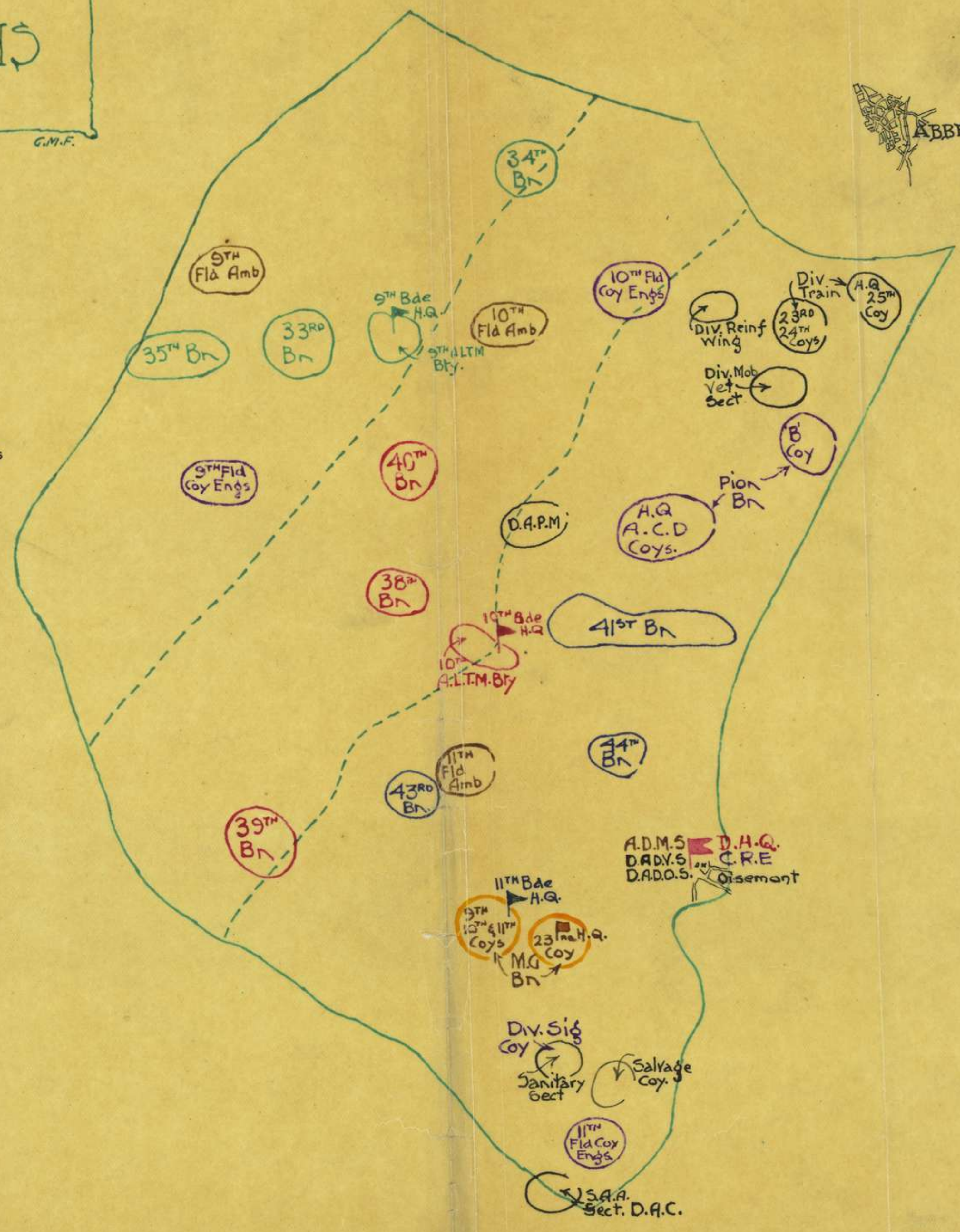

FOURTH ARMY RIFLE MEETING.

It is proposed to hold a rifle meeting in the Fourth Army about the beginning of May, 1919.

In view of the existing conditions, especially those concerned with demobilisation, it is not possible to make any final or definite arrangements. The following, however, is forwarded as an outline of such a meeting and must be regarded as somewhat tentative.

The facilities for range accommodation for the holding of such a meeting are not yet known, and the programme outlined below may therefore have to be modified. In any case, it is intended that the competitions should be of a practical nature and for the encouragement of the average as opposed to the expert shot.

It is hoped that units will commence eliminating their teams from as low down the scale as possible, thus ensuring that in the early stages of Battalion, Divisional &c. Rifle Meetings as many of all ranks as possible take part.

The competitions will be arranged under the following headings :-

A. Individual Fire Competitions.

This term will be taken to mean that each competitor has separate target or targets to himself, but he will compete for his team. The team whose individual aggregate make the highest points wins.

B. Collective Fire Competitions.

This term will be taken to mean that the effort, whether bullet or bayonet, of each team will be directed to attain the one object of obtaining the greatest effect on the supposed enemy (represented by targets, plates, etc.).

