

Summary - 6 a.m. 26th July to 6 a.m. 27th July.

No. Is Section

SOUTHERN. The day was fairly quiet but during the evening and night the enemy was active both with his patrols and working parties, which we disturbed to the utmost. We appeared to get satisfactory results from sniping. Our trenches were shelled last evening and again at 0545 this morning. The torpedo boat destroyer shelled between BALKAN GUN PITS and GREEN KNOLL at 0200.

MORTHERN. Very little of importance occurred during the day. We used the new 3.7-inch bomb mortar against the enemy's works on HOLLY SPUR- apparently with some effect. During the night patrols from the 9th and 12th Battalions found the eastern edge of THE CORNFIELD and the mouth of ALLAH GULLY clear. Ruses on our part drew but little fire.

No.II. Section ..

the day, and during the evening the bombardment was resumed. The shelling did very little damage although a number of 4.2-inch shells fell in rear of THE PIMPIE. During the night we endeavoured by showing dummy figures to draw enemy fire but were not very successful. A patrol in WIRE GULLY reported all quiet.

O Close to GERMAN OFFICERS TRENCH.

MORTHERN. Quiet during the day. We successfully fired a mine in D.21B. at 1731, and apparently buried four of the enemy. The enemy opened a heavy gun fire on us at 2145 from the direction of MORTAR RIDGE and BATTLESHIP HILL. A good deal of damage was done to the left subsection works. A few more shells were fired at 2330, but the remainder of the night was quiet, and we were able to carry on the repair of our trenches without disturbance.

Artillery

No.I Section. A working party of the enemy in square 211

Z.8 was dispersed by four rounds from HUGHES' battery.
At 1630 a considerable quantity of transport was observed on the GREEN PLATEAU, 204 L. 4 - 5; 18 rounds were fired by JOPP'S battery and the transport was scattered. The City of Glasgow battery fired 11 ranks effective rounds into LEGGE VALLEY. At 1810 the 4.7-inch gun fired four rounds at guns in square 47 M.3 as a registration series. Subsequently this gun fired at transport on GREEN PLATEAU and appeared to be effective.

Mo.II Section. In this section PHILLIPSS, CADDY'S, and BROWNE'S batteries did not fire. At 1200 a 75 mm. gun from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL opened fire on McCAY'S RIDGE and the beach. This gun would appear to be either that at 92 X.6 or at 80 K.3, which was registered by "A" and "B" batteries of the 69th Bde. with aeroplane observation. At 2155 the 69th Bde. was ordered to engage guns firing from the direction of SCRUBBY KNOLL on the 2nd Infantry Brigade trenches. At 2205 the City of Glasgow battery was ordered to shell JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY. This action appeared to be successfuln stopping the enemy's bombardment of our trenches.







No. 1 Section.

At 0725 MM A working party of the enemy in sq. 211 Z 8 were dispersed by 4 rounds fr ed from HUGHES BATTERY which caused the party to take covers

At 1145 The OLIVE GROVE right section opened fire on the beach

but ceased after three rounds from BURGESS BATTERY .

and 6" howitzers(Heavy Battery No. 1 Gun) co-operated in engaging OLIVE GHOVE. Fight section with JOPPS BATTERY only one round was fired by No. 1 gun, the 18-prs firing 17, the results were satisfactory.

At 1600 seven rounds were fixed by the City of Glasgow Battery in registration of OLIVE GROVE, the target was effectively

ranged on .

At 1630 A considerable amount of transport was observed on GREEN PLATEAU 204 L 4.5. 18 rounds were fired by JOPPS BATTERY causing it to scatter. It was at first proposed to allow the 4.7 to entgage this target but owing to presenting a fleeting opportunity and the gum not having previously fired this was not done.

At 1800 Eleven effective rounds were fired by City of Glasgow

Battery into LONG VALLEY.

on our right flank trenches, BURGESS BATTERY fired 10 rds and JOPPS BATTERY fired 4 rounds at the Observing Station to the the west of CEMENT TRENCHES the enemy guns being silenced. The 6" Howitzer from the OLIVE GROVE also opened firefat this this hour.

