

SUMMARY OF EVENTS DURING THE MONTH OF DECEMBER 1 9 1 8.

During December the Company has only been filling in time, so to speak, till general demobilisation commences. To do this we have had a little military work daily (about 2 hours) mostly in the form of route marches. A certain amount of football and other recreational training was also carried out, and Educational Classes previously commenced were maintained. Of the latter, the Architectural Drawing, French and Bookkeeping Classes have proved themselves the most popular. The Surveying Class has also been very useful to a few students, and two men from the Infantry joined the Class during the month. Classes for Tinsmithing, Carpentery and Riggers were started for men from the Infantry, and these are now going concerns, doing a certain amount of useful work, but lack of material has been the great difficulty.

The Company had one move, having shifted from WIRY - au - MONT to AIGNEVILLE by route march. A move of about 15 miles like this helped to lessen the monotony for a few weeks. It was really quite welcome, especially as AIGNEVILLE is a cleaner and better village than the one we left.

One very regrettable incident occurred during the month; the death of Sapper Gibson, who was accidentally killed. He was buried in ABBEVILLE Military Cemetery.

Christmas festivities were quite good. Numerous geese were secured in the neighbourhood of the village, and a liberal supply of beer was also obtained. On the whole, the Company had quite a merry time; certainly much happier than the previous two, when the unit was in the Line.





#### Dispositions . -

H.Qrs. and Dismounted Personnel - Q. 5. d. 1. 8. Transport..... - K. 31. b. 6. 2.

At 10.0.p.m. on 24/8/18 the O.C. received an urgent summons to Conference at C.R.E's., where detailed instructions were given for offensive operations the following morning. BRAY-sur-SOMME had been taken early that morning, and the advance was being continued (Zero hour 2.30.a.m.).

The work allotted to Company was the construction of Pontoon or other bridges over the River SOMME and Canal south of BRAY, and the repair of roads etc. in the locality, to ensure the speedy evacuation of wounded, and forwarding of supplies.

Nine Pontoons were placed at Company's disposal, being collected at 11.0.p.m. from Pontoon Dump at K.31.c.5.0.

At midnight an Officer with two O.Rs left forward camp on bicycles to make a reconnaissance of site where Pontoon Bridge (D) was to be built. This necessitated a swim across the river by the former.

The four Sections of Sappers moved off at intervals at 2.0.a.m. on 25th. August. The O.C. went ahead with two men to reconnoitre, and with his batman for runner. Shortly afterwards the nine Pontoon wagons came along the road at a sharp pace. The moon was shining in a clear sky, but soon a dense mist began to form, which by daybreak confined visibility to a few gards. This made the work very difficult, though providing an excellent screen.

were met by the O.C. No.2 Section started clearing the Canal Bank road and filling in shell-holes (A to B). They had first to construct a flying barrel pier raft to carry the men across the canal. No.3 Section commenced the erection of a bridge for Field Artillery over FROISY Lock (C), using material from Boche Engineer Dump nearby. The bridge was 22' span, closely made of steel rails.


Meanwhile the Pontoons had arrived, and were unloaded at rendezvous (D). No.4 Section started erecting Pontoon bridge to carry Field Artillery (D), the length being 75'. No.1 Section commenced Pontoon Footbridge (E), and clearing track for walking wounded (F to G).

Later, No.1 Section filled in a gap (H) where bridge had been destroyed. No.2 Section built three footbridges (I, J & K) near BRAY for walking wounded. The other two Sections were employed filling in shell-holes and clearing BRAY - FROISY Road.

Intermittent shelling was experienced throughout, but the work was completed by 3.0.p.m.

To make the way fit for artillery, footbridges (I, J & K) were reconstructed the following morning.

Our Camp was in a Wood (Sheet 63D - J.19.c.4.6.) in full observation of Fritz, after the type of the proverbial Cliff-dweller. The Line was three miles distant, and I and three others were detailed to meet 100 Infantry at Company Headquarters for work in the

Support Line close to HAMEL.

We started at dusk out along the tow-path of the SOMME, (much torn up by shell-fire) until we reached the "Bridge of Sighs", a barrel pier bridge previously our work. Passing over and finding our way through a tall timber track was no easy matter. We reached Company Headquarters and found that it was not affe to proceed for some time as the Boche was shelling.

Our work was deepening the old French Line of 1914, which had been shelled away until it was like a sunken road, leaving no semblance

of cover. The work could only be done by night.

We filed up overland in battle order, picks and shovels at the slope, each party taking cover in between strafes. The first party reached the Support, and as they filed along the task was given -'3 paces by two feet deep per man'. The men lost no time in getting into it, as to stand erect was like being alone in a wilderness. At regular intervals Fritz's 5.9s and Machine Guns made one cling to mother earth and speed the task. Needless to say, portions of the trench were abandoned for some time until shelling ceased, but Fritz's star-shells illuminated the work and helped matters before the next salvo.

The work was completed by midnight, and on the command 'file out', a minor stunt opened on our left, Fritz retaliating on our Support. We were leaving it then with only a few minutes to comparative safety. We reached the Communication, and hopped out on the overland track, being much speedier, leaving Fritz's barrage in our rear.

Company Headquarters was reached without any mishap, after a

usual night's work.

The Infantry Officer reports the task completed, and men are filed off th their various 'bivvies'.
