

Summary - 6 a.m. 3rd July to 6 a.m. 4th July.

No. I. Section .. Quiet throughout the day and night. A patrol from

End L.H.Brigade went out along "A" ridge but encountered

no enemy.

Ho.II. Section .. Quiet day; uneventful night. In Southern No.II Section sentries lay out in the hope of catching enemy patrole but none were seen. Sounds of picking are reported in our tunnel C.5 but trained listeners do not think it is within striking distance of us. During the night enemy fired two bombs into the right sub-section of the 2nd Infantry Brigade (MacLAURIN'S HILL) but no damage was done.

Artillery .. During the day the enemy fired some 8-inch shells,

apparently with the object of discovering our 5-inch
howitzers. The shells fell on the ridge over the 1st
Infantry Brigade Headquarters, where there are no
troops, and many of them failed to explode.

The contents of one of the 4-inch shells which are fired on the beach, were found to be stones, and one contained a round of our small arm ammunition.

General .. Considerable movement was again seen about HILL 600 but the light was bad and observation difficult.

No 1 Section.

At 10 15 JOPPs Battery fired 4 rounds at gun on 212 H 8, enemy gun ceased fire.

At 1102 and 1135 Right and left sections of OLIVE grove opened fire on our right and the beach and on each occasion-BU BURGESS Batte y engaged the Right Section and JOPPS Battery the Left section, in all 22 rounds were fired, enemy ceased.

At 1209 a heavy gun which remains unlocated opened fire on RAZOR BACK RIDGE. JOPPS Battery fired 8 rounds sweeping KABA TEPE as it appears as if this gun must be controlled from there, enemy ceased fire.

At 1645 Both sections OLIVE GROVE, 11 Tree emplacement, and gun in 212 H 8 all opened fire and were engaged by BURGESS and JOPPS Batteris. 28 rounds were distributed over these four targets and fire appeared effective.

At 1830 the heavy gun unlocated again opened fire but ceased after firing 6 rounds on to RAZOR BACK RIDGE.

At 1854 the gun in 212 H 8 again opened fire but ceased after

one round fired by JOPPS Battery.

Bet een 1000 and 1200 5" Howitzer Battery fired a series at gun emplacement on CHESS BOAKD, 15 rounds were fired many of which fell within a yard of two- all rounds but one mutanat detonated and damage was done but the emplacement was not hit.

No 2 Section.

- At 0606 PHILLIPS Battery fired 10 rounds at gun on DEADMANS RIDGE, fire was effective.
- 9 At 0615 CADDYS Battery fired two rounds at guns at C and one round at the head of LONG VALLEY.
- At 1700 1730 PHILLIPS Battery fired 3 rounds into valley-bey beyond CHESS BOARD and 3 on the reverse slope of BATTLESHIP HILL while BROWNES Battery fired 6 rounds serching behind emplacement on the crest near SAND PIT known as target I and 6 rounds into LONG VALLEY.

At 1725 gums at C fired at CADDYS Battery - Caddy replied with two rounds, enemy ceased fire.

Summary of Events from 6 a.m. 3rd July, to 6 a.m. 4th July, 1915.

NO. 3 SECTION. The enemy has repaired the "U" trench at the head of MONASH'S GULLY, which had been damaged by Howitzer fire the previous night, by madding a single tier of sandbags.

The Australian 5" Howitzers engaged the enemy gun beyond DEAD MAN'S RIDGE, doing a certain amount of damage.

5 bombs fell in the gully at the back of POPE'S HILL at about 10 p.m. last night evidently fired by a catapult.

The fire baloon which was sent up at 12.30 a.m. from the Headquarters of this Section, on reaching an upper current of air, was carried over WALKER'S RIDGE instead of the Chess-board. A certain amount of the enemy's fire was drawn by it.

NO. 4 SECTION. A very quiet period. The Anafarta gun commenced shelling this Section at 6 a.m. with very little effect, most of the shells striking the lower slopes of PLUGGE'S PLATEAU.

