11th. AUGUST, 1916.SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS.4th. AUSTRALIAN DIVISION.for the week ending 6 p.m. 11th. AUGUST, 1916.

6/7th. The 4th. Aus. Division took over from the 2nd. Aus. Division line running from X.5.6.4.1. to R.33.d.95 at 9 a.m. on 6th. AUGUST. Div. Headquarters established at TARA HILL.

The 23rd. Division bombed up MUNSTER ALLEY and were supported by 45th. Battalion who engaged several parties of enemy who were lying out in NO MAN'S LAND in front of TORR trench.

Enemy shelling very heavy during day and night. Five Lewis Guns put out of action. ALBERT AND TARA HILL heavily shelled.

Enemy counter attack against O.G.2 about 4 a.m., and were repulsed with heavy losses, about 30 prisoners taken.

During night enemy established fairly heavy barrage from SAUSAGE VALLEY to POZIERES and kept it up throughout the night.

7/8th. Whole of our front heavily shelled throughout the day. Enemy guns from direction of THIEPVAL doing a good deal of damage to O.G.1 and O.G.2.

9th. On the night of the 8/9th. the 15th. Battalion 4th. Brigade co-operated with the Suffolks against trench R.34.a.74 to R.33.d.5.7 The objective was heavily shelled during the day and the assault was launched at 9.20 p.m. The Infantry advanced under a heavy barrage which was kept on the objective for 3 minutes, then, as the barrage lifted they rushed forward and entered the trench. Just before reaching the trench the left portion of the 15th. Battalion line was met with cross fire from Machine guns established in point 78 and suffered fairly heavily on that part of the line, but they pushed forward and seized the objective, taking about 22 prisoners. They immediately started to consolidate the position and to try and get touch with the Regiment on their left. This they could not do as the enemy still held point 78, where they enfiladed our line, which had to be brought back, and the line then stood R.34.b.2.4., a.74, 53, C.27.

Throughout the day enemy artillery concentrated fairly heavily along our front but position remained unchanged.

Work on improvement of fire and communication trenches gone on with.

9/10th. Certain trenches were taken over from the 12th. Division during the day by the 16th. Battalion. This enabled the attack to be delivered from a more favourable direction, and under cover of a very heavy bombardment R.34.a.12 to R.33.d.5.7. was carried.

The 15th. and 16th. Bns. co-operated in this attack, and the advance was covered by artillery barrage and whole of objective was gained, about 30 prisoners and 3 M.G.'s taken. The line then ran R.33.d.26 - 78 - 89 - 99. R.34.a.12 - 53 - 74 - 95 b.24. This line was held and was subjected to fairly heavy bombardment throughout the day. Our Artillery maintained a slow barrage all along the front, and carried out some very good counter battery work.

10/11th. During the day the 15th. Battalion relieved the 16th. Battalion and during the night the 15th. and 16th. Battalions co-operated in an attack against R.34.a.96 - 53 - 34 - 43, R.35.b.61.d.28. Enemy's defence was feeble and attack was successful all along the line, and about ten prisoners were taken. About 3.30 p.m. reports were received that the enemy's infantry were concentrating for an attack in the neighbourhood of MOUQUET FARM and 1,000 yards S.E.

of POZIERES. Within a short time a heavy concentration of Artillery fire was directed into these areas.

Enemy shelling fairly heavy throughout the day.

At the time this report was closed 6 p.m., 11th. AUGUST
the lines to the 4th. and 12th. Aus. Infantry Brigades were
cut by shell fire, and no further news was to hand.

Appended is a statement showing the Casualties since the Division came into the line.



Weekly Operation Report

44th Australian Infantry Brigade

Period to noon Friday 8/10.

In the night of 8/9th at 920pm the 15th Battalion assisted by 4th M.G. Bty, 4th L.T.M.Bty and Artillery (Barrage previously arranged) with 1 boy of 16th Battalion in support attacked successfully, but owing to Suffolk Regiment having failed to reach their objective. The C.O. 15th Battalion deemed it advisable to withdraw the men objective. The remainder of 15th Battalion reached left company to original line, the remainder of 15th Battalion reached their objective and at dawn their position was as follows from R 34 b. 24; b 94 - 53; back to c 36.

