Summary - 6 a.m. 31st July to 6 a.m. 1st August

No. I. Section .. SOUTH. During the day everything was quiet. Until the time of the 3rd Brigade assault on TURKISH DESPAIR WORKS the enemy seemed very peaceful. After that there was heavy rifle and shell fire which continued until about 0300. This section was shelled again at 0500. There was no sign of counterattack as far as could be seen from this section but the enemy appeared to apprehend further attack by us, judging from the noise going on in his trenches.

It is regretted that Lieut.-Colonel Harris. Commanding 5th L.H., was killed at the beginning of

the action.

NORTH. The day was quiet. A separate report is being furnished on the operations carried out during the night which achieved their purpose, and we are still in possession of the trench. This morning the enemy has been shelling heavily but has not so far seriously retarded the completion of our communications with the captured work. The enemy's shelling continued practically the whole night. There were indications of a counterattack and an attempt to work round to the north of the captured trenches, but they did not eventuate. The estimated casualties are 10 killed and 74 wounded.

No. II. Section .. SOUTH. An uneventful day. The operation in No.I. Section drew a good deal of fire from the trenches opposite No.II Section, and a certain amount of shell fire was directed on THE PIMPLE. Otherwise the night passed without event.

NORTH. Quiet day. At 2145 the enemy gun on MORTAR RIDGE shelled our trenches, and did so again at 2300. At frequent intervals between 2100 and 2400 guns fired from the direction of TURKS HUMP, but only a proportion of the shells reached our lines, the remainder evidently being directed towards Nos. III and IV Sections. After midnight there was quiet along the front.

Artillery

OLIVE GROVE batteries, field gun and howitzer, shelled our right intermittently; they were engaged and silenced on each occasion during the morning by JOPP'S battery, and with 7 rounds from BURGESS' battery during the afternoon. HUGHES' battery fired 4 rounds at a working party in 212 J.2, and dispersed them.

The 4.7-inch gun fired at CAMEL HOUSE (Square 195 D.4 - 5), where there appeared to be a meeting of officers. Two rounds appeared to be over, but two more

were better placed.

About 2215 in accordance with previous arrangements D Battery, 69th Brigade, shelled enemy works about 200 yards E.N.Z. of TURKISH DESPAIR WORKS, the 7th and 8th Batteries opening with shrapnel on VALLEY OF DESPAIR, forward trenches on HARRIS RIDGE, ECHELON TRENCHES, and machine gun positions at the northern end of SNIPERS RIDGE. The opening of the artillery fire was a signal for the assault to commence.

At 2230 report received from O.C. 3rd F.A.Bde. that

fire was satisfactory.

At 2248 the assistance of 4th Lowland Brigade was asked for against WINE GLASS battery and OLIVE GROVE - BURGESS' and JOPP'S batteries were then engaging these guns.

At 2256 the trench was captured and work of reconstruction proceeding; intermittent shelling by 69th Brigade asked for and request complied with on

WINE GLASS ceased firing at 2345.

At 2352 the 2nd Infantry Brigade reported 75 mm. battery shelling their left subsection; this report was forwarded to 69th Brigade who engaged the enemy battery and fire stopped.

A report was received at 0002 that OLIVE GROVE had not fired since 2345 and that the number of rounds authorised

had been expended.

At 0012 the 0.C. 3rd Art. Bde. reported that the assault had proved successful, but counterattack would be likely and some shelling could be expected from OLIVE GROVE and WINE GLASS Batteries.



O840 The OLIVE GROVE batteries, both Field gun and Howitzer, shelled to our right flank trenches intermittently throughout the day, they were engaged and silenced on each occasion during the morning by JOPPS BATTERY. In the afternoon 7 rounds from BURGESS, BATTERY

BURGESS' BATTERY sufficed to put an end to the enemy's fire.
HUGHES BATTERY fired 4 rounds at a working party in SQUARE

212 . J.2. whereupon the party disappeared.

1745 WINE GLASS BATTERY shelled our right flank trenches with two guns and was silenced with 13 rounds from JOPPS' Battery.

1650 rounds were fired by 4.7 gun at CAMEL HOUSE, SQUARE 195D, 4-5 in which it was observed there appeared to be a meeting of Officer The rounds fell over but may have been effective on men who ran that way, two more rounds were fired to obtain accurate registration.

The LOWARND BRIGDE did not come into action.

No. 2 Section.

The 4th, 5th & 8th Batteries did not come into action.

