





BDE fired 10 rounds H.E. searching and sweeping trenches on the NEK in accordance with special instructions. Fired 13 H.E. and 7 shrapnel searching near 80 T land 0810 80 0 3 for guns firing on 4th Battery. 5TH LOWLAND BATTERY fired 2 rounds H.E. in retaliation 1115 at trenches on WEIR RIDGE 68 H 2 one round effective one blind . 1150 Fired 6 r sunds in conjunction with 9th Battery at WINEGLASS Battery 63 N 9 - 0 4 enemy guns ceased firing. Fired 2 rounds H%B, at wagens seen on the move near 1430 WINEGLASS BATTERY 68 0 7 one round appeared to burst very close to target. RIGHT SUB-SECTION (LONE PINE to clusive).

LONE PINE - Enemy's sniping somewaht more active than COURTNEYS both in-usual but more erratic. Occasional bursts of rapid fire and bombing were noticed. We kept up careful sniping and bombing.

40 lbs of ammonal was fired in L.P. 15 at 2100, so

far as known result satisfactory.

Sap B. slightly damaged by explosion and overhead cover on Sap A. was disturbed, repairs are being effected.

At 1150 a small gun known to Artillery) opened fire from JOHNSTONES JOLLY and damaged parapets in Sap C. This gun fired two more shots at the same spot at 0015 but no further damage resulted.

It is reported by observers that new troops appear

to bein the trenches at this point.

B8 to WIRE GULLY .- Enemy quiet. Usual sniping carried on by both sides. Heavy Battery put in some good shots on the JOLLY and the enemy's trenches were damaged.

Engineers put in new traverseon No. 1 Post and did

other general work.

WIRE GULLY to COURTNEYS .- Enemy very inactive. At night enemy became more active than usual, both in sniping and machine gun fire, probably covering his working parties Bombs were thrown by enemy at COURTNEYS but all fell short.

Grading trenches proceeded with, some loopholes put in and parapets repaired.

LEFT SUB-SECTION

(QUINNS to RUSSELLS QUINNS. - Mining transmes tunnels 16,17,21, near Sourthern TOP both inclusive) end have been pushed forward 5'6", 5'11", and 4'2", respectively. The total length of these tunnels are now respectively 20'6", 21'2" and 23'6". Enemy has been heard working intermitantly from Nos 42 and 43tunnels but sounds are distant. These tunnels are at Northern end of post.

Enemy placed 3 new panels bomb screen with angle iron stays about opposite our centre. These have all been knocked down by rifle fire.

About 25 feet of overhead cover was destroyed by our bomb-throwers nearly opposite our centre. Enemy have commenced repairing same.

Some work is continually going on in trenches opposite South centre of this position.

POPES. Work of deepening and recessing trenches is progressing.

RUSSELLS TOP .- Work on trenches. The T. Head between Saps 2 and 3 has been deepened to 6 feet and widened to 2 feet. Sap 2 has been deepened to 6 feet and widened where possible. Continuations of Sap 2 - tunnel leading to bomb proof has been deepened to 6 feet and widened to 3 feet 6 inches. Have started to showe up with timber. Sap 1 has been deepened for full length to 6 feet and widened to 2 feet 6 inches.

Bombing - Turkish bombing for 24 hours ending 1800 26th. was unusually heavy. Doorway of our bombproof, damaged by bombs. Wood showing misplaced. and sandbags and dirt knocked down. Now repaired.

Wire - No new wire has been placed by enemy or ourselves.

Artillery 1030 -About a dozen shells were fired from direction of CHUNUK BAIR and landed in valley in front of No. 1 Outpost Very slow velocity, steep angle of descent and very few shells burst properly. Those which burst were very heavy.

Communication trench in rear of fire trench across SAZLI
BEIT DERE has now been carried to the 1st Light Horse Field
Ambulance, situated North of No. 1 POST.

The enemy's mortar is reported slightly down rear slope of PINNACLE = its firing was stopped by our shells in the afternoon, but it started again after dark.

