



- 1. Third Australian Division Orders No.26 dated 31st March, and No.27 dated 1st April, together with March Tables are cancelled
- 2. In addition to the existing frontage, the Division will take over on the 6th April, the line North from ST YVES AVENUE to ASH LANE (U.8.c.60.63) inclusive.

The Northern boundary of the Division will then run from front line at ASH LAND inclusive to U.13.b.O.8, due south to HYDE FARK CORNER - RED LODGE Road, to HYDE LARK CORNER, by PLOEGOTIERT - LE BIZET road to present Divisional boundary at the MARNAVE - thence by the present Divisional boundary to STERNAEROK Station, thence to PONT DE PIERRE (36/A.10.d.O.8.) - thence by the CABT DE SAULE - GRAND BEAUMART - LE VERRIER road to the boundary of the Corps back area.

- 1. The 9th. Australian Infantry Brigade, 9th. Australian Machine Gun Company, 9th. Australian Trench Mortar Battery, together with 869th. Company A.A.S.C., and one Section 9th. Field Ambulance, will form a Brigade Group under G.O.C., 9th. Australian Infantry Brigade, and will move on 9th., 10th., and 11th. instants to BAYENGHEM-LES-SENINGHEM area, as per attached March Table, for training.
- 2. The personnel only will proceed to ST. OMER by rail on the loth. and llth. instants, and on the llth. and llth. by march route to BAYENGHEM-LES-SENINGHEM area.
- 3. All transport will proceed by road in three marches, commencing on 9th. April. This does not refer to mechanical transport, for which separate instructions will be issued by "Q".
- 4. Supply railhead will be at STUNNERCK up to loth. instant for consumption on lith. instant, and ST. OLER from lith. instant inclusive.

 Supplies for the journey will be arranged by Divisional Train.

THIRD AUSTRALIAN DIVISION.

Divisional Headquarters, 15th April, 1917.

Headquarters, 2nd A. & N. X. Army Corps.

The following copy report by 10th Brigade on attempted raid on our trenches at HOBBS FARM, HOUPLINES SECTION, on night 12th/13th instant, is forwarded for your information:-

Enemy Artillery. 1. Opened at 10.17 p.m. on Localities 14,15,16 and 17 consisting of Minenwerfer on Front and Support Lines and H.E. on Support Line. Continued until about 11.30 p.m.

OUR ARTILLERY.

2. The S.O.S. Signal was sent up from Locality 14 at 10.21 p.m. Barrage opened at 10.26 p.m. from Right Group Artillery. Subsequently a liaison barrage was put down by Centre Group Artillery. The 10th A.L.T.M. Bty., also opened fire on their SOS lines.

Artillery ceased fire at 11.10 p.m.

cations were cut in the unburied portion of the line between Battalion Headquarters and Companies. Linesmen and Signallers were immediately sent out to repair the breaks, which were many. These were mended and communication restored at 12.50 a.m.

ENEMY RAID.

4. At 10.45 p.m. an enemy raiding party, number estimated at 40, reached the outer edge of our wire, but were driven back by Lewis Gun and Bomb fire. The enemy withdrew and a fighting patrol was immediately sent out from our trenches to search for casualties and identifications, but failed to find any.

IDENTIFICATIONS.5. No identifications could be found on night of the raid, but on night of 13th/14th April the body of one dead German was brought in, on whom was found a disc shewing him to belong to R.J.R. 228, 2 K N R, 1144.

His equipment and rifle were also found, together with other portions of equipment, and many stick bombs.

The equipment had in most cases been made in SAXONY.

The rifle was from DANZIG (1916). On a belt found in NO MAN'S LAND an under-Officer's sword-knot was attached.

It is probable that other casualties occurred but we have no direct proof of this except that the Germans

withdrew hurriedly.

OUR CASUAL-

6. Our casualties were slight, resulting wholely from shell fire, and numbered 1 Officer (2/lieut.M.H.O. WHITTAKER) and 15 O.R. wounded.

The remainder of the night was quiet.

DEPY. WAR DIARY

Report on Hostile Raid carried out on April 15th, 1917, on the front held by 10th Cheshire Regt.

At 7.45 p.m. on the 15th instant the enemy opened a heavy bombardment with light and heavy guns and heavy trench mortars on the Brigade front from the River LYS to the head of AYR. ST. The bombardment was mainly on our front line, but the Supporting Points in rear were shelled as well.

The bombardment on the front line was almost immediately narrowed to the front, - Head of LONG AVENUE - ESSEX CENTRAL FARM, and grew in intensity. Our Stokes Mortars in LONG AVENUE at once put up a barrage opposite the head of LONG AVENUE.

The enemy's barrage lifted at 7.47 p.m. and 40 to 50 Germans entered our trench in two parties at the following points:-

(a) Post at Northern extremity of Gap C (marked x on sketch)

(b) 50 yds. South of ESSEX CENTRAL (Marked x on sketch).