1800 5th Battery fired 6 rounds into MULE VALLED as some considerable movement had been observed and a report had been received that a gun was bening dragged up the road into position. This report is not regarded as reliable as the observer watching it did not substantiate his statement under examination by 0.C. 2nd Brigade Art. A large emplacement has lately been built mear SIGNAL POINT (Z 2024 A Map) but this does not make the report appear correct.

At the request of the 0.C. 2nd Art. Brigade "B" Battery, 69th Brigade R.F.A. registered this target.

General. The day was very quiet; About 0700 an enemy Aeroplane dropped two bombs in SHRAPNEL VALLEY. No casualties

Arrangements were made with the 69th Brigade R.F.A. to co-

operate with our artillery in a preparatory bombardment prior to an assault by 3rd Inf. Brigade on enemy works on the North End of HOLLY SPUR. D Battery 69th Brigade fired 60 rounds with satisfactory results. About 2215 in accordance with previous arrangements D Battery shelled enemy works about 200 yards E.N.E. of TUHKISE DESPAIR WORKS, the 7th and 8th Batterie opening with shrapnel on valley of despair, forward trenches on HARRISS RIDGE, ECHELON TRENCHES and machine gum positions at NORTHERN END of SNIPERS RIDGE. The opening of the Artillery fire was a signal for the assault to commence.

2230 Report received from O.C. 3rd F.A. Brigade that fire was

satisfactory.

2248 Assistance of 4th Lowland Brigade asked for against WINE GLASS BATTERY and OLIVE GROVE - BURGESS AND JOPPS batteries were then engaging these guns.

2256 Trench captured and work of reconstruction proceeding, intermittant shelling by 69th Brigade asked for and request complied

with on previously allotted objective.

2345 WINE GLASS Cease firing.

2352 2nd Inf. Brigade reported 75 m/m Battery shelling their left s subsection, this report forwarded to 69th Brigade who engaged the enemy battery and fire stopped.

1/8/15Report received that OLIVE GROVE had not fired since 2345 0002 on 31/7/16, and that number of rounds authorised had been expended.

0012 0.C. 3rd Art. Brigade reported that assault had proved successful, but counter attack would be likely and some shelling could be expected from OLIVE GROVE and WINE GLASS batteries.

0015 Fourth LOWLAND BRIGADE instructed to have one section laid on each of above targets ready to open fire immediately required.







NEW ZEALAND AND AUSTRALIAN DIVISION.

Summary of Events from 6 a.m. 31st July to 6 a.m. 1st Aug.

NO. 3 SECTION.

Nothing unusual occurred throughout the day.

Arrangements were made for all the Posts to draw aschuch of the enemy's fire as possible by bombs and rifle fire so as to assist the 1st Australian Division in their attack on the Turkish work North of TASMANIA POST.

the same burning flares, and throwing volleys of bombs into QUINN'S POST, where a part of No. 3 bomb proof caught fire, but was extinguished with earth. A second heavy burst of fire from the enemy broke out at 10.30 p.m. during which time they fired a few shell. This latter burst lasted for about 17 minutes.

The remainder of the night passed quietly.

NO. 4 SECTION.

During the afternoon the field gun behind BAUCHOP'S HILL obtained the range of the ammunition trench and 5" Howitzers at the bottom of RESERVE GULLY, placing several shells all about them, but without doing any damage.

During the Australian attack on the Turkish work last night, a heavy rifle and machine gun fire was directed all along the line, and the enemy's trenches in front of this Section were apparently fully manned. Their rifle fire lasted for about 20 minutes, but outbursts at intervals were frequent throughout the night.

When the left flank destroyer was shelling TABLE TOP at 9.45 p.m., a small gun on the flat in the vicinity of the SALT LAKE opened fire at her. It is reported to be a pom pom. A patrol was sent out from No. 2 Outpost but was unable to locate its position.

ARTILLERY.

The O.C. 1st Brigade, reported that the enemy has constructed a large embrazure with boxes near U BEND, on the Northern face of JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY. This was done the night before last.

The 4th (How.) Battery engaged the enemy's gun which fires from behind BAUCHOP'S HILL. Four rounds were fired at 1050 and were judged effective.

About 0700 the enemy aeroplane came over our lines and dropped 3 bombs near the Australian right, doing no damage. It also dropped darts which fell in REST GULLY, on PLUGGE'S PLATEAU and in RESERVE GULLY.

It was not found necessary to call upon the guns of this Division to support the attack of the 1st Australian Division upon the enemy's work north of TASMANIA POST.

