

WAR DIARY FOR NOVEMBER 1918.

STRENGTH.(I) On the 30 thtmovember the strength of the Depot was 164 Officers and 7,270 other Ranks. The actual number in Camp was 148 Officers and 5910 Other Ranks, the difference is account for by those absent on leave, in hospital and other reasons.

The number marching in was 4989 N.C.Os and men and those

marching out 3010 N.C.Os and men, for the month.

HEALTH (3) The general health of the Depot is satisfactory, the Influenza Epidemic continued until about the 16th. and then gradually became normal. The Staffs of the various Medical Services have been kept busy, including the Massage, Remedial and Early Treatment Departments.

MESSING (3) For the month 698,600 meals were served to 174,591 men. There were no complaints.

Supplies from the N.A.C.B. have been good and in sufficient quantities for our demands.

Supplied from the A.S.C. have been good throughout, a marked and satisfactory improvement is noticeable in the bacon issue, which insludes Hams. There was a slight reduction in the meat issue for "A" class personnel employed on Company, Wings, and Depot Staff. This meat ration was reduced from 12 ozs. to 8 ozs per man, the cash allowance in such cases was increased to 6½d.

54,231 rations of saugage meat was drawn giving 40170½ lbs. in weight. \$2329 rations of fresh meat was drawn weighing 105988½ lbs.

29042 rations of flour were drawn in weight 19059 lbs.
bread was underdrawn accordingly; the quality of the bread
was good and has improved with the further addition of white
flour in the making therefore

Excellent results have been obtained in the By-Products Section, the total recovery of dripping being 170881 lbs pr practically 7% tons of fat. The distribution was :-

AGRICULTURAL. (4) The A.S.C. have taken over the Meadow Hay-stacks and men are now employed in trussing for transportation. The planting of cabbages has proceeded for the early Spring Products. Ploughing was likewise under taken. The condition of the inmates of the piggery and poultry yards are satisfactory.

DISCIPLINE (5) During the month 60 N.C.Os and men were remanded for Trial by D.C.M. as against 64 for October.

DISCIPLINE (5) continued.

SALVAGE (7)

The work of this Branch was carried out satisfactorily.
A quantity of various materials was despatched including white paper etc.

LAUNDRY. (8)

The requisite machines having ampived from the Makers this Department was opened. 10 Laundresses are employed. This is proving a boom to the men, who are enabled to obtain clean articles of clothing at a small cost, i.e. 12 per article.

VISITS. (9)

On the 1st., 4th., 11th and 12th Major General, The Honorable Sir J.W. McKay, K.C.M.G. C.B. V.D., visited the Depot inspecting Detention Compounds, Group Clearing Hospital and Messing Department and on the 12th. presented Medals to the following:

On the 28th Major General Sir Colin Mackenzie inspected training and made a tour of the Messing department including cook-houses.

The Depot Band was again requisitioned for funerals of American officers and soldiers at Bath.

The Honorable J.D. Connolly, the Agent General for Western Australia together with Mrs Connolly visited and made a

tour of the Depot.

RECREATION (10)

The embargo on assemblages of men owing to the Influenza Epidemic, was removed. The usual concerts were resumed, the "AUSSIES" Concert Party contributing their quota in this Depot and other Camps in the Southern and Eastern Commands.

The Football season is proving very satisfactory to the Depot teams.

The Picture Palace is not yet opened, delay has been caused by the non-delivery of necessary petrol engine. The G.O.C. approved of the 14th being kept as a holiday to celebrate the signing of the Armistice, and in this Depot the Commandant, with the mid-day meal, issued to each man one pint of free beer. During the afternoon each of the various football teams played matches. In the evening a concert was held. During the Armistice week there were no excesses on the part of the men; in some of the canteens the rowdy element had what they called a "hop-ever", and drank free beer.

ADMINISTRATION (LL)

Much of the heavy clerical work of the Staff was satisfactorily met with in connection to drafts. It is proposed to organise a Carrier Wing to deal with prospective home drafts. The Depot absorbing further camps to accommodate this Wing. The adjustment of messes is proving satisfactory, the Bulk Store being very convenient and is the means of reducing messing staffs.

ON WORKLING OF THE PROVOST STAFF DURING MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1918.

Again considerable changes in the personnel of the Staff have to be recorded during the month, especially towards its close. Mr. Crampton has assumed the duties of another Department of the Depot; and a large proportion of the Officeand Detention Staffs havemarched out prior to their return to Australia. Considerable difficulty is being experienced in replacing the Detention Staff, but it is bookd that things will soon be running smoothly again.

such as marked the preceding month. The number of men confined in Compound and No.9 Guard Room averaged about 25, with a maximum of 34 on the 4th. of the month and a minimum of 16 on the 18th. The lowness of the figure of men confined is due to the policy of allowing open arrest to all out the most notorious offenders, or those who have previously broken their parole--and these are not a large percentage of the number to whom the privilege is extended. Several escapes from escorts were recorded, -principally by men being escorted from Warminster to the Depot, although two men managed to effect their escape from the Compound itself.

The number of men brought in under escort increased very largely towards the end of the month, an "officer's party" as escort being the exception-rule rather than the exception during the last week. This is the aftermath of the armistice celebrations, and coupled with the news of impending departures to Australian whilst the close approach of the cold weather may also be a contributing factor.