Tunnelling at the NEK is proceeding steadily. Yesterday morning the enemy were heard using picks close to our own listening galleries in the large tunnel at the end of No. 2 Sap. It was estimated that they were 6 feet away, and a little above the level of our tunnel.

It was then decided to prepare a charge which was done.

at 2 p.m., but before it could be fired the enemy cut through

laid, whereupon our charge was immediately fired with good

Appendix No. 1.

bombarded the old No. 3 Post at 10 p.m. last night.

Bursts of rifle and machine gun fire were opened on the enemy's trenches during this bombardment from the piquets and from WALKER'S RIDGE.

The New Zealand Maori contingent, strength 16 Officers, and 461 Other Ranks, arrived early yesterday morning, and are attached to the New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade, bivouacking close to No. 1 piquet.

Colonel N.M.Smyth, V.C. took over command of the 3rd Light Horse Brigade.

The track from the main communication trench to No. 2 outpost is to be widened to facilitate the movement of mule transport.

ARTILLERY REPORT.

A new work which looks like a new gun emplacement has been built on the top of JOHNSTON'S JOLLY. This work was engaged by the Howitzer Battery and 6" Howitzer at 11.30 a.m. yesterday. No direct hit was obtained, but the firing was effective in the locality.

The Howitzer Battery also fired 6 rounds at the gun emplacement on MORTAR RIDGE, without, however, obtaining a direct hit.

The enemy was observed yesterday entrenching on the KHILID BAHR Plateau, and at about 7 p.m. 2 working parties of the enemy were seen about Square 193 G & H. These parties were actually counted, and estimated to be 150 and 50 strong respectively.

WHITE, Lieut. -Colonel, General Staff. INFORMATION. The following information has been obtained from prisoners taken by the N.Z.&.A. Division. 1. The Turks are offering a reward of 4/- a rifle brought back from between the lines and the same amount for 100 rounds of ammunition. 2. The enemy's troops are often told that a German aeroplane is going to fly over the position and that they must not fire at it but it rarely comes. The men are also strictly forbidden to blaze away at our machines when they go over but the temptation is always too strong and regardless of the orders of their officers, they always fire. 3. The rumour of the advent of a Zeppelin is current. 4. It is said among the Turks that a great part of our garrison here is composed of Greeks from the Islands. 5. When an attack is made the attacking party collect in three lines in the fire trench (a) crouching on the parapet (b) on the banquette and (c) standing in the bottom of the trench. 6. The Turks boast of their prowess and superiority with the bayonet. 7. They always look for an attack on Saturdays or Sundays, their idea being that as we are Christians and Sunday is a "holiday" (?) we "keep our spirits up by pouring spirits down" and then in a semi-intoxicated condition become bellicose. 8. All men in the firing line are awake all night but when it gets dawn, all turn in except for the men on duty in the trench. 9. Their late C.O., a kind and a gallant man, was shot dead through a loophole. 10. Some interesting papers have been taken from the killed, amongst them a manuscript copy of our last proclamation thrown into their lines. As these proclamations were printed it seems that it is arousing interest among the rank and file. In one letter the Coy. Commander complains of the utter lack of discipline of his coy. and suggests that all his n.c. os should be removed.








Summary - 6 a.m. 4th July to 6 a.m. 5th July

No. I. Section .. Quiet day. Sniping from TWIN TRENCHES began during the afternoon but ceased when we opened fire with machine guns. 7th Light Horse occupied new trenches on HOLLY RIDGE.

The result of the demonstration at TASMANIA POST appeared successful. The enemy expended a good deal of ammunition. Prior to fire being opened our patrol reported a screen of the enemy moving on HOLLY RIDGE and this screen was effectively dealt with both by artillery and machine gun fire.

No.II. Section Very little happened during the day. At 2215 last night we blew up a portion of GERMAN OFFICERS TRENCH. The result cannot be stated definitely at present but it appeared to be satisfactory. The enemy expended a

good deal of ammunition after the explosion.