Summary - 6 a.m. 1st August to 6 a.m. 2nd August.

No. I. Section .. SOUTH. A quiet day and very little enemy movement observed. We continued our forward works and made satisfactory progress. The night was quiet and there is nothing of importance to record.

NORTH. A quiet day. The night was peaceful and no attempt was made against the captured Turkish trench. The trench has been strengthened and the communications to it have been deepened; barbed wire has been placed out in front and generally the place has been made strong. Twenty-two Turkish rifles have been collected.

No.II. Section .. SOUTH. An uneventful day. During the night a patrol from the 2nd Battalion reconnoitred quite close to the enemy's line opposite the FINE, and found steady digging going on. At 0340 an enemy machine gun from LONE FINE opened fire and traversed our trenches for several minutes. The 4th Battalion reports a dim steady light showing on THE CHESSBOARD throughout the night; in the vicinity of BATTLESHIP HILL a large flare was lit at 0200 and burned for an hour and a half.

NORTH. A very quiet day and an equally quiet night. A patrol went out into the old Marine trench but observed no enemy movement.

Artillery .. At 1930 three rounds were fired from the 4.7-inch at enemy troops moving south along the sunken road close to its junction with ASMAK (Square 48 I.3). The failing light prevented us from observing the effect clearly.

PHILLIPS' and CADDY'S batteries did not fire.

During the attack on the Turkish trench on the night 31st July/1st August a 75 mm. battery was located for direction by its flashes. It did not fire during yesterday and ammunition was not, therefore, expended in searching for it.

At 1800 an enemy aeroplane flew over ANZAC.





Summary - 6 a.m. End August to 6 a.m. Srd August

No. I. Section .. South. Quiet during the day. At night the Turks seemed apprehensive and fired several prolonged bursts. The enemy did a good deal of work on HOLLY SPUR but were frequently stopped by us.

NORTH. Quiet day. The captured Turkish trench, which has been named LEANE'S TREMCH, was improved and strengthened during the night. A patrol lay out north of LEANE'S TRENCH but it did not encounter any enemy patrols. Eight enemy dead were collected and six more rifles and about 1,000 rounds of ammunition were brought in.

No.II. Section .. SOUTH. The day was quiet except for a certain amount of shelling which mainly fell in BROWNS DIF and occasioned no damage. The 3rd Battalion trenches suffered a certain amount of damage from a 75 mm. gun both during the merning and afternoon. During the night the 2nd Battalion sent out four patrols but no enemy were seen. Two patrols report the creation of fresh barbed wire in front of LONE INE. At 2300 a green flare followed by a red one at 8 seconds interval was observed from the 4th Battalion, and was the signal for a brisk burst of fire for about 10 minutes opposite QUINN'S.

NORTH. The day was quiet. Shortly after 2300 there was a sudden outburst of fire from the enemy along the line in the direction of QUINN'S, but otherwise the night was quiet. Sounds of hammering and apparently driving in of stakes were heard in the valley north of JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY.

Artillery

In No.1 Section BURGESS' battery fired 12 effective rounds at an enemy observing station on WINEGLASS RIDGE. Eight very effective rounds were fired at some mounted and dismounted men in square 56 S.9 X.3. BURGESS' battery fired 6 rounds at an aeroplane at about 5000 yards range at 1740, and burst one round very close to the machine. 1824

At 1845 a gun from a position in 68 V.6 W.7 opened fire on the recently captured Turk trenches on

HOLLY SPUR (LEANE'S TRENCH).

Srounds were seen drilling in square 48 H.5 and Srounds were fired at this target from the 4.7 inch gun. After the rounds the men took cover in the buildings some 50 yards to the west. Two more rounds were promptly fired into these and, on the troops returning to the valley, two more rounds were placed there. Generally the effect of this fire appeared to be excellent.

About 1920 troops were seen moving in the same locality and 4 rounds were accurately placed amongst them.

In Mo.II Section the 4th and 8th Batterias did





Summary - 6 a.m. 3rd August to 6 a.m. 4th August.

No. 1 Section. South. Quiet during the day. The enemy appear however to have very large working parties on our immediate front and they are placing overhead cover on a number of trenches. By a ruse we drew fairly heavy rifle fire during the night and it was clear that the enemy was nervous

North. Very quiet day. Except for heavy rifle fire which we draw by a ruse the night was quiet and uneventful.

No.II Section.