A machine gun apparently from SNIPERS RIDGE near SNIPERS NEST made a burst of fire at 4.45 p.m. on parapet at W. end of trenches on RHODODENDRON SPUR.

Patrols sent out report enemy digging on our right of the Farm, and cutting scrub down in front of their position.

ARTILLERY

2nd Battery: At 4 p.m. men were observed reconstructing overhead cover in trenches at foot of "W" HILLS. 10 rounds stopped all work and destroyed more cover.

3rd Battery: Retaliation rounds on trenches in front of Indian Brigade, and 10 rounds at machine gun emplacement at 92 C. 6.

4th Battery: 22 rounds at 81 A. 7 with aeroplane spotting, and 8 rounds at PINNACLE trenches to stop bombing.

Q (about "M" in RAHMAN) = 5 rounds were fired at it and it ceased.

ANZAC. INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY. 27th SEPTEMBER, 1915. 1st Australian Division report. Movements: - Parties of from 15 to 20 men observed entrenching throughout the day in sq 55 K 5. Movements frequently observed GABA TEPE. Considerable amount of traffic moving from OLIVE GROVE and GUN RIDGE to RUINS. Four tents seen on spur running into ASMAK DERE, sq 48 N 8. OLIVE GROVE - 7 pairs of horses, with 1 man to each pair, entered Sunken Road, 48 N 1 5. Works:- Near right angle bend PINH RIDGE saps are being roofed in. Rear trenches being deepened JOHNSTONS JOLLY. Further loopholes put into position on N end of WEIR RIDGH. Work being continued in trench 100 right of LONE PINE. Damage caused by Mtn Bty on SNIPERS RIDGE, now repaired with brick loopholes. Party still working in GUN RIDGE, sq 68 I. General: - Two observation posts observed S of LONE PINE. (7th Battery informed.) Enemy aeroplane observed landing on clear field on top of hill in sq 37 D 6, at 1755. Aeroplane report. Five bombs dropped on landing place at CHANAK. Effect good. Eight bombs dropped on mills at CHANAN. Effect good. Five bombs dropped at CHANAK, all falling on the workshops. Eight bombs dropped on camp near KUM KEUI and HALIL HLI. 22-9-15. Five bombs dropped on camps near MEANDRE on Asiatic side. 23-9-15. Eight bombs dropped on a big convoy entering MAIDOS, 2 of which took effect, causing much confusion. A column of about 500 men moving from SOGHAN towards ALI BEY FARM. 2nd Australian Division report. Works:- Enemy are improving trenches to front of LONE PINE. Many of what are surmised to be, new dummy box loopholes have been placed in position. The work resembling an embankment on BABY 700, referred to in yesterday's report, was further worked on during the night, a considerable quantity of fresh earth being in evidence; this appears to be a large communication trench. The road on CHUNUK BAIR showed evidence of considerable foot traffic. New workings on skyline on CHUNUK BAIR, immediately to our left of road, were noticed, they can be traced for about 50x - thought to be a continuation of the road. General:- Reports from sections 2 and 3 indicate that a new lot of men are manning Turkish trenches. These men expose themselves more than has been the custom, they fire erratically, keep in the one position, and wear a head-dress like a brown glengarry cap, and one at least has been seen wearing a kilt or similar garment. Men report that they are of a ruddy complexion. At 0940 an enemy aeroplane travelling S passed in front of QUINNS POST and circling inwards flew N. POPES - snipers have observed what appears to be guard changing in the enemy's trenches, they could see a number of bayonets moving along shortly afterwards a number of bayonets could be seen going along in the opposite direction. Immediately after the supposed change periscopes became much more active, this occurs about 1130 each morning. At about 1600 snipers observed a fire about the S side of MORTAR RIDGE and heard a number of explosions which appeared to come from the direction of the fire. The fire lasted for 2 hours. 54th Division report. Movements:- 161 Subsection report small party of enemy were observed moving towards ANAFARTA SAGIR along the road past the cemetry (106 C 5-6) at 0930. The position of the field in which transport animals have been seen, as reported yesterday, appears to be about 50X S of the junction of the roads at 106 B 9. The village being ANAFARTA SAGIR and not BIYUK ANAFARTA as reported. Works:- 162 Subsection report enemy effecting repairs to trenches damaged by our artillery fire on CHUNUK BAIR. 161 Subsection report continuance of digging and chopping brushwood on Hill 100. 163 Subsection - a careful reconnaissance of section of enemy trenches between BEECH LANE and MIDDLE LANE was made between 1900 and 1940. Enemy have pegged out barbed wire about 9" from the ground at a distance of 5" from their trench, extending 15° in a NW direction along the line of their trench from its junction with BEECH LANE. Towards MIDDLE LANE the wire is wound on stakes about 5'6" high and has been much damaged. MIDDLE LANE is only about 3' deep at the enemy's end but is heavily wired - the wire is not pegged down but is laid very thickly at the enemy's end, becoming thinner towards our end and extending to within 10X of our There was much talking and little work done in the Turkish barrier. trench.

