

BEAUCOURT	1918 May 1st.		FOURTH ARMY A.& Q. NOTES received Arrangements made for the relief of the Division by the 47th. Division. The D.A.Q.M.G. 47th. Division has been living with us for three days in order to familiarise himself with the sector and today the A.A. & Q.M.G. 47th. Division arrived and is living at our Headquarters. This is unusual but was advisable because the 47th. Division was away back near ABBEVILLE, and the personnel were brought up in one staging in lorries.	App.1.
BERTANGLES	2nd.		Divisional Headquarters moves to BERTANGLES. Relief completed at 10 a.m., when Headquarters Second Australian Division opened at BERTANGLES Chateau. As the Division will probably be out in rest (Corps Reserve) for only nine days every effort will be made to bathe and provide every man with clean underclothing during that time.	
	3rd.		Advice received from D.A.G. A.I.F. that authority given in A.I.F. Order 1442 for 20 extra sappers per Field Company Engineers is cancelled.	
	4th.		Weekly Strength Return Owing to an additional Division being placed in the line to the immediate North of us, it became necessary to move the 5th. Australian Infantry Brigade out of the MONTIGNY Area. We made arrangements to accommodate them in ALLONVILLE and CARDONETTE, leaving one Battalion in FRECHENCOURT. A.Q. visited 7th. Brigade in the afternoon in the RIVERY Area to see that accommodation was satisfactory there.	App.2.

ALLONVILLE	May 9th.		<p>6th. Brigade relieved 10th. Brigade in the line.</p> <p>A.A. & Q.M.G. visited Corps Headquarters reference relief of 3rd. Division, as it is noticed that a great number of men are now living in billets in FRANVILLERS, LA HOUSSOYE, QUERRIEU and PONT MOYELLES, within comparatively easy shelling range of the enemy, and it is feared that we might easily suffer heavy casualties in those places from shelling and bombing. A request for trench shelters so that these men may live in the trench systems close to the villages was favourably received - 300 being promised for the next day. This particularly applies to the Reserve Brigade and the Divisional Train.</p> <p>5th. Brigade relieved the 9th. Brigade in the line and 7th. Brigade relieved the 11th. Brigade in reserve.</p>

During the week ending 27th April good progress has been made, and salvage work is settling down.

The sites of the Casualty Clearing Stations at NAMPS are now cleared, and the removal of salvage from that part of the area handed over to the French is being continued.

Good work has been done by the Corps. A considerable amount of salvage has been evacuated from FLESSELLES and VIGNACOURT. A Corps workshop has been opened at VIGNACOURT, where salved rifles are over-hauled previous to re-issue.

Since the 25th April, all salvage organizations have been concentrated on the salvage of 18-pdr. and 4·5" shell cases, and 135,000 of which have been sent to the Base.

- (d) Some units are not paying sufficient attention to the saving of dripping. Surplus dripping provides an income from which many useful extras can be purchased.

The following copy of a letter received from AUSTRALIAN CORPS is circulated for action as desired by the Corps Commander :-

" The Corps Commander regrets to find that neighbouring units regard the Australians as deliberate horse thieves, and that they find it necessary to post special pickets in horse lines when camped alongside units of this Corps. A number of incidents have occurred which tend to show that this impression is not entirely without foundation.

He therefore directs that a strongly worded order on this subject is to be issued to all units pointing out that the removal or retention of any horse or mule not the property of the unit is not only a crime but is also not playing the game and unworthy of the Australian Corps.

Any such act is to be regarded as a most serious offence and every C.O. will be held personally responsible that no horses or other property which has not come into the unit through the regular channel is retained."