C. Pool.

As is usual at such meetings.

The following are the events so far under consideration:-

A. Individual.

5. Five rounds deliberate followed by five rounds rapid. Lying, bayonet fixed, 2nd class Fig. target 10 rounds, 1 minute and 20 seconds respectively allowed. Each firer will load with five rounds and will commence firing on word 'fire'. When his five rounds have been fired, he will immediately recharge his magazine with five rounds. Completion of 1 minute notified by whistle blast, on which signal rapid fire will commence. 'Cease fire' will be given by second whistle blast. 300 yds.
6. Advance up to the Range. (lying to fire). Bayonet fixed, Fig.3 targets controlled from the butts, 3 exposures of 8 seconds each, 10 rounds, times between exposures will vary. 500 to
7. Bullet and Bayonet. Advance up to the Range, surprise targets, 5 rounds. 200 to 0 yds.
- B. Collective.
8. Falling Plate Competition. Knock out, bayonet fixed, advance from 300 to 200 yards before firing. 200 yds.
9. A Collective Field Practice. An exercise to develop initiative. Conditions of exercise will be given out at the firing point to each successive team. 500 yds
10. Falling Plates and Jumping Jacks. Twelve falling plates and six jumping jacks (Fig.3), lying five rounds, bayonet fixed. Advance commences from 400 yards firing point to 300 yards firing point. Plates will be in position on 100 yds firing point. These will be at once fired at. At end of 30 seconds from original order to advance, the Jumping Jacks will appear for 5 seconds. Total time allowed - 35 seconds.

11. A Collective Field Practice. An exercise to develop control of fire and fire discipline. Conditions of exercise will be given out at the firing point to each successive team. 500 yds.
12. Platoon Fire Control Competition. Unknown ranges targets both visible and invisible. 400 to 800 yds.
13. Platoon Competition. Attack. Advance up <sup>the range</sup> under fire leader. Tactical considerations will be taken into account. Range not yet decided.
14. Lewis or Hotchkiss Gun Competition. Advance up the range, fire from successive positions, targets at unknown distances and in unknown directions. Limbers to be used up to the appearance of the first targets. Tactical considerations will be taken into account. 800 to 200 yds
15. Machine Gun Competition. Advance up the Range, tasks will include the various kinds of supporting and covering fire, and also surprise situations, targets will be both visible and invisible. Limbers will be used. Tactical considerations will be taken into account. 1500 to 400 yds.

C. Pool.

- 16. Running man. Speed 6 miles per hour. 200 yds.
- 17. Revolver. For all ranks armed with revolver. Probably 25 yards.

GENERAL CONDITIONS FOR COMPETITIONS

1. Competitions Nos. 1 to 6 are divided into two groups, viz, Nos. 1 to 3 and Nos. 4 to 6. Teams will consist of 1 leader and 6 O.R. Each team will be selected from its own platoon. The same team cannot enter for both groups. Not more than two teams from each competing formation can enter, viz, one for each group.

2. Competition No.7. Teams of 1 leader and 6 O.R. will be selected from the winning platoon in the Divisional Rifle Meeting. Points will be awarded for style as well as for hits and discs taken.

3. Competitions Nos. 8 to 11 are divided into two groups, viz, Nos. 8 and 9, and Nos. 10 and 11. Each team will consist of 1 leader and 6 O.R. Each team will be selected from its own platoon. The same team cannot enter for both groups. Not more than two teams from each competing formation can enter, viz, one for each group.

4. Competitions Nos. 12 and 13. Teams of a complete platoon of 2 rifle sections, each consisting of 1 N.C.O. and 6 O.R. and 2 Lewis Gun sections each consisting of 1 N.C.O. and 6 O.R. The whole will be under the command of 1 officer.

N.B. For these Competitions the platoon will be selected from any one company of the Division. Separate platoons are required for each competition, but one battalion may represent its Division in both competitions by furnishing two separate platoons, if these are considered to be the best in the Division.

5. Competition No.14. Teams of one complete Lewis or Hotchkiss Gun section (2 guns) will be selected from the best Infantry company or cavalry squadron in the Division.

6. Competition No.15. Teams of one complete Machine Gun section (4 guns) will be selected from the best M.G. Coy. in the Divisional M.G.Bn. or the best M.G. Squadron in a cavalry division.

7. Competition No.16. Is limited as regards entries to any individual who has entered for any of the Competitions Nos. 1 to 15.

8. Competition No.17. Only those who are officially armed with a revolver are allowed to enter.

9. Entries allowed. The Army Rifle Meeting is open to fighting troops only. In all cases where the organisation of any fighting troops unit differs from that of the infantry, teams will be drawn from the unit equivalent to that of the infantry platoon or company as the case may be. The equivalent units are as follows:-

10. Transfers. For competitions Nos. 1 to 11 inclusive, teams will be picked from within the platoon as it exists on January 2nd, 1919. No transfers between platoons will be allowed after the above date for competition purposes. Transfers between sections within the platoon are however admissible.

