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SHORT HISTORY OF THE UNIT UP TO 1st JUNE,

The Company was formed in Australia, Headquarters and Nos.

1 and 2 sections being raised in the Fourth Military District,
and two sections in the First Military District. Selection of
personnel commenced in the beginning of March 1916, but officers
had previously been selected and trained at the Engineer Officers'
Training School, Sydney. The O.C. (Captain R.J. DONALDSON),
2nd-in-Command (Lieut. O. B. WILLIAMS) and a number of N.C.Os.
and men came from the 12th Field Coy. A.E., C.M.F., at Broken
Hill; 2/Lieut. J.M. NORTON from the 11th Field Coy. A.E., C.M.F.,
(Adelaide); while 2/Lieut. S.W. MATTERS came from South Australia, and 2/Lieuts. R.W. LAHEY and H.StA. MURRAY from Queensland.

The quotas were collected and trained separately, that from S.A. at Mitcham Camp near Adelaide, and the Queensland sections at Enoggera near Brisbane, until 29th April, 1916, when the Company concentrated at Mitcham. The Company was completely equipped before embarkation including all technical stores except Weldon Trestles and the wagons for bridging stores, the water cart and a few minor items

Embarkation took place at Outer Harbour (Adelaide) on 31st May, 1916, on H.M.A.T. A 29 - s.s. "SUEVIC", in company with the 11th Field Ambulance (Lt-Col. DOWNEY).

After a rough trip round the Lleuwin the "SUEVIC" arrived at Fremantle on 6th June, 1916, and embarked the 44th Battalion (Lt-Col. W.O. MANSBRIDGE, D.S.O., who became C.O. Troops).

Crossing the Indian Ocean the vessel sprung a small leak which necessitated calling at Durban for the services of a diver. The stay was only twenty-four hours (21st June, 1916) but the troops had a route march through the town.

Cape Town was reached on 34th June, 1916, and left on 27th idem. No leave was granted, but troops had a route march and a sports meeting.

The next port of call was St. Vincent, reached on 11th July, 1916. No one was allowed on shore. The run from here was through the submarine zone, and was attended with the usual discomforts. The Pontoons of the Company first saw service here, being installed on the boat deck as emergency life-boats.

Finally, after a long voyage, during which there was a considerable amount of sickness, and the death of one member of the Unit, disembarkation took place on July 21st, 1916, at Plymouth. The Unit entrained to Amesbury and marched to Camp 20, Lark Hill, Salisbury Plains, joining up with the 3rd Australian Division, then slowly concentrating. The Company was the first of the Divisional Engineers to arrive, and at once came under the orders of Lt-Col. H.O. CLOGSTOUN, R.E., C.R.E. of the Division.

After disembarkation leave training proceeded at Lark Hill until 7th August 1916, when the Unit entrained to Brightlingsea, Essex, for the purpose of carrying out Pontoon training. In the end it remained there for two months, doing the full course of R.E. training at that depot. Personnel were billetted on the townspeople and were the first Australians to visit the place; both the military authorities and the townsfolk were agreeably surprised to find that their lives and property were not appreciably jeopardised by the wild colonial soldiery.

After the return to the Division at Lark Hill training in Field works in conjuction with Infantry was undertaken; the trench system at the Bustard will always be remembered by the original members of the Unit. A specially interesting exercise was a route march under tactical conditions lasting five days from Lark Hill through Chitterne, Westbury, Devizes, Pusey and back to camp.

On 24th November, 1916, after three months in England the Unit left for France, going by train to Southampton and embarking there on the B.I. s.s. "NIRVANA" which reached LE HAVRE next morning. After a "rest" in the wretched Docks Rest Camp at that port the unit entrained complete at 7 p.m. on the 26th and detrained at BAILLEUL at noon on the 28th. From BAILLEUL the transport marched, and the remainder bussed to BLEU near VIEUX BERQUIN.

From BLEU the unit went to STEENWERCK on the 30th Nov. 1916 and Headquarters and two sections moved into ARMENTIERES (billets in Tramway Barn at L'ATTARGETTE) on December 3rd, taking over LYS River bridges, Artillery work etc., the other two sections being on hutments and horse standings near STEENWERCK. The 3rd Division had relieved Frank's Force in the Armentieres sector and the 11th Field Company was reserve Field Company.