The above report and general observation point to distinct progress having been made in the destruction of enemy's wire entanglements on Hill 60. Their barricade in IVY LAME was also damaged by yesterdays bombardment. The Indian Bde report continuance of work opposite SUSAK KUYU.

General:- A bright light was observed in ANAFARTA SAGIR at 2030, it appeared to be on about the same bearing as the place where pack animals have been seen. (106 B 9). An enemy aeroplane flew over our lines between 0945 and 1000.





SUMMARY OF EVENTS from 0600 28th September to 0600 28th September 15

COURTNEYS both inclusive)

LONE PINE. - Enemy's rifle fire and bombing fairly brisk

during the night.

At 1615 hostile gun from SCRUBBY KNOLL shelled surface, evidently intending to silence our 3.7 mortar. Parapets were slightly damaged but have been repaired.

L.P. 14 has been cleared and it has been found that the charge had blown downwards and apparently filled the enemy's tunnel. A sentry is now posted at this tunnel.

The enemy appears to have located our trench mortars in Sections 2 and 4.

Loopholes have been placed at the dead end of Sap B to chable eniping to be carried out from this point.

Front B8 to WIRE GULLY. report enemy erected 30 to 40 yards of wire entanglements. Enemy have been more active than usual and at 2000 his fire increased for about an hour.

activity was noticed in the CRATER. The enemy apparently erected woodden structure. A number of well placed bombs forced him to cease work.

An hostile gun is reported at 80 S 2.

Front WIRE GULLY to COURTNEYS. - Report trenches deepened. Parapets repaired. Loopholes Constructed.

Generally - An aeroplane passed might over right Sector, 2nd Divisional lines about midnight. It is not known whether it was hostile or friendly. The Turks and our men both fired at it.

Right Sector reports deficiency of 28 periscopes.

At 1230 0230 s number of the enemy got out of their trench and appeared to be fixing something. When fired on they ceased.

RUSSELLS TOP report satisfactory progress on saps and tunnels.

A portion of the new fire trench will be within bombing range of the enemy.

A hostile gallery is being driven towards our main gallery. It is supposed that it may be as close as 3 feet now to our Gallery G. A post of 1 N.C.O. and 3 men has been placed at junction of Gallery G and our main gallery.

A light field gun from the direction of GUN RIDGE shelled RUSSELLS TOP at 1100. The principal objective appeared to be the N.Z. 18 pounder Battery. Our trenches were hit. Damage was not excessive.

From 1900 to 2030 a heavy engagement appeared to be in progress on our left extending from the level ground South of 'W' HILLS to the hills North of ANARFARTA SAGIR

The left Sector report the following deficiencies in periscopes and periscope rifles.

At QUINNS - 6 periscopes, 8 periscope rifles.

At POPES - 5 periscopes.

at RUSSELLS TOP - 15 periscopes, 6 periscope rifles.