For competitions Nos. 12 to 15 inclusive, teams will be picked from within the company as it exists on January 2nd, 1919. No transfers between companies will be allowed, for competition purposes, after the above date.

Certificates, signed by O.C., units, will be forwarded by all competing teams to the effect that no transfers have taken place in contravention of this paragraph.

11. Further details concerning the Meeting will be issued in due course. These will include the awarding of points for the various competitions, etc.

The C.R.E. and Pioneer Battalion Commanders have already been asked to reply to similar questions from C.E., Australian Corps, the Divisional Signal Company Commander has been asked for answers by Chief Signal Officer, Australian Corps.

In none of the three last cases has a copy of the questions been addressed to me for information, nor have the answers come to my knowledge, except by chance.

General GELLIBRAND does not entirely agree with these views, which are the result of a Conference. He will forward his views shortly.

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INFANTRY WITH A DIVISION.

1. What should be the number of battalions in a Division?

12.

2. Is a Pioneer Battalion necessary?

No - not as a battalion.

3. What should be the grouping of the battalions and by what name should the groups be called, e.g., brigade, regiment, etc?

Brief reasons should be given in favour of the grouping which is suggested.

4 battalions to form the infantry of a brigade group. With this number reliefs are more easily and less frequently effected, and a brigade has sufficient rifle strength to allow it to carry on longer than with three battalions; with three battalions the brigade is weak in hitting power and uneconomical in staffs.

The grouped battalions should be called a "Brigade" - they form the infantry portion of a "Brigade Group"

4. Do you favour the formation of Infantry Brigade S.A.A. Columns?

Not as such, but the S.A.A. Section should be separated from the D.A.C. and should consist of sufficient sub-sections to allow one to join each brigade group and one to supply divisional troops. The S.A.A. Section should then form part of the Divisional Train.

5. What general organisation is recommended for an Infantry Battalion, e.g., number of companies in which battalion should be subdivided? Should a H.Q. Company be formed?

Headquarters, 4 companies and a Headquarters Company. 1 extra Captain to command Headquarters Company. Each Coy. to consist of 5 platoons, 4 of which are fighting platoons and the fifth is to be a reinforcement platoon. The presence in the near vicinity of reinforcements who are not recruits but have been part of the battalion for some time, would keep the 4 fighting platoons effective in action for a considerable time. At present, through casualties, a battalion has to be withdrawn quickly after action, whereas if a few reinforcements had been quickly available, the battalion could have carried on without relief.

The Headquarters Coy. consists of all Headquarters details, including the personnel for two Light Trench Mortars.

One platoon per Coy. or one Coy. per battalion should be trained in Pioneer duties to take the place of the present Pioneer Battalion.

6. Should the present allotment (32 per battalion) of Lewis Guns or similar weapons be maintained?

Yes - with the addition of one A.A. Lewis Gun for each of the five suggested Coys - total 37 Lewis Guns.

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Infantry with a Division (Contd).

7. Have you any proposals or suggestions to submit regarding the general reorganisation of the Infantry Division?

Two Light Trench Mortars should be attached to each battalion and the brigade Light Trench Mortar Battery abolished.

Regimental signallers should be found by the Divisional Signal Unit to allow of uniform training and supervision.

A Light Trench Mortar, capable of being fired horizontally, should be issued.

Mounted Troops with a Division.

1. What mounted troops - Cavalry, Mounted Infantry or Rifles, Yeomanry or Cyclists, should normally be allotted to each infantry division forming part of a larger force?

Mounted infantry - 1 squadron, and Cyclists - 1 Coy., but if the roads are unsuitable for Cyclists, 2 squadrons of Mounted Infantry.

2. How should these troops be organised, e.g. proportion of sabres or rifles and Hotchkiss guns and similar weapons?

Present Mounted Infantry organisation with Hotchkiss gun.

3. Have you any further proposals or suggestions to put forward regarding divisional mounted troops?

No.

Divisional Artillery with a Division.

1. What number of -  
(a) 18-pdrs or similar guns,  
(b) 4.5" Howitzers or similar Howitzers,  
do you consider are normally required with the Division?

3 brigades of 18-pdrs, each with a 4.5" How. battery, i.e., 54 18-pdrs and 18 - 4.5" Hows.

2. What number of guns of other natures, if any, are required?

None in the Division, but a battery of medium trench mortars is required and should be attached to and manned by the Artillery.

3. What organisation of the Divisional Artillery into batteries and brigades is recommended?

3 brigades each of 3 - 18-pdr batteries and 1 - 4.5" Howitzer battery = 72 guns with a D.A.C.

4. What should be the organisation of the Divisional Ammunition Column (including the supply of S.A.A. to other arms)?

As at present, less the S.A.A. Section which should be transferred to the Divisional Train.

5. Do you consider any allotment of Signal Units for artillery purposes is required within a Division?

Yes - a separate Signal Coy. under the supervision of the Chief Signal Officer of the Division.

6. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward as to the general organisation or composition of the Divisional Artillery?

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Machine Gun Units with a Division.