On 24th December 1916 the 11th A.I. Brigade relieved the 9th A.I. Brigade in the L'EPINNETTE Sector, east of ARMENTIERES, and this Company took over engineer work in the area from the 9th Field Company, the whole company first concentrating in ARMENTIERES.

The Company remained working in this area until March 14th, 1917, when it took over work in the LE TOUQUET Sector, North of the River LYS, from the New Zealand Engineers, and moved into STUFF CAMP, PONT DE NIEPPE.

The period in ARMENTIERES constituted the Unit's first experience of actual war conditions. For the first3weeks work consisted of overhauling the demolition charges for existing bridges over the River LYS, and repairing temporary bridges. Assistance was also given the Artillery covering the Divisional front in the construction of O.Ps., and gunpits, among the ruins of HOUPLINES and the outskirts of ARMENTIERES. Lt. R.W. LAHEY was wounded while on this work, but returned to the Unit.

on going into the line with the 11th A.I. Brigade work was very vigorously prosecuted on the trench system, and the whole company worked very hard, in spite of the extremely severe winter weather.

At this time ARMENTIERES sheltered quite a large civilian population; estaminets, cafes and shops were numerous, and it was extraordinary to see the business of the town carried on so calmly within easy range of the enemy guns. The civilians were shelled out shortly after the battle of MESSINES.

on 5th April, 1918, preparatory work was commenced in the area of the MESSINES Battle - so called the "MAGNUM OPUS".

On the 7th the LE TOUQUET Sector was handed over to the 105th Coy.

R. E. and work concentrated on MESSINES preparation chiefly in the neighbourhood of PLOHGSTEERT Wood, Hill 63, and ST IVES.

Work went on steadily until July 6th, when the company was shelled out of STUFF CAMP with the loss of four killed and three wounded.

In preparation for the MESSINES Battle a fine model was made by the Company surveyors of the area including Hill 63 and the MESSINES Ridge as far east as the River LYS. This model, which was of solid wood and showed great detail to a scale of 1/2,500 h orizontal and 1/400 vertical, was used by the 11th Inf. Bgde. during the battle, and was afterwards sent to England for despatch to Australia.

Early in the morning of June 7th, the company moved to WEKA 142 LINES, ROMARIN, and stood by in reserve during the first stage of the Battle of MESSINES. On the 9th, the unit moved into BUNHILL ROW in PLOEGSTEERT WOOD, and relieved the 10th Field Co. The Company camp was shelled and gassed heavily all the first night, casualties being three killed and four wounded. Work has started immediately in the Battle area north of the River DOUVE, and every effort was made to improve the communications through the "Crater field" in order to facilitate the advance of the 11th A.I. Brigade, which had relieved the 10th A.I. Brigade in this area and experienced hard fighting in advancing to the "Green Line" and afterwards holding it. Enemy shelling was heavy, but the unit was fortunate enough to escape with very light casualties. During one heavy burst of shelling two sections of the company sheltered in the same trench as a company of infantry; the infantry suffered 23 casualties while the sappers escaped unhurt.

Lieut. W. H. THOMAS was in charge of the Divisional R.E. dump at CANPAC, in PLOEGSTEERT WOOD, throughout the preparations for the battle and the battle itself. Despite the heaviest shelling, both with H.E. and with gas, he stuck to his post in the dump and did a great deal to ensure the regaular supply of materials. When the Division was relieved he was evacuated suffering from gas, but afterwards rejoined the Unit and was awarded the MILITARY CROSS. For good work in the operation, MILITARY MEDALS were awarded to 2nd Corpl. C.C. JONES, Driver A.A. PAGET, and Lce-Corpl. W.W. EVANS.

On 12th June, the company moved to LA BOUDRELLE, south of STEENWERCK - a most delightful place after the battle area - and on the 15th started work on the so-called Black Line south of the River DOUVE in the vicinity of GREY FARM. On the 20th this work was handed over to the New Zealand Engineers, and the company marched on the 21st to NEUVE EGLISE (camp at STAMPKOTMOLEN).