Three new sections sandbag loopholes erected WEIR RIDGE, completing front firing line. Hears of earth getting very large along communication trench from new works on WEIR RIDGE into WANLISS GULLY. Barbed wire laid at S ond KNIFE EDGE near valley. PINE RIDGE - more barbed wire laid just N of KNIFE EDGE - near this apparently a mouth of a tunnel into the hill or hole covered with dead bushes. Marthwork, possible gun pit being improved, 68 H 1. General: - Enemy exploded mine on HOLLY RIDGE prematurely, damaging own trenches - afterwards our snipers shot several men observing result - one body still lying in open. 2nd Australian Division report. Works:- Wire entanglements, covering a frontage of from 100 - 150 yards were erected by enemy in advance of fire trench on JOHNSTONES JOLLY, 80 W 8. 9. The embankment or communication trench reported on BABY 700 shows further fresh earth and evidence of working. Works on the NEK show only slight improvement since yesterday. Further working was noticed during . the night on the Turkish front line trenches on CHESSEOARD& General:- Reports from sections 2 and 3 as to new troops occupying Turkish trenches is confirmed by observers from section 1. Turks are reported to be using buckshot at periscopes. Three white flags with small blue crescents in centre have been noticed flying from trees in the grove to the E of SARIR ANAFARTA. Hostile aeroplane flew over our position at 2330 and dropped a number of bombs in bay. NZ & A Division report. Movements:- In sq 92 U 3/6, under first E in ASMA DERE, enemy's sentry seen - there are several sandbagged trenches at this point - enemy probably living in this gully. Works:- During night enemy did a little work on ridge leading to SNIPERS NEST; about FARM and CHUNUK BAIR they appeared to be repairing damage done by our shells, only. At 2pm the Turks were removing earth from main fire trench immediately in rear of wire entanglement near FARM. Between the 2 ANAFARTAS the enemy have now dug a sap and use it for pack transport along the route. General:- Gun emplacement discovered on Hill 161 (sq 80 K) 250 to right of big washout - from a clump of bushes adjacent to it, flares and puffs of blue smoke observed during bombardment of the back of the hills by our guns at 8.20am yesterday. 54th Division report. Movements:- Indian Bde report heavy outburst of firing on their left and along their front between 1900 a 1945, which was confirmed by the number of 'overs' which struck in and around the H C of this Division. With this exception no movement of importance is reported on our front. Works:- 162 Subsection report continuance of cutting brushwood near 91 Z 2. 161 Subsection report enemy digging during night in communication trenches on Hill 100. 163 Subsection report attempts to repair damage to wire entanglements on Hill 60 were frustated by our fire. Indian Ede report enemy continuing work in front of SUSAK KUYU during night. General:- 169 Subsection - white flag recovered from knoll near 92 Z 7 by our patrols. Indian Bde shot a sniper in a tree near SUSAK KUYU. They report that 9 - 6" shells fell near 92 I 5-6, only one of which exploded no damage was caused. A book and identity disc were found on left of 162 subsection (92 U)-the former appears to be a 'small book' of a Turkish soldier called up in 1911 - he was allocated to 1st Bn, 3rd Regt, which at that time appears to have been part of 3rd Army Corps. In 1912 his father paid £ T 50 (in gold) for his discharge. Aeroplane report 25/26-9-15. 8 bombs dropped in SOGHAN DERE with good effect. 8 bombs dropped in ravine by SULIMAN Farm, which fell in a good group close to some lights. 9 bombs dropped at ENOS. 63 bombs dropped on following points: - Old aerodrome at CHANAK; Landing stage at CHANAK; Mills at CHANAK; T B D, which was surrounded with bombs but no direct hit. Confirmed report that tent was destroyed by our aeroplane a few nights ago. 105 C 9 - single gun pit, but AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL RCDIG1011100 d. Fit



Artillery Daily Report.