8 At 1810 the 4.7 gun fired four rounds at guns in sq 47 M 3

thus registering this target .

9 At 1955 after firing successfully at this target the transport on GREEN PLATEAU was engaged - three rounds being fired the last being judged effective -

11 At 1200 a 75 MM gun from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL opened fire on McCAY'S RIDGE and the beach, this gun wo uld ap appear to be that at 92 X 6 or 80 K 3 which under instructions from the Brig.-General Anzac weas registered at 1730 by A which and B Batteries 69th Brigzde with aeroplane observation This gun again opened fire on WALKERS and McCAYS RIDGES.

at 1500 and 2230, at the latter hour on WALKERS RIDGE only.

At 2155 The Brig.-General Anzac ordered #69th Brigade to engage guns firing from the direction of SCRUBBY KNOLL on

the 2nd Inf. Bde trenches .

At 2205 I ordered the City of Glasgow Battemyyto shell JOHNSTONES JOLLY, shortly after information was received from Divisional Headquarters that enemy shelling had ceased, this order was cancelled and 69th Brigade informed.

At 1115 the 2nd Inf. Bde reported shelling on their trenches and although every effort was made to locate the gun no

success was achieved.

At 1200 a gun about three degrees 40 minutes to the maxthast of SAND PIT GROUP was reported to be firing, on the MASKXX 69thBde., R.F.A., under instructions from the Brig.-General Anzac effectively engaged this gun its position was indicated by the 8th Battery.

Summary of events from 6 a.m. 26th July to 6 a.m. 27/7/15 uly, 1915.

No. 3 SECTION.

A party of the enemy, estimated at about two companies of Infantry, were observed at midday drilling to the West of the road in Square 213 L.

We succeeded in drawing a fair amount of enemy's fire

about 9.30 p.m. No movement of the enemy was observed.

At 10 p.m. the enemy fired a few rounds from a mountain gun from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL. The shots fell into the right of COURTNEY'S, but did very little damage.

The enemy's rifle fire was heavier than usual at midnight and during the early hours, particularly showing signs of uneasiness opposite QUINN'S.

No. 4 SECTION.

With the exception of shelling from the enemy's guns, the

day passed off very quietly.

At 7.30 p.m. a Howitzer from the direction of KOJA DERE fired two shells at an extreme range which fell into the sea immediately in rear of WALKER'S RIDGE.

At 8 p.m. our machine guns on TURKS POINT opened fire at

Turks working on SNIPERS RIDGE.

The 75 mm on 971 immediately replied by shelling RUSSELL'S TOP. Very little damage was done. The rest of the night passed quietly.

The Turks are still hard at work improving their defences

on both sides of the NEK.







Summary - 6 a.m. 27th July to 6 a.m. 28th July. 3048190

SOUTHERN. Quiet day. We continually harassed the enemy's No. I. Section .. working parties on HOLLY SPUR and HARRIS RIDGE, and thereby prevented them from making much progress. The night was quiet. The torpedo boat destroyer shelled the trenches along HARRIS RIDGE successfully.

> NORTHERN. The day was quiet; TASMANIA FOST was subjected to a certain amount of shelling as has been usual now for some days past. The night was uneventful. A patrol from the 10th Battalion drove back an enemy patrol and retired safely.

No. II. Section SOUTHERN. This section was subjected to a persistent shell fire during most of the day, and the work of deepening and improving the trenches, which was in hand, was therefore a good deal retarded. The 4th Battalion reported that the enemy has opened up a sap to the

crater between us and JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY.

An aeroplane was heard at 0500 but was not identified At about 0415 an enemy bugle call was sounded and cheering was heard from the direction of QUINN'S. followed by an exchange of bombs and brisk rifle fire.

