

Order of Battle. 1. The attack will be launched by the 4th Aus. Infantry Brigade on Right and 13th Aus. Infantry Brigade on Left. on frontages as per attached map. 12th Aus. Infantry Brigade will form Div. Reserve with H.Q. at BIRR CROSS Roads.



- 2. Dispositions of Brigades, Artillery Groups and Brigades at Zero hour on Attack Day are shown on attached Map.
- 3. The attack will be carried out by the 4th Aus. Infantry Brigade and 13th Aus. Infantry Brigade simultaneously at Zero hour, each employing one Battalion to capture RED objective, and two Battalions for BLUE objective, with one Battalion in Reserve. They will co-operate with flank Divisions throughout the operations.



The boundaries and objectives are marked on attached map. The 4th Aus. Inf. Brigade will be responsible for direction, and arrangements for guiding by compass have also been provided for in the event of foggy weather prevailing.

The attacking troops will be formed up in position ready to advance prior to Zero and will move forward close up under the barrage. Provision has been made for the mopping up of the area as the attack progresses.

When the final protective barrage closes at plus 327, patrols properly supported will be pushed forward along the Div. front, and tactical points within 200 to 250 yards found unoccupied will be held and consolidated.


The whole of the Vickers Machine Guns will be employed. The two attacking Brigades will each have 8 guns at their disposal which will be mobile and will act as close support to advancing Infantry and assist in repelling counter-attacks. The remainder will carry out barrage work assisted by guns of 6th Aus. Machine Gun Company under the D.M.G.O. These are again divided, 32 being employed on S.O.S. lines and 24 carrying out a creeping barrage. Take furny cavallable to fact duf

The closest liaison will be maintained with Units on the Right (14th Aus. Infantry Brigade) and Left (76th Brigade). arrangements also being made to send small parties forward with their flanks and for them to do likewise with our Brigades.

Maps have been issued to Officers showing the times of lifts of Artillery barrage during the advance.

The barrage will be placed 150 yards in advance of J.O. place at Zero, and will commence to move 3 minutes later at rate of 100 yards in 4 minutes for 290 yards, thereafter at 100 yards in 6 minutes, pausing on 7th lift for an extra 6 minutes. At plus 100 the barrage will move forward from RED Line at the rate of 100 yards in 8 minutes up to BLUE Line when a protective barrage will be formed 200 yards in front of it, and a special programme of searching barrages forward will be carried out.

- (a) On "K" day at an hour to be notified later, the I ANZAC Corps in conjunction with the Corps on its right and left, will - 1. continue the operations against the PASHENDAELE Ridgo.
 - (b) The objectives and boundaries of the Divisions of I ANZAC are as shown on Secret Map 3 D. issued with Preliminary Instructions No. 2 (also see Appendix 'A' attached).
 - The 14th Aus. Infantry Brigade, 5th Aus. Division, is attacking on the right and the 76th Infantry Brigade, 3rd Division, on the left.
 - (a) The attack of the 4th Aus. Division will be carried out by the 4th And. Infantry Brigade on the right and the 13th Aus. Infantry Brigade on the left.
 - (b) The left of the 4th Aus. Infantry Brigade will direct, and G.O.C. 4th Aus. Infantry Brigade will arrange for an Officer to be specially told off to keep the direction. In addition to the above in the case of mist or fog one Officer and one O.R. in the centre of each Battalion will be propared to lead by compass.
 - The closest liaison will be maintained with Units on the Right and Left, and Brigades will arrange to send a small party 3. forward with the Brigades on their flanks and for flank Brigades to do the same with thom.
 - Artillery barrage Maps have been issued to all Officers. (2) 4.
 - (b) Infantry Brigade Commanders will see that the Jumping Off Linesshewn on barrage map is adhered to, as the barrage will be placed 150 yards in advance of it.
 - The barrage will advance at Zoro plus 3 minutes at the rato of 100 yards in 4 minutes for 200 yards. Thoroafter at 100 yards in 8 minutes, but on the 7th lift it will pause for & minutos extra.
 - (d) The protective barrage will move forward from in front of the RED Line at "plus 100 minutes". Thence to the BLUE Line the rate will be 100 yards in 8 minutes.
 - On arrival at the BLUE Line a protective barrage will be put down 200 yards in advance of it and a special programme 5. of searching barrages forward will be carried out.
 - (b) Certain Units of Heavy Artillery have been detailed as a back barrage to deal with enemy counter-attacks.
 - Posts will be pushed out to a distance of about 100 yards in advance of the line that is being consolidated.
 - When the final protective barrage ceases at 0 plus 327 minutes patrols properly supported will be pushed forward all along the Corps front. Tactical points within 200-250 yards found unoccupied will be occupied and consolidated. S.O.S. barrage lines will be adjusted accordingly by the Division.

