

1. Information.

DATE RECO 124

The strength of the enemy in the GALLIPOLI Peninsula is estimated at 34,000 men made up of 3 Divisions of Mizam and one of Redif. Of these Divisions one is believed to be at BULAIR and one or more in the neighbourhood of ANAFARTA and KILID BAHR, and one between the ACHI BABI RIDGE and CAPE HELLES.

Information points to a landing being opposed.

2. Object of the Expedition.

The object of the expedition is to assist the fleet to force the DARDAMELLES by capturing the KILID BAHR plateau, and dominating the forts at the MARROWS.

3. General Plan.

The general plan to achieve this object is:-(1). A bombardment of the BULLIR lines at daybreak on the ___th, followed by a feint of landing on the mainland N. of the XEROS Islands (War Office hap) by the transport fleet of the Royal Naval Division.

- (2). Simultaneously with the above a bombardment of the heights commanding the beach KaBa TEPE -NIBRUMESI POINT, accompanied by a landing by the A. & N. Z. Army Corps.
- (3). Simultaneously with the above a bombardment of the southern extremity of the Peninsula, accompanied by a landing by the 29th Division in the neighbourhood of CAPE HELLES.

(4). Simultaneously with the foregoing, the Franch rleet will make a demonstration at BESIKA BAY, in combination with which a landing will be effected by a portion of the French Expeditionary Force near KIM KALE. Special instructions will be issued to General d'Amado.

4. Composition & general objective of the covering forces.

Objectives of the covering forces: -At KABA T.PE a covering position on the south western spurs of the hill in squares 224-237-238 (W.O. map, SARI BAIR). At CAPE HELLES the ACHI BABI ridge.

5. Disembarkation of the main bodies.

Kaba Tape and Cape Helles will commence directly the respective covering forces have landed, unless orders to the contrary are received from the G.O.C., A. & N.Z. army Corps, or the G.O.C., 29th Division, as the case may be. The disembarkation of the A. & E.Z. army Corps will be carried out under the orders of the G.O.C. army Corps. That of the 29th Division will be carried out in accordance with diagram "B" attached, which also shows the beaches to be used by each transport.

The Plymouth Battalion R.h.L.I. will be held at the disposal of the General Commanding the Expeditionary Force, ready to land on Beach "Y" should circumstances render such a course advisable. Transport E.2 carrying this battalion will form part of the transport fleet of the 29th Division.

6. Ceneral instructions for landing.

Two Staff officers of G.H.Q. will be landed with the covering force of the 29th Division, and G.O.C., A. & N.Z. Army Corps will detail two staff officers to land with the covering force of his corps, to select and mark out forming up places and rendezvous. Pending the completion of this work troops will be formed up by their commanders in the most convenient localities close to, but clear of, the beach. Every endeavour must be made to prevent confusion on the beaches.



- 8. Military beach G.O.C., A. & M.Z. Army Corps will detail parties and fatigue parties beach parties for eight landing places, and the necessary fatigue parties for work on Beach "Z".

G.O.C., 29th Division will detail beach parties for twelve landing places. Two companies Anson Bn. R. M. D. are attached to the 29th Division for this duty, including reliefs. The Anson Bn. R. M. D. (less the two companies above mentioned) will be available for such other working and fatigue parties as may be detailed by G.O.C., 29th Division on the CAPE HELLES beaches.

9. Piers & jetties.



Two floating piers, one for Beach "Z" and one for Beach "W" will be available for use on the afternoon of the first day, and the construction of trestle piers will be commenced at the first opportunity. At Beach "Z" the G.O.C., A. & H.Z. army Corps will make arrangements for their construction. At CAPE HELLES one Field Company R.E., to be detailed by G.O.C. 29th Division, will be landed for this work, and for improving exits from and communications on the beach.


10. Intercommunica-

The G.O.C., A. & M.Z. Army Corps will arrange for a central signal office to be established on Beach "Z", to be responsible for all signal communications forward from the beach.

He will also arrange for telephonic communication on the beach.

Communications to escorting ships and to transports will be made through a Royal Naval base signal station to be established on Beach "Z". Pending its disembarkation 6 Naval ratings, to be landed with the covering force, will form a temporary naval station.

for working the beach ends of cables laid from it,



and a Royal Naval base signal station for communications with the escorting ships and transports, will be established on Beach "V". Six naval ratings will be landed with the covering force to carry out the latter duty until the arrival of the Royal Naval base signal station.

As the General Headquarters Signal Company has not enough cable to maintain communication with all formations, each formation in turn will be responsible for maintaining communication with the central signal office.

Special telephones, to be landed with the beach equipment embarked in the transports of the 29th Division, for communication along the beaches and to the forming up places and rendezvous, will be set up by the Field Company R.E. landed for work on the beach.

Instructions for intercommunication with the fleet regarding support by naval guns have been issued in pemphlet form. Communication will usually be sent through the Royal Maval base signal stations, but 2 military W/T stations on the flanks will be provided both at KABA TEPE and CAPE HELIES, which can be used for this purpose if required.





INSTRUCTIONS FOR G.O.C. A. & N.Z. ARMY CORPS. GREENAL HEADQUARTERS 15th April 1915.