1. What number of Machine Guns do you consider are required with the Division? 64.

2. Are you in favour of a Divisional organisation for Machine Gun Units?

No. One Coy. should be allotted to each brigade group, and one Coy. or a Motor Machine Gun Battery of equal strength, should be in the hands of the Divisional Commander as a reserve of power or to enable reliefs to be carried out.

The present M.G.Bn.Cdr. would be attached to the General Staff in an advisory capacity, but would have training, and authority to concentrate two or more Coys. for special needs.

3. Or do you consider that a proportion of Machine Gun Units could advantageously be allotted to Infantry Brigades, a proportion remaining at the disposal of the Divisional Commander?

See 2 - above.

4. Or would you favour the re-absorption of Machine Guns into Infantry Battalions?

No.

5. What in your opinion should be the composition of Machine Gun Units with a Division, e.g. should Motor Machine Gun batteries or Armoured Car batteries be included?

As Machine Gun Coys. are at present composed, but without the Headquarters establishment. All details at present on M.G.Bn.H.Q. who are required for work with Coys to be definitely allotted to Coys.

As moving Motor Machine Gun batteries would be useful in the event of a "break-through" or of "rearguard" fighting, but until the latest ideas of the Tank Corps are known, it is not advisable to attach Motor Machine Gun batteries to a Division.

Tank Corps with a Division.

1. Do you consider that Tank Units should form part of the normal organisation of the Division? No.

2. If so, what should be the general composition of the unit or units required? ---

3. If Tanks are required with a Division-  
(a) Do you consider that Tank Corps Signals should be absorbed in the Divisional Signal Companies?  
(b) Do you consider that the Tank Corps Supply Service should now be absorbed by the Divisional Supply organisation? ---

4. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward etc.

Provided liaison is improved, Tanks should be held in an "Army" or a "Corps" Pool.

Trench Mortar Units with a Division.

1. Are you in favour of the allotment of Trench Mortar Units to a Division?

No - not as part of divisional troops. They should be, if medium trench mortars, part of the Divisional Artillery; and if light trench mortars, part of the battn.

2. If so, what do you consider should be the number and proportion of -

Light Trench Mortars - 2 per Bn.  
Medium -do- 1 battery with Div. Artillery  
Heavy -do- Not required.

- (a) Light Trench Mortars  
(b) Medium Trench Mortars  
(c) Heavy Trench Mortars?

3. From what Arms do you consider the personnel for Trench Mortar Units should be drawn?

L.T.M. personnel from Infantry.  
M.T.M. personnel from Artillery.

4. Do you consider that any Trench Mortar Units should normally be included in the organisation of an infantry brigade? if so, what would be the allotment of Trench Mortars you would propose?

No.

5. Do you consider that any Trench Mortar Units should normally be included in the organisation of an infantry battalion; if so, what would be the allotment you would propose?

Yes - 2 per battalion.

6. Under whose immediate orders should the various natures of Trench Mortars be vested, e.g. Commander of Divisional Artillery, Commander of Infantry Brigade, Commander of Infantry Battalion?

M.T.Ms. under C.R.A.  
L.T.Ms. under Inf. Bn. Cdr.

7. Have you any further proposals or suggestions to put forward as to the general organisation or composition of Trench Mortar Units with a Division?

The present Light Trench Mortar Battery should be broken up and two Mortars per abttalion should be issued to each Battalion. The present Battery Commander should supervise and if necessary co-ordinate all the L.T.Ms. of his brigade.

A new L.T.M. on the German pattern, able to be used either against aircraft or with a flat trajectory, should be introduced.

Transport should be provided for L.T.Ms.

Engineer Units with a Division.

1. What general organisation do you consider should be adopted for the Engineers with a Division?

1 Field Coy. per Brigade Group, with a Headquarters Section. (Abolition of Pioneers as a battalion and institution of a Pioneer Coy. per Battalion is advocated elsewhere).

2. Are you in favour of the formation of Engineer Battalions, including Pioneers, or should the present system of Field Companies be maintained?

Field Companies.

Engineer Units with a Division (Contd).

3. Do you consider the formation of a special Bridging Unit for service with the Division desirable?

No, as the Field Companies at present make great use of the Pontoon wagons which, when bridging is not imminent, are used for carrying long spars, stores, etc.

4. Do you consider that a Tunnelling Unit will normally be required?

No - enlist a proportion of Miners in the R.E. Field Companies. If needed, Miners are plentiful and could be quickly enlisted.

5. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward as to the general organisation or composition of the Engineer Units with a Division?

Some means of motor transport should be provided for the C.R.E.

Signal Service with a Division.

1. What general organisation do you recommend for the Signal Service with a Division?

One Company per brigade, one coy. per divisional artiller and one Headquarters company.

There should be a Chief Signal Officer at Divisional Headquarters to co-ordinate work and supervise training.

2. Assuming that you are of the opinion that a Signal Service on a Divisional basis is required, what units do you consider the Signal Service with a Division should be composed, e.g. Wireless Units, Piggon Service?