HORTHERN. The enemy was very quiet during the day. We were subjected to artillery fire from TURKS HUMP at 1000 and again at 1500. At 1600 and 1630 a Turkish 6-inch howitzer opened fire from about TURKS HUMP. causing a certain amount of damage to a small portion of our trenches.

During the night everything was exceptionally quiet until 0400 when considerable activity and noise were heard from the direction of QUINN'S POST. At the same time two shells burst in our trenches and it appeared that an attack was imminent. Nothing further eventuated however, and the enemy's outburst of fire seems to have been the result of a ruse carried out at QUINN'S POST. of which we had no knowledge.

Artillery

Early in the morning the WINEGLASS battery opened fire twice on our right flank trenches and on each occasion was silenced by JOPP'S battery. HUGHES' battery fired 3 effective rounds at an enemy working party in square 211 Z.8. and caused them to disperse. From the working parties towards the south it would appear that the enemy is anticipating a landing in that direction.

HUGHES' battery fired at BABA TERE and the CEMENT EMPLACEMENTS during the time that the enemy's 6-inch howitzer opened fire, and by these means the fire was stopped.


Six rounds were fired from the 4.7-inch gun at guns in square 47 M.3 (1/20,000 map) which were firing at H.M.S. "HUMBER".


In No. II. Section, the 4th, 5th, and 8th batteries did not fire.


An enemy 75 mm. gun from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL fired some 15 rounds at the beach and into ANZAC GULLY. A new and, at present, unlocated howitzer shelled SHRAPNEL VALLEY.


Arrangements were made for one gun of the 21st Mountain Battery to fire on new enemy works opposite our trenches on HOLLY SPUR.



Artillery Daily Report 28-7-15.

No. 1 Section.

0620 at this hour WINNEGLASS BATTERY opened fire on our right

old flank trenches and was engaged by Jopps Battery with 13 rounds wheathed the enemy guns to cease fire. The enemy again opened fireat 0720 and 0912 the same battery replying with one and two rounds respectively and silencing the enemy on each occasion.

1112 JOPPS BATTEMY engaged WINEGLASS Battery with 11 and 6 rounds respectively at 1112 and 1612 the enemy ceasing fire on each occasion, only two guns opened at 1612.

Between 1120 and 25 10 rounds were fired by JOPPS BATTERY at this target with the object of catching the detachments in the open returning to their zguns.

1545 An enemy howitzer having been reported firing on our tren ches the City of Glasgow Battery fired at BATTLESHIP HILL and JOHNSTONES JOLLYZ

1700 HUGHES BATTERY fired 3 effective rounds at an enemy wonking party in square 211 - Z - 8 causing their dispersion.

RANKE This position is near the coast line and would point to the enemy's anticipation of a proposed 1 anding near by.

1810 A 6 "Howitzer having opened fire on HUGHES BATTERY the observation station at GABA TEPE and CEMENT EMPLACEMENT were engaged and the enemy ceased when 7 rounds had been m fired by us.

BURGESS BATTERY and No. 1-6" Howitzer which stopped the hostile fire the same target was also engaged by the City of Glasgow Battery with 7 rounds. A further series of 6 rounds was fired by the last mentioned battery at TURKS HUMP immediately on conclusion of engagements withOLIVE GROVE, fire appeared effective in both cases.

1925 JOPPS and BURGESS BATTERIES silenced the OLIVE GROVE right section with 7 rounds.

0940 6 Howitzer No. 1, engaged OLIVE GROVE right section with 3 effective rounds this target was again fired at by Nos. 1 and 2 6 Howitzers with 2 and 4 rounds respectively at 1720.

1725 6 rounds were fired from 4.7 gum at gums in 47 M 3 (
1/200000 Map) which were firing at H M S HUMBER

No. 2 Section.