- l. Information regarding the enemy.
- 1. The enemytholds the KILID BAHR plateau in strength, and is believed to have a number of troops concentrated in the neighbourhood of the ANAFARTA villages and MATDOS. There may be two Divisions (20,000 men) distributed in these areas. Gun emplacements have been located at MABA TEPE and NIBRUMESKI POINT, but repeated air reconnaissances have failed, as yet, to disclose any guns.
- 2. Objective.
- A. & N. Z. Army Corps on the beach between KABA
 THPE and FISHERMAN'S HUT. The objective
 assigned to the Army Corps is the ridge over
 which the GALLIPOLI MAIDOS and BOCHALI-KOJADERE
 roads run, and especially MAL THPE. Gaining such
 a position the Army Corps will threaten, and perhaps cut, the line of retreat of the enemy's
 forces on the KILID BAHR plateau, and must, even
 by their preliminary operations, prevent the said
 plateau being reinforced, during the attack of the
 29th Division, from MAIDOS, GALLIPOLI or BULAJR.
- 3. Naval arrangements for landing covering force.
- Four transports can be worked simultaneously on the beach selected (Beach "Z"). Three steam pinnaces, or picket boats, with 12 cutters or lifeboats, will be available for each transport of the covering force. These boats will be formed into 3 tows, each with a carrying capacity



of 120-130 men. There will therefore be 12 tows available in all, with a total capacity of 1450 to 1500 men.


On the afternoon before the landing is to take place, the troops detailed for the first trip of the tows will be transferred, under naval arrangements to be notified later, from their respective transports to H.M. Ships Queen, London, and Prince of Walos, which will steam during the night to a position off KABA TEPE. The 12 tows will be brought alongside H.M. ships, under naval arrangements, in time to admit of the landing taking place on Beach "Z" at ______a.m.

Transports Al, A2. A3 and A4 carrying the remainder of the covering force will also rendez-vous off KABA TEPE during the night, attended by eight t. b. destroyers, two of which will be ready to stand by each transport to take off the remaining troops.

The landing of the covering force will be effected in three stages as follows:-

Directions concerning "Observation Officers" for observing fire of H.M. Ships in combined operations.

1. On shore after landing three signal stations for communicating with fleet will be established.

(a) A central station for messages to General Headquarters.
(b) Two flank signal stations for communicating with ships supporting the movements on shore with their fire.

- 2. The ships referred to in 1 (b) will be placed at the disposal of the military and for the commencement of operations are allotted suitable positions to assist in bringing fire to bear on certain land areas.
- 3. Divisional Artillery Commanders will detail "Observation Officers" and have them posted in suitable observing stations to watch areas which must include, more particularly, ground on which these ships cannot observe their own fire.

4. The "Observation Officers" will be employed in observing the fire from ships only.

They will be connected by telephone or visual signalling with signal stations of their own, placed in close proximity to the nearest flank signal station to which messages can be handed.

These officers will only send messages concerning observation of fire, but if the fire becomes dangerous to our troops they must order firing to cease.

5. Divisional Artillery Commanders will report to Headquarters the area which their "observation officers" have been detailed to watch so that Headquarters will know in whose area any particular objective may be, and such objective will be described to ships and to "observation officers" by squares.

Headquarters may be General Headquarters, Army Corps Headquarters, or Divisional Headquarters, as indicated by operation

orders.

- 6. It will often be possible for Headquarters to make arrangements on previous day for co-operation with ships, thus enabling fire to be opened promptly, without confusion, and early.
- 7. Each observing station (0.S.) must be given a distinct designation (a letter and the name of its division) to be used as an address in all messages, e.g., 0.S."A".29th. Division.
- 8. The exact position and address of each do serving station must be reported to Headquarters.

Sir,

- 1. In order to assist the preliminary operations of the troops landing in the GALLIPOLI Peninsula, I have assigned to the force under your command the task of effecting a landing near KUN KALE, with the object of engaging the attention of any hostile troops which may be near the entrance to the DARDANELLES on the Asiatic shore.
- 2. Admiral Guepratte, with whom I have been in consultaneously tation, has been asked to assist by making a demonstration in BESIKA BAY.
- 3. The information received does not point to any considerable numbers of the enemy being met with by your landing party. With a view, however, to safeguarding the landing of the troops in MORTO BAY, it is important to prevent the enemy from placing field batteries in the neighbourhood of KUM KALE, whence they could bring fire to bear on transports anchored in the bay.
- 4. The landing near KUM KALE is intended to be in the nature of a diversion, and it is not desirable to extend the scope of the operations further than is necessary for clearing the region between KUM KALE and YEMI SHEHR and west of the MENDERE CHAI. For this purpose it should not

be

be necessary to land more than one infantry regiment, without animals or vehicles, and one battery of 75 mm guns.

- 5. It is desirable that you should not land any larger number of troops for the further reason that it is intended, as soon as a secure footing is gained on the GALLIPOLI Peninsula, to re-embark your landing party, and to transfer the force under your command to the European side of the Straits, where it will be landed at CAPE HELLES preparatory to the general advance of the allied forces against the enemy's army in the GALLIPOLI Peninsula.
- 6. I regret that it will not be possible to provide boats for the purpose of your landing at KUM KALE, owing to the fact that all those available will be taking part in the landing on the GALLIPOLI Peninsula. Since, however, you will be disembarking no large number of troops, the boats carried on your transports will doubtless be sufficient for your purpose. Subsequently, when the force under your command is landed on the Peninsula the necessary arrangements for its disembarkation (including the provision of boats, etc.) will be made by me in conjunction with Vice Admiral de Robeck.