3. In whom should the immediate control of the Signal Units in a Division be vested?

A Chief Signal Officer should co-ordinate work, but the brigade signal companies should otherwise be self-contained.

4. Are you in favour of the organisation of separate Signal units for service with Infantry brigades, or do you consider that this should be part of the divisional signal unit?

Yes, each brigade should have its own self-contained brigade signal company, which should include all regimental signallers of units of that brigade.

5. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward as to the general organisation or composition of the signal service with a Division?

No.

R.A.S.C. with a Division.

Assuming that the size and organisation of a Division will not differ materially than that which now obtains -

1. State generally what alterations, if any, can advantageously be made in the organisation of the Divisional Trains?

The R.A.S.C. of a Division is insufficient. The following G.S.wagons are required to avoid the constant requests for extra transport from Corps or Army when a Division moves:-

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R.A.S.C. with a Division (Continued)

- 1 G.S. wagon for D.A.P.M.
- 1 do Div.Salvage Coy.
- 1 do Div.Reinforcmt Wing
- 2 (3) do 2 (3) F.A.Bde H.Qs.
- 6 do 3 L.T.M.Batteries
- 4 do M.T.M.Battery.

An increase in the number of spare horses is also required.

If 2 motor lorries were added per battalion, they would obviate the present pressing shortage of transport.

In Australian units which are allowed to carry one blanket in Summer and two in Winter, there is provision made for extra transport, but it is never available.

2. Should the personnel charged with the requisitioning and issuing of supplies continue to form part of the divisional train, or should they be attached to divisional or brigade headquarters?

Existing organisation, except Group Companies, should be with their respective Brigade Groups.

3. Could any portion of the train e.g. baggage train, be organised with advantage on a mechanical basis?

For operations in FRANCE, yes; but for operations in theatres without good roads, No.

4. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward with regard to the general organisation and composition of R.A.S.C. units with a Division?

M. T. Company to be with the Division and under command of the Divisional Train.

R.A.M.C. with a Division.

Assuming that the size and organisation of a Division will not materially differ than that which now obtains :-

1. State generally what alterations, if any, could advantageously be made to the organisation of R.A.M.C.units with a Division?

The Field Ambulance should be divided in -  
Headquarters for administration.  
Nursing Division (of 2 sub-sections)  
Bearer Division (of 2 sub-sections)

Each portion should be capable of detachment and should be complete with transport.

The Nursing sub-division of 3 officers and 28 O.Rs. could staff and conduct a Field Hospital of 100 patients and could handle a rush of wounded unaided.

The Bearer sub-division of 3 officers and 106 O.Rs. would provide 24 squads for S.B.work. The officers of this need not be medical men, but all personnel should have a good knowledge of First-aid.



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R.A.M.C. with a Division (Continued).

2. Are you in favour of the retention of a Sanitary Section in a Divisional organization?

Yes, under the A.D.M.S.

3. Do you consider that the A.D.M.S. and D.A.D.M.S. of a Division should be officers on the establishment of Divisional H.Q. or would you favour the formation of a separate H.Q. for A.M.C. of a Division similar to that of Divisional Engineers?

Present arrangement is satisfactory.

4. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward with regard to the general organization and composition of R.A.M.C. units with a Division?

If the Bearer sub-divisions are to be taken from Field Ambulances, it will be necessary to supply a special unit of Stretcher Bearers from some other unit. These men must not be available for other work in action or they will fail as Stretcher Bearers. S.Bs. must be "A" class personnel.

The present number of medical officers is insufficient to replace casualties to R.M.Os. and should be increased to 9 per Ambulance.

R.A.V.C. with a Division.

Assuming that the size and organization of a Division will not differ materially than that which now obtains :-

1. State generally what alterations, if any, could advantageously be made to the organization of R.A.V.C. with a Division?

If Brigade Groups are not detached, present strength of Veterinary Officers is sufficient, but if detachment is anticipated, one Veterinary Officer is required for each Brigade Group.

2. Are you in favour of a mobile veterinary section as part of the Division?

Yes.

3. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward with regard to the general organization and composition of R.A.V.C. with a Division?

No.

R.A.O.C. Units with a Division.

Assuming that the size and organization of a Division will not differ materially than that which now obtains :-

1. Have you any proposals to make as to the present organization of R.A.O.C. personnel with a Division?

Ordnance carry an insufficient number of tradesmen at present and draw on units for their requirements.

No provision is made for extra pay for the substitute appointed in a

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R.A.O.C. Units with a Division (Continued)

unit who carries on during the absence of the real holder of the position at Ordnance.

2. Have you any other proposals or suggestions to put forward with regard to the general organization and composition of R.A.O.C. with a Division?

No.

Chaplains with a Division.

Provost Duties with a Division.

1. Have you any alterations to suggest as to the present organization of Provost Duties within a Division?

Traffic Control men should form a definite part of the Provost unit. The present method of attaching personnel for this work is unsatisfactory.

