

WAR DIARY FOR DECEMBER 1918.

STRENGTH (1) On the 31st December the strength of the Depot was 175 Officers and 5704 O/Ranks. The actual number in Camp was 168 Officers and 4490 O/Ranks, the difference is accounted for by those absent on leave, in Hospitals and other reasons.

HEALTH (2) The general health of the Depot is satisfactory. The Influenza epidemic has completely died out. One notable feature during the month was the greatly reduced numbers on Sick Parade and the small number of men admitted to Hospital from General Diseases.

MESSING (3) For the month 610004 meals were served to 152501 men and these were of first class quality and variety. The Christmas Menu(attached) proved a complete success, the meals being liberal in quantity, excellently cooked and served. For the Dinner on an average each man was issued with half a pound of Chicken and a similar quantity of Pickled Pork, and a Pint of Beer per man. Kmas Pudding, Pastries, Nuts, Fruits and Śweets also in liberal quantities. Owing to further Camps being absorbed, another Kitchen was opened, making 8 mens Kitchens being in full operation. The outgoing Drafts for return to Australia, each man prior to marching out of the Depot-during the early hours of the morning- was provided with a hot Breakfast, and on entraining at warminster for port of embarkation was issued with Sandwiches, Bread, Margarine and Salmon and at an intermediate Station, money was provided from Regimental Funds to purchase each man a mug of warm Tea or Cocoa. Supplies from all sources have been good. The Sausage Meat as issued was becoming distasteful to the men, consequence waste was abnormal- 29551 lbs were issued for the period-Fresh meat issued amounted to 97211 lbs. Depot bred Pork for Xmas Dinner amounted to 2100 lbs for the mens Messes and 158 lbs were supplied to the Officers and Sergeants' Messes. The quality of Bread continues to improve. Again excellent results have been obtained from the bye products section. The total recovery of Fats amounts to 12968 lbs- distributed Lbs 5855 Sold as follows:-Used in lieu of Margarine 3363 37/50 Used in cooking. Lbs. 12968

The percentage of fat recovered to meat issued was 13.3 as against 16.1 for November.

The amount of Swill per head was 5.2 as against 3.4 for November.

It is generally recognised that the amount of Swill is greater during the Winter Months, mainly due to the large quantity of

waste vegetable matter during the season.

AGRICULTURE (4) Operations have eased off in this Department-The trussing of Hay is proceeding and is being taken over by the A.S.C.

DISCIPLINE (5) During the month 41 N.C.O's and men were remanded for trial by D.C.M. as against 60 for November. The principal charges against individuals are:-

Minor offences shew a great decrease being 514 as against 1242 for previous month.

Owing to evacuation to Australia practically the whole of the Staff Owing to evacuation it difficult for the incoming Staff to pick up was changed, making it difficult for the incoming Staff to pick up the threads. Nevertheless this is being done.

EVACUATION (6) This paragraph formerly appeared made the head of "Overseas requirements", however, owing to the Armistice the functions of the Depot altered .- For the month 2969 N.C.O's and men marched into the Depot and 4088 marched out-made up as follows:-

To other Depots in U.K. To Port of Embarkation to Australia 3402 4088

The ships allotted for the period to the Depot and their complement 1100 were: -120 "Saxon" Transport 800 80 "Nestor" 800 . 80 "Marmari" 550 50 "Bakara" 17.12 940 60

Of these a total of 3402 Sergeants and O/Ranks embarked- the difference being made up in deletions from boat rolls- for various and sundry reasons.

SALVAGE (7) The work of this branch has been carried on satisfactorily- but towards the end of the month- moderation in its operations were advised- as there were difficulties in disposing of their products.

(8) Five "HOLBORN" Washing Machines and other necessary appliances were installed at a cost of £168:15:9. Thirteen women Laundresses, Ironers and Menders are employed at a weekly wage of 25/- each. 10.000 articles passed through the Laundry. Free issue of clean underclothing is made weekly to men in Detention. Others are charged at the rate of lad per article. This department is a great convenience to the men and much appreciated by them as a clean outfit is assured at a nominal cost.

VISITS (9) On the 20th the G.O.C. Major General J.W. McCay K.C.M.G. C.B. V.D. visited the Depot and called a General Parade for the area and presented Medals to various N.C.O's and men of the A.I.F.

Pte No.4783 Greenleaf L. of the 13th Battalion received the M.M.

and was of this Depot.

The G.O.C. again visited the Depot on the 26th, inspecting the Detention Compound and Group Clearing Hospital. The Depot Band visited London and were present for the presentation

of Christmas Gifts by Lady Birdwood.

The Band was also requisitioned for to play at a Funeral at Bath. Prior to entrainment for port of embarkation to Australia Pte No.284 White D. 15th M.G.C. was presented before a parade of the Ships complement with the Distinguished Conduct Medal by the Commandant Lieut-Colonel W.O.Mansbridge D.S.O.

RECREATION (11) The usual weekly Concerts were held-The Camp "Cinema" was opened by a free evening to the men on Xmas eve. The subsequent tariff will be 3d 6d, and 9d. Two shows daily. On Christmas day special Church Parades were held, afterwards the men sat down to a substantial dinner (Menu Cards enclosed) A feature of the Dishes is noticable that with exception of the sweets, the whole is the product of the Depot Farm.

