

CONFIDENTIAL MEMO TO COMMANDING OFFICERS.

21/3/18

Remission of Sentences of Detention not served in a

Detention Barrack.

The G?O.C. A.I.F. Depots in U.K., approves of men who are sentenced to undergo detention for 28 days or upwards, but who do not serve such sentences in a detention barrack, being granted the same remission for good conduct, etc., as would have been granted them under the rules for Military Detention Barracks if they were sent to a detention barrack.

The rules bearing on this matter are:-

"125. A soldier sentenced to detention or imprisonment for a period of 28 days or upwards shall be eligible, by special industry and good conduct, and (if not sentenced to discharge with ignominy) proficiency and attention to drill and military training, to earn a remission of a portion of his detention or imprisonment, not exceeding one-sixth of the whole sentence reckoned from the date of award".

A.O. 64/13. Rule 125, add Full marks will be awarded for any time spent prior to commitment in the guard detention room, or in hospital, when this is
not caused by his own fault".

Where the sentence of detention is imposed by a C.O., the power of granting the remission in question may be exercised by him (Vide M.M.L. p.425, note 16.)

Where the sentence is imposed by a D.C.M. remission may only be granted by the G.O.C. of the Command (Southern, Northern or Eastern) within which the soldier undergoing detention is held. In such cases recommendation for remission must be submitted to these Headquarters in time for authority to be sent either by letter or by wire.

The grant of remission of sentence carries with it remission of forfeiture of pay for the period remitted, and credit entry will need to be made in the papers, paybook etc., of the men concerned.

Remissions granted by a C.O., as specified above, should be recorded in Army Rack Form B. 2069.

Remission of D.Cs. M. sentences will be communicated to A.I.F. Administrative Headquarters, by these Headquarters.

CONFIDENTIAL MEMORANDUM No. 232.

All Commanding Officers.

with reference to Special Order No. 1912 of 24.9.17, providing that cases of absence without leave exceeding 14 days will be tried by D.C.M. - It is stated that some men, when shortly due to proceed overseas, go A.W.L. and remain absent for 15 or 16 days with a view to incurring Court Martial and evading draft. When therefore, Commanding Officers of Units providing drafts are satisfied that an absentee has endeavoured to evade a draft, the G.O.C. approves of such absentee being dealt with summarily and sent overseas by first draft, provided that:

(1) The period of absence does not exceed 17 days.
(2) A report must be forwarded to these Headquarters giving reasons for dealing with the case summarily.

In cases of this nature, where period of absence is longer recommendation that the case be dealt with summarily, may be submitted with the application for D.C.M.