4th 5th and 8th Batteries did not fire. Little activity was shown by enemy artillery, a 75m/m gum from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL fired some 15 rounds in all on the beach and Anzac Gully. A new and, at present, unlocated howitzer shelled SHRAPNEL VALLEY. The beach at ANZAC COVE wwas subjected to less that fire than had been the case for some days. Arrangements were made for one gum of 21st Mtn. Battery to fire on new enemy works opposing our trenches in THE COHNFIREID this was do done by order of 1st Aust Div.

A report was received from the AERODROME and extracts were made and circulated to all units.

Summary of Events from 6 a.m. 27th July to 6 a.m. 28th July.

No. 3 SECTION.

Turks throughout the night in front of QUINN'S POST displayed uneasiness. It is thought that they are fresh troops as a bomb thrown into their trenches inevitably draws a burst of rifle fire, and they expose themselves much more thanmusual.

Three 5.7" shells fell into the right of COURTNEY'S POST about 6 p.m. Slight damage was done to the trenches in two, places, but no casualties occurred.

At 4 a.m. today a ruse carried out by the garrison of QUINN'S POST was very successful in drawing heavy rifle and machine gun fire which lasted for over half an hour.

As it was reported that the trenches in front of QUINN'S were full of Turks, Sykes' Battery was requested to fire 20 rounds of shrapnel over there. No enemy movement was observed.

No. 4 SECTION.

This section was subjected to the usual shelling throughout the day. A 75 mm gun damaged the trenches on RUSSELL'S TOP, two shells going through one of the mountain battery's gun emplacements. It is considered that a gun is now firing from behind BAUCHOP'S HILL. This gun shells the Beach and ANZAC COVE and the 4.5" Howitzers.

During the evening a wagon was again seen escorted by

about 10 horsemen entering ANAFARTA village.

Increased activity can be observed in the improvement of the existing trenches all over the ground to the North of this Section, and also in the Turk defences of the NEK and BABY 700.

In spite of rifle fire from the NEK and machine guns at TURKS POINT, a new trench has been dug during the last two nights running along the far side of the head of MALONE'S GULLY round SNIPERS RIDGE.

Progress has also been made over night with the work about C 29. It is here that the parapet has been levelled, and an extensive glacis made.

A bomb martar was observed during yesterday afternoon firing bombs into POPE'S from this position. At 6 p.m. it was found necessary to fire a charge in "A 1" tunnel, owing to the close proximity of the enemy, digging having been heard very close. The charge consisted of 40 lbs ammonal. Six seconds after the explosion a second explosion was heard, and it is supposed that the explosion in our tunnel fired a charge in that of the Turks. No report has yet been received as to the result of our explosion.

It was arranged for the 5" Howitzer Battery to shell the Turk trenches C 5 and C 8, but owing to the failure of the Howitzer telephone connection, it became too late to fire before darkness set in. This will be carried out this morning at 8 a.m.

ARTILLERY.

At 4.30 a.m. the O.C. 3rd Section reported the enemy trenches on his front were fully manned, and at his request the 2nd Battery fired 14 rounds at them. The effect is believed to have been good.

At 5 p.m. the Howitzer Battery fired 6 rounds at the ehemy's heavy Mortar on MORTAR RIDGE. This series was reported effective.

The 6" Howitzer had orders to register BABY 700, but could not clear the crest, the range being too short. This morning it will fire one round to test how far down in this direction it can get.

Summary - 6 a.m. 28th July to 6 a.m. 29th July.

No. I. Section .. BOUTHERH. The enemy were quiet in front; of this section during the day. We had a good deal of sniping opportunity and our shots accounted for at least 10 Turks. The activities of the enemy's working parties were somewhat diminished yesterday. During the night the enemy was quiet. The torpedo boat destroyer shelled TWIN TREMCHES and other parts during the night.

> MORTHERN. Quiet both during the day and night. We sent out a patrol from SILT SPUR which encountered an enemy party building bombproof shelter about 130 yards in front of our new line. This party we dispersed.