On night of 9/10th 16th Battalion assisted by 4th M.G. Bty, 4th A.L.T.M.Bty and Artillery (Barrage previously arranged) with 1 boy of 13th Battalion in support attacked successfully the circular trench 100 yards N of point R 33 d 85 - 95; then took line from R 33 d 85 - 95 to R 34 a 12 and joined up with the 15th Battalion at point on R 34 a 12 and joined up with the 15th Battalion at point on R 34 a 42. The 16th Battalion occupied hostile trenches running from R 33 d 77 to 26.

On the 10th the 13th Battalion relieved the 15th Battalion's relief being complete by 930pm.

On the night 10/11th the 13th Battalion and 16th Battalion with assistance of 4th M.G. Bty and 4th A.L.T.M.Bty and Artillery (Barrage previously arranged) attacked successfully and gained their objective which was R 34 b. 24 a 96 - 65 - 34 - 13 to R 33 b 61 d 28 - 26.

The 16th Battalion held line from R 35 c 48 to R 34 b 24. The 4th Bde have now 3 Battalions in front line which reads from R 35 c 48 to R 34 b 60 - 24 a 86 - 65 - 34 - 13 to R 33 b 61 d 28 - 26.

Our weekly casualty report has already been sent to D.H.Q. over. Our objective for the proceeding week is as follows on the night 11/12th. 12th AUSTRALIAN INFANTRY BRIGADE.

Weekly report on operations between
4th and 11th August, 1916.

4th August. The Brigade (less 40th Battalion which had already been sent up to assist the 2nd Division by carrying water, ammunition, stores etc.) moved to TARA HILL as reserve brigade to the 2nd Austr. Division.

5th August. Orders were received at 3 p.m. to relieve 5th Austr. Infantry Brigade and part of 7th Austr. Infantry Brigade immediately and the Brigade moved off from TARA HILL at 4.30 p.m.

The 45th and 48th Battalions were ordered to take over the front line from X.5.b.22.28 to C.T. R.32.Q.4.0. the ALBERT-BAPAUME road being the dividing line between the two battalions.

47th Battalion was ordered in support to the strong points X.10.c. 6.9. - X.10.a.2.9. - 7.7.

The relief was carried out under very great difficulty owing to constant heavy enemy shelling and heavy enemy barrages being kept over the whole area.

Trenches Q.G.1 occupied by one Battalion 7th Austr. Infantry Brigade had been evacuated and wounded left there.

These were re-occupied, wounded collected and evacuated under very trying and difficult conditions.

There were very few communications to the rear and those that were there were mostly blocked and congested by wounded and dead.

6th August. Enemy heavy bombardment and constant barrage continued. At 4 a.m. enemy counter attacked our right sector, ^{OK} but was repulsed and severe losses inflicted on him, and four prisoners captured.

During the day 5 Lewis guns and one Vickers gun were rendered useless by enemy shell fire.

Enemy planes were up a good deal during the day and, consequently their shelling was very accurate.

Preparations for operation against TORR TRENCH and MUNSTER ALLEY in conjunction with the 69th Infantry Brigade were completed, but the operation was cancelled by 2nd Austr. Division.

7th August. At 4 a.m. the enemy made a determined counter attack on our front line and penetrated our left flank but were driven back by a determined counter attack of the 40th Battalion and 14th Battalion (4th Austr. Infantry Brigade). 40 prisoners were captured.

The enemy attack on our right sector was easily repulsed by the 45th Battalion and heavy losses inflicted. 2 prisoners captured.

25 wounded prisoners were taken and evacuated to dressing stations.

The ammunition dump of 7th Austr. Infantry Brigade and two cookers of 48th Battalion were blown up about 11 a.m. by enemy shell fire.

Communication trenches were dug and improved. Strong points made and consolidation of front line was proceeded with.

The 48th Battalion was relieved by 47th Battalion at 2.30 p.m. and relief completed by 5 p.m. 48th Battalion moving into support line.

8th August. Enemy continued bombardment and maintained heavy barrage over the whole area.

A small enemy counter attack developed against X.5.b.7.2, but was easily repulsed by 45th Battalion and two prisoners taken.

During the afternoon enemy shelling slackened somewhat.

46th Battalion relieved 45th Battalion on the right sector of defence. 48th Battalion moved back in reserve and 45th Battalion moved back in support line.

Patrols were sent out during the afternoon to reconnoitre along the road to R.32.Q.2.4 to R.32.Q.9.0 to R.32.Q.7.4.