On the 23rd the MESSINES Sector was taken over from the 25th Division, and the company started work with the 11th A.I. Brigade, which was holding the forward system on the whole divisional front, from the River DOUVE to the BLAUPOORTBEEK. A very strenuous time ensured until July 11th, the infantry of the Brigade carrying out a vigorous policy involving pushing the line forward and an enormous amount of the digging, and the sappers carrying out well-sinking, repairs to concrete dugouts and construction of new shelters, trench improvements, tracks, maps, and similar work. In spite of considerable enemy artillery activity, losses were slight.

After six days training at NEUVE EGLISE the company marched to LA BOUDRELLE, but returned to NEUVE EGLISE and took part in the operation at the WINDMILL on July 31st. It returned to LA BOUDRELLE on August 15th and started pontoon training on the River LYS, but on the 19th was ordered to commence roofing the big ammunition dump at LA CRECHE. Work was, however, stopped on the 20th and on the 21/22 the unit moved with the Division to the training area near FAUQUEMBERGUES, S.W. of ST. OMER, and billetted in RECQUEBROEUCQ on the River AA.

Here the company stayed until September 25th, training, and refitting. This was a very delightful period, the accommodation for all ranks being good, the country people very kindly, and the weather favourable. Opportunities for training were also good, and the Unit was in a very good state when it started marching northward with the Division on September 25th, to take part in the third Battle of YPRES.

Before leaving the training area the company took part in two noteworthy parades, one on the 19th September, when the Divisional Engineers assembled with full transport and carried out evolutions under the C. R. E., and again on the 22nd when the whole of the 3rd Division, less Artillery and transport, was inspected by the Commander-in-Chief, F.M. Sir Douglas HAIG.

The march northwards, with the 11th A.I. Brigade Group, was via BLARINGHEM, EECKE and POPERINGHE to YPRES, which was reached on the 30th September. The Company took over from the 529th Field Co. R.E. (3rd British Division) and billeted in cellars and shelters among the ruins just south of the prison. The horselines were at BRANDHOEK, with, later, an advanced camp east of YPRES.

For the next three weeks the company was continuously engaged in the battle area, in the Divisional sector, north of the ZONNEBEKE Railway, assisting first the 3rd Australian Division in the attack of October 4th, and then the 66th British Division on October 9th, and the 3rd Australian Division again in the advance of the 12th October. The work was very arduous and the company suffered a steady drain of casualties.

Under these conditions the possession of ample Comforts funds supplied chiefly by friends in Australia contributed considerably to the comfort and efficiency of the Unit, as it rendered possible the supply of hot drinks and food at all hours to the different parties, and of emergency chocolate rations to parties on exposed work.

Worthy of special note during this period was the work done by Lieut. J.M. NORTON and a small party of surveyors in laying down an elaborate system of jumping-off tapes for the attack of October 4th, and a similar task carried out by Lieut. S.W. MATTERS previous to the attack of the 9th October. On the 4th, Lieut. H. StA. MURRAY and a party of sappers and attached Infantry (the 11th A.I. Brigade had supplied a permanent working party of three officers and 100 other ranks who lived and worked with the company) pushed forward on to the top of the BROODSEINDE Ridge immediately behind the attacking infantry and dug and wired a number of strong points. The transport, both pack and wheeled. carried out very difficult and dangerous tasks under Captain O.B. WILLIAMS and Lieut. W.H. THOMAS M.C., and the work of the surveyors was also particularly arduous and valuable. Lieut. H. StA. MURRAY received the MILITARY CROSS, 2nd Corpl. C.P. ATKINS the MERITORIOUS SERVICE MEDAL, and 2nd Corporal A.M. STEWART, 2nd Corpl. J.J. MACE, Lce-Corpl. W.G. TOFT, Driver A.H. FURNISS and Sapper F.C. BUGDEN the MILITARY MEDAL.

On being relieved by the 12th Canadian Field Coy. Engrs., 22.10.17 the company moved back to RECQUEBROEUCQ (dismounted by train, transport by road) and rested and refitted until 12th November, 1917, when the Division once more went into the line in FLANDERS, revisiting one of its old haunts in the LE TOUQUET - PONT ROUGE and WARNETON Sectors, taking over from the 8th British Division. The 11th Field Co. A.E. was placed in reserve, took over a camp near WULVERGHEM (28, T.10.a.5.9.) and commenced work on pipe-burying, Artillery positions, drainage and the like. Regular winter warfare conditions commenced, and much useful work was effected.