On Boxing Day the Depot held a very successful Sports Meeting. Distributing £100. in prize money. Boxing Night at the Camp Cinema Hall the Commandant presented Medals to the various Depot Football Teams who won the Premiership. These teams throughout the season

shewed exceptional form, the final totals being:-SOCCER- Sgt Gunner Captain of Team.

Furniture & Fittings placed in the Camp Cinema during the month. The Building is of Wood & Iron 64 by 34 complete with entrance Porch etc., and contains seating accommodation for 600, made up with 200 Red Plush and "Pegamoid" Tip-up Seats complete with backs and Standards. 200 Feet Running Seating with backs and Standards complete. Electric Light Fittings throughout. The BIOSCOPE is a "Brockless" with a 2 Cylinder "Kelvin" Petrol Engine 6.h.p. and a "Vickers" Dynamo capable of giving an output of 50 amps 60 volts. Only the best films are being shewn. It is the intention to give free entertainment to the Convalescent Patients from the 1st Australian General Hospital Sutton Veny on Saturday afternoons and for these outings it is hoped that arrangements can be made with the Red Cross Society to supply Tea & Smokes.

ADMINISTRATION (13) Owing to the quich dispatch to Australia of "C" Class personnel and of whom the Depot was Staffed, it has made it difficult to keep up, as the new Staff who have made every effort, have not the local knowledge which comes with time and experience, and when it is remembered the numbers of men which the Depot handles, I think the results are creditable. Fresh ground was broken to organize Embarkation Staff and to this end an Embarkation Wing was formed to deal with complements for Boats. Five Transports have been supplied with N.C.O's and men for return to Australia. Again a further re-organization of the Depot was made, i.e. Centre Wing was reabsorbed into Right & Left Wings, that is to say the "3rd Div. of Infantry" was transferred to the Right and the "Details" to Left Wing. Later a further reduction in the Depot organization was made by the Left Wing being absorbed by the Right Wing. The disposition of Units now are "A" Company includes 1st-2nd & 3rd Divisions of Infantry and Artillery. "B" Company 4th & 5th Divisions of Infantry. "C" Company "Details" i.e. Machine Gunners, Trench Mortars, A.A.M.C. etc etc A further Company is added which deals with men being made ready, that is, withdrawal and issue of Australia & Ships' Kit. Pay-Books etc. After this is completed they are transferred to Embarkation Wing for inclusion on Boat Rolls and necessary Inoculation and Medical examination.

Monthly Medical Report for December 1918

During the past month the Medical organization of the depot has been carried out without inetrruption of any kind. Since the last rever report the Demobilization of the A.I.F. troops has commenced and over 5000 men have been boarded for return to australia and three boats have wireast already left with troops from this depot. The influenza epedemic has completely died out and it is only on rape occasions that a case is reported. One noticeable feature during the month was the greatly reduced number on sick parades and also the few number of men admitted to hospital with general diseases. One case of measles occured during the month the usual precautions were taken in each case (also one case of mumps) and there wasno spread of the disease among the contacts.

The Early Treatment Department has continued with good results and for the three months ending 31/12/18,584 cases have been treated of w which 326 were cured ,241 were transferred to 1st A.D. Hospital and 17

are still under treatment.

On the whole the health of the troops in the Depot is satisfactory and there are no other special features needing comment.

ly for November 1918 - shewing a DECREASE OF 2020 in the marching in, and an Increase of 1078 in the Marching Out.

Approximately 3000 full-fare Warrants (Army Book 422) were issued as against 1000 for November, 2880 Leave Passes, 1601 Road Passes, and 700 Duty Passes, against 3040, 2702, and 500 for November.

REPORT ON WORKING OF THE PROVOST STAFF DURING THE MONTH OF DECEMBER 1918.

Staff.

Practically a complete change was affected in the personnel of the staff in this office during the month of December, thus throwing a considerable amount of work on the present existing staff which had not the opportunity of picking up the routine prior to the marching out of the old staff. The present staff, however, is now falling into line and the work is beginning to run smoothly again. Owing to Capt. McCaul leaving rather suddenly queries dating back before I took charge have proved hard to solve at times owing to fecords and files not being up to date. The majority of these, however, have been adjusted. A certain amount of difficulty is being experienced with owing to the several changes which have recently taken place in the organisation of the depot, i.e.:- The Centre Wing being absorbed into Right and Left Wings, and more recently Left Wing into Right. This is noticed more particularly when a query as to action taken of minor offences of men who were attached to Centre and Left wing prior to re-organisation arises.

Compound.

The month's review in regard to the compound is decidedly satisfactory. The number of men confined in compound and No 9 guardroom averaging about 22 with a maximum of 36 on the 5th December, and a minimum of 9on the 27th. The lowness of the figure of men confined is due to the policy of allowing open arrest to all but the most notorious offenders and even in these instances men are occasionally released under open arrest pending trial if their conduct is exemplary during detention. It is satisfactory to note that not one of these cases have broken open arrest, though several who have been released under open arrest on account of it being their first crime have broken away. Several escapes from No 9 Guardroom were reported during the month by men already sentenced, and who were awaiting commitment to Lewes. These men have repeatedly escaped and in this instance succeeded in cutting a hole in the floor of the cell. As the guards, however, were supplied by wings and guard company, no blame is attached to this staff for their escape. number brought in under escort has been rather heavy, especially the latter end of the month. This being no doubt due to the Xmas holidays.