- 13. (a) A contact patrol distinguished by a black streamer on near odge of loft wing will fly over the front from Zero till the final objective is reached.
 - (b) Red Flares will be lit by leading troops 20 minutes after reaching each objective, at which time a contact aeroplane will call for them by Klaxon Horn or firing a white Very Light.
 - (c) In addition Infantry will light flares whenever an aeroplane calls for them.

- Instructions have been issued separatoly.

OPERATIONS

Artillery
From 5.30 A.M. to 6.30 A.M. on 24th our artillery
fired a practice barrage. The actual bursts could not be
observed on account of the fog. Roads and approaches were
fired on during the day. 120 rounds were expended on wire
cutting on JUDILEE TRENCH.

Patrols A patrol states that flares were fired from "PILL BOX" at J.3.d.3.6. Three of the enemy were shot down in front of this PILL BOX. The shots brought much movement and the patrol had to retire. Another patrol was sniped at from vicinity of PILL BOX at J.3.a.9.9. A M.G. was active in brick ruin at J.3.a.9.9. A second M.G. was active to the rear of this block-house. A small party of the enemy was seen here.

IDENTIFICATIONS

At 2 A.M. 3 of the enemy were captured by one of our patrols at J.3.b.2.2. (approx) The prisoners who belonged to the 49th R.I.R. were apparently coming in to give themselves up.

ENEMY SHELLING

During the period there was very little shelling forward of ANZAC RIDGE. WESTHOEK and BELLEWARDE Ridges were heavily shelled with 5.9s and 4.2s. The valley in J.7.a. and b. was continuously shelled from 10 A.M. to 3 P.M.

HOSTILE AERIAL ACTIVITY

Hostile aeroplanes were very active during the period. At 11 A.M. 12 planes circled overJH.7. for half an hour. At 1.30 P.M. a plane dropped 12 bombs in J.12.d. From 2.30 P.M. to 5.30 P.M. three enemy planes patrolled our front line trenches and WESTHOEK Ridge.

m MOVEMENT

At 1.20 P.M. an enemy dump was exploded near ROMULUS WOOD. At 11.30 A.M. 3 Germans left near of TOKIO FARM and worked down shell holes to D. 27. a. 8.5.

NOT to be taken into the Front Line.

Our Operations.

Artillery response was quick and effective as no enemy troops reached our lines. They appeared to suffer very heavy casualties. Throughout the day our artillery was active on live targets with good results.

Patrols. Strong patrols worked well out in front of the BLUE LINE. One prisoner- was captured by a patrol of the Right Brigade.

Aircraft. Our planes were very active during the day.

Identifications.

1 prisoner of 4th Company 456 I.R. was captured on Right Brigade Front.

Enemy shelling.

Hostile shelling was active throughout the whole day but was scattered over the whole of the Sector. From 6.38.p.m. to 7.p.m. a heavy barrage was placed on the front system.

4 H.V. guns were active on the back areas during the day.

CHATEAU WOOD was consistently shelled throughout the period by an 8" howitzer. I.12.b. and d. was shelled by a 5.9 battery at frequent intervals.

J.1. and J.7. and WESTHOEK RIDGE were shelled by a 4.2" battery from 7.10.p.m.. The majority of the enemy guns appeared to be firing at long ranges.

Enemy Defences.

Snipers. Enemy snipers were very active and caused a fews casualties to our consolidating parties.

Trench nortars. Two heavy hinnenwerfers were active at 4.4.b.9.7..

77/s. Twp 77's have been located at D. 28.b.9.9.

Hostile Aircraft. Enemy planes were out as soon as our attack commenced and were active throughout the day. At 11.30.a.m. a hostile plane shot down by Lewis Guns. At 4.40.p.m. one of our planes shot down a German plane, which fell in our lines. At 7.20.p.m. 3 hostile planes fired on troops and Battery positions in J.7.a. At 3.10.p.m. 4 enemy planes made a low reconnaissance in I.12, 4 Enemy balloons were up during the day on T.B.'s of 750, 800, 820, 1200 from J.7.b.75.90. At 12.30.a.m. a hostile plane shot down one of ours.

at D.29.a.3.9. and made their way in single file to D.28.b.9.4. This party was engaged by the Artillery. Hovement was also noted at D.29.a.5.1., REMUS WOOD, J.5.c.1.7., D.29.c.9.2., D.12.a.8.2.