Towards evening Q.G.1 and Q.G.2 N. of the windmill was heavily bombarded and enfiladed by enemy guns, a good deal of damage being done to trenches and communications.

9th August. Heavy enemy shelling continued during the morning

but slackened towards the afternoon.

Special patrol sent out to reconnoitre the SUNKEN ROAD at R.35.d.3.2 and 4.0.

Enemy searched SAUSAGE VALLEY with H.M. without doing any material damage.

Indirect machine gun fire was brought on SUNKEN ROAD R.35.d.3.4 from X.11 Central.

Work continued on consolidation and construction of strong points.

10th August. Enemy artillery became very active on our left sector TRAINAY AVENUE and O.G.2 being searched with H.M.

An enemy aeroplane flew low over this sector about 5 p.m.

The whole of SAUSAGE VALLEY was subjected to an active searching by enemy heavy guns.

Officers patrol under Lt. Craig went out to reconnoitre the sunken road. Report sent to Division under separate cover.

Work on communications and strong points continued.

11th August. Considerable heavy enemy barrage was kept over the left area, otherwise situation normal.

Work continued on consolidating communication trenches.

WEEKLY REPORT ON OPERATIONS
12th DIVISION.
From 2 p.m. August 4th to 2 p.m. August 11th.

OPERATIONS.

In the course of the past week, our line has been considerably advanced on a frontage of 1200 yards - the whole of FIFTH AVENUE being now in our possession.

The enemy has made several determined counter-attacks, using Flammenwerfer in the fighting for FIFTH AVENUE. In conjunction with the 4th Australian Division, the North East end of this trench was secured: the Australians further extending their line to the N.E. for some 700 yards.

Fifth AVENUE has been joined up to FOURTH AVENUE by two trenches.

(a) From X.3.A.9.5. to R.33.C.7.5. and (b) from X.3.B.3½.8½. to R.33.D.1.4.

At the South West end of FIFTH AVENUE the strong point at X.2.A.9.0. was made good, and trenches dug through from point X.2.D.4.7. to X.2.B.9.0. and from X.2.D.8.7. to X.2.B.9.0.

Our barricade now being held a few yards East of strong point at X.2.B.6.2.

The details of the weeks fighting are as follows :-

On the night of the 4th/5th two Companies of the 7th Royal SUSSEX Regiment on right, and three Companies of the 9th Royal Fusiliers on Left, made a successful attack on FIFTH AVENUE, capturing from about 150 yards N.E. of point X.2.B.9.3. to about 30 yards N.E. of point R.33.D.2.6. Touch was once established and later the 8th Royal Fusiliers, who were already in the South West portion of the trench, bombed up it until getting in touch with the 9th Royal Fusiliers' Left.

Simultaneously with the above attack, an unsuccessful attempt was made to take the strong point at R.33.D.7.7. in the extreme North Easterly end of FIFTH AVENUE, but in the South West end the 6th Royal West Kents further extended the line through point X.2.B.9.0. to a few yards East of point X.2.B.6.2., where a bombing stop was established.

During this fighting 15 prisoners were captured.

On the morning of the 5th a number of enemy was seen in between FOURTH and FIFTH AVENUES; these were steadily bombarded with Stokes Mortars until three Officers and 188 men surrendered.

On the 8th August at 3½ a.m. the enemy made two determined attacks using Flammenwerfer on our bombing stop about point R.33.D.2.6., and succeeded in driving us back a few yards, where a new stop was made.

At the same time he attempted to take our bombing post near X.2.b.6.2. but was repulsed with loss.

On the night of the 8th/9th the 7th SUFFOLKS in cooperation with the 4th Australian Division made an attack on the remainder of FIFTH AVENUE and point R.33.D.7.7. The attack was partially successful, our bombing stop being advanced to within 50 yards of R.33.D.7.7.


On the night of the 9th/10th the 4th Australian Division carried the strong point at R.33.D.7.7., and the 7th SUFFOLKS took the remainder of FIFTH AVENUE up to that point.

In this fighting the 35th Stokes Mortar Battery captured 9 prisoners.

The total number of prisoners captured since the last report is approximately 3 Officers and 250 men.

The enemy artillery has been very active - our newly won positions and approaches to them being constantly shelled. MARTINSART WOOD has been heavily shelled while ECUZINJOURT receives daily attention.

Our Artillery has been making the enemy trenches practically untenable. Patrols have kept touch with the enemy throughout.