29.9.15. A very quiet day until 1600 when enemy open fire from 1600 OLIVE GROVE 56 Q 4 and 56 W 1 on our right and 4thm and 9th Batteries - A few shells missing 4th Battery fell near H. Q., First Aust. Divn., and one fell inte G. O. Cs dug out, burying the General under the debris. The General had a miraculous escape, and was extricated practically unharmed. NINTH Battery and Heavy Battery engaged these guns, 9th Battery firing 19 shrapmel and 3 H. E. at gum 56 Q 4, which slowed down its rate of fire, became erratic and eventually stepped - Heavy Battery meanwhile fired 24 rounds H. E., observation being checked from LONE PINE? which, being a little to a flank, gives some assistance. 9th Battery fired 25 shrapnel and 2 H. E. at gun at 56 W 1, which ceased firing after firing 3 mere rounds, and did not open again. During this series 7th Battery fired in retaliation 2 rounds, and knocked down the whole parapet at the northern end of SURPRISE GULLY 68 B 6, which had been rebuilt during previous night. At the same time 8th Battery retaliated by firing 26 rounds at trenches below TURK'S HUMP and SANDPIT and A Battery, 69th H. Brigade fired 5 shrapnel and one H. E. in retaliation, searching valley of target C 80 T 1 0645 A Battery fired 10 rounds at trenches on the NEK IN A000 1807 accordance with special instructions, and by chance cressed fire with H.M.S. ENDYMION firing at the same time-Fire of both appeared effective.

5th LOWLAND Battery fired 6 rounds H. E. at trenches on southern portion of WEIR RIDGE 68 H 3-4, one round blind, one in trench and 4 very close to trench.



SUMMARY OF EVENTS from 0600,28th September to 0600

RIGHT SECTOR (LONE PINE to COURTNEYSboth inclusive)

LONE PINE reports enemy blew up mixe mear No. 3 Section (B. and C. Saps). No damage done to our parapets or saps. This would indicate a definitexwakier defensive policy by the enemy at this point as though he were afraid of our proceeding further, since his mine exploded some distance from our parapets and did no damage. We Improved parapets and trenches. The enemy were active with bombs and caused two casualties.

The enemy appears to have improved the CRATER and

evidently occupies it at night time.

Front between B8 and WIRE GULLY report Enemy put some .75s into this Section but no damage. At 1945 as enemy could be heard working, two rounds were fired at them which drew very heavy fire from opposite us. At 2200 dirging could be heard near their entanglements and we fired in that direction causing them to cease. Their reply was weak firing.

Yesterday a special report was sent in with reference to possible indications of a gas attack. It is thought however that if Chlorine Gas had escaped it would have escaped in far larger quantities than the report indicated and the effect would have been more far reaching. Apparently no inconvenience was experienced by the men in our trenches. It is assumed therefore that the rifle grenades which were fired merely exploded a few of their bombs loaded with a special powder which whits a dark and somewhat pungent smoke. Special report on this powder and sample thereof already forwarded.

Front WIRE GULLY to COURTNEYS. -Usual sniping. Three

.75% shells dropped into trenches - no damage.

At 1945 two of the enemy were observed immediately in front of this Section. We threw up a flare and opened fire, the Turks replied with rapid rifle and machine gun fire from the JOLLY.

LEFT SECTOR.

(QUINNS to RUSSELLS QUINNS report demonstration by the enemy started by TOP both inclusive ked red rocket being fired on their right front and machine gun from the direction of CHESSBOARD fired rapid bursts for about five minutes. Machine gun also fired from our right flank. Little fire was directed at QUINNS and heavy fire at STEELES. At 2148 two hostile red rockets were fired over QUINNS, Several kerosene flares were thrown by the enemy.

Satisfactory progress has been made with our tunnels. Enemy have erected two new angle iron bomb screens

in front of North end of QUINNS. POPES report enemy placed 4 flares on their parapet

otherwise did not demonstrate.

RUSSELLS TOP report - 4 fire recesses in T head between Saps 2 and 3 have been completed and 2 other recesses starte ed. The surface tunnels are being deepened and widened. Preparations are being made to sap in from Gallery G.

At 1730 the NEK was shelled and bombing was carried out. The wire round the Turkish bomb-proof practically destroyed. An effort by the enemy to restore it was only partially successful.