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



OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Our Artillery was very active throughout the period and keptenemy's roads and approaches under heavy bursts of fire. In response to S.O.S. Signals from the Front Line, Divisional Artillery put down barrages in front of the BLUE LINE at 6.58.p.m. and 9.50.p.m. Infantry observers report good shooting by the Heavies in J.4.b. and d.

Lachine Guns. Vickers guns corried out indirect fire on enemy's communications and assisted in the artillery barrages in response to the S.O.S. signals.

Trench Hortars. Stokes Hortars on the Right Brigade Front fired on the following targets: - J.4.b.5.6., J.4.b.9.2. and working party at J.4.b.7.2.

Patrols. The Divisional Front was actively patrolled throughout the night. No enemy patrols encountered but movement observed in vicinity of J.4.b.7.2. Flares were sent up about 250 yards in advance of the Front Line on Left Brigade Sector.

Aircraft. Our planes continually patrolled the enemy's lines and were subjected to fairly heavy machine gun fire.

ENELLY SHELLING.

Hostile artillery fire was fairly heavy over the whole sector

throughout the period.

The following points were subjected to heavy shelling at frequent intervals: BLUE and RED LINES, TOKIO, ANZAC FARM, WESTHOEK, J.7.d. and b., BELLEWAARDE RIDGE and HEMIN Road. At 6.30.p.m. a heavy barrage was placed along the RED and BLUE LINES and eased off at 7.30.p.m.

Snipers. Were active, operating from shall holes in U.4.b. and d.



The following notes regarding tactics etc., are forwarded as a result of experiences during recent operations. Further details will be forwarded when submitting my report.

FORMATIONS.

- l. A line of skirmishers close up to the barrage ready to shoot at any of the enemy who put their heads up after the barrage had passed proved very effective and disposed of any enemy resistance.
- 2. Small columns in single file proved a very handy formation, and enabled troops to move forward easily over the broken ground without getting out of control.
- 3. Small Platoon operations to reduce pill boxes which were holding out were most effective on at least two occasions.
- 4. Stokes Mortars very close up in rear of the leading waves were effective in subduing hostile machine gun fire when capturing the right of the BLUE Line.
 - It was found that when forming up, a gap, of at least 100 yards between the waves destined for the RED and BLUE Lines respectively, reduced confusion and did not prevent the rear troops getting clear of the enemy barrage, which was in this case very light.

COMMUNICATIONS.

- Special Engineer parties moved in rear of attacking troops and laid tapes (for Runners, etc.) to the various Headquarters. This proved very useful, but it is recommended that as soon as possible these tapes be replaced by a line of posts painted white at the top, as the tapes soon get obliterated.
- 2. Notice boards marked with the names of farms etc.

 were prepared beforehand and put into position at once.

 These proved very useful.

 Candle lanterns with red glasses placed at intervals

 were useful guides to the front and rear at night.

INTERCOMMUNICATION.

The Forward Parties as laid down in S.S. 148 carried

out their worl successfully.

Pigeons proved very useful and numerous pigeon messages were received. The first message to be received by this Division or by the Divisions on either Flank, notifying the capture of the BLUE Line, was a pigeon message from our Right centre Battalion.



REPORT ON OPERATIONS CARRIED OUT BY 4THAUS. DIVISION

ON 26/9/1917 AND SUBSEQUENT DAYS.



A. PREPARATIONS AND DISPOSITIONS PRIOR TO ZERO.

- 1. Early intimation was received from 1 ANZAC in the form of Preliminary Instructions to the effect that the 4th Aus. Division would participate in the second phase of the operations against PASCHENDALE RIDGE. Final orders for the attack were received on September 24th? The frontages and objectives allotted to the Division were shown on attached Map.
- 2. It was decided to attack with two Brigades (4th and 13th) with one Brigade (12th) in Divisional Reserve. The frontage of each Brigade was approximately 700 yards. The area to be captured was divided into two phases, the first being the RED Line, and second the BLUE Line, as per map herewith. Each Brigade was ordered to employ one Battalion against First Area, and two Battalions against the second; one Battalion remaining in old front line to form Brigade Reserve.