Some shelling from the direction of BATTLESHIP HILL during yesterday morning; and early this morning from the same locality, from MORTAR RIDGE, and other places the enemy guns bombarded our trenches. So far · as can be ascertained at present the result seems to be slight.

Patrols lying up during the night on the 400 PLATEAU saw nothing of enemy scouts. A patrol also moved as far as it could down OWEN'S GULLY but did

not meet any enemy patrols.

Artillery At 1735 HUGHES'S battery fired 6 rounds, which appeared to be effective, upon a party of the enemy observed

in the gun pit on PINE RIDGE.

The 5-inch howitzers fired 7 rounds at the gun emplacement on the western side of THE CHESSBOARD in an endeavour to put a round into a tunnel. The desired result was not achieved, but a section of the Indian Mountain Artillery made a direct hit in the tunnel. BURGESS'S and JOPP'S batteries kept careful observ-

General At 1045 and 1105 large explosions were observed in the southern theatre.

Movement was again seen on the northern slopes of ACHI BABA and also on 706.



At 1002 Jopps Battery fired 5 rounds at observing stattion on KABA TEPE hoping to stop the fire of 4" gun firing from 292 F 8 This gun is prohably observed from KABA TEPE

NEW ZEALAND AND AUSTRALIAN DIVISION. Appendix No. 2 5/7/15. Summary of events from 6 a.m. 4th July 1915 to 6 a.m. 5th July 1915. NO. 3 SECTION Very little rifle fire throughout the day, At 6.45 a.m. yesterday, the enemy gun on the left opened fire on the left of QUINN'S, firing about nine rounds, but doing no damage. A certain amount of sniping was again done by the enemy down MONASH GULLY from the NEK. Steps were taken to reduce this fire. 3 of the enemy's 8-inch shells fell and exploded in the

vicinity of the Supply Depot in MONASH GULLY at 7. 50 p.m. last night doing little damage.

At 4. 15 a.m. to-day, enemy Artillery opened fire, and continued intermittently up to 6. 30 a.m. with little result.

At 4. 30 a.m. enemy Mountain Gun again opened fire on QUINN'S, blowing in the left of No. 6 Sub-post, and knocking down some wirenetting. Our Machine Gun on COURTNEY'S replied with 500 rounds, but was unable to silence the gun. 30 rounds in all were fired by the enemy.

NO. 4 SECTION

The gun on the "W" Hills opened fire at 5 a.m. yesterday, and continued for a couple of hours without doing any damage.

There was very little fire from snipers during the whole period. At 10.50 a.m. it was reported by the O.C. Field Troop that the enemy could be heard tunnelling north of Al Tunnel in No. 1 Sap, and that he was working towards the sounds, laying a charge when necessary.

At 3. 30 p.m. the sounds of the enemy picking towards No.1 Tunnel, at a distance of 6 feet, could be heard. A charge was prepared and put in position, and fired at 6 p.m., but no investigation could be made up to midnight on account of the fumes. A report will be forwarded when received.

During the night H.M.S. "CHELMER" fired upon TABLE TOP and old

No. 3 Post, and the Gully to the north of the latter.

Our Machine Guns were again ready and fired a few rounds. The firing drew a certain amount of the enemy's fire, but not so much as on the previous night.

The night passed quietly, but at 4.15 a.m. to-day the enemy commenced shelling WALKER'S TOP. There were apparently 4 guns, including two .75. The Artillery Observers state that they are unable to locate a single one of these guns. So far, no damage of a serious nature has been done to the trenches, and no casualties have been reported.

Colonel N.M. SMYTH V.C. has taken over temporary command of No. 4 Section vice Brig. General A. H. Russell reported sick to Hospital

Ship.

ARTILLERY REPORT.