No.II. Section

SOUTHERN. At about 1900 the trenches of this section were subjected to a certain amount of enemy shell fire but very little damage resulted. At noon we exploded a mine in C.27 tunnel opposite JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY, the enemy having approached our tunnel very closely. The day, generally speaking, was quiet and the night uneventful. The detached post which we place in WIRE GULLY reported that all was quiet in their front.

NORTHERN. A comparatively quiet day. There was a steady amount of shelling at intervals during the day. The large mortar on MORTAR RIDGE fired six shots over the right sub-section, and these appeared to fall at the junction of BRIDGES ROAD and HONASH GULLY. The night was quiet; no enemy movement was observed by our patrols.

Artillery

At 1700 the City of Glasgow battery fired 5 rounds into JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY. The effect was moderately good although a certain number of rounds failed to detonate.

Enemy water carts, which were observed in square 203 A.6 B.4, were dispersed by 5 rounds from JOPP'S battery at 1824. At the same hour the OLIVE GROVE right section shelled CHATHAM'S and TASMANIA POSTS. JOPP'S battery replying with 22 rounds.

At 1840 the same enemy guns fired on the beach, and four rounds were fired from No. 2 6-inch howitzer. At 1930 two rounds were also fired from No.1 6-inch howitzer.

Two unlocated howitzers from the direction of SCRUBBY KNOLL and BATTLESHIP HILL searched SHRAPNEL VALLEY and shelled BROWNE'S battery. The 4th, 5th and 8th batteries had a quiet day and did not fire. Orders were issued for periodical series to be fired by the 5th City of Glasgow battery at JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY, the 69th Brigade R.F.A. co-operating by engaging LONESOME PINE.

The 4th Lowland Howitzer Brigade landed 3 guns during the night. This battery is allotted to the same section of defence as the 5th battery of that brigade.

1ST AUSTRALIAN DIVISION Artillery Daily Report, 28-7-15.

No. 1 Section.

6400 A moderate amount of musketrey began which was reported to be a bomb attack on QUINNS POST. THE CITY OF GLAS-GOW BATTERY was ordered to be ready to shell troops in LONG VALLEY but this was not necessary as the firing

0600 ceased. At 0600 7 rounds were fired by this battery at JOHNSTONES JOLLY

0840 BURGESS and No. 1-6 "Howitzer engaged OLIVE GROVE BATTERY and fire cessed after three rounds from 18-pr and two

opened fire at 0900 and 0935 and was engaged by CITY OF G GLASGOW BATTERY in the first instance and JOPPS BATTERY on the second occasion. The WINEGLASS BATTERY was engaged at 0935 and 1026 - 27 rounds in all were fired by JOPPS BATTERY and good effect obtained as the twoguns were near the crest and clearly visible.

1700 In accordance with instructions is sued the CITY OF GLASGOW BATTE/MY fired 5 rounds into JOHNSTONES JOLLY 4 rounds only detonated the effect appeared to be good.

1824 Enemy watercarts which were being filled in square 203-3 A. 6 B 4 were dispersed by 5 rounds from JOPB BATTERY

1824 OLIVE GROVE RIGHT SECTION shelled CHATHAM and TASMANIA
POSTS JOPPS BATTERY replying with 22 rounds. At 1840
the same guns fired on the beach and 4 rounds were fired
from No. 2 -6 "Howitzer and again at 1930 two rounds
from No.1-6" Howitzer.

The 4th Battery, 4th LOWLAND HOWITZER BRIGADE, landed three guns, the Brigade Staff also arrived at ANZAC.

This Battery is alletted to the same section of defence

Two unlocated Howitzers from Birection of SCHUBBY KNOLL and BATTLESHIP HILL searched SHRAPNEL VALLEY and shelled BROWNES BATTERY.

No. 2 Section.

4th, 5th, and 8th BATTERIES did not fire:a quiet day in t this Section.

General order s were issued faxx. xx for periodical series to be fired by 5th CITY OF GLASGOW BATTERY on JOHNSTONES JOLLY, the 69th Brigade, R.F.A. co-operating by engaging LONESOME PINE. The 1st series was fired at 1700 and is mentioned above.