A careful record was apt of the enemy barrage lines prior to Zero Day, and the most suitable plan for forming up was adopted. The Red Line Battalions formed up in advance of the front line while the BLUE Line Battalions were immediately in rear, extending while the BLUE Line Battalions were immediately in rear, extending for about 350 yards in depth. These positions were marked out with tape beforehand.

The troops carrying out the attack had the colour of the objective they were detailed for, painted on the back of their helmets, in order to lessen the chances of confusion.

3. Our troops were disposed as follows at Zero hour, 5-50 a.m., 26th September:-

DIARY OF EVENTS.


The attacking troops, 4th Aus. Infantry Brigade on Right, and 13th Aus. Infantry Brigade on Left were in position before Zero, and advised everything ready for the assault at 5.35.a.m. and 5.5.a.m. respectively, which was reported to I ANZAC.

The barrage fell at the appointed time, 5.50.a.m., and lifting three minutes later our troops commenced to advance moving close under it. Distances were adjusted between waves after all troops were in advance of our front line. The morning mist rendered visibility difficult, but this cleared later, the day being calm and fine.

The hostile retaliation to our opening fire was weak, probably due to our counter battery work harassing their Artillery.

The attack started well in proper formation and made good progress. At 6.45.a.m. advice was received that the first batch of prisoners was coming in. These men afterwards proved to be part of the 49th R.I.R., the identification being normal.

7.0.a.m. 50th Battalion had mopped up concrete dugouts in J.3.b., and had captured 2 Machine Guns and 19 prisoners in them. Everything progressing satisfactorily, and the 13th Brigade commenced work on C.T. leading towards RED Line which was thought to be captured. This was afterwards confirmed.



- 7.15.a.m. The 16th Battalion reported having taken the RED Line and that they were in touch with the Brigade on their Right, which had met with equal success. Touch was kept with the progress of flanking Umits throughout the advance, all Units having previously arranged for the closest liaison. The 5th Aus. Division on our Right were progressing well, and had captured 100 prisoners.
 - 7.20.a.m. Further prisoners were identified from 2nd R.I.R. These also were POLES.
 - 7.25.a.m. RED Line gained throughout the Sector with comparative--ly few casualties, and was being consolidated. Touch was maintained with both flanks. The first news received of the capture of the RED Line was timed 6.55.a.m.
 - 8.4.a.m. Information received from Division on our Right that they had secured their RED Line and were consolidating. Our Brigades progressing satisfactorily. Left Brigade established Forward Station at TOKIO.
- 8.10.a.m. 13th Brigade had taken BLUE Line. Germans were then surrendering freely. Touch was kept with 76th Brigade on our Left.
- 8.46.a.M. 14th Battalion reported having reached BLUE Line and were then in touch with 15th Battalion on Right, and 49th on Left. This position was then being consolidated, but few prisoners were taken at this objective. This news was received by Pigeon service.
- 9.15.a.m. Contact aeroplane returned from the front and dropped map at D.H.Q. with position of our troops as shown by ground flares marked thereon.
- 10.4.a.m. The 14th Battalion reported by Pigeon that they were still consolidating, though troubled with heavy M.G. fire.
- 10.45. a.m. Our forward Amplifier picked up a message to the effect that the enemy was massing for counter attack along the Ridge, but the instrument jammed before anything very definite could be ascertained.
- 11.10.a.m. Encouraging reports were received from C.O's in the front line. A few hostile M.G's were located within bange of Stokes Mortars were dealt with. Brigade Dump was shifted forward to RED Line. Three M.G's were reported captured by 4th Brigade.
- 11.57.a.m. An S.O.S. was reported by 'phone on the Div. front on our Right to which our Artillery replied.
- 12.15.p.m. Units were warned that our Artillery would test their new S.O.S. line on our front and asked for arrangements to be made so that a report as to its suitability might be rendered.
- 12.28.p.m. The Wireless Tank which had been ordered up to assist in maintaining communication was reported in position. This Tank was subsequently disabled, and proved of little value so far as this Division was concerned.
- 12.35. p.m. A written report with map attached was received from 51st Battalion showing dispositions, strong points constructed in advance of the BLUE Line, position of Vickers Guns (Mobile), and Stokes Mortars. Numerous enemy dead were lying about. 50 prisoners including 2 Officers were sent back.

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12.55.p.m. 4th Brigade had placed 6 Vickers in position near BLUE Line. These combined with the sid of the Lewis Guns and Rifles, the Brigadier considered would stop any counter-attack that might develops against his front.