After a month in the line, the Division was relieved by the 2nd Australian Division and went into Corps Reserve, with Headquarters at METEREN, and the 11th Field Co. A.E. moved into MAHUTONGA Camp on WATERLOO ROAD near NEUVE EGLISE. A programme of training was commenced, but most of the available strength was soon absorbed on various back area works, and finally the Division somewhat unexpectedly took over the ARMENTIERES Sector from the 38th (Welsh) Division. This Unit went into the line with the 11th A.I. Brigade on the right, and billeted in the big Jute factory near the emergency bridge over the LYS.

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APPENDIX

Conditions were much as prevailed during the previous winter, there being plenty of work unhampered by any undue enemy interference. Under the circumstances quite a memorable Xmas was spent, the feasting by the section messes providing the best possible testimonial to their Cooks.

The stay in this Sector was quite short, the 57th British Division relieving the 3rd Australian Division on 3rd January, 1918, the 11th Field Co. A.E. returning to MAHUTONGA Camp.

The next move was into the LE TOUQUET - PONT ROUGE Sector with the 11th A.I. Brigade, the 11th Field Co. A.E. taking over from the 5th Field Coy. A.E., 2nd Australian Division, on 31st January, 1918. With the help of a permanent working party from the 11th A.I. Brigade, great progress was made in improving the drainage and the whole system of defences of the area, which was handed over again to the 5th Field Co. A.E. on 3rd March, 1918.

The Division was now due for its turn in the back area and the company moved by train and road for dismounted personnel and transport respectively to BAINGHEN-le-COMTE, about 14 miles from BOULOGNE, Training work was at once instituted, but the expected month at peace was rudely interrupted by the German attack on March 21st, and the Division hurriedly moved towards & the line. Trains, as usual, took the dismounted personnel.

The first move was to the EECKE area on the 22nd March. On the 24th the company moved by motor lorry to WARDRECQUES Station (Divisional Headquarters, BLARINGHEM). On the 25th bridging equipment was picked up and all equipment overhauled. On the 26th a move was made to DOULLENS, and thence the unit bussed to FRANVILLERS, near the confluence of the SOMME and ANCRE, arriving on the 27th, and marching to HEILLY in the ANCRE a valley. On the 29th it moved to BONNAY, a little to the south-west, and established horselines at FRANVILLERS. On the 30th the enemy attacked the 11th A.I. Brigade, but was repulsed with heavy loss.

The work of the 11th Field Company in the new warfare was very interesting. Bridges over the SOMME and the ANCRE had to be prepared for demolition and guarded; new emergency bridges were built, the pontoon equipment being actually put to use in one emergency; a steel bridge over the SOMME at BOUZENCOURT was blown down, and a number of mined dugouts were started. For this last work timber was essential, but was almost unobtainable. Some was salvaged, some cut by hand in the woods with pitsaws, until finally a small steam saw-milling plant was found in CORBIE, set up on the bank of the ANCRE near BONNAY, and run by men from the company.

The attack by the enemy on VILLERS-BRETONNEUX on April 24th. was accompanied by heavy shelling north of the SOMME, during which the company was driven out of BONNAY. It subsequently established itself in bivouacs in a valley near HEILLY. On the 24th Lieut. S.W. MATTERS and 2/Lieut. H.E.S. MELBOURNE were both wounded in the forward camp of their sections and a number of men gassed.

On the 30th April, line work was handed over to the 9th Field Company, A.E. and reserve company work taken over from them; and on May 10th the Division was relieved by the 2nd Australian Division and work handed over to the 7th Field Coy. A.E. and the 11th Field Coy. A.E. moved into PONT NOYELLES, the 3rd Australian Division becoming Corps reserve.

At PONT NOYELLES the company supervised the work of an English Labor Coy. on neighbouring trenches, and improved the emergency route and bridges over the River HALLUE, until the 20/21st when the Division relieved the 4th Australian Division 142

in the VILLERS-BRETONNEUX Sector. The company relieved the 13th Field Coy. A.E., Headquarters and three sections moving into camp in a railway cutting just north of BOIS 1'ABBE, one section in BLANGY and the horse lines in LA MOTTE.