Summary of events from 6 a.m. 28th July to 6 a.m. 29th July, 1915.

NO. 3 SECTION.

The Turks in front of this Section still appear to be uneasy. Their fire was a little heavier than usual during the early part of the night, otherwise nothing unusual to report.

MO. 4 SECTION.

At 8 a.m. yesterday the 5" Howitzers opened fire on the DOUBLE-TIER trench at the head of MONASH GULLY (C5 and C8), and also at trench C29 overlooking POPE'S. The result of the shelling was disappointing, as little damage appeared to be done. The 75 mm gun on the 971 Ridge fired throughout the day, and the small gun which fires from about BAUCHOP'S HILL was also fairly active shelling the main communication trench leading from MULE GULLY to ANZAC COVE.

In the evening about 20 Turks were reported to be

working on the CHOCOLATE HILLS in Square 250 R 3.

Last night the enemy were again observed working at the head of MALONE GULLY. Our machine guns at TURKS POINT

fired upon them at intervals during the night.

At 2 a.m. today the 75 mm gun on 971 opened fire and continued shelling this Section for about half an hour. No damage was, however, reported, the majority of the shells falling harmlessly in the Gully.

ARTILLERY.

The day was exceptionally quiet, except that there was rather more shelling than usual in ANZAC COVE from guns which are not engaged by us.



Summary - 6 a.m. 29th July to 6 a.m. 30th July.

No. I. Section .. SOUTHERN. Quiet day. We prevented the enemy making much progress with his work on HOLLY SPUR and HARRIS RIDGE.

NORTHERN. An uneventful day and a very quiet night. A good many bombs were thrown into our works without hindering their progress, however.

No. II. Section .. SOUTHERN. At 11.30 an enemy 75 mm. gun shelled for half an hour the trenches of the 2nd Battalion, and did a certain amount of damage. The 2nd Infantry Brigade now have two machine guns in the daylight sap at the south side of BARBED WIRE GULLY, which cover their front. An observer reported yesterday evening that the head cover had been removed from the two forward trenche on JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY. There is some doubt about the accuracy of this statement at present. The night was fairly quiet. We had several patrols out. One from the 2nd Battalion got quite close to the enemy's trenches where work was steadily in progress. The

NORTHERN. The day was comparatively quiet but the trenches of this section were subjected to the usual shell fire. The machine guns of this section were informed of the removal of head cover on JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY and were prepared accordingly. The enemy was fairly quiet during the night and no movement of his patrols was observed. At 1230 a large bomb fell behind the line but did no damage. At 0320 we fired a mine in sap D.9B.; this drew heavy rifle fire from GERMAN OFFICERS TRENCH. At 0415 the enemy fired a mine at QUINN'S POST causing what appeared to us to be a great explosion.

enemy appeared to be preparing some form of obstacle

with barbed wire. No enemy patrols were encountered.

Artillery

At noon HUGHES' battery fired 3 rounds at what appeared to be a telephonist party north-west of the Y Junction trenches (Square 67 Z.6 - 1/20,000 map), and 4 rounds at recently made earthwork in that locality. The result appeared satisfactory. The 4th Battery Lowland Brigade registered JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY in 5 rounds, and MULE VALLEY in 4. 2 rounds were fired by the 4.7-inch Q.F. at a body of enemy troops estimated at 500.

The second round was judged effective.

In No. II. Section the 4th and 5th batteries did not

come into action.

1150 The OLIVE GROVE right and left sections shelled our RIGHT FLANK and mthe BEACH at various times between 1150 and 1909 and on each occasion were silenced by either BURGESS or

1909 JOPPS BATTERIES, 20 rounds being the maximum number expended in any one series. AAt 1800 the left section was engaging a Monitor in co-eperation with a howitzer, the latter ceased fire after three rounds from JOPES BATTERY .