There was very little bombing by the Turks during the night, this was probably due to our shelling earlier

in the day.

The enemy shelled RUSSELLS TOP intermittently between 0930 and 1130. Apparently a 10 or 12 pounder was employed from the direction of GUN RIDGE. No damage done.

5 shells from the direction of CHUNUK BAIR were fired

at 1730 apparently aimed at N.Z. Battery.



INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY. 29th SEPTEMBER, 1915.



Works:- During the night 27/28th the enemy erected barbed wire entanglements on JOHNSTONES JOHN to the front of No 14 Post of No 4 Section. During the day enemy was constantly digging on SNIPERS RIDGE what appears to be a gum emplacement. A communication trench leading to SNIPERS RIDGE to the front of No 4 Post of No 1 Section at a distance of 70 has been deepened. Approximately 150 of barbed chevaux de frise placed along crest of WIRE GULLY from first enemy trench on JOHNSTONES JOHNSTONES

General: At 1950 enemy showed a red flare. At 1940 there was another red flare followed at once by a green flare and immediately there was a burst of machine gun and rifle fire lasting about 10 minutes. The lights were on the E side of the JOLLY, where also 8 steady yellow lights were seen to be thrown from the higher trenches to those lower down, where they burnt out. At 0530 enemy blew up between L P, 14 and L P, 15. No damage done to our trenches or tunnels. Reported that at 1955 the beam of a searchlight rested on WIRE CULLY Post and swept along parapets of "A" Coy, 21st Bn. At 1030 a Turkish aeroplane flew over position and was chased by one of our aeroplanes.

MZ & A Division report.

Movements:- Patrols report signs of strong enemy patrols out,

concealed in scrub below FARM - could only estimate by sound of movementand much more active in clearing foreground and placing entanglements.

Works:- A new sap or tunnel observed near wire entanglement in front

of FARM.

General:- At 1945 yesterday enemy aircraft passed overhead - reported to be using a machine gum. Wireless station has now been established on GHOGOLATE Hill. At 1630 several small bombs landed in APEX, said to contain poisonous gas.

54th Division report. Works:- A further recommaissance was made last night of enemy's front line trench from MIDDLE LAME to IVY LAME. The wire entanglement 5" in front of the trench is intact for a distance of 20 N of MIDDLE LANE. There are 3 bomb proof covers in this section of the trench; that nearest MIDDLE LANE was watched for 10 minutes - there appeared to be no movement inside - the B edge is screened by a small piece of cloth which flapped in the wind, evidently covering an aperture. It is thought that the shelter contains a machine gun. The centre shelter was then reconnoitred and the enemy were seen to throw 6 bombs from it in the direction of IVY LAME, all of which fell short and 4 failed to explode. The 3rd shelter I of IVY LANE could not be approached nearer than a distance of 15x owing to wire. The wire, except for a distance of 20 M of MIDDLE LANE, is much damaged and lengths of loose wire were observed lying about. No wire pegged down near ground was found. Indian Ede report enemy still engaged in working E and NE of SUSAK KUYU on works above ground level.

General:- 162 report enemy shelling fire and support trenches in M branch of the AGHYL DERE; this is the first time that this sector has been shelled - shells were of poor quality and did no damage. Indian Bde report enemy shelling their lines at 1530 near KABAK KUKU, at 1600 near KAZLAR CHAIR and SUSAK KUKU, no damage being done. Hostile aeroplane flow over Indian lines about 1000 and fired a machine gun, apparently at one of our aeroplanes at very long range. This aeroplane was fired at by machine guns in the 161 Subsection without effect.



QUINNS. - Enemy troops are observed frequently passing through sap in spur 80 X 9. Mules also have been observed passing through the sap. Columns of smoke and dust frequently seen behind the spur.

During the night enemy's bombing was heavier than

Engineers report enemy working intermittently both night and day some distance in front of right arm of Tunnel 23.

Mining kummaks progress, Tunnels Nos 16,17,18 and 21 have been increased by 1'5",2'10",4'8",and 1'9" respectively. Total length is 31'6", 31'9", 23'3" and 32'9" respectively.

