





Work carried out by 5th Australian Division for week ending 3/5/18 is as follows :-

1. TRENCHES WIRING.

Digging and improvement of Strong points and connecting trenches in the three systems of the Forward Zone, and the three systems of the Second or AUBIGNY Zone was carried out, also erection of wire entanglements in connection with these systems. A switch trench (PIONEER SWITCH) joining Forward and Second Zones and running through O.21., 22, 23, and 24 was dug. This trench has a field of fire facing south. Trenches dug and wiring erected from 27/4/18 to 3/5/18 are shown green on attached map. This includes bridge head defences in N.15.c., N.16.c. and N.17.c.




E.A.V. WORKS MAP.

MESSENGER DOGS.

Herewith I am forwarding a copy of a report from the O.C. of the Signal Section upon the work of the first Section of Messenger Dogs supplied to this Division.

Runners take about one hour for the journey between the points the dogs were working.

The work of the dogs were interfered with by stray dogs and bitches in the vicinity of the village. These are being destroyed as found.

Under the circumstances and considering the fact that it was the first work done by the dogs, the results are satisfactory.

The Infantry Commanders consider that they will prove a useful and valuable means of communication.

Report on Messenger Dogs.

A Group of Messenger Dogs was stationed at Left Battalion Headquarters from 2nd to 9th instant.

The dogs worked from front line Company Headquarters to Battalion Headquarters, a distance of approximately 2000 yards. The first shift of dogs was sent to Companies at 10 p.m. on 2nd instant after being four hours at Battalion Headquarters. Two returned within fifteen minutes after release, one being a bitch with a pup at the rear station; the third dog arriving some hours after release, after being seen roaming around the village of SAILLY-le-SEC. On the second shift one dog came back in ten minutes, the other two took nearly two hours.

The dogs were not sent forward the next night, but were kept at Battalion Headquarters to get them used to the place; after that they ran much better. The dogs that ran well on the first day continued their good work throughout, the remainder returning in times varying from half an hour to two hours, except in one instance when a dog delivered its message to the Centre Battalion Headquarters, which is about two miles from the Left Battalion Headquarters.


Messenger dogs were interfered with a great deal by stray dogs in and around SAILLY-le-SEC. Arrangements have been made to have all stray dogs destroyed, and when this is done I consider Messengae Dogs will work much better.