In anticipation of the successful attainment of the objectives to be attacked on the 12th/13th it is necessary to foresee and prepare for subsequent operations.

2. For the present the energies of the Corps will be limited to the occupation of a line in the vicinity of MOUQUET FARM. The exact position to be occupied must now be determined, and if after its occupation our rôle is temporarily to be defensive the location of our whole front must be considered and the distribution of troops adjusted to the new requirements.

3. As regards the first point, - the definition of the line to be occupied - the deciding factor is the retention of our hold on the high ground. MOUQUET FARM is slightly in the "dip", - and incidentally the German maps show it on the northern side and not on the southern side of the re-entrant. Apparently the German map is correct but confirmatory information is awaited as to the view to be obtained from our present forward position. Our objective, therefore, on the right must be the line R.28.c. 9.5., 66, 36, R.27.d.95.40, 94, 73, 42. If the present boundary between us and the adjoining Corps is to be adhered to then our attack must be extended to the left against points R.27.d.1.2., R.33.d.2.9. and R.33.a.7.7. This amounts to a frontage of some 1200 yards which is considerable for the troops available. The question of changing the Corps boundary will therefore be referred to Army Headquarters.

B Even with a reduced line, however, the arrangements for attack will not be simple. From point R.34.a.38. and its vicinity, the new objective on this flank R.28.c.95.. 66, 36, is distant some 400 yards. An intermediate jumping off line in the vicinity of the SUNKEN ROAD running from R.28.c.21.. appears to be necessary.

The indefinite trench work running from 95 to 24 may, or may not, menace the flank of an attack from R.34.a.38. In air photographs the trench appears to be a shallow and discarded line.

Similarly, to attain the objective between R.27.d.04. 42, an intermediate line between R.28.c.01. and R.33.b.48. is a necessity. The sunken road, if occupied by patrols, might, in the one case be utilized and in the other the MOUQUET FME. - COURCELETTE Road. The latter appears to have a small trench along it. But in any case occupation by patrol posts might save the construction of separate lines.

Apparently therefore in our next advance we must move by two stages - that is to say as far as the right portion of the advance is concerned; our flank will, however, always need special care. The left portion of the attack - if it falls to us - will be less difficult and an intermediate line will not be necessary. Requirements will be met by pushing forward a post from R.33.b.5.5. and connecting this with the QUARRY POST.

4. - As regards the remaining points, - the general arrangement of our line and the distribution of troops. - steps are already being taken to fill up the re-entrant between 24 and 48, and this will make the line fairly satisfactory. The line is apparently well sited being slightly back from the crest.

Posts/

4. (ctd.)

Posts should however be advanced right to the edge of what may be called the PLATEAU. On our right near the BAPAUME ROAD we must try to advance by a line of posts, so as to connect with the adjoining division at MUNSTER ALLEY. There are a certain number of enemy trenches in the locality which have the appearance of being a continuation of the SWITCH LINE. The latest information indicates this line as occupied. The SUNKEN ROAD at 46, which forms part of this series was said to be unoccupied. After the operation of the 3rd Corps it may be necessary for us to advance our extreme right to the vicinity of the SUNKEN ROAD and the SWITCH LINE and preparations should be made to this end.

5. - As regards the distribution of troops it must be borne in mind that our advance northwards is gradually extending our eastern front. After the operation of 12th/13th our divisional front will be some 3,000 yards. Immediately after the operation of 12th/13th and before a further advance it is for consideration whether the eastern front should not be divided between two brigades, leaving a third brigade for allotment to the northern front, for the next operation. At the same time an augmentation of artillery will be necessary. To provide for the final operation and to meet defensive requirements at least two additional brigades of artillery will be needed, and these will be placed at your disposal.

Artillery Arrangements with a view to continuance of Operations.

The following tasks are to be taken in hand at once.

I ANZAC CORPS ARTILLERY.

N.E.

1. - Break down the German trench system running from O.G.2. so as to force any counter attack from that direction to advance across the open.

15. - Artillery reconnaissance to be made from O.P. in LEIPSIC SALIENT and written report forwarded showing in detail what can be seen of the country towards FERME MOUQUET.

16. - Gun positions to be reconnoitred from which trenches in R.31. can be enfiladed.

17. - Barrage in enfilade the sunken road running through R.20.a. - R.15.c. towards GRANDCOURT.

XIV Corps Artillery.