POPES. - 34 shells were fired by the enemy towards ANZAC from position from the direction of CHUNUK BAIR 9 shells from the same direction were fired towards PHILLIPS TOP, 4 of these fell short.

About 1800 enemy gun firing from behind LONE PINE fired 4 shrapnel on to POPES killing Lieut. Mace and wounding one man.

Enemy was observed at about 2130 working on trench to left of POPES.

By pre-arrangement Machine gun on RUSSELLS TOP opened fire, the result could not be observed.

RUSSELLS TOP: Surface workings etc. The firing recesses in T head have been completed. Sap 3 has been deepened farxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx to 3 feet and widened Surface tunnel D has been widened and deepened for about 18 feet. Work is progressing on surface tunnels from Sap 5 to Surface tunnel D.

Mining - The mine in gallery G was blown in at 2204 with September. Tamping has not yet been removed and it is impossible to estimate result. Enemy was heard working after the explosion had taken place. The Engineer Officer and several men were overcome by fumes. One man has died, the others reported as progressing satisfactorily.

Bombing. - It is reported by N. C. O. in charge of bankroof bombproof that a moment mine was fired, our crater was rushed by a Turkish bombing party. Four were shot and remainder retreated. Our crater was considerably damaged by the explosion, a quantity of earth being knocked down, the sides and the passage and door leading from bombproof being partially blocked up with earth.

Artillery - RUSSELLS TOP was not shelled during the day. About 1630 about 5, 10 or 12 pounder shells were fired at N.Z. Battery at RUSSELLS TOP, most of them passing over into the sea. At 1740 cruiser "Endymion" opened fire on NEK. About 15 shells were fired and considerable

General improvement of trenches, and extension of saps progressing.

Machine Gun on TABLE TOP fired throughout the day on SNIPERS'
RIDGE and NEST, enfilading trenches, keeping down snipers and
stopping the enemy's work.

An alternative emplacement for this Machine Gun now completed.

One bridge for upper mule track half erected, 200 yards

down DERE from 3rd Light Horse Brigade Head Quarters, and another

to be commenced probably today.

Our shells appeared to do considerable damage last evening to enemy's communication trenches leading from CHUNUK BAIR towards PINNACLE.

Patrols got within 20 yds of enemy's entanglement to our left of FARM - they saw and heard about 50 men working and carrying material.

1st Battery: On S.W. trenches of CHUNUK BAIR.

2nd Battery: At trench at foot of W. HILLS (105 Y 4.5.6) SAK and shelled DERVISH ALI KUYU and CHAKAJAK KUYU and gully at 106 R 7.

3rd Battery: At trenches in front of the Indian Brigade.

4th Battery: 8 a.m. at trenches on BATTLESHIP HILL. 5 p.m. at trenches at PINNACLE. All effective.

5th Battery: 4.45 p.m. at trenches at 80 F 8, and gun at 81 A. 5.

69th Brigade: Registered trenches beyond APEX and running down from CHUNUK BAIR, and night lines laid. At request of 54th Division, fired on trenches 92 U. 5.

17th Siege Battery: Registered Hill 100, and fired 14 rounds at it in retaliation to 75 m.m. gun which was shelling our own Hill 100. (92 N 9)

