1. I presume that all your troops withdrawing on the last night of the final stage will use the ANZAC - LALA BABA road or follow the sea beach, and so pass through the line of the SALT LAKE trenches.

Two gaps have been left in the wire at those points, and gaps in the wire of the inner defences of LALA BABA have also been made ~~on this road~~.

The approaches to the gaps in these wire entanglements will be clearly marked with flour for a distance of about 200 yards as soon as it is dusk on the last night of the withdrawal.

As the front of the SALT LAKE lines and of the LALA BABA defences will be mined on the last night, troops should be carefully warned to keep to the two approaches indicated.

Posts will be established at the gaps in the wire in front of both the SALT LAKE lines and LALA BABA defences, and I would request that an officer from each party which comes through should be directed to inform the officer in charge of the post concerned as to what his party consists of, and that the officer in charge of the last party to withdraw should notify the officer in charge of the post when all his party have withdrawn, so that the gaps in the wire may be closed. This is particularly important.

2. I should be glad if the officer who will command the detachment withdrawing from ANZAC during the final stage of the withdrawal could come to my Divisional headquarters at LALA BABA as early as possible on the last night in order that I may be in close touch with him should the tactical situation require this.

1. I presume that all your troops withdrawing on the last night of the final stage will use the ANZAC - LALA BABA road or follow the sea beach, and so pass through the line of the SALT LAKE trenches.

EXTRACTS FROM THE IXth CORPS OPERATION ORDER No 13.

(a) The final defence of LALA BABA and the Salt Lake lines should occasion arise is entrusted to the G.O.C. 13th Division (Major-General F.S.Maude, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O.), as is the security of "C" Beach.

As the simultaneous withdrawal of the troops on 9th Corps right and ANZAC left is of much importance, the G.O.C. 2nd Mounted Division, working in close touch with G.O.C. 13th Division and G.O.C. No.4. Section, ANZAC, will direct the final retirement of the 2nd Mounted Division until such time on night of 19/20th as he considers this duty should devolve on a more junior officer of his Division, when his report centre will close and his headquarters embark.

(e) Should weather conditions so supervene during last night of the final stage as to delay embarkation temporarily, all troops at the time within the area commanded by the G.O.C. 11th Division will be available for such dispositions as he may consider necessary.

All troops of 2nd Mounted Division and from ANZAC on passing the Salt Lake line of defence during final stage are at the disposal of G.O.C. 13th Division for tactical purposes should he require them.



1. The Army Corps Commander wishes all ranks of your Division (Section) to be now informed of the operations that are about to take place and a message conveyed to them from him to say that he deliberately takes them into his confidence trusting to their discretion and high soldierly qualities to carry out a task, the success of which will largely depend on their individual efforts.

If every man makes up his mind that he will leave the trenches quietly when his turn comes, and see that everybody else does the same, and that up to that time he will carry on as usual, there will be no difficulty of any kind and the Army Corps Commander relies on the good sense and proved trustworthiness of every man of the Corps to ensure that this is done.

In case by any chance we are attacked on either day, the Army Corps Commander is confident that the men who have to their credit such deeds as the original landing at ANZAC, the repulse of the big Turkish attack on May 18th, the Capture of LONE PINE, THE APPEX, and HILL 60, will hold their ground with the same valour and steadfastness as heretofore, how ever small in numbers they may be, and he wishes all men to understand that it is impossible for the Turk to know or tell what our numbers are, even up to the last portion of "C" Party on the last night, as long as we stand our ground.

With reference to Army Corps order No. 31 I am to say:

- (I) that in arranging for times of heads of columns to be at place of embarkation Divisional Commanders will be allowed all the latitude necessary to avoid any movement in daylight.
- (II) That on the final night particularly there must be no noise and no shouting of orders. The use of the word 'retire' will be forbidden. Although movement on this night must be made expeditiously there should be no running.
- (III) The entrance of troops within the areas:- No. 1 Post - WALKERS RIDGE - PLEASANT PLATEAU - MACLEAY RIDGE must be regulated and an officer must be at the head of each party to apprise sentries.
- (IV) A Staff officer from each Division will be detailed to supervise at the place of embarkation and to assist the M.L.O.

MEMORANDUM.

1. With reference to Naval General Orders dated 12th December and our conversation on the subject I think it is most desirable that there should be no appearance of a naval flotilla off ANZAC and that the usual normal conditions should be strictly maintained. I hope you concur.

2. I would therefore particularly ask:

- (1) that the normal covering ships only be in the vicinity during the operation unless application is made for augmentation.
- (II) That naval fire be restricted to what is normal unless application for an increase is made by the Military Commander ashore by normal methods.
- (III) That the flanking destroyer remain in position showing her light at night on the south flank.
- (IV) That only those troop carriers be brought in at one time which can be cleared promptly.
- (V) That on the day of the last night the offing shall have a normal appearance.

3. I venture also to ask your attention to the need of anchoring those troop carriers which remove troops from ANZAC (South Beach) and Brighton Beach in such a position as to minimize risk of fire and observation from the enemy OLIVE GROVE batteries.

MEMORANDUM FOR:

IX Corps.

Commodore Keyes tells me that you wish three extra covering ships stationed fairly close in off your southern flank on both the final nights of embarkation. I am afraid that on a moonlight night these ships would be visible, and might disclose that something abnormal was in contemplation.

I am strongly in favour of normal conditions being absolutely maintained and have impressed this particularly upon the troops moving from my left on the northernmost flank nearest you, i.e. those which you are kindly allowing to go with yours. I have arranged for the supporting ships allotted to ANZAC to lie off at a distance of twelve miles, from which they could be summoned if required, and could reach their firing positions in about an hour. Would it suit you to arrange similarly and have any abnormal ships for your southern flank kept at a similar distance? In the meantime, the normal ANZAC ships are available, and I should be very glad to ask for them to be stationed on your southern flank.



