

Report re Messing arrangements for the month of March 1919.

During the month the strength of this camp has been considerably decreased and it was found necessary to close down one cookhouse for general messing, and it is used now by Hospital cooks alone.

Much inconvenience is caused by the short notice which is given regarding the movement of troops.

Indents have to be submitted for rations 48 hours before they are required for consumption, and on two days a week, 72 hours before, but it nearly always happens that definite information concerning the departure of Boat Drafts or the marching-in of Drafts reaches this office less than 24 hours prior to any of the movements. It is essential that these indents be correct as near as possible as I cannot over-draw rations, yet food has to be supplied to outgoing drafts up to the time they move out and to incoming drafts from the time of their arrival. Supplementary indents do not meet the situation. It would be of great assistance if sufficient notice of movement of troops and approximate numbers could be given in the future.

Another matter which is a continual worry to the messing Officer is his Staff. It is difficult at all times to find men willing to work in Cookhouses. Numbers of the men procured take up the work as they are desirous of remaining in England for various reasons. Men detailed for the work are seldom any good for they have too many opportunities to let the Messing Officer down if they so desire. The men who wish to remain here on the Permanent Cadre submit applications to the effect that they desire to be kept off all Boat Rolls, yet rarely does a boat go without taking some of this type of man. The result is that a very dissatisfied feeling exists among cooks and such like people and also a great amount of the Messing Officer's time is taken up in keeping his Staff up to its correct complement. This is no easy matter in a Camp such as this which is full of convalescents and low category men. Very seldom does one meet a trained cook who wishes to stay here so it means that a man has to be trained in his work and this is no sooner achieved than he is placed on a Boat Roll and marches out. The situation is most unsatisfactory. There are numbers of men who desire to remain in England and who are willing to remain on the Permanent Staff so long as they are required. Cannot some movement be made whereby these men can be kept off Boat Rolls and retained in the Camp for duty as that would facilitate matters considerably.

By-Products proceeds have all been expended in the interests of the troops and no complaints have been received regarding the quantity or quality of the food. Potatoes at present are not too good and bad parts have to be removed so that the nett weight of potatoes consumed is not so high as a fair margin for wastage should permit. Otherwise complete satisfaction has been given by the N.A.C.B., also the A.S.C. which renders every assistance towards the attainment of a high standard of Messing.

I have to report that Messing has been conducted from the 29.3.19 to the closing of the Depot on 14.4.19, on lines similar to that outlined in my report of last month. The number of rations issued was 25,744 and the allowance for this number was £595-14-9.

MONTHLY REPORT ON MESSING.

RATIONS A.S.C. Rations are drawn daily from Westham, and at all times arrive in a satisfactory condition.

CASH ALLOWANCE Foodstuffs are purchased from the local branch of the N.A.C.B. I have not experienced any difficulty in obtaining these goods required with the exception of fresh vegetables the supply of which is limited.

KITCHENS The Camp is fitted with three Kitchens, two of which are fitted with "Deane" ovens and "Richmond" Steam cookers. The latter have proved very unsatisfactory and at no time reliable.

In addition they are very extravagant in the consumption of fuel.

MEAT Meat is all boned and trimmed before being issued to kitchens bones are used as stock for soup.

VEGETABLES Vegetables are washed and trimmed before being issued to the Kitchens, Owing to the quality of the potatoes they are peeled.

BREAD Bread is cut into slices before being issued.

STAFF I am experiencing great difficulty in obtaining Cooks and on several occasions food has been spoilt owing to the in-experience of the men, and unless competent Cooks are forthcoming it will be impossible to obtain satisfactory results.

BY-PRODUCTS

Bones are thoroughly cleaned and bagged, and then sold to Contractor. Fat is clarified and graded and surplus sold to Army Contractor. Swillm is sold to Local Contractor.