South. A quiet day. By gun fire a certain amount of the wire entanglement in front of LONE PINE was damaged During the night we put some effective machine gun fire on a new enemy trench. A patrol from the 4th Bn. went down WIRE GULLY. They saw a Turk patrol of three men but were unable to take them. The enemy was discovered yesterday to have a deep tunnel very close to our trenches opposite LONE PINE. It is hoped, however, to be able to deal effectively with it. An enemy aircraft dropped two bombs this morning at 0545; one fell in WHITE GULLY.

Fired starshell and opened heavy rifle fire. They responded vigorously a little later to the ruse adopted by us, to the extent even of bringing gun fire to bear on us. Later on in the night we again drew a good deal of fire by a ruse, and discovered that the GERMAN OFFICERS TRENCH and NIPERS TRENCH were fully manned. At 2335 an incendiary bomb was thrown from JOHNSTONES JOLLY into the right subsection. Them only damage done was one man slightly burned.

Artillery. Throughout the day the OLIVE GROVE battery persistently shelled the beach necessitating an expenditure of 65 rounds from JOPPS and BURGESS' batteries, and a number of rounds from the LOWLAND Brigade and 6" howitzer.

The enemy gun in square 68 " 400 yards from its southward line and on the dividing line between square V and W has been named the ORCHARD GUN.



Throughout the day the OLIVE GROVE battery persistently shelled the beach, necessitating an expenditure of 63 0800 rounds from JOPPS' and BURGESS8 batteries, 19 rounds from to 4th LOWLAND BRIGADE, and 3 rounds from No. 1 6" Howitzer, 2000 in endeavouring to silence the hostile fire. The enemy gun in SQUARE 68 W, 400 yards from its SOUTH line, and on dividing line between SQUARES V and W has been named the ORCHARD GUN.

The 5th CITY OF GLASGOW battery fired 6 rounds at CHESSBOARD trenches obtaining 4 effectives actually in

the trenches. One shell failed to arm.



NO 3 SECTION.

A ruse carried out at 9.30 p.m. drew heavy rifle and machine gun fire in front of all posts. Nothing noteworthy occurred during the night.

NO. 4 SECTION.

The usual movement of the enemy about the Chocoling

HILLS was reported throughout the day.

At 9.30 p.m. flares were burned and bombs thrown which drew heavy rifle and machine gun fire from the enemy's trenches lasting for about 10 minutes. At 4 a.m. today the enemy's fire was again drawn, but this latter burst did not last very long.

The situation is very quiet all along the line.

ARTHUBRY.

At 5 p.m. the 1st Battery had fired 19 H.E. and 16 shraphel at the enemy's wire entanglements on LONESOME FINE and at the trenches near them. The fire was effective and these entanglements will now be demolished as aften as put up.

At 7 p.m. the 4th (Howitzer) Battery fired 9 rounds in registering trenches beyond the NEK, and 4 rounds at JOHNSTON'S JOHNSTON JOHNSTON'S JOHNSTON JOHN

latter were effective.

The OLIVE GROVE battery yesterday appeared to register the WATSON FIER, and during the afternoon and evening an extremely accurate fire was directed by them against it. Something over 50 rounds were fired and were replied to by the Australian artillery.

Summary - 6 a.m. 4th August to 6 a.m. 5th August.

No. I. Section .. South. Quiet day although the enemy appear to be very busy in the tranches on the immediate front of the 2nd L.H.Bde. A ruse adopted at 2100 succeeded in drawing a very heavy fire for about half an hour.

NORTH. An uneventful day. A ruse carried out last night by us drew heavy fire including some shells, which mostly landed in SHELL GREEN.

No. II. Section .. SOUTH. The 1st Battalien reports that a new gun opened fire last evening from the OLIVE GROVE direction and appeared to enfillade GUN LANE. There was little to record during the day. The enemy made a moderate response only to our ruse and immediately afterwards endeavoured to repeat our display of coloured lights and flares.

NORTH. The enemy gum on MORTAR RIDGE fired a number of rounds into our tranches during yesterday morning and did slight damage to the parapet. There is little to record during the day. During the night our ruse only drew a small volume of enemy fire. A patrol observed no movements of the enemy. It is believed that the enemy heavy tranch mortar now fires from a position between JOHNSTONE'S JOLLY and MORTAR RIDGE.

Artillery .. In No.1. Section BURGESS' and JOFF'S batteries fired
25 rounds in endeavouring to silence hostile gun fire
from the south directed against the beach and our
right flank. A little field gun, probably a 9-pdr.
opened fire on HUGHES' battery and our trenches at
1825, and was engaged by JOFF'S battery. The gun is
believed to be in square 68 R.7.