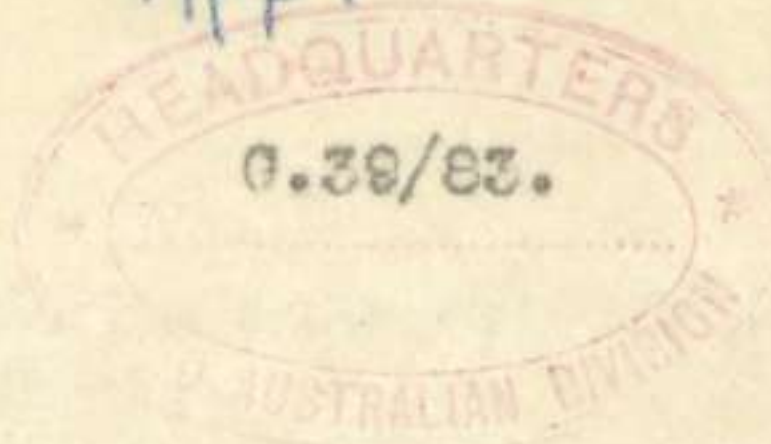

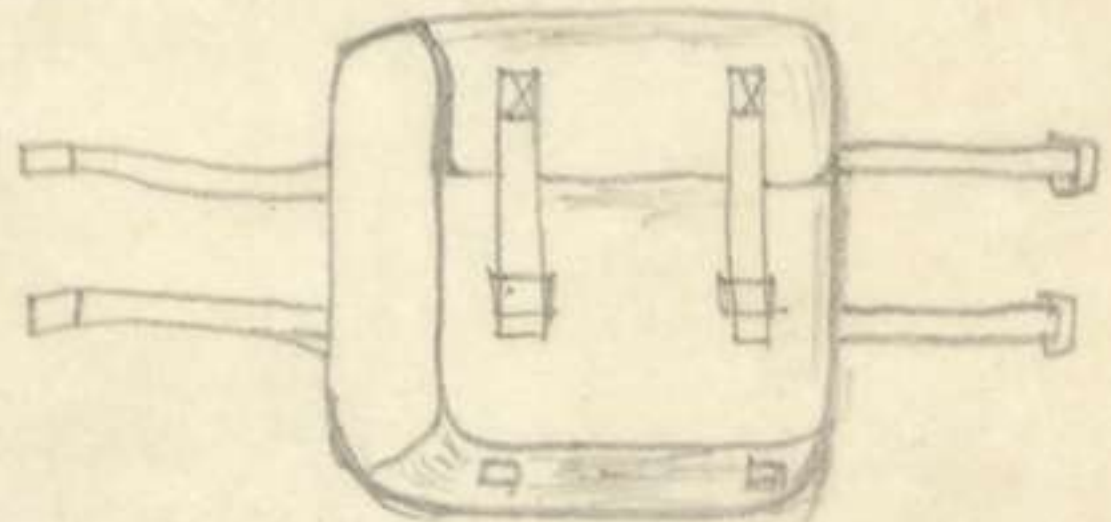
The following are answers to the questions contained in G.H.Q. letter O.E/2312/C. dated 15th December 1918, together with suggestions for the improvement of Infantry equipment generally :-

EQUIPMENT.

The Web Equipment is, on the whole, satisfactory and to be preferred to the Leather.

The following improvements are necessary :-

- (a). Non-slipping buckles or "S" hooks in place of the present "D".
- (b). Pouch fastener should be a stud, on the lines of field glass cases, in place of clips.
- (c). Pack should be a separate part of the equipment, carried by two straps  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inches wide.
- (d). Straps (pack supporting) should be 3-inches longer.
- (e). Straps (pack attaching) should be attached to the waistbelt and not to the ammunition carriers as at present.
- (f). Haversack should be made without the partition, and at least  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inches broader at the base.
- (g). Packs should be made in three sizes - large, medium and small - the difference in size being in the length.
- (h). Pack requires the addition of four straps, as per sketch, to fasten down the blanket and an extra pair of boots, if carried.



- (i). On medical grounds, the waterbottle should be made round and not square cut; should also be fitted with a screw cup top.
- (j). Mess tin also should not be square cut; handle of fryer should be attached to the outside.
- (k). Rifle sling should have some non-slipping device.

SMALL ARMS

- (a). Yes.
- (b). No - only improvement required is construction of bolt in non-corrosive metal.

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- (c). The present bolt lever should be retained as it has proved highly satisfactory.
- (d). -----
- (e), (f), (g). No.
- (h). Automatic rifle only.
- (i). On the lines of the Lewis Gun, with structural improvements, and lighter. Rate of fire should be reduced, if possible, to 300 rounds per minute as a maximum.
- (j). 37 per battalion - 32 platoon weapons, 5 for A.A.
- (k). Yes.

S.A.A.,

- (a). The brands K., KN., and RL., have proved satisfactory. Three kinds of packing are required:-
  - (i) Expendible belts for machine guns
  - (ii) Bundles for Lewis guns.
  - (iii) Clips and bandoliers for Infantry.Clips should be of rustless metal.  
  