- 1.20. pan. Aerial observation reported that about 1,000 hostile troops were seen on WATERDAMHOEK FOLKSON Road at 12.30. p.m. These troops disappeared in D.30., where Artillery fire was brought to bear.
- a.O.p.m. 4th Brigade reported enemy to be massing in large numbers opposite their front, and asked Artillery to be ready to fire on their S.O.S. lines. Our guns apparently dispersed this force, as this counter-attack failed to develope.

Enemy seroplanes were flying low over our RED and BLUE Lines, and were engaged throughout the day with M.G. and rifle fire. One E.A. was shot down by our fire at 11.50.s.m.

- 5.80.p.m. S.O.S. was sent up on our Right Brigade front at S.RS.p.m. to which our Artillery successfully responded. The enemy failed to reach our lines.
- 4.5. p.m. Report received from 13th Brigade that enemy were massing opposite their front for a counter-stack. Our Artillery and M. 0's took action, and the advance of the enemy failed to eventuate. The 13th Brigade reported later that this force was dispersed in disorder by our protective Artillery barrage.
- in advance. Hostile artillery was active along the whole front, and shelled the ridges in rear intermittently. An s.O.S. Signal was fired on 4th Brigade front and afterwards a report was received saying a counter-attack was in progress at that hour. This was easily beaten off with artillery, M.O. and Rifle fire.
- 7.14.p.m. Reports from our front showed all to be quiet on our Sector. The consolidation of the position and the forwarding of supplies and material was progressing.
- 10.50 p.m. Both 4th and 15th Brigades advised that all was well and that there was very little enemy shelling on the front.

No serious counter-attacks were attempted after this and the 18th Aus. Infantry Brigade relieved the 18th and 4th Aus. Infantry Brigades on the nights 27/28 and 28/29 respectively.

G.

GENERAL.

Artillery.

Our Artillery Barrage was clear cut, and inspired confidence throughout the operation. The support generally given was most satisfactory. F.O.O's went forward with H.Q. of the BLUE Line Battalions, and were of considerable assistance in centrolling and directing fire.

Engineers.

The 4th and 13th Field Companies Engineers worked in close touch with their Brigades and were employed chiefly in laying out and marking tracks forward of Brigade H. C., bridging

swampy ground in the HANE BEEK Valley, assisting with the consolidation and with bringing forward R.E. material. Having the J.C. Field Company at Brigade H.Q. proved a suitable arrangement, and assisted in having work done expeditiously.

An Officer and Party of Sappers who accompanied the Infantry in the attack gave valuable technical assistance.

Machine Guns.

The whole of the Vickers Machine Guns were in action. The 4th and 13th Brigades each employed 8 Mobile Guns which advanced with the last attacking wave and occupied pre-arranged positions, which enabled them to render valuable assistance with covering fire. The remainder, together with the guns of the 12th, 24th Aus. M.G. Company and 8 kekike Guns from 6th Aus. M.G. Company, were employed on barrage work, 24th carrying out the creeping barrage programme, while the other 32 guns were used on S.O.S. lines. (Special M.G. Report attached).

The M.G. barrage was successfully carried out and gave confidence to our troops. Prisoners captured state enemy were very reluctant to advance through it when ordered to counter-attack.

Stokes Mortars.

Six Stokes Mortars were allotted to the RED Line troops, and to the BLUE Line troops. These Mortars were not employed during the attack, but were subsequently brought into action from the rear of the BLUE Line against "pill boxes" containing M.G's which were within range of them.

Intercommunication.

(a) Communications generally were well maintained, though at times considerable difficulty was experienced by Divisional H.Q. in calling up Brigade H.Q's on the telephone. The 4th and 13th Brigades each had a Brigade Forward Party which advanced in rear of the attacking troops and established themselves at near J.4.c.4.4. TOKIO respectively. Owing to lack of accommodation and heavy shell fire, the 13th Brigade Party withdrew to J.3.a.9.9., whence communication to Brigade H.Q. was kept continuously.

The Amplifiers again proved of great value.

The Pigeon service was most satisfactory, messages being delivered promptly by this means.

(b) During and after operations 2,350 yards of cable were buried 6 feet deep. (20 pairs from J.9.a.3.4.to J.2.d.9.8. and 42 pairs from J.2.d.9.8. to D.27.a.6.5.).

Medical.

Medical arrangements worked satisfactorily.

Prisoners.