At 5 p.m. last night, two gun emplacements on MORTAR RIDGE were engaged by the Howitzer Battery with a view to getting direct hits. Usually we have been content with silencing the guns which is easily brought about by putting shots anywhere in the vicinity. Recently, however, emplacements have been strengthened considerably, and it was thought advisable to engage them directly. 16 rounds were fired which were all effective on the adjacent trenches, and 4 of which which were direct hits.

At 8.15 p.m. 10 effective rounds were fired at old No. 3 Outpost. This was done because of a report that 200 of the enemy had

been seen to enter this position.

It had been arranged with the Australian Divisional Artillery

that PHILLIPS' Battery shall fire a few occasional rounds during the next few days at the trench from which POPE'S HILL is sniped in reverse. O.C. 3rd Section considers that this action will

deny the use of this trench to the enemy.

It has been arranged for the Australian 5-inch Howitzers and our 4.5-inch Howitzers to earry out registration series with aeroplane observation on the 6th inst. The target will be the long valley running North and South beyond LONELY PINE, JOHNSTON'S JOLLY and MORTAR RIDGE.

The MORTAR RIDGE guns opened fire early this morning, and at 4.55 a.m. the Howitzer Battery fired three rounds at them.

At 0415 a more vigorous and keneral artillary bombardment of ANZAC positions commenced than for for some time past; guns from nearly every position known to be used opened fire and a few from positions from positions

In No 2 Section the morning sun and mist in the valleys made observation wery difficult and most of the shooting in this section was "searching" as well known ranges - The light was better in No 1 Section and the OLIVE GROVE and gun at 212 H 8 were quickly silenced. The WINEGLASS HIL Battery however gave more trouble being widely distribute

Battery however gave more trouble being widely distributed PHULLUPS Battery came under a very heavy cross fire and was not used. Capt THENCHARDS Section I.M.A. being brought in instead. One gun PHILLUPS Battery was put out of action and will take probably two days to repair. During this action a few rounds were fired at intervals into valleys and places where reserves are known or supposed to be and at some of his communication trenches, as it was thought he might be preparing to attack.

At 0942 BROWNES Battery fired 8 rounds at what appeared to be an observing station on 971 and party dispersed, and at the same time an observing party was seen on KAIKMAZ DACH 213 Z 3. This party was out of range but both parties were probably observing for the big gun firing from the DARDENELLES. A few rounds were fired over KABA TEPE but observation for the big gun did not appear

5 At 1915 OLIVE GROVE Left Section opened fire on shipping,
BURGESS BAttery engaged them and caused their fire to
slacken - The RIGHT Section then opened with one gun
but one round from JOPPS Battery him.

6 At 1515 6" Howitzer fired a series at guns west of OLIVE

6.7.15 - Casualties in bombardment of SEDDEL BAHR 3 officers 60 men 400 animals also quan ity stores and saum. The bombardment of beaches & front yesterday was the heaviest yet experienced but general damage very small it was preliminary to a general attack made all along the line by fresh troops ascerbained to come from ADRIANOPEE. Our losses neglig ble and enemy infantry everywhere immediately driven back with very heavy loss. Special efforts made first on june mon of R.N.D. with French. Here about 500 Turks penetrated to our front brenches but counter attack at once made by supports and men who retired recaptured position. Turkish killed at this point 300. .90 bodies counted close to parapet on the right; remainde in centre. Enemy subsequently reported massing on this flank in front of French but suffered heavily from shell fire and no further attack on Britis front in this neighbourhood. Second for ther west at tack made on H 12 fror direction H 13. Enemy here came under heavy rifle and machine gun fire from right of 29th and left of 42nd Div. and attack died away; enemy lost. 150 killed. 3rd on our left Turks massed in force in Nullah N.E. of J13 and have attempted several attacks. None of these pushed home owing to steadiness of our troops and effective artillery support and Turkish losser again exceedingly heavy. Impression conveyed by whole affair that a grand attack was ordered but so far as infantry was concerned the attack failed to materialise. Turks have expended large amount of ammunition and added considerably to already very serious losses. The night was quiet.