Reference your ANZAC S/44 of 16th December -

This point has been very carefully considered and your view is well understood. At the same time I should like to point out that the dangerous ground for an enemy's advance is through the scrub West and South-west of Susak Kuyu, which if the enemy undertake, might render our 'C' Beach insecure. Also I was studying at the same time what I thought would be a safeguard to your troops and Anzac beaches should the Turks direct attack along the beaches from the North.

I will, however, consider whether it would not be judicious to keep these ships at a distance during the night of 18th/19th.

Instructions for Rear Guard Commander.

1. (i) The number of troops remaining under your command totals 10,000 made up of brigade Commands with whom you will be in communication from Army Corps H.Q. The troops consist of brigade Commands of all Divisions and 11th IV Section and a representative of each Division and 11th IV Section will report to you for duty. Two General Staff officers from Army Corps H.Q. will also be available to you.
- (ii) The number of guns remaining is:-
 - 6 - 18 pdrs
 - 5 - 5"
 - 4 - Mountain guns.
 - 1 - 3 pr gun
 - 1 - Anti-aircraft gun
 A detailed list is attached. You will be in communication with these batteries through respective Divnl H.Q. The necessary preliminary measures for the destruction of guns which may have to be abandoned has been made by the B.G. R.A. direct with the divisions concerned.
- (iii) The medical units remaining are set out in Army Corps order N^o 21: a Staff officer from these units will report to you.
2. The troops remaining at your disposal have been organised in 3 parties: A, B and C, the first two directly commanded by Brigade Commanders, the last by specially appointed 'C' party Commanders from each brigade. A scheduled time table for the withdrawal of each 'A', 'B' and 'C' parties has been drawn up by Divisions and will be adhered to automatically unless you issue orders to the contrary.
3. Instructions have been issued for the preparation of an inner line covering the places of embarkation and for the garrison of this on the last night by special details from 'C' parties, under Colonel Paton, 2nd Division. Any change in these instructions will only be made on your orders.
4. You will use your discretion as to the time you leave. When you withdraw you will leave the Commanders of the inner defences in command and issue any necessary instructions for the withdrawal and embarkation of the Army Corps Signal Coy, the remaining medical units, and Beach Staff. The Commanders of the inner defences should be instructed to inform the N.T.O., the P.M.L.O. and Colonel Antill who has been detailed to supervise embarkation, when embarkation may be considered to have been completed. M.L.Os and Naval details in ^{communication} with the P.M.L.O. have been detailed to ASMAK DERE and Brighton Beach and they will report to the P.M.L.O. when embarkation respectively at these places has been completed.

It is estimated that 23 Motor Lighters will complete evacuation on the last night and M.L.Os have been instructed to keep a tally of all lighters cleared.

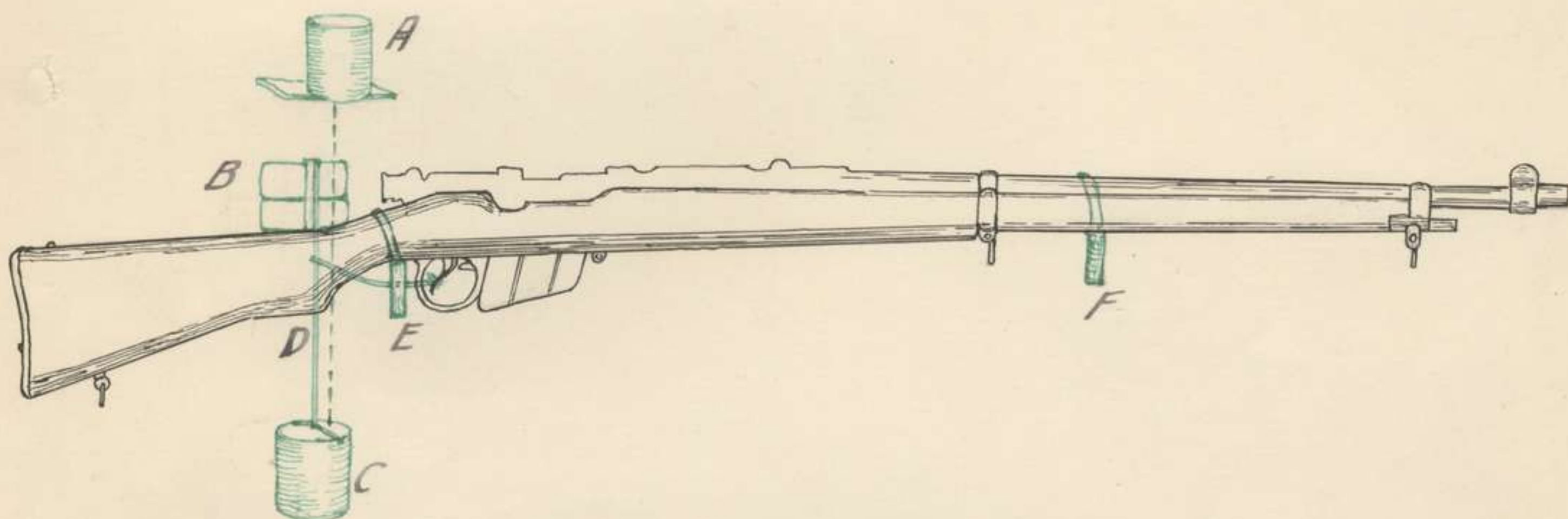