The number of prisoners captured is estimated at 7 Officers, and about 340 other ranks.
Trophies taken include 12 M. C's and 6 T. M's.

- D. The following points may be of interest. -
- (a) Day and night recommaissance of routes to forming up line and marking of routes by at least 1 Officer and 1 N.C.O. per Platoon, is essential if the ground is in any way difficult.
- (b) Ground in front of jumping off line should be patrolled on at least one night prior to Zero night by patrols of strength similar to those to be used on Zero night, this to prevent raising suspicion.
- (c) No definite line for "forming up" can be safely allotted the troops for the 2nd objective until it has been ascertained where the hostile barrage is likely to fall. If possible, there should be at least 100 yards distance between the troops for the 1st and those for the 2nd objective to avoid a mixture of units.

At the same time it is preferable, if it can be done, to form up all troops in front of the hostile barrage line, and for this reason, especially, Divisions if consulted could materially assist in fixing the best position for the "jumping off line.

(d) It was found useful to mark the jumping off line on the night prior to Zero, have careful sketches of forming up ground made showing exact position of units.

As early as possible on Zero night, lay the tapes along the whole front and mark flanks with notice boards, showing units and shaded lights - in addition tapes to be laid at right angles to jumping off tapes for about 50 yards, both to front and rear -


- (e) Better Training of Officers in guiding by compass was emphasised.
- (f) When the barrage halts in front of the objective, the inner edge requires clearer definition to prevent parties going too far forward.
- (g) The best use possible must be made of the time the barrage is covering the objective
 - (i) To put out wire in front of the contemplated line of defence, it should be well in front (i.e. about 100 yards) to give defenders room to move forward out of their trench, should they be heavily shelled later -
 - (iii) To dig.(iii) To form advanced dumps of ammunition and R.E. Stores,
 Water, etc. -

- (h) Importance of properly organized Runners was again emphasised Battalion H.Q. should move well forward and establish early communication with the Brigade Forward Party.
- especially marking routes back with tapes and posts. Field Company Commanders were with advanced Brigade Headquarters and this arrangement proved very successful. Tapes should be laid out as soon as possible right up to the front, and these should be replaced by posts with the tops painted white at the first opportunity, as the tapes soon get obliterated, especially in muddy weather.
- (j) Stokes Mortars moving well up in rear of the leading waves were found very useful in overcoming machine guns which continued to fire from pill boxes and shell holes, after the last objective had been captured.

OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Registration from our new battery positions was carried out. At 6.50.p.m. our Right Group responded to a call from the Division on our Right. Some 2,000 rounds were fired. During the day a large Dump was exploded in ROHULUS WOOD and a fire burned in the vicinity for several hours.

Stokes hortars. A working party was fired on by Stokes Hortars. Casualties were inflicted and the party dispersed.

Bombing. Several enemy working parties were dispersed and casualties inflicted by rifle grenadiers crawling forward and firing from shell-holes. A M.G. at J.4.b.6.6. was silenced by Rifle Grenades.

ENELY SHELLING.

Enemy's artillery was hormally active on Battery Areas. From 7.15.a.m. to 4.p.m. the area between WESTHOEK and BELLEWAARDE RIDGES was heavily shelled by 10.5.cm., 15.cm., and 21.cm. howitzers. It is estimated that 4,000 rounds were fired. Most of the fire came from the BECELAERE and BROODSEINDE Groups. J.7.a. and b. was shelled throughout the night with gas shell and H.E. At 12. noon a heavy borrage, netures was put down on CHATEAU "OOD for 15 minutes. Hostile guns were also active on the RED LINE and on the Right portion of the BLUE LINE.

ENERY DEFENCES.

Work. Enemy parties were at work on suken road at J.5.a.2.3...
These parties were fired on by our snipers who caused many casualties.

Machine Guns. Active during night on NO HAM'S LAND and on roads in vicinity of GARTER POINT.

Trench Hortars. A enemy light T.H. was active at D. 2f. central. (approximately).

HOSTILE AERIAL ACTIVITY.

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Constructions and model break

Enemy aeroplanes were very active throughout the period, flying low over our lines in large numbers. They directed Artillery fire, and fired M.G's on the garrison. At 6.a.m. 6 planes flew low over our battery positions. At 12,40.p.m, 12 hostile planes flew over to YPRES and returned after 15 minutes. This was possibly a photographic flight. Three enemy ballons were up early in the morning and remained up till 11.a.m. Three balloons were up from 2.30.p.m. to dusk.