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
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
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
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
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






























AUSTRALIAN DIVISION.

Summary - 6 a.m. 30th July to 6 a.m. 31st July. Appendix No. 1 31/7/15.

No. I. Section SOUTH. This flank was shelled yesterday afternoon for half an hour, otherwise the day was quiet. The demonstration to mark the victory over the Turks drew considerable fire for about 30 minutes. The night was quiet and generally during the 24 hours there was less movement in front of this section than usual.

> NORTH. A quiet day and night. The enemy were fairly active at their new works on HOLLY SPUR until moonrise; with that exception the night was uneventful.

No.II. Section .. SOUTH. The day was comparatively quiet. The 3rd Battalion reported that the effect of our artillery fire on JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY was good and that the Turks were heard crying out after the fall of our shells. Between 2400 and 0400 sentries of the 2nd Battalion in our observation post report much digging just outside the enemy's trenches at LONE PINE. The 4th Battalion report the erection of a body screen on the front trench of JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY opposite the crater which is now between ours and the Turkish lines.

> NORTH. This section suffered its usual daily shelling but beyond the destruction of a certain amount of our parapet, the damage was small. Infantry observers report that our guns landed one shot in the enemy's gunpit on MORTAR RIDGE, and that a fire ensued. An enemy aeroplane flew over our position at 1745. During the night no enemy movement was observed except work in the crater near GERMAN OFFICERS TRENCH, which we retarded by sniping and bombing.

Artillery ..

At varying intervals throughout the day the OLIVE GROVE, by xixed shelled our right flank and also the beach. In all it came into action seven times and involved us in an expenditure of 69 rounds from BURGESS' and JOPP'S batteries.

At 1405 and 1545 working parties were seen northeast of Y JUNCTION (square 67 Z. 2 - 6). HUGHES' battery fired 3 effective rounds at this target.

The 4th Battery, 4th Lowlands Brigade, fired 5 rounds at JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY but only obtained 2 effective bursts. The 69th Brigade fired 10 rounds at ECHELON TRENCHES but none appeared to fall in the trenches.

In No. II Section no firing was carried out by our batteries. The most active battery of the enemy was the 75 mm from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL.



No firing was carried out by the Batteries allotted to this Section of Defence. The most active battery of the enemy was the 75m/m from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL which baffles all our efforts to locate it although a most careful watch is kept of the area under observation. Approximately 47 rounds were fr ed by the enemy, 31 of these being from the above mentioned battery.

GENERAL- two 18-pr. guns and carriages arrived and were allotted te the 2nd Artillery Brigade to form a Mobile Section, its rendezyous being at the junction of SHRAPNEL and WHITE VALLEYS. 1730 Two bombs were dropped from an enemy aeroplane no damage being repo rted to any units of this command.

Summary of events from o a.m. 30th July to o a.m. 31st July.

No. 3 BEUTTON.

The demonstration to celebrate the victory at MadialYah drew a considerable amount of fire all along the Section. Te enemy 5.7" gun from the direction of DETERMENT HILL fired into the left of COURTHEY'S POST about 6.30 p.m. causing a fair amount of damage to the trenches, but only three slight casualties among the garrison.

During the night the enemy were a little more active than usual with their bombs, otherwise the night passed particularly quietly.

No. 4 SECTION.

The cheering and feu de joie at 5 p.m. drew a considerable amount of rifle fire from the enemy, and it was observed that their trenches were fully manned; a little movement was reported in the trenches above FOFL'S left.

At 8 p.m. the left flank destroyer made very good practice into the large "U" trench in the NEK and also into the communication trench behind it, and trench No. C 5. This was done without searchlight.

At 10.30 p.m. H.M.S. The what shelled Table Tor and valley North of Ballenur's Hill and at 4.45 a.m. this morning again made excellent pravilde at the NEK trenches. placing a few shells into the big trench in front of No - 2 Sap, beginning at the bottom of the trench on the seaward face, and working upwards.

The night has passed quietly.