(a) The Lewis Gun detachment garrisoning the strong point in the middle of GAP C were buried during the bombardment and so were unable to engage the enemy as he crossed NO MAN'S LAND at the Northern end of this GAP.

The Sentry on duty at the post at the Northern end of GAP C (point of entry of Southern raiding party) was wounded. The remainder of the Lewis Gun team were in the concrete dugout which was bombed by the enemy. Our casualties: 1 Killed and 2 wounded.

This party of the enemy then travelled along our front line trench, crossing LONG AVENUE and working northwards towards MONMOUTH HOUSE. When just South of MONMOUTH HOUSE one of our Lewis Guns was brought into action (marked on sketch), but it was put out by the first bomb thrown by the enemy.

(b). The northern raiding party, after entering our trench just South of ESSEX CENTRAL worked south along our front line trench and was opposed by a Lewis Gun in position between MONMOUTH HOUSE and ESSEX CENTRAL (marked on sketch). The Lewis Gun jammed and the sentry destroyed it with a bomb.

The two parties of the enemy apparently met at MONMOUTH HOUSE, and at this point left our trenches, taking with them 7 of our men (loth Cheshire Regt.) all of whom formed the teams of the two Lewis Guns marked "L.G." on sketch.

Machine and Lewis Guns opened fire on the enemy as he left our trenches, and it is thought that some were hit, but no bodies have been recovered either in our trenches or in NO MAN'S LAND.

The Front Line trench between LONG AVENUE and ESSEX CENTRAL the posts at the Northern end and in the centre of C GAP, the junction of LONG AVENUE and NAPOO AVENUE, and SUFFOLK AVENUE have been considerably damaged by shell fire.

The enemy put down a box barrage on the line- centre of GAP C - junction of NAPOO and LONG AVENUES - Head of SUFFOLK AVENUE.

Our casualties are as follows:Other Ranks Killed 13
Wounded 18
Shell-shock 3
Missing 7

The salient points appear to be :-

- (1) That the enemy practically attacked immediately the bombardment opened, and he was into our trenches before our garrison had time to prepare for him, and there us no doubt that he effected a surprise.
- (2) The enemy's stay in our trenches (5 minutes) was so brief that the supporting troops did not reach the front line until he had withdrawn.
- (3) The method of bombardment used by the enemymnamely, bombarding on a wide front and narrowing to a limited frontage, made it difficult to locate the exact point selected by him to enter our trenches.

Consequently, the task of the artillery was most diffi-

cult.

- 3. (a) The 9th Aust. Inf. Bde. will move from the Training Area on the 25th April, arriving in the Divisional Area on the 27th April, and moving into billets.

AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL

THIRD AUSTRALIAN DIVISION ORDER NO. 31.

21st. April, 1917.

1. INTENTION. It is intended to discharge gas on the Divisional front on nights when the weather conditions are

favorable.

The gas on the Divisional front South of the River LYS will be discharged by "I," and "N" Special Coys. R.E., and on the front North of the River LYS by "A" and "K" Special Coys., R.E. In addition to the gas cloud attack, projectors

will be fired from a position North of the River on positions opposite the loth. Brigade front.

2. RELEASE OF GAS.

The gas will be discharged under instructions to be issued by G.O.O's, 7th. Brigade and 11th. Aust. Inf. Brigade, in consultation with O.C., "A" Special Coy. R.B., and under instructions to be issued by G.O.C., loth. aust. Inf. Bde., in consultation with O.C., "N" Special Coy., R.E.

3. PROJECTORS. (a). The projectors will be fired under orders to be issued by C.O.C., 10th. Aust. Inf. Bde., in consultation with the G.O.C., 75th. Brigade, and O.C., "N" Special Coy. R.E.

(b). The projectors may be fired independently of the gas discharge, but if favorable opportunity offers, they will be fired simultaneously with one or other of the discharges on the North or on the South of the River LYS.

- 4. RELEASE OF SMOKE. In addition to discharge of gas, arrangements will be made by the G.O.C's, 75th. Brigade, and 11th. servicing or tol to Aust. Inf. Bde., to release smoke, as may be required by the O.C., "A" Special Coy., R.E.
- 5. WARNING OF (a). Warning of the intention to discharge gas will be DISCHARGE. given to Divisional Headquerters six hours before Zero hour, by the G.O.C's, 75th. Brigade, and 11th. Aust. Inf. Bde., and the O.C., "A" Special Coy., R.E. for discharge North of the River, and by the G.O.C., loth. Aust. Inf. Bde., and O.C., "N" Special Coy., R.E., for discharge South of the River.

(b). The Brigadiers concerned will be responsible for warning any Corps or Divisional troops in the Brigade

Area, and also adjoining Brigades.