18. - Preparations to be made, O.P.'s established, &c., to enfilade with heavy howitzers the German trenches in Q.24.a. & b. and R.19. when the time comes.

These trenches meanwhile to be gradually registered.

1. The Reserve Army is continuing its operation in a North Westerly direction on the night of the 12th/13th August.
2. The objective of the 1st ANZAC is the line R.34.b.44 to R.34.b.07 to R.34.a.38 to R.34.a.17 to R.33.b.55 to R.33.b.13 to R.33.a.81 exclusive. The objective of the II Corps is the line R.33.a.81 inclusive to R.33.c.14 to X.2.b.99 to 78 to 74 to 62.
3. The hour of assault will be zero hour which will be notified.
4. The trenches from R.34.a.38 to R.28.c.05.15, R.34.a.17 to R.27.d.91, R.27.a.05 to R.33.b.55 will be bombarded heavily for four separate hours previous to the assault by the 1st ANZAC H.A., and the trench from R.33.b.55 to R.33.a.81 will be similarly dealt with by the II Corps. The points R.27.d.95.40, R.27.d.73, R.27.d.42 will be separately dealt with by the 1st ANZAC, and the II Corps are bombarding the MOUQUET FARM, THE QUARRY, and other strong points.
5. The time table of the bombardment and barrages for the assault is attached.
6. In addition to the barrages therein laid down, the II Corps will assist the 1st ANZAC by putting down a barrage of 60-pr fire along the trench R.27.d.42 to 73 to 95.40 to R.28.c.03 to 36 to 95 from 0 to 1 hour, by keeping a steady bombardment with 9.2" Howitzers on the trench system about R.27.d.12 from 0 to 1 hour, and by blocking the trench from R.27.d.12 to R.27.d.10 for the same period. They will also, when the final barrage is established, keep the trench R.33.a.27 to R.33.a.97 under fire.
7. There will be no fire by heavy howitzers, except in case of emergency, between the hours of 7.0 p.m. and zero hour, on the 12th instant.
- B.G.R.A.
8. The normal fire of the 18-prs of the Divisional Artillery will be continued until zero hour, and the 4th Australian Division will arrange for the barrage to be continued from point R.28.c.22 to R.35.b. Central and on to the BAPAUME Road, with the three Brigades of the 1st and 2nd Australian Divisional Artilleries, at an increased rate after zero hour. This barrage is continued by the III Corps, south of the BAPAUME Road.
9. Counter-battery work is being carried out by the II Corps.
10. Green flares will be shewn by the Infantry in the front line at 7.30 a.m. and at 10.30 a.m. on the 13th instant.

1. The Anzacs are tonight making a further advance on our right, and the 144th Inf. Bde will attack points 62, 64 and 55 in N.S.B.
2. In conjunction with these the brigade will carry out the following operations :-
 - O.C. 1/5th Gloucesters will send 2 platoons to point 81 in R.S.S.a. to relieve the post of Oxford & Bucks L.I. now there and to make a bombing attack down 6th Avenue tonight. This party must carry everything required in the way of food, water, grenades, flares etc.
 - The route is via 3rd Avenue, but an officer will reconnoitre the best way by day.
3. The men of the Oxford & Bucks L.I. should be relieved as soon as possible, their strength is about 12, the remainder of the two platoons should be in position by dark or as soon after as possible.
4. The BUCKS BN. will tonight make a bombing attack up the right hand communication trench between 6th and 5th Avenues in R.S.S.c.
- They will also do everything possible to make 5th Avenue as strong as possible, by improving certain points for small garrisons.
5. Here possible shell holes both in front of and behind the trench should be held instead of the trench itself, to avoid hostile shelling.
- Should the GLOUCESTER & BUCKS Bombing parties not be able to join hands, a line of posts in shell holes must be established from centre of 5th Avenue to point 81.
6. This is very important having regard to the operations on our right.
7. The 1/5th GLOUCESTER will clear out 4th and 3rd avenues, especially existing strong points or places that could be made so.
8. The time for the operations on our left and right will be communicated when known, and this will also be the time for the commencement of our bombing attacks.
9. This morning 6th Avenue is reported by Flying Corps to be very lightly held, but probably the garrison will be increased after dark and a further attack on 5th Avenue is not impossible.
- The Supporting Battalions in GVILLERS will therefore keep in close liaison with O.C. BUCKS BN. and will be prepared to move as required at very short notice.