Work continued on this sector, again with the 11th A.I. Brigade, until May 31st, 1918, the second anniversary of the departure from Australia, and the close of this account. Work was again interesting, including a number of deep dugouts in the chalk.



- (a) Two independent gas guards to be posted, one at each end of camp. On noticing gas sentry will wake two other members of guard, who will pass along cutting, sounding the rattle at each dugout.
- (b) All ranks will see that water bottles are full before going to bed.
- (c) Spare ammunition is in charge of section Quartermasters and at Orderly Room.
- (d) In the event of heavy bombardment of the vicinity of the camp with mustard gas, all ranks will use respirators and remain in dugouts until bombardment ceases or slackens, and will then be moved, by sections, on order from Company H.Q., by the best route to a clean area, and will remain there until the camp has been declared clean. All ranks moving about during mustard gas bombardment to sear water-proof manual capes and to remove same on entering a dugout.

S. IN CASE OF HEAVY ENEMY BOHBARDMENT OR ACTUAL ATTACK:

- (a) Parties working in or forward of the CACHY system will report to nearest Infantry Company H.Q., or if impracticable to nearest officer for orders. On situation clearing will ask permission to return to own Company Headquarters.
- (b) Parties at work behind the CACHY System will report back to Company Headquarters.
- (c) Company Headquarters and all ranks in forward camp at 0.25.d.3.7. (Railway Cutting) will stand to and await orders from C. R. E. or Brigade. All ranks to be fully equipped in fighting order, with respirators at the alert, but to remain in shelters until ordered out.
- (d) Personnel in Blangy Tronville will report to O.C., Reserve Field Company for orders.
- (e) Transport at LA MOTTE will harness up, but not hook in, load wagons, and stand to.


























































THIRD AUSTRALIAN DIVISION APPENDIX

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COMPOSITE SCALE

This scale has been designed for the purpose of plotting from Aero-Photos on to Ordnance Maps 1:10,000,1:20,000 or other scales. It is a simple device whereby the scale of any photo may be readily obtained.

It consists of a right angled triangle divided by a number of lines drawn parallel to one side so that any line drawn through the apex opposite this side and intersecting these lines is divided by them so as to form a scale. The side adjacent to the Apex is divided into 1:10;000, and 1:20,000 scales A and B and on the side opposite is marked a scale of ratios so that any line drawn through the Apex cutting this side at a given point say X forms a scale having the ratio X to the 1:10,000 scale; or in other words its RF is X/10,000. At the ratio 2.00 we have of course the scales of 1:5,000, "C", and 1:10,000 "D".

Hence the scale of any photo, if its ratio to the 1:10,000 be known, may be drawn immediately, it only being necessary to draw a line through the Apex and the point on the ratio scale

corresponding to the known ratio.

The ratio between the photo scale and the 1:10,000

map scale, may be found, (1) By calculation: -

Take any two well established points found to be on both map and photo, preferably near the centre of the photo, and using any scale find the number of divisions corresponding to the distance between them on the photo and map respectively, and divide the 1st and 2nd.

(2)Directly by the use of the scale itself:
Using the dividers, measure the distance between the two points on
the 1:10,000 map by means of scale A; then set the dividers at the
corresponding distance on the photo and find by trial the line
drawn through the Apex of the triangle, such that, on the scale so
formed, the number of yards corresponding to this distance is the
same as that measured on A from the 1:10,000 map. This line then
gives the scale of the photo. Two or three determinations should
be made as a check. The ratios of the scales as read from the scale
on the right may then be marked on the photo for future reference.

Distance may be read directly in yards from the photo or may be transferred to the Ordnance Map by using the scales A and B at the top. If plotting on a 1:40,000 map, draw the photo scale with reference to the 1:5,000 scale, and use the 1:20,000 scale in plotting.

It will be found that the majoroty of Aero-Photos lie between the ratios of 1.00 and 2.00 that is, between the 1:10,000 and 1:5,000 scales, but provision is made for larger scales up to the ratio 3.00.

Photo scales smaller than the 1:10,000 may be dealt with by using the scale D, and halving the figures on the ratio scale.