6. PRECAUTIONS. (a). The front line from which gas is to be discharged, will be cleared to a distance of 250 yards on either flank of the gas, with the exception of sentries, machine gunners, and one Infantry Officer per Gas Sector, who will wear their Box Respirators fully adjusted, from Zero minus 5 to Zero plus 30.

> (b). The Infantry Officer remaining in the gas Sector North of the LYS will keep in touch throughout the whole operation with the Officer commanding "A" Special Coy., R.E., and those remaining in the gas Sector South of the LYS, will keep in touch with the O.C.. "N" Special

Coy., R.E. (c). O.C., Signal Coy., will arrange the necessary communications between O's.C., Special Companies, R.E.,

and the Brigadiers concerned.

- 6. PRECAUTIONS. (d). Special procautions will be taken to ensure that the trenches in front of and for 100 yards on either side of the line of fire of the projectors are cleared of troops, with the exception of those mentioned in sub-para. (a).
- 7. CODE.
- (a). The following code will be used for giving warning of gas discharge. -"Candidates will report today at (11) o'clock". THE STRUCTURE COVER This will mean that gas will be discharged that night at 11 o'clock.
 - (b). In the event of O.C., Special Companies, R.E., finding the weather conditions unfavorable, prior to Zero hour, the Zero hour may be postponed for one or more hours, in which case a message will be sent as follows:-"Candidates report (1) hour later". This will mean Zero has been advanced one hour.
 - (c). In the event of weather conditions being so unsuitable as to preclude any possibility of discharge of gas that night, the following message will be sent;-"Candidates will not report today".
 - (d). The decision as to whether conditions are suitable for gas discharge is left entirely with the O.C., "A" Special Coy., R.E., who will be able to give provisional opinion one hour before Zero. The final decision at Zero hour as to the suitability of the weather is left entirely to the discretion of the Officers of the Special Companies, R.E., in the gas Sectors.
- 8. ARTILLERY ACTION.
- It is important that conditions should be normal from about Zero less one hour.
- (b). Artillery will, however, stand by for retaliation from Zero, in case enemy replies to gas waves.
- (c). Arrangements are being made for the Heavy Artillery WO LEEN MAR ST to carry out a bombardment on FRELINGHIEN three hours after Zero hour. In order to enable this to be done, the Brigadier concerned will arrange to inform the C.R.A. direct when gas has been discharged . or projectors fired in the direction of FRELINGHIEN.
- 9. SYNCHRONIZATION OF WATCHES.
- When the message "Candidates will report today at () o'clock" has been sent out, the O.C., Div. Sig. Coy., will synchronize the watches of those concerned.

PROJECTOR DISCHARGE? April 28th/29th 1917.



455 Projectors were discharged at 12.33 a.m. at the first discharge. The remaining 45 guns did not fire, owing to continuity of circuits being broken by concussion. It was not possible to get these tatteries recharged in time for a second zero after 35 minutes.

The discharge seemed successful. Although no direct evidence was secured by the FRELINHIEN raiding party, indirect evidence procured by them showed the bridge at FRELINGHIEN (C.11.c. 45.90) to be apparently unguarded and no enemy were in the western fringe of the village near the bridge.

This is shown by the fact that near the bridge the patrol was forced to ford a wide dyke, a far from noiseless proceeding as the water was neck-deep. During this operation one of the patrol "pulled-off" his rifle accidentally. No consequent action was taken by the enemy.

Two burst bombs were discovered near the bridge head and it seems that the bridge was well caught by the gas.

Infantry Officers in the line observed the bombs bursting near FRELINGHEEN.

45 guns remain which could be discharged when required, preferably in conjunction with discharge of the remaining cylinders in the line.

REPORT ON GAS ATTACK - 29/4/17.

Gas was successfully discharged by us from two places of our sector at 12.30 a.m. this morning (29/4/17) :-

(a) by cyainders in E Gap U.28.a. & C.

(b) by projectors, firing from a line from NORTH BLOCK to CARTERS FARM C.10.c. These were directed on FRELINGHIEN At the same time smoke bombs were lit along the whole of our

front.

(a) The discharge was completed at 12.45 a.m. and the officer of the Special Company R.E. considered the attack one of the most successful they have accomplished.

Immediately at the commencement of the discharge the Enemy

Immediately at the commencement of the discharge the Enemy put up GREEN VERY Lights and then alternately GREEN and RED, which were followed at once by a bombardment of our FRONT line with light and heavy artillery, light and heavy T.Ms. and Rifle Grenades. Enemy also topened up M.G. Fire and Rifle fire but this ceased after 5 minutes, opposite E Gap which pointed to the gas affecting his rifles and M.Gs. His T.M. activity almost ceased in this area after 25 mins., but the artillery bombardment lasted 45 minutes. Just prior to the discharge our front line troops were withdrawn except for a few teams of LEWIS GUNNERS, none of which suffered casualties. One runner sustained a slight wound on the cheek from shrapnel.