All packing should be in boxes of 500 only, with strap handles, as for machine gun belt boxes.
- (b). A.P. and Tracer.
- (c). A.P. should be able to penetrate  $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch chilled steel plate. Tracer to give trace and true trajectory up to 800 yards.
- (d). Two per cent. (2 %) of each.
- (e). No, except as above.

PISTOLS.

- (a). Yes.
- (b). Better grip, as given by Colt .38 automatic. Issue should be larger, i.e. down to Section Leaders and Runners; Machine Gunners as at present.

BINOCULARS.

- (a). Yes.
- (b). Prismatic: universal adjustment: mag: x 6.  
Issue to Section Leaders.

COMPASSES.

- (a). 30 per battalion, as Mob. Stores.
- (b). Oil: prismatic: luminous.

RANGE FINDERS.

- (a). One per company.
- (b). Should be more portable than the BARR & STROUD, which is considered too big. Ranges, 500 to 2,000 yards.

ENTRENCHING TOOLS.

- (a), (b), (c). Not required. Mob. Store shovels and picks being sufficient.

STEEL HELMET.

- (a). Better lining and a greater variety of sizes.
- (b). No.

BODY ARMOUR.

- (a), (b), (c). No.

GRENADES.

- (a). Hand grenade (MILLS'): Egg and Rifle Grenade, (MILLS' No.36).
- (b). Percussion grenade not favoured.
- (c). Range of rifle grenade, 300 yards if possible.
- (d). Yes; except bayonet cannot be used.
- (e). Not required.
- (f). Not considered necessary.

FIREWORKS.

- (a). Percussion flares not considered necessary. Lights should float longer than at present or have longer range.

- (b). S.O.S. Should be parachute and of three kinds, or three-in-one: light for night, smoke for day and whistle for fog.

Lengthen range. Yes, if allowed to be used by all officers and not Battalion Headquarters only.

Success Signal. Required.

Locality S.O.S. Not favoured.

Tank Signal. ----

Very Pistol Cartridges. Red, Green, Yellow.

- (c). Yes, if change has not to be made forward of Divisional Headquarters.
- (d). Two per company, issued when ~~necessary~~ required. A longer range is considered necessary; smoke should be denser on landing; and message should be put in an asbestos container. Carrying arrangements as per Artillery director.
- (e). No, if including illuminating fireworks.

#### INFANTRY TRENCH MORTAR.

- (a). Yes.
- (b). Should be on the principle of the Stokes, but with a flatter trajectory. The shell should weigh about 6-lbs or 7-lbs, with a maximum range of 750 yards.

The mobility should be largely increased by making the Mortar easily transferable from first line transport to light wheeled carriage and from that to man handling.

#### INFANTRY GUN.

- (a). No.
- (b). Something in the style of the German Light Minenwerfer, able to fire at aeroplanes and tanks, is favoured - thus combining the infantry trench mortar and gun into one.

#### SMOKE GENERATORS.

- (a), (b). No. - This is considered to be part of the equipment of a Special Company, R.E.,



MISCELLANEOUS.

- (a).
- (i). GROUND SHEET. Should be constructed so that they can be buttoned together to form a Summer bivouac, and should be larger than the present issue.
- (ii). DISCHARGER CUP. Should have a web carrier to fit to equipment.
- (iii). BOOTS. Each man should be issued with two pairs.
- (iv). PUTTIES. Should be cut spiral, would thus relieve pressure on the legs and reduce foot trouble.
- (v). FIRST LINE TRANSPORT. Equipment should be mounted pattern.
- (vi). MAP CASES. A light kind should be issued to platoon and section leaders.
- (vii). STRAPS. All extra articles (compass etc.) should be constructed to fit direct on to equipment and thus do away with straps.
- (viii). IRON RATION. Present issue unsatisfactory. The iron ration should be carried in one flat container and should consist of -
  - (a) Maconochie ration in 3 small tins
  - (b) Tea and Sugar in tabloid form.
  - (c) Solidified alcohol.
 Biscuits are not considered necessary.
- (ix). INTELLIGENCE EQUIPMENT. Considered necessary and should comprise -
  - Two telescopes
  - First class compasses
  - Binoculars
  - Map cases
  - Protractors.
- (x). PIONEER EQUIPMENT of a battalion is quite inadequate and should be increased.
- (xi). WATER BOTTLES. A Divisional reserve of 50% should be maintained.
- (xii). WIRE CUTTERS, HAND. Should be fitted with curved jaws for "finding" the wire at night.
- (xiii). FOOD CONTAINERS. Are necessary, but should not be larger than the present pack.
- (c). Periscopes. "Vigilant" periscopes on a scale of one per section, with an addition of "No.25" on a scale of 5 per battalion.
 

Sniperscopes. Should only be retained as a Corps Store. An issue of telescopic sights on a scale of 4 per battalion is favoured.

