening, opposite our right sector an enemy relief was anticipated, y and an oxtra empenditure of ammunition allotted to the thorough soarching and swooping of tronchos and tracks.

In addition short bursts of fire wore at intervals directed on to the following locations; - FLY BUILDINGS. MIDGE. CODE. COPSE. PIP and DION FARMS. A number of rounds were expended by our F.O.Os in offective fire on movement at KORTEWILDE. APPLE FARM. SQUARE FARM. FORT BUILDINGS. LAKE FARM. and 0.18.0.60.60.

T.Ho. 34 rounds were expended on the following targets - THE TINE. THE GIANT. FLY BUILDINGS, WHIZ. BANG and BIEK FARMS. Good bureto were observed.