The Kank front line trench and SUFFOLK AVENUE were slightly

damaged but this is being repaired.

The garrison of front line of left centre company was sent to CHESHIRE AVENUE and suffered no casualties from the bombardment They returned to front line at 2.15 a.m. during which a N.C.O.

was slightly wounded by a rifle grenade.

At 2.5. a.m. a reconnoitring patrol consisting of 1 officer, 1 Sgt. 1 L/Cpl. from Left Centre Company also 1 L/Cpl fr of the R.E. left our front line trench at South end of E Gap. They received definite instructions from R.E. Officer that should they smell gas at all, they were to return. In this matter they were guided by the R.E. N.C.O. In spite of numerous Very Lights which were being sent up by the enemy they proceeded across NO MAN'S LAND, and were fired on three times. Sounds of the enemy working in his trenches were heard, hammering &c.

mere signs that there was still plenty of the enemy alive in his front line. Having got up close to the wire the R.E. N.C.O. gave the gas alarm. The patrol put on their box respirators

and returned to our lines at 3.2 a.m.

The R.E. personnel sustained one casualty. This man removing his box respirator too soon. He died in 5 minutes. (b) The projectors were fired at 12.35 a.m. Three Batteries of which were failures. The enemy immediately put up his S.O.S. signal and sounded a high pitched horn.

He retaliated on our right company sector after five minutes with Field Guns which ceased after firing for about 6 minutes. Two trench mortars also fired for a short time from direction of

FRELINGHIEN.

There was no further retaliation in this sector. No projectors fell in or near our lines, and we suffered no casualties in our right company.

Situation now quite normal on our front.

REPORT ON GAS DISCHARGE ON 3rd AUST. DIV. FRONT.

L. Cylinders were installed as follows:
K Coy. SEAFORTH - ANTON'S FARM 505 cyls.

A Coy. ST YVES 180 "

- 2. Arrangements were made to fill the space between E and G gaps with smoke into which White Star Hand Grenades were to be thrown so as to make it more difficult for the enemy to detect the flanks of the gas.
- 3. The discharge was unfortunately divided between two nights, the 180 at ST YVES being discharged at 12.30 a.m. on the night 27/28th. Of these, 7 were either only partially emptied or else not turned on for various reasons. I sent out orders cancelling the discharge three quarters of an hour before zero, but owing to the slowness of an operator, this message took forty five minutes to reach the section Commanders' Hqrs., and by this time the discharge had already begun. The section in E gap was only stopped by a 'phone message while that in G Gap could not have discharged in any case as was also the case in K Company.
 - 4. The remainder were discharged at 12.30 a.m. on the night 28/29th Sections in E Gap and G Gap claimed to have emptied all their cylinders while K company claimed 495 out of 505. If these figures are correct there should be 17 cylinders undischarged on the Divisional Front.
 - 5. As intended the space between E and G Gaps was filled with smoke. Triple candles were used and proved fairly satisfactory
 - 6. The discharge on "A" company front took ten minutes or under, on the K coy. front, about twenty minutes. The difference is due to the fact that the former company used a separate pipe to each cylinder, the latter used four-ways. The former method permits a higher concentration of gas.
 - 7. The enemy retaliated with field guns and trench mortars on the right of K Coy and on E and G gaps but the retaliation was not severe. As has usually been my experience in a discharge unaccompanied by our own artillery, this retaliation began about 10 minutes after zero.

 There was no retaliation of any kind on the previous night.
- 8. Green and red lights were visible from Brigade Headquarters where I was, beginning about three minutes after zero and lasting until some time after the discharge.
- 9. CASUALTIES. On the night of the 27/28th, three men of "A" Company were slightly gassed. On the night of the 28/29th "A" Coy lost 1 killed, apparently from the effects of gas (not quite certain), 1 wounded, while three men claimed to be gassed and one to be suffering from shell shock. 'K' Coy. had nine cases of gas poisoning, none killed.
- 10. The reconnoitring patrols sent out on the 'A' Coy. front and accompanied each by an N.C.O. of the Company, in no case penetrated the enemy's wire, and brought back no information. I have received no information of the "K" Coy. patrol.
- 11. Projectors installed near BUTCHER'S SHOP were fired at 12.35 P.T.O.

a.m. Some of the drums did not leave the projectors immediately, but all except 45 were got rid of by 1 a.m. The original arrangement had been to fire off any that were left with artillery bombardment three hours after zero, but this arrangement was altered to meet the wishes of the 75th. Brigade, who could not clear their lines twice, and it was arranged that as many as possible should be got off within half an hour of zero.

12. Discharges also took place from "L" and "N" Coys., South of the River at the same zero (12.30 a.m.).