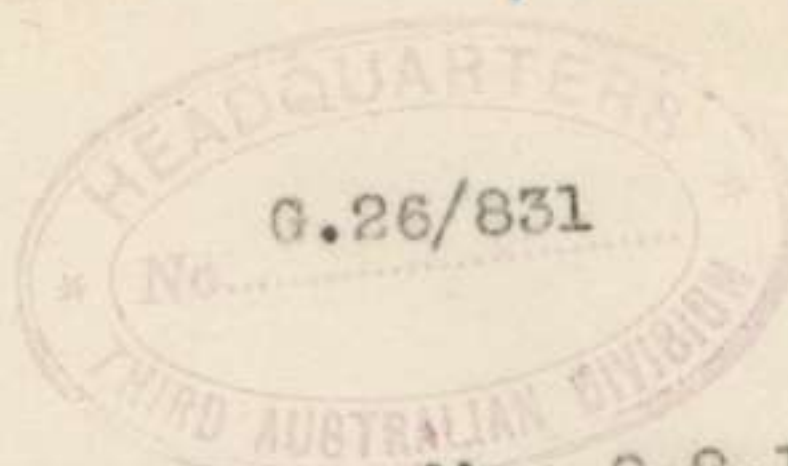

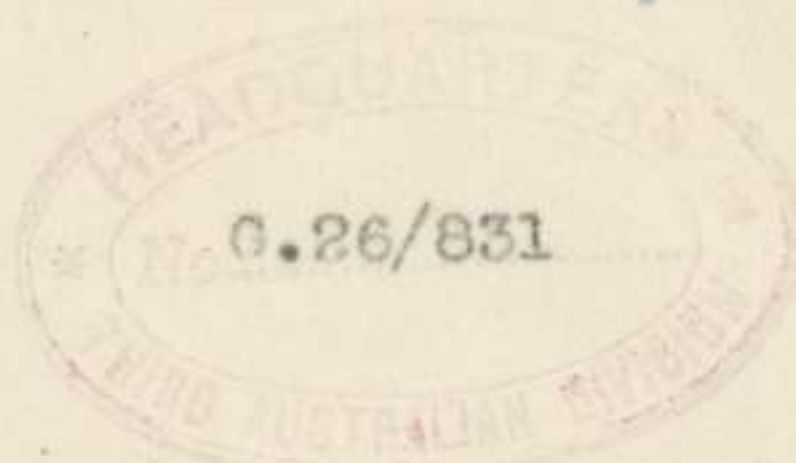

FINANCE. (1). A cable has been sent to Australia asking Sporting Organisations to raise funds to meet current and training expenses.

(2). Mr. BOX has promised to call on Australian sporting men in England for subscriptions and hopes to be able to provide a considerable sum at once.

CLOTHING and MATERIAL. Major GOWING, AAOC, is willing to buy Sports clothing and material in England for units who wish to purchase privately. Units wanting to avail themselves of this should write to Q.M.G., A.I.F., 130 Horseferry Road, S.W.1, asking that Major GOWING be instructed to purchase the material required. The amount of material should be stated and also the amount of money unit is prepared to spend. Units are advised to get an officer returning from leave to collect the material at H.Q., A.I.F., and bring it to France with him, otherwise considerable time will be lost. Purchases will be made on payment only.

SPORTS. The Sports Control Board is taking up the matter of fixtures for the various sports, but it was ascertained that the following can be counted as comparatively certain.

CRICKET. An A.I.F., Cricket Team is to tour England next season under arrangements to be made with the M.C.C.

TENNIS. It is probable that there will be a tournament at WIMBLEDON at which A.I.F. will be represented.

RIFLE SHOOTING. A.I.F. will also be represented at BISLEY this year.

Progress made in other sports will be reported as information becomes available.

Enquiries were made about balance sheet and report on Boxing tournament in England. Balance sheet not yet available but will be promulgated as soon as it is ready. There is a chance of training expenses being refunded to Divisions from gate, but it is not possible to state for certain at present. The matter however is being taken up in England.

SPORTS. The Sports Control Board is taking up the matter of fixtures for the various sports, but it was ascertained that the following can be counted as comparatively certain.

CRICKET. An A.I.F., Cricket Team is to tour England next season under arrangements to be made with the M.C.C.

RUGBY FOOTBALL. The Army Rugby Football Association is meeting with a view to organising a season this year of international Army fixtures. A.I.F. is to be represented on this Committee.

ROWING. There will most likely be a Henley this year at which all nations will be invited to compete. There will probably be an 8 oar and a 4 oar race in which A.I.F. will be represented. It is probable that there will be 3 or 4 other Regattas at which crews will be able to compete.

TENNIS. It is probable that there will be a tournament at WIMBLEDON at which A.I.F. will be represented.

RIFLE SHOOTING. A.I.F. will also be represented at BISLEY this year.

Progress made in other sports will be reported as information becomes available.

Enquiries were made about balance sheet and report on Boxing tournament in England. Balance sheet not yet available but will be promulgated as soon as it is ready. There is a chance of training expenses being refunded to Divisions from gate, but it is not possible to state for certain at present. The matter however is being taken up in England.