ANZACO INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY. 30th SEPTEMBER, 1915. 1st Australian Division report. 29-9-15. MOVEMENTS. About 100 men moved from Hill 472, thence weto woody POINT, sq 37 F 4. Possibly a camp extists in one of valleys close to latter place. During the day enemy observed to and from REDOUBT to IBRAHIM RIDGE in groups of twos and fours, also camel transport going S from RUINS. Reliefs were carried out in BOOMERANG TRENCHES at 1730. Dust in the valley right of RUINS, sq 48 N 6, lasted 20 minutes but no movement observed. Movements in CHANA VALLEY along KRITHIA Road to MAIDOS. WORKS: - Timber being carried forward to works at TURKISH DESPAIR. Howitzer fire evidently damages enemy trenches considerably at LONE PINE. Enemy seems very anxious to maintain them in good order and repairs every night. PINE RIDGE (centre) - a galvanised iron tube is showing at this point which appears suitable for a trench mortar. On N corner of field at S end of GUN RIDGE an excavation with overhead cover showing. GENERAL: - Enemy aeroplane flying W dropped two bombs near LONE PINE. Considerable amount of artillery fire from enemy, Silt spur being fired at by 75 m/m from NE. 30-9-15. MOVEMENTS:- About 20 men dressed all in white with white fez seen in comm'n trench S end of PINE RIDGE. RUINS, 48 N 6 - good deal of movement of pack animals to KILIA RIDGE and towards MAIDOS, especially about 1100. Parties respectively of 10,12 and 12 seen going into BOOMERANG TRENCH at 1200, 1350 and 1520, also at 1735 a party (120 counted) seen moving out of comm'n trench above BOOMERANG TRENCH on to GUN RIDGE. Small party of horsemen moving towards Hill 600. WORKS:- Work is continuous on WEIR RIDGE and dumps in rear of enemy lines greatly increasing. VALLEY of DESPAIR - a telephone is observable in comm'n trench from PINE RIDGE firing line. LONE PINE - trenches on E side now well connected with those on WEIR RIDGE and appear to form 2 main firing lines. HOLLY RIDGE - about 150 of wire entanglement hurdles placed before trench near LEANES TRENCH extension. GENERAL: - Turks are using blasting powder or explosives in doing trench or dugout work. The movement apparent at BOOMERANG TRENCHES and GUN RIDGE point to reserve in LEGGE VALLEY. The enemy is making increased use of wire entanglements. 2nd Australian Division report. WORKS:- On SNIPERS RIDGE at 150 S of deadend, enemy still engaged in digging a pit. To the right of this pit and just behind there is a machine gun at times. There is heavy overhead cover. Barbed wire on the JOLLY strengthened with wire and timber. On the N end of entanglement the enemy commenced digging. Sniping stopped this digging during the day. Enemy again working on their new wire entanglements on JOHNSTONES JOLLY. A few rounds from our machine gun stopped this. Comm'n trench to MORTAR RIDGE from gully at rear of GERMAN OFFICERS TRENCH filled in, probably because it could be enfiladed from our lines. GENERAL: - From No 8 Post, at 1515, man seen with a white turban and on the top of the turban a red spot. (Fez ?). He exposed his head and shoulders and was wearing a white tunic. QUINNS - at about 0745 enemy displayed a stationary red flag for about 30 minutes on Ridge 68 C 2. N.C.O in charge of bomb throwers on night 28/29 reconnoitred ground in vicinity of Turkish bombproof. He reports that a short open sap runs out from left of Turkish bomb wire in direction of our No 2 surface tunnel which is 6 to 8 feet distant. Head of this sap is being used for bomb throwing by the enemy. NZ & A Division report. MOVEMENTS: - Patrols got within 20 of enemy's wire entanglement left of FARM. They saw and heard about 50 men moving, apparently carrying material. WORKS: - Enemy actively working at FARM and PINNACLE. GENERAL: - Our machine gun from BIG TABLE TOP successfully stopped work SNIPERS RIDGE. 54th Division report. MOVEMENTS: - A patty of about 50 of the enemy were observed near the cemetry in ANAFARTA SAGIR at 1100. Patrols well to the front of 162 Subsection encountered no enemy patrols. WORKS:- Enemy busy repairing wire entanglements which had been damaged by our shell fire on Spur NE 80 F 3. Further digging reported on Hill 100. On Hill 60 enemy attempted to repair wire but were prevented by our fire. GENERAL:- Enemy machine gun located on spur near 92 U 5. Our 17th Siege Bty registered on Hill 100 between 1600 and 1700 several shells bursting well in enemy's trenches. Right of 161 Subsection was considerably shelled by enemy and the parapet was damaged in many places, also a machine gun. 1 shell examined- a 7.5 c/m shell marked with Turkish characters.