The 4.7-inch gun was again successful in dropping two shells on the road in 68 N.5, where enemy troops were seen to be drilling. This gun also fired at transport on GREEN PLATEAU but both rounds fell beyond their objective.

In No. II. Section PHILLIPS' and CADDY'S batteries fired a number of rounds into "A" and "C" trenches respectively. BROWNE'S battery did not fire.

No. 1. Section. 2040 Between 2040 and 0200 on night 3-4-8-15, hostile fire was 3/8/15 directed on our right flank, the beach and its vicinity from the south, BURGESS & JOPPS batteries firing 25 rounds in 2000 endeavouring to silence it. 4/8/15

.0550 Enemy aeroplane dropped two bombs and reconneitred our position and BURGESS and JOPPS batteries firing 5 rounds at it.

1345 HUGHES batteryfired two rounds at TWIN TRENCHES, both bursting on graze.

1744 The OLIVE GROVE opened fire and was silenced by 11 shrapnel and 2 H.E. from BURGESS BATTERY.

1825 A light field gun, probably 9 pounder opened fire on HUGHES battery and our trenches, JOPPS BATTERY engaged this target which was found to be in Sq. 68 R 7 and simultaneously the OLIVE GROVE shelled our guns. BURGESS battery compelled him

and his fire to slacken by firing 11 rounds at the hostile guns. 0855 The 4.7" gun was again successful in dropping two shells in road at 68 M 5 where enemy troops were seen to be drilling.

1710 Transport observed on GREEN PLATEAU and two rounds fired from 4.7" fired at it, both rounds falling beyond the objective.

1900 THE OLIVE GROVE was engaged by No. 2-6" Howitzer firing 4 rounds which were judged effective, since hostile fire ceased.

1100 Between these hours WINE GLASS battery opened fired twice, the to 1500 5th LOWLAND BATTERY replying with 5 rounds, all effective.

1700 The OLIVE GROVE RIGHT and LEFT SECTION again came into action and against this the battery above mentioned fired 14 rounds, which, bursting near the emplacements appeared effective.

0745 4th LOWLAND BRIGADE fired 20 rounds 10 in each series at GERMAN and OFFICERS TRENCH, 16 fell in trench and detonated, two were

1600 short and two were blind.

1700 The same battery registered LEGGE VALLEY and WIRE GULLY with 5 rounds at each objective. No. 2 Section.

1747 PHILLIPS BATTERY fired 8 shrapnel and two H.E. at trenches A. 3, A. 4, A. 7, and A. 8, (trench diagram No. 3) in accordance with orders issued by G.O.C. Div. Artillery,

1700 CADDY'S BATTERY fired 14 rounds shrapnel and five rounds H.E. to1900 at trenches C.1, C.6,b, in accordance with orders issued by 6%0%0% Div. Artillery. The 19 round was a premature and damaged the gun which will be replaced by 5th inst. BROWN'S BATTERY did not fire.



Summary of events from 6 a.m. 4th August to 6 a.m. 5th Aug. 1915

NO. 3 SECTION

Ruses at 9 p.m. and 10 p.m. drew a considerable amount of enemy rifhe and Machine Gun fire.

The remainder of the night has been comparatively quiet : Nothing unusual to report.

NO. 4 SECTION

At 10 p.m. a fair volume of enemy fire was drawn by using rockets and crackers. They fired throughout the night in irregular bursts.

The enemy were reported working in the CHAILAK DERE at 10 p.m. last night, but ceased doing so as soon as fire was opened upon them by the Outposts.

ARTILLERY

At 11.40 a.m. and 12.45 p.m. the 1st Battery engaged the enemy's entanglements on the west of LONESOME PINE, and worked back over his trenches towards the East. A total of 20 rounds was fired for the two series. The second series was very effective on the trenches.

The 2nd Battery fired 8 rounds in registering on the trenches

at the head of MONASH GULLY.

At 8. 25 a.m. clouds of dust were observed proceeding from the enemy's communication trench beyond MORTAR RIDGE. The 4th (Howitzer) Battery engaged it with 7 rounds.

At 9.30 a.m. the gun on MORTAR RIDGE was engaged with two

rounds.

10 rounds were fired on the trenches at LONESOME PINE working from West to East.

All these series were reported effective.

LITTLE TABLE TOP and TABLE TOP were registered yesterday by the 6-inch Howitzer (8 rounds).