Summary - 6 a.m. 6th July to 6 a.m. 7th July.

No. I. Section .. Quiet in front during the day. The enemy are, however, improving their works on their left flank. During the night/they appear to be apprehensive of attack. A light horse patrol moved out to lay up for the enemy and got forward about five hundred yards but no enemy was encountered. A patrol from the 12th Battalian moving towards SNIPERS RIDGE was heavily fired on. The/enemy appear to be attempting to dig towards our new position on HOLLY RIDGE.

No.11. Section ... uiet day generally. At 1840 enemy threw some 6-inch high explosive shells from the direction of 971 into the trenches held by the 2nd Brigade and caused a certain amount of damage to our parapets. A patrol meved down BARBED WIRE GULLY and reported the enemy's snipers are endeavouring to approach closer from SNIPERS HXMEM TRENCH. We found it necessary to blow in C.3 tunnel last night and this was successfully done at 2345; forming a crater. The explosion drew a good deal of enemy fire.

Artillery .. Our gunners had a quiet day. The 6-inch howitzer which was firing into the northern pertien of He.II Section and the head of SHRAPNEL VALLEY was engaged by BROWNE'S and CADDY'S batteries; the New Zealand howitzers also lent some assistance.

Both our 6-inch howitzers are now emplaced in position and have been allotted zones.

Summary of events from 6 a.m. 6th July to 6 a.m. 7th July 1915.

NO. 3 SECTION

A quiet and uneventful day. The Engineers are still working in COURTNEY'S POST to connect the communication trenches with the new firing line.

The enemy's shell fire was intermittent throughout the day,

but without doing any serious damage.

The enemy have repaired the "U" trench at the head of MONASH GULLY.

NO. 4 SECTION

Brig. General A. H. Russell returned to duty from the Hospital Ship.

At 9 a.m. yesterday morning, the usual relief of about 100

men was observed going in to old No. 3 Outpost.

The 4th charge fired in Al Tunnel of No. 2 Sap at 5 p.m. the previous afternoon (5th inst.) has resulted in stopping the enemy's digging at this spot. The ground was well shattered and broken through to the surface. The head of the Tunnel cannot now be worked, but the remainder of the Tunnel is unharmed.

During the afternoon, an Officer from No. 2 Post went out in

H.M.S. "CHELMER" to point out targets and gun positions.

Between 8 and 9 p.m. the "CHELMER" shelled old No. 3 Post, the trenches at the NEK, and those beyond BAUCHOP RIDGE; and again,

at 1 a.m. and 4.30 a.m. this morning with good effect.

Between 7 and 8 p.m. the usual garrison of between 50 to 100 Turks was observed going into the old No. 3 Post, and later between 20 and 30 moved through the Ridge towards TABLE TOP, evidently manning trenches.

ARTILLERY REPORT

The Howitzer Battery engaged MORTAR RIDGE whenever it opened during the day.

At 3.45 p.m. four rounds were fired by the Left Flank Section

at 75 mm. gun at 238 V with good effect.

At 6.50 p.m. a 6-inch gun was firing on the Australians from the Western slopes of BATTLESHIP HILL. Their own 6-inch Howitzers were being moved, and could not engage it, and at their request the Howitzer Battery engaged the enemy. This is a target where accurate observation is not possible, and the ground has to be searched. Elemen rounds were fired which looked as if they were probably effective, and at any rate the fire of the enemy ceased after the 8th or 9th round from us.

on the 5th Inst. an Officer of the Howitzer Battery was sent to No. 2 Post to have pointed out to him a position from which gun flashes had been seen during the morning. The position proved to be in the valley running North West and South East about 300 yards South East of Old No. 3 Post. If these guns reopen at

any time, they can be engaged by the Howitzer Battery.

The work of improving the Beach Road, and widening the communication trench between Anzac Cove and the extreme left flank has already commenced.

The number of rounds fired by Japanese Mortar - Nil.
