The artillery embarked has 3 sections of 18 pdr guns, horse & personnel which were left at the training centre.</p> <p>The artillery is organised at present in 4 Brigades each of 4 Batteries of 4 guns, 3 - 18 pdr. batteries & 1 - 4.5 Howitzer battery in each brigade.</p> <p>The artillery is to be reorganised on a six gun battery basis.</p> <p>The following proposals were submitted to II Anzac on 27th December.</p> <p>(a) Whole unit on arrival to be quartered in the rear Corps area, and not in the Divisional area, where there is no accommodation immediately available.</p> <p>(b) Out of the available personnel, two complete Brigades each of 3 - 18 pdr. batteries and one howitzer battery, all 6 gun batteries, to be organised and prepared for relief, i.e. 36/18 pdr. & 12 howitzers.</p> <p>(c) Additional emplacements to be completed at once for above, also additional horse standings and accommodation at wagon lines - over & above that which now exists for 30/18 pdr & 8 howitzers guns as present with the Division.</p> <p>(d) The remainder of the 3rd Divisional Artillery to be left billeted in the Corps back area until a decision has been reached as to the ultimate organisation & disposal. THIRD AUSTRALIAN DIVISION.Divisional Headquarters,
January 26th, 1917.-CIRCULAR MEMORANDUM No. 44.REINFORCEMENT CAMP.-

- 1.- The Camp is situated at Sheet 36 N. W., A.11.d.5.4. next STEENWERCK BATHS.

Accommodation: 10 Officers, 112 Other Ranks.

- 2.- Command and Administration:

The Command and Administration of the Camp will be under the Camp Commandant, Divisional Headquarters, in his capacity as a Staff Officer.

Discipline and Training:

The Officer on duty is responsible in the Camp for administration, discipline and training under orders communicated by the Camp Commandant.

3. Staff of Camp: Officer on Duty - Officer of the Reserve Brigade.

The Officer on duty will live in the Camp.

Quartermaster-Serjeant - Serjeant J. Carey, Permanent Base H.C.O.
Cook, and Cook's mate, A.A.H.C.-

4. The Camp Commandant will arrange for Guides to meet all ordinary incoming trains. On notification of time of arrival of a special train by which Reinforcements are expected, "C" Staff will make necessary arrangements with Divisional Train for transport of Kits from Station.

All reinforcements and men arriving at night will be taken to the Reinforcement Camp, when space permits.

- 5.- Men discharged from Divisional Rest Station.-

On notification of the discharge of men from the Divisional Rest Station, through the Camp Commandant, the O. C. Camp, will send a guide to the D.F.S., to conduct them to the Reinforcement Camp. These men will remain at the camp for three days and undergo exercise to harden them before return to their units.

Troops proceeding to ARMENTIERES will march. Dress - Marching Order, under an Officer or H. C. O., according to strength.

- 6.- Units will send Guides to conduct men from the Reinforcement Camp.-

(a): For troops in the Forward Area - to 11-30 Square, ARMENTIERES.

(b): For troops in Rear Area - To Reinforcement Camp.

Times will be notified by the Camp Commandant.

The O.C. Camp, will arrange that men use the STEENWERCK BATHS before proceeding to join their Units.-

- 7.- Sick Parade:- A Medical Officer will visit the Reinforcement Camp daily.

- 3.- Records:- The Conducting Officer, Reinforcements, will hand over his papers to the O. C., Camp, who will check them, and give necessary receipt. The O. C. Camp, will inform the Camp Commandant, and will note the classification of the men and whether they are properly equipped, and have been through gas.

The O. C. Camp, will furnish a daily state to the D.A. & Q.M.G., on following pro forma :-

- 9.- A reserve of 600 Blankets will be held, and reinforcements will be issued with blankets on arrival, which they will take when joining their respective units. Units will take on charge blankets arriving with reinforcements.

Indents to replace blankets issued will be made through Camp Commandant on Divisional Ordnance Officer, immediately reinforcements are despatched.

Men discharged to Units from Divisional Rest Station through the Reinforcement Camp will not take blankets with them on return to their Units.

- 10.- A small reserve of rations will be held by the Quartermaster-Serjeant of the Camp. In the event of reinforcements being notified, the Camp Commandant will arrange for indents on the Divisional Train for the necessary rations.

Divisional Scheme for Collection of Stores in Event of an Advance.

ARMENTIEREA + AREA.

1. is detailed by the Corps to co-ordinate the collection of Stores in all the Corps Area.

2. An Officer will be detailed by the Divisional Train to assist the Corps Officer in arrangeing supplies for the troops left behind.

3. The Divisional Salvage Company Officer will be in charge of the Divisional Area. His Duties are given in Appendix " A ".

His Headquarters will be at(Map Attached).

4. An Interpreter and a Gendarme will be attached to Divisional Salvage Officer.

5. The Divisional Area will be divided into Front and Rear Areas. See map attached.

The Front Area will be in charge of the Divisional Salvage Officer.

The Rear Area will be in charge of the O.C. Convalescent Coy. Instructions from O.C. Convalescent Company are laid down in Appendix "B"

6. Personnel from Units will be detailed to be left in charge of Stores as follows :-

7. In addition to the above the men of the Convalescent Company will be attached to the O.C. Divisional Salvage Company, by him where required.

8. The Divisional Signal Company will leave behind The Supernumerary Officer attached to it. This Officer will be in charge of any Signal personnel remaining behind in the Area. He will collect all spare Signal Stores and will be instructed to get in touch with the Corps and Divisional Salvage Officers and obtain from them the necessary fatigue parties he may require.

9. Unit Commanders will be responsible for having orders ready for issue, for the collection of stores in their Area on instruction from Divisional Headquarters. Copies of these orders will be held at Divisional Headquarters.
 10. All stores will be collected at Temporary Unit Dumps under Unit arrangements and will not be removed from these Dumps until orders are received from Divisional Headquarters. Units will report the location of their Temporary Dump to O.C. Divisional Salvage Company.
 11. The sites of the Divisional and Brigade Dumps are shown on Appendix " C " .
 12. Trenches will not be dismantled (i.e. Loopholed plates and woodwork removed) until receipt of a definite order from Army Headquarters that this is to be done.
 13. Owners of Civilian Transport are Shown on Appendix " D " .
 14. Civilian Labour available is shown on Appendix " E " .
 15. List of Huts and Tents in Divisional Area are shown on Appendix " F " .

6. An interpreter will be placed at your disposal from the French Mission.
